
ALICE AND SHERMAN POTTS

CECIL REHKOP



Cecil Rehkop was born November 5, 1910, in Esther, St. Francois County, Missouri. He was the son of Thomas Powderly and Ida Mae (Crook) Henson Rehkop. Cecil's brothers and sisters were Normal and Virgil Henson, and Walter, Truman, Medford, Fay, George, Thomas, Velma, and Juanita Rehkop.

In the early years of his life, Cecil lived in St. Francois and Madison Counties. In 1924, the Thomas Rehkop family moved to St. Louis, Missouri. At the age of 16, Cecil went to work for Woodward and Tiernan Printing Company in St. Louis. He worked for Woodward and Tiernan until

World War II broke out. Cecil was inducted into the U. S. Army on April 3, 1942. He took basic training at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri. From there, he went to Warrensburg, Missouri, where he was promoted to the rank of staff sergeant. He then served in North Africa (African Theater); Venice, Florida; India (China-Burma-India); and Santa Anna, California. He was honorably discharged at Scott Field, Illinois, on November 21, 1945.

After the war, Cecil returned to work for Woodward and Tiernan. Cecil never married, but was very devoted to his family. He helped care for his parents during their waning years, and this devotion was well known. He continued to work for Woodward and Tiernan until his retirement at age 62.

Shortly after retiring, Cecil moved to a house on Missouri State Highway H in Madison County. He lived there with his half brother, Virgil Henson, who also had never married. Virgil was a WWII Veteran with declining health. Cecil helped care for Virgil until he passed away in 1973. Cecil was Master Mason of Marcus Lodge #110, A.F. & A.M. Cecil had an interest in Rehkop family history and always made it a habit to bring together other family members with this common interest.

During the years from 1972 to 1975, Cecil routinely visited the Elza Rehkop family. Cecil and Elza were first cousins, as well as neighbors. Cecil would often have supper with them.

In the mid-70's, Cecil was stricken with cancer. He fought the disease for several years. During this period Cecil was saved, and joined Copper Mines Free Will Baptist Church on October 30, 1977. Cecil continued to attend Copper Mines until his health would no longer permit. Cecil died in St. Louis, Missouri, on May 25, 1978. He was buried in Marcus Memorial Park, Madison County, Missouri, near his parents.

ELZA AND CLARICE (BREWINGTON) REHKOP



Clarice Marie Brewington was born May 4, 1929, in Fredericktown, Missouri. She was the daughter of Theodore Thomas Brewington and Flora Belle (Stacy) Brewington. Her older sisters and brother were Beatrice Buella, Alberta June, and William Percy. At her birth, the Theodore Brewington family lived in Fredericktown, but later moved to the Twelve Mile Community. One of Clarice's very first memories was the day her mother died in September 1933. Clarice was only four years old. This created a real hardship on the family, especially the sisters who had the responsibility of running the household at a young age.

Theodore Thomas Brewington was a schoolteacher. He taught at the Twelve Mile District No. 46 at the time of Flora Belle's passing. There was no one left at home to

take care of young Clarice, so she started school at age four under the tutelage of her father. She does not remember her first day in school.

Theodore was not a professing Christian at the time but always took the children to church. The churches they attended were the Mt. Pisgah Missionary Baptist and the Zion (now Twelve Mile) Missionary Baptist, both pastored by the Rev. Leonard Davis. They attended wherever the pastor was on that particular Sunday. Bea and June became members of the Mt. Pisgah Church.

In March 1937, Theodore married Anna Ethel Clauser, who became stepmother to the children. Ethel was a member of the Cedar Bottom General Baptist Church. They attended Cedar Bottom, and sometimes the Little Vine United Baptist Church. In the meantime, the New Harmony General Baptist Church (now defunct) was organized in their community, and it became their church home. Theodore had been saved at a brush arbor meeting during this time.

In 1918, Theodore was a WWI Veteran stationed at Camp Funston, Kansas. While there, he contracted tuberculosis. He was treated for the disease for many years. Tragedy stuck the Brewington home again in May 1941 when Theodore passed away after a long illness with tuberculosis and the flu. Clarice was twelve at this time. Soon thereafter, Clarice followed her brother Percy to the altar and was saved. She did not follow through with baptism. The Brewington family was left with Ethel, Percy, and Clarice. Beatrice and June had moved away in 1938.

Due to starting school early, at age twelve Clarice began attending Mine La Motte High School as a freshman in 1941. Her brother Percy was a senior at the time. They rode a school bus all the way from Twelve Mile to Mine La Motte.

In Percy's class was a young man named Elza Moloye Rehkop. Elza was the son of Henry and Nancy LuEtta (Underwood) Rehkop. He was born on January 30, 1923, in Flat River, St. Francois County, Missouri. His brothers and sisters were John Henry, Clifford Sylvester, Leon Denver, Elma Eileen, Norma Ruth, Leonard Elden, Glenn Allen, Euvana Marie, Gale Leeman (Bud), and Dale Ray (Jack). The Henry Rehkop family had lived in Flat River where Henry was employed by St. Joseph Lead Company. Eventually they moved back to Mine La Motte where Elza attended school. Elza graduated from Mine La Motte High School in 1942. He began working for St Joseph Lead Company in Mine La Motte after graduation.

Elza's early church life began at the Mine La Motte Free Will Baptist Church where he began with his family. His memories of the early years are very vague. Sister Nettie Rogers was his teacher in the Card class. The pastors during this time were the Reverends John Long, Dammon Dodd, S.A. Hand, and Bill Reeves. He remembers a young Reverend, Mark Lewis, age 17 or 18, running a revival with over one hundred people saved.

A group of young people from the church formed quartets and were on demand from several churches, those being Old Bethel, Union Light, Aulsbury Chapel, and even the Methodist Church in Fredericktown. Some of the group were Truman and Homer Huffman, Ruth and Elza Rehkop, Ray Limbaugh, Ruby Reeves, Blanch and O.D. Matthews, and Butch Mooney.

Elza was baptized by Reverend Bill Reeves on April 7, 1940, and joined Mine La Motte Church on the same day. After his family moved to Copper Mines, he walked back to the Mine La Motte Church for many services. He especially remembers two old preachers at Mine La Motte named Isadore Lindsay and Herbert Ellis, who were so feeble that they had to be helped up to the pulpit in order to preach.

World War II started in 1941 and ended when Clarice was a senior in 1945. Many of the usual school activities were suspended because of conservation. Shoes, sugar and gasoline, along with many other items, were on the ration list. Clarice still has her ration book. Church attendance was the thing to do during this difficult time and was never neglected. Percy was drafted into the U. S. Army after high school graduation, and Elza Rehkop was too. They were inducted on January 20, 1943, at Jefferson Barracks, Missouri. They were sent to Camp Joseph T. Robinson, Little Rock, Arkansas, for their basic training, but were later separated for the remainder of the war. After Percy was drafted, Clarice and Ethel were the only ones left to tend the farm at Twelve Mile. Her high school friends thought it a little strange that she had to feed the livestock after school and do outside chores, but there was no one else left at home to do it.

In 1945, Clarice and Ethel moved to 114 South Maple Street in Fredericktown. After graduation from high school in 1945, Clarice worked a short time at the Brown Shoe Factory. Later on, she was employed as a secretary to the County Superintendent of Schools in Madison County, Clarence G. Moore.

During the war, Elza served as a private in the European Theatre. He spent some time in England before landing in Omaha Beach, France, D-Day 5. He was assigned to Company B of the 20th Combat Engineer Battalion, attached to the 16th Infantry of the First Division. The mission of the Combat Engineers was to build bridges, clear mine fields, and maintain roads. Elza criss-crossed France during the invasion, and was with the armed forces that liberated Paris. On September 9, 1944, while building a bridge near Sudan, France, Elza's left leg was seriously injured during a construction accident. This accident effectively ended his active participation in the war. Elza was hospitalized for a while in England. Later, he was transported back to the United States via a hospital ship, landing in Staten Island, New York, on December 23, 1944. From there, he was transferred to a hospital in El Paso, Texas, to recover from his injury. He spent 18 months in military hospitals. He was honorably discharged from service on February 22, 1946, in Fort Carson, Colorado.

Clarice and Elza began dating on May 3, 1946. They were married on December 24, 1947, in Fredericktown, Missouri. Elza began working for St. Joseph Lead Company in Flat River, Missouri. At night, he continued his education by attending machinist training at the Flat River Junior College. Clarice worked in the office at the shoe factory for a little while, before going back to secretarial work for Roscoe Stephens, County Superintendent of Schools. She held that position until the birth of their first son, Lon Edward Rehkop on October 31, 1955. Two more children were soon to follow: Marty Dean Rehkop on April 30, 1957, and Joyce Viane Rehkop on September 30, 1959. Clarice became a full-time mom and never returned to the employment world.

In 1959, the Rehkop family moved to St. Charles, Missouri, where Elza took employment as a machinist in the aerospace program. Elza worked for Universal Match (Unidynamics), Matco, Alliance Tool, and Kimco while in the St. Louis area. In 1962, they moved again to Fenton, Missouri. All three children began their schooling during these years, which continued until November 1967.

While living away, Elza and Clarice began constructing a home in Copper Mines. Elza and his brother, Clifford, had also acquired the old Copper Mines Schoolhouse. During their house construction, the Elza Rehkop family spent weekends at the schoolhouse. The first Sunday in July 1961 was the time that Clarice and the children began attending Sunday school at Copper Mines Church. The family had attended church there on



special occasions when the Rev. Glenn Rehkop was pastor.

In the early 1960's, Glenn was pastoring in the Kansas City area, and he came to Arnold in April of 1967 to run a revival. The Elza Rehkop family was living in Fenton at this

time and attended the revival, where Elza and Clarice rededicated their lives and subsequently became regular attendees at Copper Mines. They joined the church on September 21, 1967. Elza was received by letter from Mine La Motte Free Will Baptist Church, and Clarice by baptism on July 22, 1967, by the Rev. O.D. Matthews.

In November 1967, the family moved from Fenton to Copper Mines. Elza was employed at Unidynamics in Bonne Terre, Missouri, for a few years. In November 1970, he went to work for the AMAX Lead Company of Missouri, Buick Mine, in Bixby, Missouri. He worked in the underground machine shop until his retirement in 1985.

After moving back to Copper Mines, Elza and Clarice were connected with many phases of the church work. Clarice served as Junior Class teacher for eight years, and Young Teen Class teacher for three years. She also worked in Vacation Bible School, Christmas programs, and served on various committees. Elza served as Sunday School superintendent for twelve years, Young Married Class teacher, Men's Adult Class teacher, Sunday School Convention President for three years, worked on many projects, and was ordained a deacon on November 30, 1968. One of his favorite callings has been to provide candy for the kids after Sunday services.



On April 24, 1971, Lon, Marty, and Joyce were converted during a revival. Rev. O.D. Matthews baptized the children on May 30, 1971. Lon joined the church on July 30, 1972, and Marty and Joyce on January 28, 1973. Marty and Joyce are presently on the inactive church membership list.

It has been a privilege and a great honor for the Elza Rehkop family to belong to the Copper Mines Free Will Baptist Church.

The membership has been with them for all these years to share in both joys and sorrows. They always treasure the fellowship they have enjoyed with one another, and are looking beyond this life to that great hope of the eternity with Jesus Christ, the Lord. They are proud to be members of this church during its centennial anniversary celebration.
