PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends,

So much has happened since our last meeting in March. The steady diet of rain has promoted a very healthy crop of grass and weeds to sprout up in our cemeteries so the BCCPG's major focus during the past three months has been MAINTENANCE along with general cleanups. Project Coordinator Dorothy Miller has a general report for everyone in this newsletter.

The Ozark Cemetery, located behind the Beaver Lake Fire Department buildings in Beaver Shores, is very fortunate to have two separate Scout projects going right now. Chase Henneesse of Troop 122 brought in a crew and did a major cleanup to clear fallen trees and hanging limbs which were all over the cemetery. They also cut young saplings and weedeated the cemetery. Scott Eagleson plans to make a nice gravel walkway to the cemetery and is working on platting the graves and creating a plat map for referencing the burials.

I would like to recognize a new volunteer, James Skinner, who graciously offered his services and adopted the Grimes Cemetery close to Pea Ridge. All of our volunteers' efforts are deeply appreciated. The Mechanized Cavalry is again taking care of Stoney Point and Woods cemeteries this year. They did share with us that they have held off mowing the Woods cemetery until the baby deer living there are bigger. Some still had spots on them.

The Russell Cemetery west of Gravette is scheduled by Scout Hunter Hawkins in mid July and plans are being made to clean the historic McCraw cemetery off Benson Road. Please consider volunteering to help maintain any of our historic cemeteries in Benton County. YOU make the difference!

The Ozark Cemetery

The Ozark Cemetery is quietly nestled behind the Beaver lake Fire Department's Headquarters in Beaver Shores. It cannot be seen from driving by on the road and visitors need to park in the grassy area East of the fire department. It is only a very short walk around the building and the Ozark Cemetery comes into view as it gently slopes downward under a canopy of trees. It covers well over an acre and the graves are spread out, some grouped with different family members.

Ozark had been hit hard with a lot of limbs that had fallen from dead trees during the past several years and a lot of dead debris covered the cemetery. The rocky hillside also makes maintenance more challenging as rocks seem to grow from nothing when cleaning.

The BCCPG is working with two different Scout projects on this project. Dorothy Miller reports that Chase Hennessee, Troop 122, volunteered to organize a cemetery cleaning project at Ozark. Chase and his group of volunteers began gathering at Ozark the morning of May 7, 2016, and soon began

working on achieving their mission. Within an hour a large pile of dead tree limbs and logs had been stacked at an area designated outside of the cemetery by the Beaver Lake Fire Department. Soon more volunteers arrived and began the detailed tasks of cutting small saplings and brush that were beginning to sprawl across over the grounds. The ferns and flowers already evident in many areas of the cemetery were left and more concentrated efforts were made cleaning around the gravesites. The Ozark cemetery is now much easier to walk through to find the grave you are seeking.

Scout Scott Eagleson will be featured in our next BCCPG Newsletter. His project is building a gravel walkway to the cemetery so it is much easier to access and platting the cemetery and grave sites. Scott plans to install a sign at the cemetery of the plat map.

During the cleanup, a Benton County area fireman who was conducting a training class at the Beaver Lake Fire Department, came back to the cemetery and visited with Nancy Feroe, Dorothy Miller and Bill Degge about the Ozark cemetery and asking about its caretaker/maintenance. When he was told that it had no caretaker which is why the BCCPG was working with the Scouts to get it cleaned, he offered to talk to his group about adopting the Ozark Cemetery. The BCCPG is very appreciative and thankful for this generous offer.

The Armstrong Cemetery is being taken care of very well by a local landowner. I am very appreciative of their support maintaining this cemetery located close to Highfill.

James Skinner has now volunteered to assist with the maintenance of the Grimes Cemetery near Pea Ridge.

Gary Black and Linda Norman are coordinating a project to fence the Ricketts Cemetery off of Price Coffee Road East of Bentonville along Sugar Creek.

Mowing was recently done by volunteers at the Brady, May-Keith,. Post Oak, Rickets and Stoney Point cemeteries.

I am very sad to report that Jack Allen, a long-time caretaker of the Summit Cemetery in Bella Vista, recently died in a tragic accident while riding his bicycle. Jack was very supportive of the BCCPG and active in preserving Bella Vista's history. Our thoughts and prayers go out to his family.

Please consider volunteering to help with any of the BCCPG projects. Assistance is needed with coordinating the Boy Scout cemetery projects along with volunteering to help with general upkeep of our old historic cemeteries.
