POST OFFICE PROJECT HERE IS DELAYED

New Federal Building Here Held Up Pending Further Appropriation

Washington D.C., Nov. 19 - More money will have to be procured for the new Berne, Ind., Post Office building project before the Treasury's Procurement Division architectural section can go ahead with the plans for the building, it was learned here today.

To put up the building at Berne needed to fit the requirements of postal activities there, is impossible within the limits of the \$67,000 now allotted for the entire cost of the project, architectural section officials stated.

Just how much more money will be needed was not revealed by the officials, who said it was "a confidential matter."

More Funds Requested

However, they stated that they were making effort to obtain additional funds so that they could proceed with preparation of the plans for the new structure. Whether the funds will be forthcoming should be known by the end of this month, they said.

Several preliminary sketches of the building have been completed, but will not be approved by the section's planning committee until a definite augmentation of the \$67,000 allotment is made, according to officials.
