MURDER IN MONTPELIER (SOURCE UNKNOWN) submitted by June A Shrock

J.I. MCGREW KILLS KIT-TEN KRETZER

Three shots Fired by Each Party.

Coroner's Inquest and Full Particalars

To get into the true inwardness of the shooting affray which occurred in Montpelier last Friday, it is necessary to go back to the 14th of September, 1876. A man by the name of Jas. Stroup, living a few miles from Montpelier, had left a watch at H.C. Wallace's for repairs and that day got the watch, and also had purchased three pieces of dress goods of J. I. McGrew. He had become drunk and exhibited his money which amounted to about \$15, and in the evening started home but only got to Baker & Nail's Sawmill where he laid down and slept for some time. When he awoke he found he had been robbed of his money, goods and watch. The next day he sent word to McGrew and Wallace to watch for goods. Since that time two dresses have been seen worn and other evidences which attracted suspicion to Mart Timmons and H.S. Spaulding, but the watch was not seen until New Years, when Wm Leonard too it to H.C. Wallace for repairs and he at once recognized it as the one taken from Stroup. They traced the watch back and found that Mart Timmons claimed to have owned it at one time. Deputy Prospector Williams and E. Pierce were sent for and three search warrants issued on Thursday last. One for H.S. Spaulding's house, one for Mart Timmons, and one for Kitten Kreutzer. At the first a dress, recognized as the goods taken from Stroup was found, and at Mart Timmons' a piece of Flannel containing about 15 yards, claimed to have been taken from J.T. Arnold's store last February and at Kreutzer's

nothing was found. Spaulding and Timmons were arrested and their trial set for Friday. ON Friday the trials were continued until Tuesday. The fact that McGrew had sworn out the warrant for Kreutzer made him more angry, and he expressed his determination to kill him on Thursday night. Since McGrew was robbed in October last he has been the object of their hatred and several times his life has been threatened, mostly by Kreutzer. He had often accused Kreutzer of being implicated in taking of his goods and Kreutzer denied it all the time. Twice during the fall a wagon was stopped between Hartford City and Montpelier by a number of men in hopes of catching McGrew. Thus he had been harassed in his business and in his social life until late it has been considered unsafe for him to be out after dark. On New Years' night McGrew's watch dog was killed in front of the store, and on Wednesday night Kreutzer and John Hartley attempted to place the body of the dog on the porch in front of the store. McGrew fired several shots at them and captured Hartley. ON Thursday night Kreutzer told J. E. Williamson he would sooner kill McGrew than to kill his dog, and the law was all that had saved him. The same evening he wanted to sell McGrew's body to Dr. John Ranson saying it would be good subject to operate upon, and the next morning while on his way to town he told a neighbor that there would be a man killed in town that day. McGrew was made acquainted with the situation and prepared himself for defense. About 11 o'clock McGrew was called to the Squire's office as a witness in the case of H. S. Spaulding, when he got near the Commercial House and Kreutzer was talking insultingly about the dog McGrew asked him " why he wanted to steal him? He would not make good sausage meat." Kreutzer said he would make

McGrew told him he would hunt him down. With an oath Kreutzer drew his revolver. McGrew realizing it was life or death for him. drew his revolver and fired. The two shots were almost simultaneous, McGrew's ball struck Kreutzer in the abdomen and passed through to his spine cutting off the main artery. Kreutzer clasped his hands to his abdomen and exclaimed, " McGrew you have shot me, I am a dead man," and then he started towards Crossau's store door and McGrew started towards Squires office. Kreutzer turned and started toward McGrew, fired two shots and fell in the street. They fired three shots each, McGrew was not touched more than to have the dust raised off his coat by the first shot of Kreutzer. Kreutzer was carried to the Commercial House and laid on the lounge where he died in about one half hour afterward. A coroner's inquest was held and the following evidence given: Frank Maddoc, being of duty sworn, on his oath days: The he is acquainted with the deceased Kitten Kreutzer. I was standing on the corner by Crossan's store, saw McGrew and Kreutzer shooting at each other, Heard Kreutzer say-putting his hand upon his stomach-"McGrew you have shot me, I am a dead man." I saw one other shot fired from McGrew and heard the report of one, supposed to be from him, from the north side of the street. F.C. Maddox

Chas. A. Raines, being duly sworn, upon oath says: I was standing on the corner by Crossan's store and saw Jas. I. McGrew and Kitten Kreutzer shooting at each other, was Kreutzer turn around and say "McGrew you have shot me, I am a dead Man." He walked to the store door, turned and shot at McGrew. I saw McGrew shoot at Kreutzer twice and heard two other reports supposed by me to be from Kreutzer.

Jas. W. Kinsdbury, being duly sworn, upon his oath says: I am acquainted with the deceased Kitten Kreutzer, I was McGrew and Kreutzer shooting at each other, Kreutzer was standing in front of El. Crossan's store, McGrew was standing on the side walk about two-thirds of the way

across the side walk on the north side of the street leading east and west when he fired at Kreutzer, who put his hands on his bowls and said" McGrew you have shot me, I am a dead man." He then turned and walked to Crossan's store door turned around and shot two other shots at McGrew and fell in the street. Mr. McGrew shot three shots that I know of, all of which occurred in the town of Montpelier, Blackford county and State of Indiana on the 4th day of January 1878.
