This will also work if you can't make it to a family reunion or other event. Find a trusted relative to take pictures for you (or offer to pay for a second set of prints!).

NEW BOOKS

MONTPELIER HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The Montpelier Herald has reported that the records of Montpelier Alumni Association have been published. A book recounting the history of Montpelier High School, which was closed in 1969, is now being offered for sale by the Higginson Book Company of Salem, MA.

Sources used in compiling the book were records in the Superintendent of Blackford County Schools' office, high school yearbooks, and the local history "Montpelier, Yesterday, Today, Tomorrow" (1976) among others. There are many photos along with records of the Montpelier Alumni Association. Also included is an index of graduates and their parents.

The history of the school from 1898 through 1969 is hardbound in the school colors of royal blue with gold leaf stamping on the spine. It is available by mail from:

CIVIL WAR MEMORIALS HELD

On May 11, 1996 several members of the Blackford-Wells Genealogy Society participated in memorial services held at Woodlawn Cemetery in Montpelier and the I.O.O.F. Cemetery in Hartford City in conjunction with the 7th Annual Civil War Days in Blackford County.

Lillie Harris received a certificate honoring her grandfather, John Walter Carter, a Wells county farmer who saw war service with Co. O, 44th Ohio Cavalry and with Co. K, 8th Ohio Regiment.

Nona O. Volz was presented a certificate honoring her ancestor, Thomas McCoy Blount, for his service in Co. K, 53rd Indiana Volunteer Infantry.

Norma Smith attended with several family members as her husband, Joe E. Smith, accepted a certificate in memory of his great-grandfather, Josiah Twibell of Co. I, 34th Indiana Volunteer Infantry.

Representing Rebecca Otis Tent #54, Daughters of the Union Veterans of the Civil War, Lucille Henley paid tribute to all men and women who took part in the conflict for the freedom and unity of our great nation.

Sponsored by Blackford County Civil War Reenactment Club, Inc., the weekend of activities allowed visitors the opportunity to observe living history events of the Blackford County Draft Riot, Civil War campsites and battle reenactments of the only war waged on American soil 1861-1865.

Copy of Ballad Written by Nan Sanford Is Discovered

Mrs. Florence Starr Will Sing
Song Which Was Inspired by
Scene at First Bridge on Site
of New Cement Structure.



Here is a rare photograph of the old covered bridge over the Wabash river at the site of Bluffton's new \$70,000 cement structure. It was built of logs in the "Sixties" and supplanted the first bridge, constructed in 1852, which inspired Miss Nan Sanford to write the famous "whip-poor-will" song entitled "In the Moonlight." Below is given further particulars regarding this occasion.

Mrs. Florence Starr, soprano, who has accepted an invitation to sing a ballad written by Miss Nan Sanford at the ceremony in dedication of the new Main street bridge at 7 o'clock this evening, had almost despaired of being able to procure a copy of it when she was informed that Mrs. Nona Ashbaucher, this city, had one.

Miss Sanford's song was selected as one appropriate for the occasion on the word of Mrs. George Burgner, one of the pioneer residents of the city, who recalled that Miss Sanford

received inspiration for it while standing with a group of young people one moonlight night in 1852 on the first bridge constructed at the site of the present new structure.

Mrs. Burgner thought the title of the song was "The Whip-poor-will!", but discovery of the copy reveals that the title is "In the Moonlight." Mrs. Burgner's recollections were justified, however, for the song does include mention of the whip-poor-will, which sang on that moonlight night many years ago.

Mrs. Ashbaucher, who found the copy of the song informed Mrs. Starr that it was given to her by her mother, Mrs. Alice Quick. Mrs. Quick was a girlhood friend of Miss Sanford, who later became Mrs. A.S. Barlow.

The copy of the song reveals that it was not copyrighted until 1872. It was published by the firm of C.J. Whitney & Company, Detroit. Mrs. Barlow presented copies to Mrs. Quick and other friends in this city, but so far as has been learned, Mrs. Ashbaucher is the only descendant of the original recipients who preserved one.

Words of the ballad are as follows:

"IN THE MOONLIGHT"

Verse:

We stood on the bridge in the moonlight,
one June night,
And watched the river's soft flow,
The clear silvery waters danced brightly,
glanced lightly,
Reflecting the dear scene below.
The whip-poor-will's song was heard
sweet on the hill.
Whip-poor-will, whip-poor-will, whip-
poor-will.
The low drooping willows that grew near
the mill
Were bending to kiss the stream; but Oh!

Chorus:

'Twas not the moon's ray descending, soft
blending
That made the scene so divine,
But the warm light of eyes entrancing, soft
glancing,
That lovingly gazed into mine.

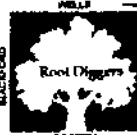
Verse:

Once more on the bridge in the moonlight,
one June night,
And watched in sadness alone,
The moon on the waters light beaming,
bright gleaming,
But the charm of its radiance was gone.
The whip-poor-will's song was still heard

PONETO 1871 - 1996

Platted in 1871 on land donated by Simeon Tappy, Poneto was an oil boom town during the 1890s and 1900s. In the early years of growth, Poneto boasted of its own two banks, two general stores, a grocery store, barber shop, shoemaker, butcher, flour mill and blacksmith shop.

Early churches were the Baptist and Methodist (Episcopal), both of which still hold services today, and the United Brethren Church.

After Poneto townsmen and landowners raised funds to build a depot, the town was served by the Lake Erie and Western Railroad. The railroad, which later became known as the Nickel Plate, is the Norfolk & Western today. The town, because of the Depot, became the "gateway" in and out of the oil fields.

During the oil boom days, the trading in gold was common. It also contributed to the downfall of the town. There were many rough oil field workers who worked many hours and drank and gambled after work and on weekends. There were once five taverns and the records show the town clerk's business of that day was the assessing of fines for drunkenness and brawling.

There were, however, other types of attractions for the townspeople. There were yearly street fairs and places for dancing. Riding in open sleighs during the winter was also a favorite pastime.

The streets of Poneto were dirt or mud, depending on the weather. The walks were made of planks or boards, to afford some safety to pedestrians from the horseman or horse-drawn vehicle.

There was a time when many of the citizens of Poneto turned out at the depot or train station to see who was about to board or leave the passenger railroad cars, or for that matter, who was arriving in town.

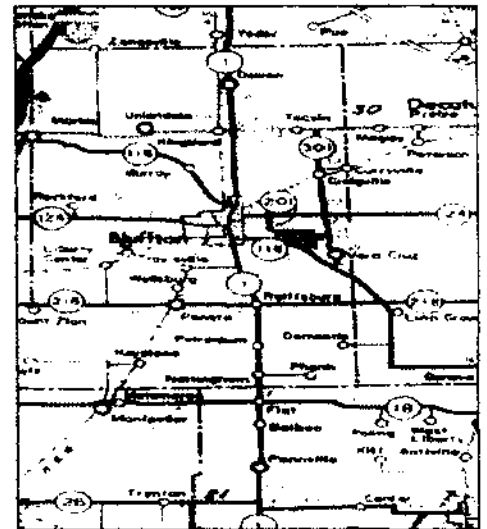
About 50 years ago, there were 2 grocery stores, 2 feed mills, several restaurants, 3 garages, 2 barbershops, 3 beauty shops, a shoe manufacturer, the city building (with no electricity), a fire station, and the Post Office. There were "Free Shows" once a week which were held just west of the present Post Office.

Poneto will be celebrating their 125th year anniversary on August 24 and 25, 1996. On Saturday, August 24, there will be displays of memorabilia, persons on hand to possibly identify old pictures from the town, entertainment, parade, flea market, and food. Also on Saturday, the Poneto Post Office will have a special "Station" set up at the Fire Station for persons who would like to mail something with a special Poneto cancellation stamp.

The celebration will continue on Sunday starting with church services and will finish with a band concert.

The activities will be located at the Fire Station at the corner of State Road 218 and Meridian Road, in the southern part of Wells County.

BETHLEHEM LUTHERAN CHURCH CEMETERY

Bethlehem Lutheran Church Cemetery is located at the corner of 650 E and 750 N in Jefferson Twp., Wells County, Indiana. The church and school are on the corner with the cemetery positioned behind the north end of the building. The cemetery faces the west, with rows running north and south. There is a driveway on the west and north boundary of the cemetery. All plots start at the north driveway and count to the south.

This information was extracted from the original plat book which lists all burials in the church cemetery. There are some unmarked gravesides. Ages are written next to the names and the dates listed in the second column are the date of death and not necessarily information taken from stones.
