# 1. History

The JewishGen website was founded by Susan King in 1987 as she started her own research into her genealogy. She started an internet message board that had 150 members. This message board eventually became the JewishGen website. JewishGen has grown into a research tool that benefits hundreds of thousands of genealogy researchers in 163 countries.

Susan King bases JewishGen on the concept that all information people contribute to JewishGen should be free to all who participate. This brings over 6.5 million visits to JewishGen each month.

# 2. Registration

The JewishGen website is free to use, but you must register as a user to access many of the features such as searching the database, submitting information to the family tree, and subscribing to mailing lists.

Registration is a simple process. You can register by following this link to the registration page: <a href="http://www.jewishgen.org/cure/jgidadd.asp">http://www.jewishgen.org/cure/jgidadd.asp</a>. You can also reach this page when you try to access an area of JewishGen that requires registration and you have not already logged in to the site. The following is a screenshot of the registration form. Note this does require that you supply an email address so be sure to have that ready when you register.

However, because this is a service provided by JewishGen we reserve the right to contact registrants from time to time regarding JewishGen programs and projects. We also will send e-mail requesting the voluntary financial support from registrants using our services.

If you enter data into the JewishGen Family Finder (JGFF), your contact information will be displayed in the JGFF. We offer the following display options to ensure the greatest degree of privacy without compromising the intent of the database. For address information select any one of these display options:

#### 3.3.1. Soundex Calculator


This calculator will calculate an entry into both the Daitch-Mokotoff and NARA soundex. The entry screen looks like this:

### 3.3.2. Calendar Conversion

The JOS calendar conversion tool converts Gregorian dates into Hebrew calendar dates and vice versa.

#### 3.3.3. Jewish Calendar

The Jewish calendar displays all Jewish holidays for an entered Gregorian or Hebrew year.

### 3.3.4. Distance/Direction Calculator

The Distance/Direction calculator calculates the distance and direction between two geographic points that are entered in terms of latitude and longitude.

### 4. Research

4.1. **JewishGen Family Finder (JGFF)**: The JewishGen Family Finder is a database used for finding other researchers who are searching the same towns and surnames. It contains over 70,000 researchers who are researching over 350,000 surnames and 20,000 towns.

This database can be used by entering a surname, town, and country and viewing all registered JewishGen users who are searching the same surname, town, and country. If you register with JewishGen you can add your name to the list of researchers along with a surname, town, or country so that other researchers can contact you for research collaboration.

Below is the search page for JGFF. There are three fields in which a surname, town, and country can be entered. In the following example, the surname 'Ellenbogen' and the country 'Germany' have been entered. Once you have entered your search criteria, click the 'Search' button.

You will then be presented with search results, as shown in the next screenshot. The surname, town, country, date entry last updated, and the researcher will be displayed for each record that matches your criteria. There will be a varying amount of information in the researcher column. The amount of information is determined by the amount that the researcher has chosen to make available. There will be a link in the researcher column that can be either an email link to allow you to contact the researcher directly, or it could be just the JewishGen ID of the researcher. In this case you can enter a message and it will be forwarded to the researcher via their email address without displaying the email address to you.

4.3. The Family Tree of the Jewish People (FTJP): A searchable compilation of family trees of Jewish researchers. This project is a cooperative project by the following three different agencies: JewishGen, Inc., The International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS), and the Nahum Goldmann Museum of the Jewish Diaspora (Beit

Hatefutsot). Both JewishGen and Beit Hatefutsot make this family tree available through websites, IAJGS makes the family tree available on CD-ROM. JewishGen allows registered users to search and to upload genealogy data. In order to do this, you must agree to certain uses of the database. You do this by clicking either a button to search the database or upload GEDCOM data to the database as is seen in the next screenshot.





Figure 7: FTJP Agreement Page

### 4.3.1. Search

Once you accept the agreement to search the database you will be presented with the following search screen. You have two search options, a simple search by surname, town or country or a generational search. The simple search allows you to enter a surname, a town, or a country. JewishGen will return any record that meets the criteria you enter. The generational search allows you to search for people who have common ancestors. You can enter up to six surnames in the bottom half of the search screen.

If you find the person you are looking for in the search results, click the link. You will then see a Family Display page that has a family tree centered on the person whose link you clicked. This page will open in a new browser window so you can easily return to the search results.

The Family Display page displays two generations of ancestors of the selected person, spouse (if any), and any recorded children. You can see the family page for any of the relations by clicking on their link.




Figure 10: FTJP Family Display

### 4.3.2. Upload GEDCOM Data

Genealogy data in the GEDCOM can be produced by most genealogy software. To upload your genealogy data to FTJP, first export the data from your genealogy software. It is important to note that each registered researcher can only upload 1 GEDCOM file, not one for each person you want to add to the FTJP. This means that you must export all of the people you want to upload to the FTJP from your genealogy software into the same GEDCOM file. You can submit an updated GEDCOM file to the FTJP when ever you add to it. However, JewishGen requests that your initial file contain at least 100 people.

In order to protect privacy, JewishGen will remove all dates, places of birth, and marriage information that are not 100 years old. The links for each of these persons will be maintained.

Once you have done this, click the FTJP link from the JewishGen home page. You will be presented with a description of the FTJP and an agreement that you must agree to before uploading data. To upload GEDCOM data, click the 'UPLOAD my GEDCOM' button.

The next page will be the upload page as seen above. Click the 'Browse' button. You will be presented with a file find dialog box, as seen below. Navigate to your GEDCOM file on your computer. Once you have located it, highlight it with one click and then click the 'Open' button. At this point you should see your selected file in the text box on the GEDCOM upload page. Click the 'Upload' button to send your file to JewishGen. According to JewishGen, it will take approximately two weeks to process your file before it

will be available in the FTJP. JewishGen will send you an email when they make the file available.




Figure 13: Select GEDCOM File Dialog Box

You also have the option of sending your GEDCOM file to JewishGen via email. There is a link on the GEDCOM upload page called 'click here to send your file by email'. When you click this link, your email program will open. Attach your GEDCOM file just as you would attach any file to an email and then send you email. It will still take JewishGen approximately two weeks to process your file.

# 5. Discussion Groups

# 5.1. JewishGen Discussion Group (via electronic mailing list or newsgroup)

The JewishGen discussion group is an internet forum on which subscribers can share information, ideas, methods, tips, case studies, and resources with other Jewish genealogy researchers.

An internet forum is a place where people can submit messages that are distributed to all people who subscribe to the forum. Any subscriber can then respond to any message by replying to the forum, so that each subscriber receives the reply. This format allows people to ask questions, submit information, provide tips, or any other information that can be of use to fellow researchers.

You can subscribe to the JewishGen Discussion group in one of two ways: via email or via a newsgroup. When you are subscribed via email, you will receive all messages from all subscribers in the form of an email. When you want to send something to the forum, you do it by sending an email.

The other method of participating is through a newsgroup. A newsgroup is similar in concept to an electronic bulletin board that contains all messages from all subscribers. Many email programs provide the capability to participate in newsgroups.

You will receive the same information whether you subscribe through email or through a newsgroup. You can get detailed information on subscribing by clicking the JewishGen 'Discussion Group' link on the JewishGen main page.




Figure 14: Discussion and SIG Links




Figure 16: German Jewish Special Interest Group Page

# 6. Projects and Activities

The Projects and Activities page contains several different sections relating to Jewish Genealogy. Each section contains information that you can use or a project that you can take part in. As of 5-1-5, these are the projects and activities.

#### 6.1. ShtetLinks

In JewishGen's own words, ShtetLinks are "aims to provide a place where anyone with an interest in a place where Jews have lived to commemorate that place. That is accomplished by creating an individual web page for that place with information, pictures, databases, and links to sites that provide additional information on that place."

For each region listed on the ShtetLinks page, there is a list of towns contained within today's boundaries of the countries in the region. There are links to each town some of which are within the JewishGen website and some that are not. These links can be helpful if you are researching a specific town.

### 6.2. Yizkor Book Project

As you may know, a Yizkor book is a remembrance to the people who were killed in the holocaust and the Jewish homes that were destroyed. The purpose of the Yizkor Book Project is to provide access to Yizkor books and their contents. This is done through translations, database, death index, and a discussion group.

#### **6.3.** Holocaust Global Registry

The Holocaust Global Registry is a list of Holocaust survivors. The list is maintained by survivors who add themselves or other survivors they are looking for to the list. This list can be helpful if you are looking for someone who you know or suspect is a survivor of the Holocaust.

### 6.4. JewishGen Online Worldwide Burial Registry (JOWBR)

The JewishGen Online Worldwide Burial Registry is a collection of names from Jewish cemeteries and burial records from around the world. Researchers can submit information but it must be submitted for a whole cemetery and not just for one family. See the JOWBR page for details on submitting information.

JOWBR can be a valuable research tool for genealogists. Below is the JOWBR search page. You can search for a name or a town. Enter your criteria in the 'Enter text' field and then click the 'Search the JewishGen Online Worldwide Burial Registry' button. You will be presented with a list of records that match your criteria. Each record returned will have a link to the information about the individual or town. Some of the information even contains photographs of burial sites or individual graves.

### 6.5. Family Links

The Family Links page contains a searchable list of family web sites. The sites are a combination of JewishGen sites and non-JewishGen sites. If you maintain a family website and would like to add a link to it, see this page for instructions. This page can also provide a resource for researchers. Search for a family name and you might come across a connection.

### 6.6. ViewMate

ViewMate is a section where registered JewishGen users can post photos and documents for identification, analysis or translation by other JewishGen users. From the ViewMate page, as seen below, you can upload, respond, and view items. Any time you have a document or graphic that you would like assistance with its translation, transliteration, or other aspect of, you can upload the item. This item will then be available for other user to view and respond to.

# 6.7. JewishGen ShtetlSchleppers

The ShtetlSchleppers is a JewishGen group that plans and conducts tours to Eastern Europe. These tours visit the major hub of the specific region, and then allow time to visit shtetls in the area. If you know the town of your ancestors you can search for a trip on this page that will include a visit to the town.

### 6.8. Genealogy by Genetics

JewishGen is working with a company called Family Tree DNA on a DNA based genealogy project. This project is linking ancestors together based on DNA and surname. Family Tree DNA provides DNA testing and then provides access to the DNA test results. Researchers can find ancestors dating back to a few thousand years based on DNA. This page provides a link to the Family Tree DNA where you can view the surnames that are being researched and find out how to participate.

#### **6.9.** Record the Names of Holocaust Victims

JewishGen has joined with Yad Vashem to record the missing names of Jews who died in the Holocaust. You can support this project by supplying your genealogy research to this effort.

#### 9.3.1. Which Ellis Island Search Form Should I Use?

This section provides an overview of three Ellis Island search forms.

- 1. White Form This form is for searching all passengers with a very restricted town search and a somewhat restricted sounds-like search.
- 2. Blue Form This form is for searching all Jewish passengers.




