A large crowd attended the funeral of Eldon Habegger, held at the local Mennonite church Friday afternoon. Hundreds of people attended the rites to pay last respects to the young man who was killed in an accident last Tuesday at the Decatur Soya Company. County Supt. of Schools, C. E. Striker, and the township trustees attended the funeral in a body. All the Blue Creek township schools were closed Friday afternoon.

The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. Bennett, of Hicksville, O., formerly of Wren. Rev. Bennett officiated at the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Habegger. Rev. Smith, pastor of the Salem M. E. Church, and Rev. Burk, former pastor of the Salem church, assisted in the funeral services.

The pallbearers were all close friends of the deceased, Herman Patterson, Albert Davidson, Harold Dolch, Wilmer Riley, Omer Merriman, Don Byers, Ulrich Reinhart, and Martin Walker of Ft. Wayne.

A local quartet composed of Carl Luginbill, Milo and Arlie Habegger and Emerson Neuenschwander sang the following songs at the funeral service: "I'm Going Higher Some Day," "Looking This Way," and "Oh, Holy Saviour, Jesus Saviour Pilot Me."

REV. SAMUEL H. BAUMGARTNER, 76, DIES WEDNESDAY

Funeral For Native of the County Is At Naperville Saturday

Rev. Samuel H. Baumgartner, a native and well known in the vicinity, who was stricken with a heart attack November 17, died in the New Haven, Conn. hospital Wednesday, according to a telegram Thursday morning to the Witness from Prof. Hope Baumgartner, a son.

Rev. Baumgartner, author of several books, had returned to the home of his son at Hamden, Conn., only two weeks ago from South Bend. Last Sunday he was removed to the hospital, and had been in a critical condition since, according to word received here just prior to the announcement of his death.

Burial will be at Naperville, Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The deceased was born in French township, west of Berne, March 2, 1860, the son of Samuel and Catherine Welty Baumgartner.

Rev. Baumgartner first attended school at the election school, then at Linn Grove and the county normal school at Decatur. He taught school for a period of? years, and then entered Northwestern College at Naperville, Ill. He entered the ministry in June 1887 and pursued (cut off)
