She was a hard worker and a diligent saver and investor who taught her children and grandchildren to do the same. After the war she and Albert lived with her parents until thev saved enough money to pay cash for the materials to build a house. With the help of Albert's brothers they built a house on her Daddy's farm in 1950 where they lived the rest of their lives. She was raised in the Presbyterian Church and Albert in the Baptist so they compromised in raising their children and throughout their marriage attended Harmony Baptist on the 1st and 3rd and Ray Memorial Presbyterian on the 2nd and 4th Sundays. She served as church treasurer for many years and was active in Women of the Church. She was a wonderful

cook and fed her family well with garden fresh vegetables in the summer and its canned and frozen bounty in the winter. She was known and appreciated for her ham and tenderloin biscuits. She was a caregiver; first for her elderly mother that lived with them and later for her sister Eva Ree that suffered from Parkinson's and sisterin-law Lona with MS. After her retirement, she volunteered at Walton Regional Medical Center as a Pink Lady until she quit driving at age 88. She was a tremendous influence in the lives of her children and grandchildren and leaves behind a legacy of gentleness, inner strength, service, love of God and joy in family.
