AUTO VICTIM'S FUNERAL SET

Rites Saturday Morning At Monroeville Church For Daniel O'Shaughnessey

Funeral rites for Daniel O'Shaughnessey, aged 26, of near Monroeville, who died late Tuesday afternoon at the Adams County Memorial Hospital in Decatur of injuries suffered last Saturday night in an automobile accident in Decatur, will be held Saturday morning.

Services will be held at 8:15 a.m. at the home of the deceased's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John O'Shaughnessey, two miles northeast of Monroeville and at 9 a.m. at the St. Rose Catholic Church in Monroeville. The Rev. Theodore Fettig will officiate. Burial in the Monroeville Catholic Cemetery.

The accident victim resided with his parents. The body was removed to the residence this afternoon from Painter Brothers' Funeral Home in Monroeville.

INJURIES CAUSE INFECTION.

Mr. O'Shaughnessey's death resulted from infection caused by compound fractures of both legs. He also suffered skull injuries. Physicians amputated his left leg at midnight Wednesday night after infection developed.

Floyd Rison, aged 34, $1724 \frac{1}{2}$ Oakland Street, this city was killed instantly in the same accident. Three others were hurt. Mrs. Rison and Raymond Papenbrock, aged 31, of near Monroeville, were reported improved at the Decatur hospital, Mrs. Papenbrock was released from the hospital Wednesday afternoon.

CAR HIT CONCRETE BLOCK.

The car in which the five Allen County residents were riding was being driven by Papenbrock when it crashed into a cement signal block at the railroad crossing on Mercer Avenue in Decatur.
