One of the most unique, comical and picturesque parties of the season was that of the ladies choir of the Mennonite church which was held at the home of Miss Marcella Habegger, Thursday night. The thirty-two members arrived at the scene of the party dressed in all sorts of Swiss costumes and looked as though they had stepped out of style books of many years ago.

The guests were taken to the basement where they were seated at a long dining table and were served a most delicious dinner consisting entirely of Swiss dishes and served in Swiss style. The following dishes represent in part the dishes which were included in the menu: Roeschti (Swiss fried potatoes to you) wurst (sausage), ziger (cottage cheese), ladwarch (apple butter), chuechli (crullers), chirisbri (cherry sauce), malassig (molasses), salat (lettuce), and Schwyzerchaes (Swiss block cheese). The guests ate by the light of a beautiful coal oil lantern and coal oil lamps and their conversation was carried on entirely in the Swiss dialect. Swiss customs, such as passing the block of cheese around the table and each guest cutting off what they wanted, were used.

DEATH TAKES FRED EICHENBERGER HERE EARLY SUNDAY MORNING

Pioneer Berne Business Man, Member of County Council, and Former School and Town Official Victim of Illness Which Started Three Weeks Ago

FUNERAL AT REFORMED CHURCH TUESDAY



BUSINESS MAN DIES
Died Sept 9 1934

Fred G. Eichenberger, aged 71, one of the pioneer business men of Berne and a leader in many affairs of the town, died at his home on West Wabash street, Sunday morning at 8:50 o'clock. Mr. Eichenberger became sick on Sunday, August 19, and had been confined to his bed exactly three weeks before death relieved him.

Post mortem findings on Mr. Eichenberger disclosed general peritonitis, multiple abscesses in liver and kidneys, a dissecting retroperitoneal abscess along the descending colon, and a perforation of descending colon, which connected with retroperitoneal abscess.

He never suffered much pain it is believed, but he lost much weight during his illness. He suffered numerous chills, after which his temperature would mount to as high as 106 degrees. He failed rapidly during the past several days, but remained conscious until near the end. He was unable to speak the last day or two, but recognized members of the family. Before his fatal illness started, he was in fair health and active in the City Bakery every day.
