Mrs. Townsend said her daughter was married Monday to Robert G. Marshall, Jr. of Fort Wayne in a secret ceremony performed after they had obtained a marriage license at Spencer.

Marshall is 23 years old and the bride is 22. They had been engaged for some time, Mrs. Townsend said, and being opposed to an elaborate ceremony and publicity, decided to wed without previous announcement.

Marshall is the son of a farmer near Spencer. Mrs. Marshall has been a teacher in a Grant County consolidated school. Marshall lived in Marion until two months ago and it was there that he met Miss Townsend.

Mrs. Marshall returned to the Governor's mansion Wednesday afternoon for a brief visit with her parents before going to Fort Wayne to join her husband, who is employed there as a salesman.
