"Manifest Destiny": Names at Ellis Island

About 70 % of immigrants to the U.S. during 1892 - 1954 came through the Ellis Island Immigration Station. The pressures of the "Great Migration" eventually led to immigration quotas. Twenty percent of processed immigrants ended up on detention sheets. Our speaker will enlighten us on how to locate the detention sheets, all four of the ship indexes, as well as addressing the persistent myth on Ellis Island name changes. Learn how the manifest can be an effective genealogy research tool!

About the Speaker: Joel Weintraub is a New Yorker by birth and an emeritus Professor at California State University Fullerton. He volunteered for nine years at the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). He has created search tools for the U.S. and New York City censuses and is currently engaged in developing locational tools for the 2022 release of the 1950 Federal Census. He is a widely sought after speaker on a variety of genealogical topics and has published articles on many of those subjects.

In fact, it was typical for us not to see each other except at lunch time and our few planned get-togethers during the week.


April Meeting

Marine Corps Casualty Card Databases (Information from a Marine Corps Newsletter)

The History Division's Historical Reference Branch holds casualty cards for World War II, War Dogs, Interwar Period 1946-50, Korea, Interwar Period 1955-1965, and Vietnam. Casualty cards were issued when a Marine was wounded, missing, killed or deemed a prisoner of war.

In an effort to increase patron usage and preserve the historic cards, the branch has digitized them and created a database of the information. The cards and corresponding database are NOT COMPREHENSIVE as there are often gaps or omissions. This does not mean that the event (KIA, WIA, etc.) did not happen, just that the branch did not have a card. The Marine Corps History Division is NOT the official repository for Marine Corps casualty information and cannot create new additions to their in-house collection of casualty cards not the online databases.

While the cards for World War II through Korea are not classified, they can often be very graphic. Therefore, to maintain the dignity and honor of the Marines, the individual cards will only be released, upon request, on a case-by-case basis.

Wildcards Work on Ancestry.com's Keywords posted April 23, 2016

The keyword box at Ancestry.com allows searches to [contain wildcard terms](#). Soundex isn't an option in the keyword box, but [this does give some flexibility](#).

Check the Newspapers for Court Day posted April 23, 2016

When you have finished analyzing the materials in a court case file, make note of the dates of any court action. Then search local newspapers for possible mention of the case. The court record may only give part of the story. What is in the newspaper may be unsubstantiated, but it may give you a different perspective than what was in the court record.

Junior Might Not Be the Son of Senior posted April 22, 2016

Without other information, do not immediately conclude that the person referenced as a "junior" is necessarily the son of the "senior." The references could indicate the two men are father and son, but they could be uncle and nephew as well. It is also possible that the relationship is more distant (or nonexistent) and that the use of junior/senior is simply to indicate which man is which—by using their age.

Pre-1850 Heads of Household Don't assume that the oldest male in a pre-1850 household is the person named as the head of household. In some cases the named head of household may be a younger male or in some cases the oldest female.

STAY IN THE HOUSE and BE QUIET!

Circa: 1936, Cincinnati, Hamilton County, Ohio

Our mother, **Rebecca Irene Shultz Dean** (26 Sep 1904), was married 3 Sep 1929 in Columbus, Ohio ... about one month before the stock market crashed on 28 Oct 1929. For most city folk, this was a devastating occurrence. For our grandparents, not so much; they were farmers, livestock growers, had gardens and were able to maintain themselves satisfactorily. When certain items required hard cash ... such as fuel or machinery ... bartering became the method of transaction in many cases. For about the next decade, until the start of World War II, the Depression was upon not only the nation but the entire world.

Our father, **John William Roy Dean** (10 Dec 1903) was a petroleum engineer employed by Standard Oil of Ohio (SOHIO). His education and choice of employer allowed him “perks” not currently available to the depressed populace. One of these perks was a Plymouth Sedan automobile. As part of his employment and under his purview, our father bought land, built service stations, hired personnel, made payroll, trained mechanics, purchased inventory and solicited service contracts from various entities in municipal governments who would service their vehicles at a Standard Oil Service Station. Standard Oil was forward thinking and fuel generated automobiles, aka the internal combustion engine, were the future no matter the current economy.

Our little family was living in Cincinnati, Hamilton County, Ohio, from about 1932 until 1939. The rented Tudor style home in which we lived, at 4730 Winton Road, provided the suburban atmosphere that was conducive to growing a family. And grow we did! Mother bore three little girls in 42 months. **Patricia Ann** (29 Nov 1932); **Barbara K.** (7 Feb 1934); and **Nancy Lou** (5 Jul 1936). As the mother of a large family myself, I reflect back on my mother’s life and it must have been exhausting.

As a child, I was energetic, always busy, and into everything; Barbara was sickly and had required major surgery at three weeks of age; and my baby sister, Nancy, was just that ... a baby. Mother required major surgery after Nancy’s birth ... mother hemorrhaged so severely that it was life-threatening. The surgery that saved her life prevented further child bearing.

Each afternoon we would all be put into our separate beds; the two younger sisters into a crib or bassinet and I into my “big girl” bed. The idea being that mother could get some rest as well and be rejuvenated to carry on her role as a mother and wife for the balance of the day.

That plan didn’t always work. I would feign sleep by closing my eyes until bed check was done; then I would be up getting into things ... things that would amuse me until nap-time was over ... things that were sometimes noisy and disturbing to others. Like singing and playing my toy piano.

Finally, my mother had enough. She could see that perhaps I was getting too old for naps and needed to be guided into something constructive that would be safe and quiet. She set up an area that held all kinds of interesting things ... pieces of ribbon, an old felt hat of my dad’s, coloring books, picture books, a baby necklace that had a knot in the chain (with a straight pin I could undo the knot ... and did), colored paper, a jar of paste, classified section of the newspaper turned sideways to practice printing alphabet letters or draw on and a box of watercolors, if I wanted to paint. There was also a sleeve of saltine crackers that she called “cookies” for me to eat if I got hungry. All this with the firm admonition, I was to “STAY IN THE HOUSE!” and “BE QUIET!”

Eventually, I was given a “work” apron which had pockets to hold my crayons, scissors and a pencil. Our mother was a skilled, innovative seamstress. The fabric that was used was from a pair of coveralls that were beyond repair and had once belonged to our Dad; he wore them when he worked on his car.

For the past 80 years I have followed my mother’s instructions. From the time that I was a student and working to put myself through school and using middle of the night hours to do homework; to having roommates that snored or talked in their sleep I used the time to sew costumes and create dance steps; to being so tired that I couldn’t sleep ... as a wife and mother I would fold the 25 loads a week of laundry; to being a widow with insomnia and discovering the joy of genealogical research, writing life stories and the Internet.

Staying in the house and being quiet has been quite productive for me ... and it allows others to get a good night’s rest; especially the “quiet” part.
