Program: Researching Quaker Records

Starting around 1706, there have been a number of Quaker Meetings in the area then known as Baltimore County, and since 1774 called Harford County, Maryland. The minutes of their weekly gatherings, taken by conscientious Recording Clerks, contain a treasure trove of surnames that are a delight to genealogical researchers. In addition to



major life events, there are lists of elders, clerks, overseers, wedding attendees, slave owners, discipline actions, and disownments. Obviously, we can determine the general geographic area of member families by the location of the Meeting they attended.

Some of these Friends Meetings are Bush River, Deer Creek, Little Falls, Forest (Sharon Road & Forest Hill), Gunpowder (APG), Broad Creek, and Darlington.

Some of the facts that might be found are names of those attending a Meeting, names of members with immediate family relationships, pre-wedding processes, wording on wedding certificates, attendees at various functions, slave ownership, disciplinary actions, and the disowning process.

Our speaker, James E. Pickard, is a retired schoolteacher who taught English, History, and Humanities classes to students in grades 6 to 12 for 37 years. Most of his career was with the Harford County School system, with the last four years at the new Harford Friends (Quaker sponsored) School. His hobbies include Quaker history and genealogical research, as well as traveling, reading and music. His research is drawn from the extensive Quaker archives at Swarthmore College Library in Pennsylvania.

When this process is completed all of the materials of potential archival value will find their way to the Historical Society collections. Don't throw away old family documents without careful scrutiny. If not to be preserved by family members, please give our experts at the Historical Society the option of examining them.

Responding to a cousin's inquiry about our Faidley ancestors took my mind immediately to the Genealogy Feature in our most recent newsletter, "We Always Spelled Our name That Way". Our ancestors have documented spellings of Faidley, Faidley, Faidley, or Fadley. Which is it and why? Is the origin English or German? And so, the mystery and search continues.

All these activities and a bit of attention to Society matters caused me to again wonder how I ever had time to hold a paying job. But it is all fun, keeps the juice flowing, and the unexpected solving of a family mystery can be downright exhilarating.

GENEALOGY FEATURE



Recently, I was reminded of the genealogical materials available at the Maryland State Law Library in Annapolis. Many of you are familiar with Henry C. Peden's, **A Guide to Genealogical Research in Maryland**, 5th Ed, MD Historical Society, 2001, which provides a brief synopsis of the Law Library (p.9, MD State Law Library), and its genealogy related holdings. Others may have visited the Library, which is open to the public and located across Rowe Blvd. from the State Archives. Less likely, is that you have heard a Law Library presentation at a genealogical group meeting during the last year, by Carol Carman, a part time Research Librarian at the Law Library.

Although the Library has a collection of hundreds of thousands items, of which only a small portion are genealogy related, computer indices abound! All databases are available to library patrons free of charge from the Library's public computers, and a select number of databases are available via the Library's Wi-Fi connection, and online website.

Genealogical & historical materials available include secondary sources for many counties and cities in Maryland, general family histories, some specific family histories, general genealogy references, some DAR lineage books, Burke's Peerage, Notable Southern Families, and ship passenger lists. Newspaper archives include of full-image content for hundreds of U.S. and international newspapers, from 1759 to present. Every newspaper in the archive is fully searchable by keyword and date. Included is the Baltimore Sun, 1837+ (ProQuest version); Annapolis Capital, 1887-2005; Maryland Republican, 1809-1886; Martindale-Hubble, 1868-1993; and Maryland Gazette, 1745-1839 (the most complete file in existence).

The Law Library provides an online "Genealogical Guide" to help researchers plan and execute successful explorations. This Guide provides a sophisticated description of Maryland related genealogy resources, and how they can be used in conjunction with the wide variety of materials in the Library. Topics include cemeteries, death certificates, law & genealogy, memorials, obituaries, and wills. From the website Home page, select RESEARCH, HOW TO GUIDES, OTHER, -Genealogy Guide.

The Maryland State Law Library was established in 1826 as the State Library. During its early years, the library collected books on a wide variety of subjects. By the late 1800's the collection began to focus on legal materials and in 1972 was formally made part the judicial branch. The library still has many of these original materials, which is why historians and genealogists often seek-out its collection.

The Maryland State Law Library is located on the first floor of the Robert C. Murphy Courts of Appeal Building, at 361 Rowe Blvd, Annapolis, MD 21401-1697. Hours are Monday, Wednesday, & Fridays 8:00-4:30; Tuesday, & Thursdays 8:00-9:00; and Saturdays 9:00-4:00. Online the URL is: http://www.lawlib.state.md.us where the hours are 24/7.
