CHURCH OF ENGLAND OFFERS COMBINED WEDDING, BAPTISM

LONDON – The Church of England is offering couples a two-for-one service – marriage for them and baptisms for their children.

The church is recognizing the changing reality of British families, it said Thursday. Statistics show that 44 percent of children in Britain are born to unmarried women, and the church's own research found that one in five couples seeking a church wedding already had children either together or from a previous relationship.

New guidelines sent to the Church of England's 16,000 parish churches encourage services that combine a wedding with a christening or a service of thanksgiving for the birth of a child.

The new guidelines are the latest attempt by the church to compete with increasingly popular civil marriages.

Original documents, numerous photographs, and several indexes of Jefferson County data compiled by members of the Jefferson County Genealogical Society are only a part of their collection. Genealogists who are both knowledgeable in the area and are willing to help staff the Center.

The building is located on Boulder's Main Street. The most visible landmark is the grocery store. Find it and then look directly across the Main Street. The Center is a stone building with blue trim. Hours are Monday, Thursday, & Saturday from 9 am to noon and Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, & Sunday from 1 to 5 pm.

ARMY CAMELS? IT'S TRUE. And Edward F. Beale's trek across the desert to survey a road between New Mexico and California with Army-issue camels is just one of the stories you'll find in *Returns from U.S. Military Posts, 1800-1916*, a new collection at Ancestry.com.

The collection includes reports from hundreds of posts listing names of officers and civilians who held positions there, plus records of events, lists of official communications received, notes about military personnel who came and left and why they departed. Currently, the collection is being indexed through the Ancestry.com World Archives Project; you can also browse the images to gather clues about a family member's military service before the index is complete. And if it's camels you're interested in, you'll find them in the collection, too, at least for the few years that their service lasted. While the Army considered them hugely successful in adapting to conditions in the American Southwest, the camels' tendency to scare horses – and troops --- quickly earned them unfit-for-duty labels.

NOW WHAT? 10 GO-TO GENEALOGY RECORDS

Q. What records should I use to research my family tree?

A. As you research your family back in time from yourself, you'll find clues that point you a variety of records—so the short answer is, you'll use whatever type of record your research directs you to.

But some kinds of records are easier to use and/or cover a broader segment of the population than others. Check these 10 go-to genealogy records for any ancestor who falls into the right age range at the right time.

Home sources: Search for awards, certificates, Bibles, photos and other family papers in closets and attics in your own or relatives' homes. This is among your first steps when starting your family tree.

US census records: Check every available US census during each ancestor's lifetime. The census has been taken every 10 years since 1790; 1930 is the most recent one open for research. (Almost all of the 1890 census was destroyed.) Censuses are on micro-film at National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) facilities, the Family History Library (FHL) and many of its branch Family History Centers, and large libraries. The census is online at subscription site Ancestry.com and at Ancestry Library Edition and Heritage Quest Online (free through many libraries). Individual censuses are at subscription site Footnote (1860 and 1930) and are being added free to Family Search (1850, 1860, 1870, 1880 index, 1900, 1920 index).

Birth records: Most states mandated tracking births starting in the late 1800s and early 1900s (download our chart listing state vital record keeping dates here); towns and counties may have kept records earlier. States often restrict access to birth records older than **75 or 100 years**. Historical birth records may be at the state archives or health department, county courthouse or elsewhere. See the state vital records office Web site for information on obtaining them.

Marriage records: These work similarly to birth records as far as when they were kept, and where they're stored (they're also listed on our Vital Records chart). Look for marriage licenses, too, as well as church records and newspaper announcements.

Death records: These include not only death certificates—kept by the same entities as birth certificates, often with fewer privacy restrictions—but also obituaries and the free **Social Security Death Index** (which lists deaths reported to the Social Security Administration, mostly after 1962). Once you know the date and place of death, look for a will and probate records.

Ship passenger lists: Starting in 1820, US-bound ships had to keep lists of their passengers. Some 40 percent of Americans have an ancestor who arrived at Ellis Island from 1892 to 1924 (Ellis Island records are free online), but immigrants also arrived at other ports. Surviving lists for all ports are on microfilm at NARA facilities and the FHL, and online at Ancestry.com. Large public libraries often have microfilmed records from various ports, too.

WWI draft cards: Virtually every man born from 1872 to 1900 and living in the United States in 1917 and 1918 had to fill out a WWI draft registration card. They're on NARA and FHL microfilm, and on Ancestry.com. These WWI resources will help you find your ancestor's card.

City directories: Like modern phone books, these annual directories listed the residents of city or town, and some rural areas. Once you find your ancestors lived in a certain place at a certain time, look for them in city directories to get an address and determine when they may have moved. **See our advice on finding city directories**; also use the **Online City, County, and Rural Directories Web Site** for links to online directories.

SS-5: If you find your ancestor's Social Security Number in the Social Security Death Index, be sure to send away for his application, or SS-5. **Find out how to request an SS-5 on our Genealogy Insider blog**.

Civil War General Index Card: The 6.3 million Union and Confederate soldier names on these cards (some soldiers have more than one card) are searchable on the free **Civil War Soldiers and Sailors System**. You'll confirm your ancestor's Civil War service, and you can use the information to help you find service and pension records.




