The marriage was solemnized at the St. John's Reformed church at Vera Cruz. the Rev. H. H. Meckstroth, pastor of the church officiating at the single ring ceremony.

Mrs. Lester Alexander, sister of the bride, and Frank Gregg, of Paulding, Ohio, friend of the groom, attended the couple as matron of honor and best man.

Preceding the ceremony, a ten minute musical recital was given. Miss Daisy Augsburger of this place, played on the piano, "Ah, Sweet Mystery of Life", "Indian Love Call" and "The Rosary".
