The temperature this morning registered 24 degrees above zero, and the forecast is for warmer followed by snow or rain and continued warm Friday.

HOPE FOR RAIN

Scores of people of the town and community are hoping for a real rain soon to re-fill empty cisterns and supply tanks as there is a severe shortage of soft water in many places. Very little rain has fallen the past weeks and the precipitation shortage since the first of the year amounts of more than three inches already.
