WIFE OF JACOB SCHWARTZ DIES LATE FRIDAY

Funeral for Well-Known Woman Is Held Today

Mrs. Catherine Schwartz, aged 59, wife of Jacob A. Schwartz, of Monroe township, died at her home two and one-half miles north and two miles west of Berne, Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The Schwartz family has been living on the old Musser farm for some time. Death was caused by a cerebral emboli, according to the attending physician.

Mrs. Schwartz had been bedfast five days, and was in a coma three days previous to her death. She had been in ill health for seven years and was unable to walk for the last six years. She was well known throughout this community and had a large number of friends.

Mrs. Schwartz was born in French township, east of Vera Cruz, on Jan. 1, 1877, a daughter of Joseph and Emily Girod Graber. She was married to Jacob A. Schwartz, Aug. 5, 1897. She lived in Adams County her entire life, living with her family on different farms in this community.

Surviving are the husband and three children, Sam K. Schwartz, who lived on the Gottschalk farm east of town until recently; Mrs. Jacob (Adeline) Hilty and Mrs. David D. (Rose) Wickey, all of Monroe township. The mother, Mrs. Joseph Graber, also survives, and three sisters. They are, Mrs. Jacob P. Schwartz, Mrs. Joseph J. Schwartz, and Mrs. Jacob J.
