# DEATH TAKES LOCAL MAN AT CO. HOSPITAL

**Emil Badertscher Dies Sat.  
A. M.; Mrs. Badertscher's  
Sister Also Dies**

## FUNERAL HELD THIS AFTERNOON

Emil Badertscher, aged 56, well-known local man, died at the Adams County Memorial hospital at Decatur, Saturday morning at 9:17 o'clock. Death was caused by acute nephritis, according to the attending physician. Badertscher was taken to the hospital one week ago this evening, suffering severely from kidney and bladder trouble. A minor operation was performed to give relief, but Badertscher never rallied and Friday it was apparent that the end was not far away.

### 2 Deaths In Short Time

The death of her husband came as a great blow to Mrs. Badertscher as on Thursday evening, just a short time previous to the death of her husband, her sister, Mrs. Jacob Moser, formerly Sarah Nussbaum, died near Orrville, Ohio.

Mr. Badertscher had been in good health until about four weeks ago when the ailment first became noticeable. He suffered severely during the past week and was uncon-

scious much of the time following the operation.

The deceased was born in Switzerland, Feb. 28, 1878, a son of Ulrich and Maryann Zaugg Badertscher. At the time of his death he was 56 years, 8 months and 26 days old. He came to this country in March of 1883, coming directly to this community where on Oct. 13, 1910 he was united in marriage to Barbara Nussbaum. The couple lived in Berne for the past 25 years. Badertscher was a laborer, and was formerly a farmer. During the last 15 or 20 years he has been a carpenter, also operated a broom factory, but was best known through his accordion factory which he operated for several years. He was a skilled instrumental musician. He also did various odd jobs.

Surviving are the widow and one daughter, Mrs. Millie Sprunger wife of Noah Sprunger of Berne and 5 grandchildren. One brother and one sister survive, Adolph of Fresno, California, and Mrs. Albert Bintz of Berne. Two brothers, Alfred and Ulrich, one sister in infancy and one half sister, Mrs. Fred Ryf preceded also the parents.

The funeral was held this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the home and at 2 o'clock at the local Reformed church, Rev. J. L. Conrad officiating, assisted by student Wilson Bixler of Mission House College, Plymouth, Wis. Burial was in the M. R. E. cemetery.
