This letter was given to me by Mary Ann Fitzpatrick Messer after the first edition of this book was published. It had been passed down in the Frank Panther family in Iowa. It was written on February 8, 1913 from Donat Panther to his American relatives and appears to have been sent, along with the "Panthers in Germany" postcard to Louise Traub Klumpp. Louise was the sister of Amelia Traub Panther. It appears Louise then forwarded the letter to Frank and Frances Panther on May 8, 1913. The letter appears to talk about the photograph, saying a copy should be given to Ferdinand, one to Louise and one to each of Aloys' and Monika's three children because Aunt Amelia (Monica's sister) would like it that way. Donat says the rest of Aloys' children shouldn't feel bad. He wishes they had enough for everyone. The letter says the people in the photo are Donat, his wife, Amelia, their maid and their youngest daughter, whom they call their "Black Panther" in the window.
