FOREMAN

Foreman, Arkansas, is an inland town in Little River County, on the St. Louis and San Francisco Railroad, 37 miles from Texarkana and 149 miles from Little Rock. It was built and has grown because of the rich farm lands around it. Its growth has never been affected by land or oil booms, and has a population of 1800.

Foreman went "over the top" in every war loan drive and despite the pressing demands for money on every side, during the last two years there have been six fire-proof brick buildings of the most modern type built for business concerns of the city. A Methodist church was built last year that rivals any other in the State for a town of this size.

There are two first-class banks with capital stock of \$50,000 each, owned by local citizens. There are fifteen locally owned business firms operating in the town with capital stocks of from \$5,000 to \$25,000. There are five churches, each occupying its own building, which is sufficiently large to care for its own congregation.

The people of Foreman have taken active parts in good roads and all other public welfare movements.

THE SCHOOL

The school of Foreman is known throughout the State as a school of the first class, conducted in the most modern way, and with qualified instructors. The people of Foreman are justly proud of their school and use every possible means to make it a powerful institution. Graduates from this school have been successful. Their work stands upon its own merits and is our only advertisement.

The school building was erected in 1915 at a cost of \$35,000. It is one of the most modern type in the State. Its departments are so arranged as to make it very comfortable for teachers and children.

Courses given in this school will be recognized by the University of Arkansas and other first class Universities and Colleges. Special attention will be given to out of town students who wish to arrange for attendance here. Board can be obtained at reasonable rates in desirable homes.

PATRONS

Patrons and friends of the school are requested to visit any department or grade as often as is convenient, to get acquainted with the instructors of their children, and to familiarize themselves with the particular part of the work in which they are most interested. They are invited at all times to discuss their individual problems and the general school conditions with the teachers and members of the school board. Their help is needed and co-operation expected.

Children can do very effective work in the home, and parents who are willing to assist the teachers by directing their children in the evenings will be very much pleased with the results. This school is supported by you and operated for your benefit.

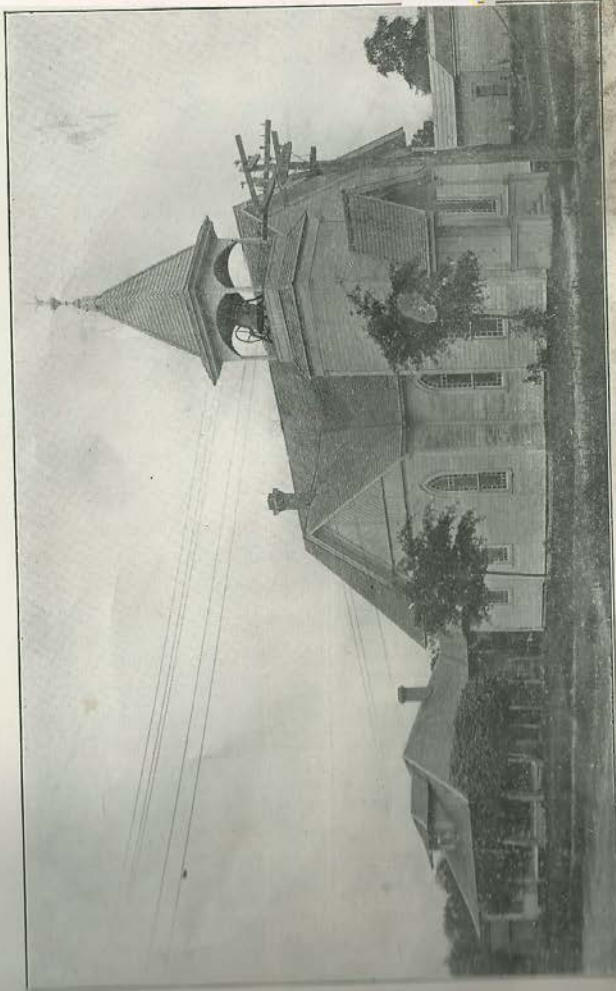
GENERAL INFORMATION

FIRE DRILLS

Fire drills shall be conducted in the school building at least twice a month under the direction of the principal or superintendent. The number of fire drills and time used in emptying building shall be given on teachers' reports.

The alarm for fire shall consist of three bells sounded in quick succession.

Every teacher and pupil must leave the building—leaving hats, cloaks, lunches, etc. behind. Crippled must be cared for.

When the alarm is heard teachers must see that the children keep their regular formation and not allow them to run past each other. Children who lead the lines will open outer doors and hold them open.

Substitute teachers will familiarize themselves with the rules so they may be able to conduct the drills properly.

One or two pupils from each room should be taught to give the alarm in case the janitor or principal should not be present if a fire should break out.

These drills are instituted in order that pupils may be taught to act quickly and orderly in case of danger.

USE OF TELEPHONE

The telephone is for school business. Pupils are not allowed to use the phone except in emergency cases, after receiving permission from principal or superintendent.

CLASS HONORS

Department is not counted as a study, nor is it averaged in as a grade in determining class honors, medal winners, etc., but pupils who do not average as high as 90 per cent in department are not allowed in any contest for honors or medals.

GRADUATION

The voluntary expenses of the graduating class shall not be excessive and shall not be incurred without the consent of the superintendent.

AUDITORIUM

No club or organization may use the auditorium with-

out the consent of the superintendent. No admission will be charged for the special holiday programs given by the school on Thanksgiving, Christmas and Washington's Birthday.

MEDALS AND PRIZES

The Horner Scholarship Medal

The Horner Scholarship Medal is a medal offered by Mr. Frank Horner, of Foreman, Ark., to the pupil making the highest general average in all subjects. Any child in school may compete for this medal, provided he or she is taking the full number of courses required by his or her grade or year and meets the requirements in deportment and attendance.

Valedictorian Prize

Mr. Roy Berry, of Foreman, Ark., offers a prize to the winner of the senior class honors. This prize will be known as the Valedictorian Prize and will be announced later.

Grammar School Prize

The Foreman Sun offers a prize, known as the Grammar School Prize, to the one winning the highest honors in the graduating class of the Grammar School.

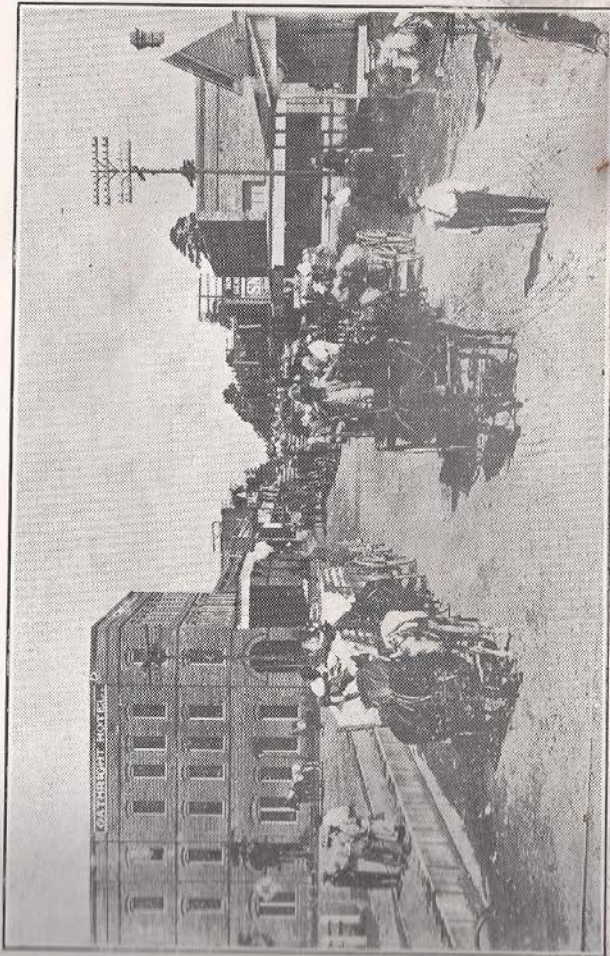

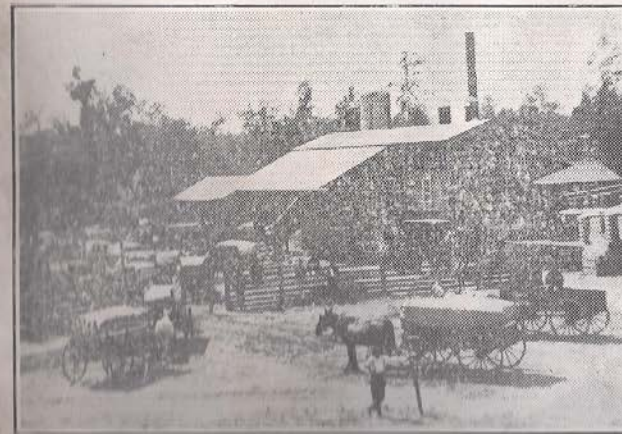
