Fundraising for Cemeteries!



The Armstrong Cemetery



The BCCPG again extends our deep appreciation to Chandler Hatch, a young man who adopted the cleanup of the Armstrong Cemetery for his service badge from the Boy Scouts of America. The Armstrong cemetery is located in the Highfill, Arkansas area about ½ East of the junction of Hwy. 12 and Armstrong Cemetery Road.

Chandler first contacted Dorothy Miller in early 2015 asking about cemeteries in need and the Armstrong Cemetery had just been placed on

BCCPG's list for assistance. The previous caretakers were no longer able to continue maintaining the cemetery and had asked for help. A tree had died and was falling on the fence along with becoming overgrown.

After meeting with Ms. Miller and assessing the cemetery's needs, Chandler coordinated a clean-up day at the cemetery. April 11, 2015 was designated and Chandler showed with quite a group that morning. The adjacent landowner graciously allowed Chandler and his Troop to camp overnight nearby so they were able to start early, despite the threat of rain.




Lots of cheerful help soon made quick work of hauling out the fallen tree limbs, eliminating the overgrown brush and grass that had taken over and painting the nice pipe fence that encloses the cemetery. By mid afternoon, most of the volunteers had left, leaving Chandler and his family to tend to the final, small details. The brush debris and old tree remnants had been burned in a designated area adjacent to the cemetery and the remnants of the fire dealt with before leaving.

The BCCPG is so appreciative of these young men who care about our cemeteries and want to make a difference in their

maintenance and upkeep. They approach their projects with a lot of thought and careful consideration regarding the actual needs of each cemetery individually, and create plans that work.

Since Chandler's clean-up in April, a nearby landowner has contacted Dorothy Miller and offered to keep the Armstrong Cemetery mowed. The BCCPG deeply appreciates these "Angels" who come forward and help continue this much needed maintenance of our historic Benton County cemeteries.

The Woods Cemetery

The Woods cemetery is another one of Benton County's early historical cemeteries which is now nestled in the middle of the David Cawthorn Subdivision, Little Flock. Now completely surrounded by houses that eliminated the normal, acceptable legal access needed for vehicular traffic, this cemetery has its challenges in our endeavor to keep it maintained and presentable.

Slightly over ½ acre in size, the Woods Cemetery has burials as early as 1840, although it was not deeded as a cemetery until October 24, 1890, when J. N. Woods and Nancy Ann Woods conveyed the land known as the Woods Family Cemetery as a public burying ground, which was recorded January 29, 1891 in Benton County Deed Book 35, Page 121. The last known burial was Celina Woods, wife of James

The gate to the cemetery was blocked with a wooden privacy fence. The BCCPG can not get a riding lawn mower into the cemetery.



In July, Dorothy Miller was contacted by a local volunteer group looking for a way to help preserve local Benton County history. After discussing the need for volunteers to help with cemeteries, several individuals met with Dorothy Miller and Bill Degge and went with them on a tour of two local historic cemeteries, learning about the important contributions made by the men and women buried in them to the original establishment of Benton County. Within two weeks they began working on the Woods, transforming the overgrown cemetery from unkempt to peaceful and inviting. The BCCPG deeply appreciates and salutes the "Riders," for their commitment to preserving Benton County. They have also adopted Stoney Point Cemetery, SE of Rogers off of Old Wire Road.
