Johann Gottlieb Nass who died Saturday morning, September 10, was born March 2, 1806, in Zicker, Germany. He later resided at Rutzenhagen. In 1837 he married Ernestine born Wegner. In 1857 they and their five daughters left for America, making their home in Cooperstown. He was almost always healthy, but in late life both he and his wife lost their memory, her first, and they could no longer live together. Then he developed an internal sickness which led to his death. He is survived by his wife and five daughters. He died at the age of 86 years, 6 months and 8 days.

Nord Westen newspaper Oct. 27, 1904 newspaper article:
"27 Oct. Death Sat., following a long illness, of 63-yr. old Mrs. Johanne Olp at the home of her sister, Mrs. Carl H. Schmidt (Bertha). She was the widow of Julius Olp who died a year ago. The deceased, nee Nass, came from Germany with her parents as a child. The family settled in Town Cooperstown, where the deceased lived until her husband's death, when she moved to Manitowoc. (Description of the doctor's inability to establish a diagnosis.) Her illness weakened her more and more, accompanied with terrible pain, so that one might consider her death as a release. Mrs. Olp leaves 4 sons –Robert, Hermann, George here, and Anton in Reedsville, as well as a daughter, Mrs. Paul Paape in Milwaukee. In addition there are 4 sisters –Mrs. Carl H. Schmidt here, and Mrs. Robert Olp, Mrs. August Schlei, and Mrs. Wilhelm Buth in Cooperstown. The funeral was held Tues. from the Lutheran Church."

Nordwesten newspaper June 14th, 1894 article on Julius' death:
"14 June: Death on Mon., 11 June, of Julius Olp of intestinal disease, here in Manitowoc. The deceased was born 17 June 1836 on the Island of Wollin, Province of Pomerania. He came to the United States in 1849, spent about 5 yrs. in Milwaukee, and then came to Cooperstown with his brothers Ludwig and Robert Olp. In 1859 he married Johanna Nass, a marriage blessed with 14 children, of whom 8 preceded their father in death. 5 boys and a girl survive their father, along with his widow. His intestinal illness began about 2 yrs. ago, making it difficult to continue farming, which he gave up in Jan. of this year and came to Manitowoc. On Wed. of last week he suffered a new attack and despite feeling better on Sun. he declined on Mon. and died that evening. The funeral will take place this afternoon in the city cemetery."

After their marriage, they moved to a farm at Millard, So. Dakota, living there for 3 yrs. Returned to Manitowoc County, locating in Reedsville, Wisconsin. Rented a farm at Silver Lake and in 1893 purchased their first farm in Maple Grove, NE of Reedsville. This was the homestead where most of the 12 children (8 sons, 4 daughters) were born and raised. Two children died very young.

Anton Olp, a farmer and stock-raiser of Franklin township, and the owner of one hundred and twenty-eight acres of valuable land on sections 31 and 36, was born in Manitowoc county, Wisconsin on October 3, 1862, and is a son of Julius and Hannah (Nass) Olp, natives of Germany. Mr Olp's parents came to the United States as young people, and were married in Wisconsin, shortly after which they settled on eighty acres of land near Cooperstown, where they resided until 1893, at which time they retired to Manitowoc, where Mr. Olp died in 1894, aged fifty-eight years, his widow surviving until 1904 and passing away when sixty-two years of age. Both are buried at Manitowoc. Anton Olp was the second of a family of eleven children, and received a common-school education, remaining at home until he was twenty-one years of age, at which time he commenced working for wages. He continued thus for five years, when he engaged in farming in South Dakota on a homestead, but after three years, on account of a drought, he returned to Manitowoc county and again worked for wages. Two years later he rented a farm, and after one year purchased a part of his present farm, and since July, 1893, he has lived here, gradually adding to his acreage until he now has one hundred and twenty-eight acres, on hundred and six of which are now under cultivation. The entire property is fenced with barbed wire, and Mr. Olp carries on general farming, marketing hay, grain and dairy

products, and milking twelve cows. He has a frame barn, one hundred and sixteen by thirty-six feet, which he remodeled from an older and smaller one in 1911, while his residence is frame covering log, and two stories and one-half in height. His water supply is secured from drilled wells.

Mr. Olp was married in 1888 to Miss Albertina Engelbrecht, who was born 3-1- 1870, daughter of William and Ernestina (Becker) Engelbrecht. Mrs. Olp's parents were natives of Germany who were married in Wisconsin, and settled in Manitowoc county, where the father is living at the age of seventy-one years, his wife being sixty-eight. Ten children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. Olp, namely, William, Emma, John, Ella, Herman, Arthur, Amelia, Walter, Anna and Irwin, of whom Amelia died at the age of about one year and eleven months. (Peter Batek's note) I believe Louis was a 11th child who only lived to be 8 months old Cemetery records indicate he was "A. & A. Olp's son. Mr. Olp gives his support to the democratic party and although not actively engaged in political affairs fulfills his obligation of good citizenship regularly and conscientiously."

He was buried 1-1-1948 from their home church and is buried beside Albertina.

Funeral sermon as recorded/found in her records, by Edna Olp Ballenthin:

Funeral Sermon: The late Mrs. O. Olp, Sept. 10, 1949. Psalm 84: 1-2

"How amiable are Thy tabernacles, O Lord of hosts! My soul longeth, yea even fainteth for the Courts of the Lord."

Seventy-seven years ago, the now deceased mother was baptized into the name of the Divine God, when she had been made a newborn creature by the washing of regeneration Holy Baptism. The congregation sang, "Write the name we now have given, write it in the book of heaven." A few years later, she herself renewed the baptismal covenant at the Lord's alter and vowed lifelong faithfulness to God. On that confirmation day, she like so many others do on a solemn occasion, sang and prayed. Let me be Thine forever Thou faithful God, and let me forsake Thee never, not wander from Thy word. Lord, do not let me waiver, but give me steadfastness, and for such grace forever Thy holy name I'll bless. Ever and again throughout her life, she prayed for true steadfastness, praying in the words of hymn, "and never in my purpose let me falter oh Father, Son and Holy Ghost". But keep me faithful to Thine alter till Thou shalt call me to Thine post. So with Thee I live and die,

and praise Thee evermore on high."

By the grace of God she faithfully kept her vows, for she lived and died a believer Christian. When on Wednesday afternoon, I came to see her and reminded her that her end was fast approaching, and if she would not want to have the firm assurance that Jesus had surely saved her from the guilt, the punishment and the slavery of sin from death and Satan's claim and power, that through faith in Jesus, she is God's child for time and eternity and that such assurance is hers also by partaking of Jesus body and blood in the Lord's supper and whether therefore she would again have the blessed assurance of faith, she readily answered "yes". Her mind clear, she prayed with me, strengthened in her faith. When the Angel of Death came the following morn, Thursday. When her soul was separated from her mortal body, the precious promise of her Saviour was fulfilled in the promise her pastor had selected for her memory verse, Isaiah 54:10. For the mountains shall depart and the hills be removed, but my kindness shall not depart from thee, neither shall the covenant of my peace be removed, saith the Lord that hath mercy on thee. "Ah, I love Thy Zion, Lord. The house of Thy abode, the church our blest Redeemer saved, with His own precious blood. These words in which the Christian prepares his love for Christ's Church, express also the words of the deceased mother. She loved the church and received the means of grace, she loved the church where the savings means of grace are dispersed with David in our text she could truthfully say, "How amiable are Thy tabernacles oh Lord of hosts. My soul longeth, yey even fainteth, for the care of the Lord.

I chose these words as the basis for this funeral sermon to assist us in seeing what must have been in the mind and heart of the deceased mother. What thoughts occupied her a good deal with the Lord and His saving Gospel because excepting for the past year, when her physical health, strength and eyesight were fast failing, her place in the lord's house was always occupied by her, repeatedly also partaking of the Lord's supper and even

Doing so here with the congregation while quite frail and almost completely blind, all of which indicated that she loved Christ and His word. The words of text were originally spoken by pious King David, we know also from other passages of Holy writ that David was a true lover of the Lord and His word, that he delighted to hear God's word and meditated upon it daily. Therefore he showed that he was a true child of God. Of course, by nature, he was not a Child of God. Since man's fall into sin, all men are by nature, children of Satan. It's only through the sanctifying work of the Holy Spirit that a sinner becomes a Child of God who loves the saving Gospel. This it was with the deceased mother and thus it is with every Child of God. That's the reason why a true Christian's mind and heart longs for the tabernacles of the Lord, causing him to say with David, "How amiable are Thy tabernacles, Oh Lord of hosts. My soul longeth, yea even fainteth for the courts of the Lord". By the word tabernacles, David means the place where God is present in his mind, although David's time was not yet to be.

The believing Children of God had a place of worship made like tents. This tabernacle was divided into three parts: the court, the Holy place and the most Holy place. In this most Holy Place, the Ark of the Covenant was kept. The Jehovah would appear in a cloud, answer prayers for the high priest for his people. Because the Lord Himself appeared from time to time in the most holy place and because God's His most wonderous works were here told, as the 26th Psalm says, sacrifices were offered, hymns of praise and supplication were sung, and public prayers were said, all the believing Israelites loved the tabernacle. They longed to meet the Lord, gladly heard His word, especially the precious promise concerning the Messiah, the Saviour of the world.

The Old Testament (unreadable text) past; was succeeded by the Temple and this House of Worship was destroyed almost two thousand years ago. But the Lord and His Word and His Sacraments are undiminished wherever these means of Grace are needed, there He is present according to His promise. "In all places where I record My name I will come unto Thee and will bless thee." Exodus 20: 24 This every true Christian knows and therefore

longs for the courts of the Lord. This it was also with the sainted mother. She loved the Word of the Lord and diligently attended our divine services as long as she could. During the past year, she was unable to come to public worship because of senility and advancing feebleness, but she was always glad to have me read devotions and sermons to her in her home and at her bedside she would listen attentively and discuss religious matters. There is not the least doubt in my mind that she died in the Lord, for she truly believed in her Saviour, loved God's Word and His Sacraments. Moreover, she led a devout, Christian life and this gave evidence of her true faith and loving trust in the Lord.

No one can be saved by his own "good" works, efforts and merits. We sinners think that we can be saved solely through faith in Jesus the Saviour who has redeemed us from all sins, from death and from the power and claim of Satan that we might live under Him in his kingdom of grace here on earth and in His kingdom of glory in the eternal tabernacles of the Lord of Hosts in heaven. These tabernacles Jesus Himself called the mansions of His Father in heaven when He said to His disciples, "In My Father's House are many mansions. If it were not so, I would have told you. And if I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you into Myself that where I am, there will you be also." By these comforting words, Jesus assures all those who believe in Him that they shall be eternally saved.

But He also commands all His followers to prove their faith and love by a truly Christian life, for He said to His disciples, "Let your light so shine before man that they may see your good works that they may join your Father which is in heaven." We Christians let the light of our faith shine before men where we lead a godly life, diligently hear the word of God and keep it when we have our fellow men and our fellow Christians for Jesus' sake, when we show by our whole conduct that we have a childlike reverence for our Lord and Saviour; when we shun and fight sin in every form and are contented with those things which God bestows upon us, submitting ourselves to the will of our all wise and everloving Father in heaven. By this, letting the light of our faith shine before man and setting a good example for others. God the Father will be glorified and many an unbeliever may be gained for Christ and His kingdom, so that He too will learn to say, "How amiable are Thy tabernacles, O Lord of Hosts! My soul longeth, yea even fainteth, for the courts of the Lord." Oh that all of us may follow the example of the sainted Mother in her love for the Lord, His word and His sacraments. When our last hour comes, we too shall experience the blessedness of those who die in the Lord. Then our longing and yearning to be with the Lord of Hosts in the eternal tabernacles will be satisfied, and we shall be in eternal bliss and joy forever. May God grant it for the sake of His dear Son, our adorable Saviour. Amen.
