The following is a QUERY from Judy BAIRD.

VANDENBROECK-SMITH-COPPENS
 Rochus VandenBroeck b. near Brussels, Belg.
 9 Jan 1819, s/o Peter and Mary TRACEY
 VANDENBROECK, Came to U.S. in 1845, m. in U.S.
 Sophia (SMITH? COPPENS?) also from Belgium.
 Lived at Pontiac & Grosse Pointe MI, before settling in Kent Co., MI in 1851. Any informations appreciated.
 Judy BAIRD, 13738 3 Mile Rd. Lowell, MI 49331.
 Along with her query Judy sent a funeral card which tells a little bit more about Rochus VANDENBROECK who left Belgium February 9th 1844, arriving in N.Y. May 1st; Sophia Smith who later became his bride arrived a few days later having spent 62 days on the voyage. " He came directly to

1846 moved to Pontiac where he resided until 1851 when he moved to Kent Co. settling on 40 acres of land in the township of Bowne, at that time an almost unbroken wilderness, built a shanty and the following winter and summer chopped and cleared 10 acres, putting it into wheat which he harvested the following year. At that time threshing machines were scarce and there was no road to him so he built a clay floor and threshed part of his wheat, about 20 bu., with a flail, but in the spring he cleared a road five miles for a Mr. Johnson to come with a machine and finish his threshing, the 10 acres yielding 355 bu., which he sold for \$ 1.50 per bu. In the spring of 1860 he traded farms with Ira Gardner and moved to Vergennes where he lived until his death". The article goes on saying that his wife died in 1870 leaving him with 9 children, that he never remarried, that he worked hard and provided well for his family. In 1883 he divided his land giving his 5 sons farms averaging 100 acres each, to his four daughters he gave \$ 1,500 each. In 1883 he went back to Belgium to visit his 2 sisters and numerous friends, and after his return lived with his daughter until his death in 1893. In his will he left between \$ 13-14,000 to be divided between his 9 children.

The following is a query from Sandra DOBBIE pertaining to the name VAN MALDER

" I would like to hear from anyone doing research on this name anywhere in North America. I am looking for the parents of Peter Alexander VAN MALDER, born 29 June 1821, Halifax, Nova Scotia. He married Eleanor HARVEY, 13 Feb 1845, Liverpool, Nova Scotia. Eleanor was born 17 May 1819, Halifax, daughter of James HARVEY and Mary FLEMMING, both born Halifax, married Halifax 29 Sept 1811. James' trade was shipwright. Peter and Eleanor's children were: Charles William, born 20 Jan 1846, died 2 Feb 1846, Halifax. Thomas, born 5 Oct 1848, married Sophia, living Rochester, N.Y. 1906 Eleanor, born 9 Nov 1852, Toronto, C.W. died 5 Oct 1854, Toronto. James, born 26 Sept 1856, Toronto, married Sarah May BOURKE, 25 Dec 1884, Toronto, died 6 May 1926, Toronto. Joseph, born 17 July 1858 Toronto, married Matilda MAYBERRY, died 19 July 1938, Lockport, N.Y. Peter was a shoemaker, James and Joseph worked as shoemakers and later as merchants. Eleanor HARVEY's family were Anglican. Peter was an Oddfellow. James was an Orangeman. I have so far found no record of Peter's birth in Halifax. Did his parents come from New York ? England ? So far, Sandra has never found VAN MALDERS listed in the phone books of any major North American city. There are 2 in Toronto. There is a full column of VAN MALDERS in the Brussels phone book and a few in Ninove. None were found among the New York Loyalists, nor in the 1800, 1810, 1820 N.Y. censuses.

Rene BALAND was told by Dr. Charles BALANT, a Belgian emigrant residing in Malvern, Pa., that a BALANT was listed in the 1970 Philadelphia, Pa. telephone book, however by 1982, this Philadelphian wasn't listed anymore. In the 1977 Pittsburgh telephone book, we found 3 BALANT and 2 BALLANT, whom Rene Baland will be contacting in hope that these American BALANT/BALLANT are related to him. Barbara Conway VanDePete is still looking for Peter Van de Putte; so far she has read over 22 counties of the 1870 Illinois Census. The Kansas State Historical Society was able to find for her obituaries in papers other than the ones she had, she found that Pieder VanDePutte was born in Belgium on 2 September 1844, that his father had died around 1853 and his mother around 1864. He emigrated around 1865, he was married in Illinois where they lived for about 9 years, Peter Van de Putte and family moved to Kansas in 1879.

Maxine Wood's Belgian ancestors came to America from Sweden where the ancestors of her great grandfather "Jean Jaques" a blacksmith, had settled previously. Jean Jaques was a "Walloon" and he or his father had changed their last name to "BERGSTROM".

Josephine Eshelman called to our attention that the "La Renaissance du Livre" in Brussels has published "Communes de Belgique" a 4 vols. historical and geographical dictionary of all the Belgian communities. The four volumes cost 11.660 BF.
Josephine sent us an article found in "Encyclopedia Canadiana" Vol. 1, about Belgian emigration to Canada. It seems that the first Belgian to emigrate to Canada was a wig-maker named TISON, who came from Hainaut and settled in Montreal in 1760. Another early Belgian newcomer was Ferdinand van BRUYSSSEL (1856-1935) first Belgian consul general in Canada. Colonel CHABALLE (1876-1952) came to Canada in 1904. As a volunteer in the Canadian Army during the First World War, he displayed outstanding gallantry on the battlefield and was decorated by the British, French, and Belgian governments.
According to the 1951 census, there are 35,148 persons of Belgian origin living in Canada. There are many Flemish tobacco growers in the Southern part of Ontario province. The population in the Manitoba villages of Bruxelles, St. Alphonse and Swan Lake are largely Belgian.

In Quebec, Richelieu Valley, a colony of Belgians (Flemish-Walloon) dairymen have prospered. In Ungava the development of mineral resources has attracted many Belgian miners formerly employed in Nova Scotia. The article also mentions the "Gazette van Detroit" as serving as a source of information for both the American and Canadian Flemish communities.

Marie Josephe DELHANDE (Antoine DEMEUSE's widow) was the daughter of Jacques Thomas DELHANDE and of Marie Anne GRUELLE.
From Thorembais-St. Trond Lois received the baptismal record of Marie Therese DELLOYE (27 July 1781) daughter of Jean Francois DELLOYE and Jeanne Joseph JONET; the godparents were Jean Joseph and Marie Therese DELLOYE.

Peggy WENTE is most happy with her research, she says: "In October, my husband and I took my mother

to Green Bay for a week to visit my father's people and to do some real searching. We met with Mary Ann Defnet (who turned out to be the daughter of one of my father's closest friend - Henry Lurquin). We spent a day visiting cemeteries and another at the Research Center at UWGB..... Through the cemetery lists at Brown County Library, Mary Ann found the burial spots of most my people. While visiting relatives we were introduced to a DELVEAUX widow who is living on the farm where my great grandmother, Octavia DELVEAUX is buried. She showed us the place - it is unmarked but she knew about it ! I could have spent many more days there. They are such wonderful people and so interested in the old families. Because of marrying back and forth in families, I think this is why some of my elderly relatives got names mixed-up. Three DELVEAUX families had Constant and Celestin, Celestina, Joseph, Josephine Ann Joseph etc. it can be pretty confusing til you start sorting it out on family sheets".

Peggy is pleased that the LDS library in Rochester is now better organized in their new building, she found on the IGI (better known as microfiche) Constant DELVEAUX, his father is listed as Ferdinand Constant DELVEAUX and his mother as Marie Francoise SOQUETTE/SOQUET; could the name SOQUETTE have been changed to "SACOTTE" in this country ? she asks. She is still searching for her EVRARD family, so far she has found 3 Jean Baptiste EVRARD:

- 1) Jean Baptiste EVRARD 1840-1930 who married Jos. PATRIS.
- 2) Jean Baptiste EVRARD 1840-1904 (her great grandfather who married Sylvia LEALIOU.
- 3) Jean Baptiste EVRARD 1882-1953 (her grandmother's brother) who married Jos. DELVEAUX, and ...Anna.. Margaret DANDOIS WENTE, 1426 9th Ave. NW, Rochester, Minnesota 55901

Two years ago, it was Gail BICE's good fortune to follow a lead given to her by Pierre Inghels and to write to Georges GAILLARD of Herbeumont, LX, about e

her GAILLARD ancestors. Georges Gaillard promised her to find some informations about her ancestors, and being a gentleman of his word sent her recently, a pedigree chart taking her GAILLARD ancestry back to a Gilles GAILLARD born around 1640 and married in 1668 to Jeanne LECOMPAGNON in Herbeumont. Georges GAILLARD's 3GG father and mother (Gilles GAILLARD and Marie DUPONT x 1750) are Gail BICE 4GG father and mother.

Definitely, Graig TRUAX has a way with words, as demonstrated by his "Truax and Related Families in Europe and America 1585-1982" that he graciously sent us. Facts, anecdotes interlaced with humorous remarks make this genealogy interesting reading not only for the Truax family members but also for those interested in the human history of the settling of the U.S., mainly New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania Kentucky and Indiana where the Truaxes settled. We asked and received permission to quote from this manuscript and have selected the poem by John McCrae "IN FLANDERS FIELDS" and the remarks that Graig made about World War I.

IN FLANDERS FIELDS, by John McCrae (1872-1918)

In Flanders Fields the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place;
and in the sky the larks, still bravely singing,
fly scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead, Short days ago
We lived, fell down, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie,
in Flanders Fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe:
To you from fallen hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us to die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
in Flanders Fields.

"This is included because a pair of ninth-generation American descendants of immigrant Phillipe DU TRIFUX were returned to the ancient land of their family to fight in World War I. There were Edward Combs TRUAX (b.1896) and Joseph Johnson TRUAX (b.1897). Neither had any notion that they were "back home". Joseph was badly hurt, with gas and shrapnel, as a member of the Rainbow Division. Sgt. Edward Combs learned the war was over, as he recalled, "when a Frenchman came galloping down the road on a skinny horse yelling at us". Having long lost the French language, Edward Combs had no notion that the Frenchman was shouting: "Stop fighting. ... the war is over."

The land of Flanders is marked by the graves of men of many backgrounds and Nations who fell in war at this Heartland of Europe ."

Also in "Lucius Families U.S.A." by Ophelia Richardson Wade, 1971, we find children of the Lucius family saying that they came from "Saumpong", while others said that they came "Sass", as you can easily guess they were all talking about the same place "Sampont" a village of Hachy..... Saumpong was the (about) French pronunciation and Sass, the Luxemburgese name for Sampont.

Charles and Claudine BELVA sent a copy of an article published Aug. 23, 1974 in the Belgian newspaper "Vers l'Avenir", listing the names of the Wisconsinites planning to visit Belgium that year. The article gives some informations about the visitors' ancestors. It says: Mrs. Josephine Legreve Wauetelet thinks that her grandfather Peter Reince/Rance and her great-grandfather Alexandre Reince came from Perwez region. Her mother Lucy Reince, daughter of Peter married Frank Legrave (or Legreve). Mr. and Mrs. Laurence Johnson stated that their maternal and paternal grandparents were Clara La Luzerne, Aralea Piette, Catherine Delwiche and William La Luzerne. There is also 2 grand-uncles - John and Frank Delwiche - one grandaunt, Josephine Delwiche who married Joseph Charles. Another letter tells of Marie Antoinette Degrave, wife of Jean-Pierre Wery, she was born in Tourinnes-la-Grosse in 1798, Charles Wery their son was born there in 1836, he married Marie Adolphine Evrard born in 1844, the letter also mentionned Laura Wery wife of Leo de Baker, George de Baker who married Marie Gilliard daughter of William Gilliard and Victoria Vandervest. The same family are still locking in the Tourinnes-la-Grosse region for Marie Josephine Malcorps, wife of Alexandre Evrard, for Adolphine Evrard, daughter of Alexandre Evrard who married for the second time to Josephine Vandervest. Joe and Goldie Derenne found Celia Nanut born in Belgium 6 December 1843 and her husband Edouard

Derenne born in Belgium 4 July 1842. One daughter is born in Daussoulx on 5 December 1868. Two sisters: Virgil Potier Bosman and Myrtle Potier Alberts said that their maternal grandmother, Eugenie Legot or Ligot was born in Marsin, most likely they meant Marchin. Their maternal grandfather was Jean Baptiste Nellis; their paternal grandparents were Genevieve Early or Hearly and Ferdinand Potier, who perhaps was born in Namur. Ivan Draize says that his paternal grandparents + Auguste Draize or Deraize born in 1856 in Templou and Celina Renard (from St. Denis?); his maternal grandparents were Alex Bodart and Sarah Dechamps. According to Margaret Lampereur Draize, her paternal grandparents were Nestor Lampereur or Lempereur born 1853 in Thoremabais-les-Beguines and Eugenie Descamps. Her maternal grandparents were Martin Baudhuin from Meux, and Theresa Pensis from Tourinnes-la-Grosse. Harris Dhuey says that he is a descendant of Jean Dhuey (perhaps spelled Dewey or Duwez) born in Belgium in 1815 and a knives-maker, his wife was Marie Francoise Bofue born in Liege in the village of "Kernache". We wish to thank all of you for your support, good wishes and those marvelous articles that you send in, one of them about Belgians in MI sent to us by Luana Bauer will be published in our next issue of Belgian Laces. Please check the "microfiches" which is a list of names sent to the Temple by members of the Church (LDS)-the information found is as accurate as the person who submitted it !! But you get surprises, i.e. you will find some "PESRUWAUX" in Norfolk Co. England!!

We received a letter from Mr. Marcel HUSTING, 26, Neufchatel, B1060 Bruxelles, Belgium, requesting some genealogical informations regarding Marie JUNEAU who had married Jean-Pierre HUSTING a Belgian emigrant to Wisconsin, they were the parents of Paul Oscar HUSTING, a senator, born in Fond-du-Lac 25 April 1866. Our correspondent was also interested in receiving some informations on "La Farinee" an Indian Chief, related to Marie JUNEAU.

We called on Mary Ann Defnet for help and ever so kindly, she did the requested research on the JUNEAU family, who is of French-Canadian descent and quite famous. She wasn't able to find a relationship to "La Farinee", but did find that there is a strong possibility that one of Marie Juneau's maternal ancestor was "AHKENEPOWEH" an Indian Chief.

We asked The State Historical Society of Wisconsin (816 State St., Madison, WI. 53706) do give us some details about LA FARINEE and AHKENEPOWEH.

Mrs. Jeanne PREUX-QUIN, 25 rue du Parc, 7270 Dour, Belgium was told by the Genealogical Library (LDS), 5 Rond Point de l'Alliance, 78000 Versailles, France, that Salt Lake had 2 microfilms of 2 QUIN family genealogies. Mrs. Preux would like to know if any QUIN from Belgium ever emigrated to the U.S. We will be checking one of the QUIN microfilms for her. In 1624 many people originate from Hainaut Province

came to America via The Netherlands, they settled N.Y. alongside the Dutch; many years later (around 1880) again many people from the Hainaut Province emigrated to America, mostly to Pennsylvania? this latter emigration involved many coal miner and glass maker families. Perhaps there was some QUIN families among one of these emigrations. Mrs. Preux is now a member of TBR

Mr. Armand VANWELDE, 3 rue J.B. Denys, 1070 Brussels, Belgium, is researching the name WELDE/WELDEN and other spellings and would like to know if we have members or are acquainted with people by that name. Mr. VanWelde sent us an interesting manuscript about the surname WELDEN, it includes not only Mr. VanWelde's genealogy going back to Petrus Van Welde who married Cornelia Leemans in 1607 in Kerkom, but also numerous references to the other Welde/VanWelde/deWelde/Welden/Velde families of Belgium and Europe and the U.S. and Canada.

Mr. Andre GYRE, 42, rue de Beauvechain, 5991 Tourinnes-la-Grosse, Belgium, found thru a 1850 tax roll that Martin Gyre, a brother of one of his direct ancestors had emigrated to the U.S. from which he was still paying taxes on land he owned in Belgium. Martin Gyre (sometime the name is also spelled Gire) was born in Nethen on 7 July 1810 and had emigrated to the U.S. before 1850, he was married but the name of his spouse is not known; Mr. Gyre would like to know if Martin Gyre had any descendants and where in the U.S. did he emigrated to. Could you, if your library has printed copies of the 1850 census of your state check it for a Martin Gyre - there is a strong possibility that the spelling of the name was changed - the name would sound like "Geer/Jeer" and might be spelled that way too. Mary Ann informed us that there are many "Geyer" in Wisconsin (where many people from Nethen and surrounding towns settled) she thinks that they are German of origin, but will find out for sure.

Mr. Yves HELLEBAUT, 21, Place Flagey B.P.6, Bruxelles, Belgium, has a grandaunt who emigrated to the U.S. in 1890 with her daughter;

she was Elisa Amelie HAECK RICCI born in Schaarbeek on 25 February 1856, she had married Archangelo RICCI in 1877 (St. Josse-ten-Noode) - she left, according to the St. Gilles population registers, on the 29 April 1890 taking her daughter Gabrielle RICCI along but leaving her husband behind. She died in Philadelphia on 18 Oct. 1903. Mr. Hellebaut's question is this: Did her daughter Gabrielle married and did she have any descendant. So far we asked the University of Pennsylvania-Philadelphia to check the obituaries for that time-period in their newspaper collection. They did check the only collection that was available to them, but were unable to find any obituary for Elisa HAECK RICCI, but did refer us to another library which has an extensive newspaper collection. First, we will be checking the Philadelphia Vital Records before writing to the Free Library of Philadelphia, to make sure that we have the right death date and place. If however the obituary (if found) doesn't mention the married name of her daughter (if indeed she ever married) what do you think could be done to find out what happened to the daughter?

Why so many letters from Belgium you may ask? the following, from Mr. Michael C. DUDNEY, 127 rue Puits-en-Sock, 4020 Liege, Belgium, will answer that..... "I saw an article in the January 1982 (# 217 -No.1/1982) issue of L'Intermediaire des Genealogistes published in Brussels by the S.C.G.D. (Service de Centralisation des Etudes Genealogiques et Demographiques de Belgique) concerning The Belgian Researchers" and the quarterly "Belgian Laces", written by J. DETRO, a member of the S.C.G.D. who has corresponded with you. The article is very interesting, encouraging Belgians with interest in the U.S.A to become members of The Belgian Researchers..... Mr. Dudney goes on saying that his father is American and his mother Belgian-born and that he is residing in Belgium permanently, he is familiar with Belgian research and also with problems (genealogically speaking) of Belgians in the U.S. especially helping

American Belgians to tie up with the "Old World" Mr. Dudney also offers his help to anyone who might need it. How nice!

We received an inquiry from Mr. Richard LAMINE, 3480 Greenbriar Ct., La Crosse, Wisc. 54601, who knows that his great-great-grandparents left the village of Melin, BT on March 28, 1856. They were Jean-Baptiste LAMINE and his wife Josephine BARETTE and their 4 children, they were accompanied by Barbe BARETTE and the widow Mr. Lamine would like to know when they departed Belgium for the U.S.. what was the name of the ship and where was the port of entry, how many people were on the ship and if it's possible to get a copy of the manifest. If when checking passenger lists you find some informations about the above mentioned people, please contact Mr. Lamine or us.

Mr. Joseph WEYN informs us that he was born in Antwerp and that he is a member of the GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY OF FLEMISH AMERICANS. There were 2 Dohogne and 2 Legrand families that emigrated also from Francorchamps. They settled first in Ohio for a few years and then moved on to Scott Co. "The emigration of remarkably skilled people gave a new impulse to our industry, very modest at that time. Their contributions have left their marks on our economy and in the history of our civilization" (Gustavus VI, King of Sweden, May 11, 1964, Stockholm)

In his address, the King of Sweden was referring to the WALLOON EMIGRATION TO SWEDEN DURING THE 17th CENTURY.

Toward the end of the 16th c., the Louis DE GEER family from Gaillardmont, LG, had because of their religious beliefs, emigrated like so many to the Netherlands. A son, also named Louis (married 1612, in Dordrecht/Neth. Adrienne GERARD from Liege) gave an extraordinary expansion to his father's business. It was around 1612-1615 that he started exporting canons to Sweden where he met the DE BESCHE/DE BECHE

brothers who were living there and who were involved in the steel industry. Louis de Geer supplied them with calamine. This was the start of Louis de Geer's business transactions with Sweden. In April 1615, he exported 500 canons, canonballs and nitre to that country. By June of the same year, Louis equipped at his own expenses 200 soldiers whom he sent to the service of Gustavus II, King of Sweden. By 1619, Louis was lending money to the King and received copper ingots as payments.

Before long Louis who was now residing in Sweden, became the ammunition supplier to the Swedish Kingdom. He provided them with artillery equipment, and iron canonballs. He became an associate of the de Besche brothers and managed the Osterby mill, but by 1627 he is found as the director of all of Sweden weapon factories !!! (Dannora, Finspong, Nykoping, Norrkoping, Godegard, Forsmarck, Torshalla, Flogford, Nacka, etc...) In 1630 he is the sole master of all these plants and is able to equip an army of 35,000 and to supply weapons and ammunitions for 42,000 soldiers!

How was Louis de Geer able to accomplish such feats? he had at his disposal a very able and industrious group of people, mainly highly qualified 5,000 emigrants and their families from the Namur, Walcourt, Liege and Franchimont regions! No doubts that Louis de Geer was instrumental in recruiting his fellow countrymen; did he recruit them in Belgium or had they too taken refuge in the Netherlands where they were recruited?

These informations taken from "L'Expansion Wallonne en Europe" by Joseph Delmeille, would be just about all that we could offer for now, if it hadn't been for Jacques Detrou, 99 rue de Fétinne, 4020, Liege, Belgium, who sent the following list of surnames found in the "Bulletin de l'Institut Archeologique Liegeois" Vol. 12, 1874, Stanislas Borman.

These surnames were found in the parish registers of Oster-Lofsta, also including Akerby and Hillebois; in the account registers of Osterby, Dannemora, Finspong mills; in the Carlskoqa and Fernebo districts mines accounts; in the church of Lena registers for Wattholma mill.

(D) means Dannemora-Verken; (Etc.) means that these surnames are found in various places; (F) = Finspong; (H) = Hidemora; (L) = Leufsta; (O) = Osterby;

To close this article about "Walloon" in Sweden, let me just say that if Blanche of Namur (b. 1315?) wife of Magnus Eriksson, King of Sweden, was well liked and is still remembered by the Swedes - 600 years later, it was the turn of Astrid, Swedish Princess (1905-1936), to capture the hearts of the Belgians and of Leopold, their future King. Queen Astrid was the mother of Baudouin, King of Belgium; of Josephine-Charlotte, Grand-Duchess of Luxemburg; and of Albert, Prince of Liege. So loved was Astrid that even long after her untimely death, her picture still hung in many homes in Belgium.
