MAKING THE MOST OF MAPS

Want to make your genealogy come to life? Turn all the facts and figures into a short story so that future generations will come to know your family as the people that they were, instead of a jumble of dates and names. Granted, in most cases, you won't be able to give an account of exactly what happened and why, but using a combination of tocations, dates, and history you can give future researchers and readers a pretty good idea of your family's own story.

A map showing the entire country is useful for tracing the possible route your ancestors may have taken to a given location. Using topographical map can be useful as well. Pioneers generally can be counted on to follow the "path of least resistance" when making the trek westward. Instead of going over the mountain, they will go around it — or

through a gap, such as the Cumberland Gap.

Following the path your family took, may give you new ideas of places to look for information. For instance, I know that "my" Craig family was in Abingdon, Virginia in 1800. I know that a son married a woman in eastern Tennessee. I know that in 1850, "my" Craigs were in Knox Co., Kentucky. I know that by 1880, they were in Pike Co., Indiana. Family legend says that they lived along the Cumberland Gap. Looking at a map of the country, I can get a general idea of the route the family took to Indiana. Now, I can refer to local history books covering Virginia, Tennessee, Kentucky, and Indiana to see what events may have occurred that caused my family to move from place to place. Perhaps, I will even run across *more* references to my family!

The easiest map to find and use, of course, is a current map of the area where your ancestor lived. Try to obtain a copy of a map from the time period your ancestor lived there. Then, compare the two. Chances are, there are quite a few differences between the two maps! County lines change, township lines change ... even state lines change! One particular book that shows the changing county and state boundary lines is "Map Guide to the U.S. Federal Censuses, 1790-1920" by William Thorndale and William Dollarhide (1987). This 445-page book shows all U.S. county boundaries from 1790 to 1920. On each of nearly 400 maps, old county lines are superimposed over modern ones to highlight boundary changes at 10 year intervals.

Comparing new and old maps can reveal changing place names as well. As an example, you have an old letter referring to a cousin living in Worthington, Indiana. Look up Worthington on a map of Indiana and you will see that it is in Greene county. After checking every available record in Greene county and Worthington with no success, you find an old map that shows that there was a town called Worthington in Wells county ... compare the maps and you have Poneto AND your ancestors' records!

The Geographic Names Information System (GNIS) is the Nation's official data base for place names. GNIS is maintained by the U.S. Geological Survey and can often provide information on name changes. This data base contains two million entries. They include the names of places that no longer exist as well as other or secondary names for existing places.

This automated system also contains the names of every type of feature except roads and highways. It is especially useful for genealogical research because it contains entries for very small and scattered communities as well as churches and cemeteries, including entries for those that no longer exist. (GNIS can be found at http://www-

nmd.usgs.gov/www/gnis/ if you have Internet access.)

But, let's face it ... Some places are just hard to find. Some have changed names one or *more* times. Some are too small to be shown on a map or noted in a gazetteer. Some are now ghost towns. Some of these places may be noted on an old map. The location of some others may be found in such sources as lists of abandoned post offices, local histories, government records, microfilm records or clippings from old newspapers, old city directories, or old county atlases kept in the library or archives of a town, city, or county in the region. If you know the ward, district, neighborhood, or street of a city where an ancestor lived, an old map used in conjunction with a new map of the city may expedite your search for needed facts.

This handbook describes features and sources of a worldwide range of new and old maps, atlases, and related products. Has sections on researching old maps, history maps, maps of the United States and of foreign countries, State and provincial maps, county maps, urban maps and city plans, boundary maps, census maps, railroad maps, topographic maps, and many other kinds of maps: World Mapping Today: Butterworths, London, 1987. A large, 583-page book that describes the mapping programs of each country in the world and gives the names and addresses of each country's principal mapping agencies. PRAIRIE VIEW CEMETERY

Prairie View Cemetery is located 1 and 1/4 mile north of Tocsin, Indiana (Wells County) on the west side of County Road 600 East. The entrance to the cemetery is in the center and the rows start in the northeast corner and continue west through the wooded area and then count from the west back to the east, weaving back and forth through the cemetery to the south side. There are no burials in the wooded area but it is laid out in lots for future use.

The information was abstracted from the original cemetery plot book by Margorie Myers and submitted by Joyce Bauermeister. This is the second part of the abstraction. The North Side was printed in Vol. 1, No. 4.
