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The purpose of this work is to present information that I have collected pertaining to life in Blawnox during the period of the mid 1920s through the mid 1960s. The particular information consists of two parts.

The first part consists of transcripts of three oral history interviews with three different men who lived in Blawnox during those years and memories of the author covering the later part of that time period.

The other information consists of transcripts of the first two United States Census records covering the Borough. These are the only two available as of this date and serve to compliment the interviews. I have also included an analysis of the information from both census pertaining to occupations and place of birth and residence in 1935.

A Glimpse at Life in Blawnox in the 1930s, 1940s and 1950s

An Interview with Bill Sproul

This is an edited transcription of an interview with Bill Sproul conducted in November and December of 1998. Bill was born in Blawnox on April 4th of 1924 and has lived there since then.

The interview was conducted over the phone by Dan Nowak with Bill at his residence in Blawnox. The editing is an attempt to make it more readable. Editor's notes are shown in {brackets}, probable missing words, due to difficulties hearing the tape recording, are in (parenthesis).

{Timeline: Ten years old: 1934
Graduated high school: 1943
Discharged from U. S. Army: November, 1948}

Q: What was the address of your **place of birth**?

A: Well, I'm not sure whether I was born in the hospital or not, but I think we lived up on Fountain Street at the time.

Q: Did you **live in another house**?

A: Later on we moved up to where the Allegheny Valley Bank is now, they used to call it the Honeymoon Hotel. And, years and years and years ago, people by the name of Simons had a grocery store there. It was called Simon's Grocery Store. Then what it was, it caught on fire and so we moved down to Blaw Avenue, above Kaczynsky's restaurant, more or less. It was like the mill restaurant there on Blaw Avenue, that's where Beno's was. I don't think there's nothing in there right at the moment, as far as business. But, anyhow, from there I moved down to Second Street. 136 Second Street. And, I lived there probably until about Nineteen... let's see, yeah I was there in the flood, 1936. We probably lived there until about 1938, no maybe even later than that. Probably in the forties, because when I went to the Service, we lived there. Ferines had bought our house. You knew Ferines didn't you? OK, well, that's the house I lived in. Well, then they bought our house and we moved about 4 doors up from there, where Ed Ireland lived. I don't know the number of the house. And from there I went to the Service. Well, then when I was in the Service Ed Ireland bought that house, so my mother had to move up on Freeport Road. And, she rented the old Sharp place. Mrs. Bataglia owned (it). Right beside the store. Well, if you would come in the town now it's still an empty spot because they had torn that down after we moved out. When I came home from the Service my mother was living there. I came home in November of Forty-Eight. And, probably about March or April of '49, we bought the house at 140 First Street. That's where your grandmother and granddad lived. And well, your grandparents didn't own the house beside me at the time. There was a guy named Mr. Klue, I used to call him Mr. Glue because every time he'd come over to the store he stick around so dog-on long. So anyhow, I think your grandparents bought the house beside right beside us. Then in 1952 I came over here to the store. The store was already a store that Pentarts had. Sasnowski owned the building, but Pentarts were running the store. And, I took it over March 1st, 1952. And, I think about 3 or 4 years later, the end of '55 or possibly the first month of '56, I bought the building from Mrs. Sasnowski. And well, I've been here ever since.

Q: Did your **parents own any of the houses** that you lived in or did they rent them?

My father left my mother about... I can vaguely remember him, you know, as a kid. I've seen him years later; in fact we visited him a few times out in Philadelphia. He was a constructional ironworker. So I was basically just living with my mother, in fact when I lived in 136 Second Street, we rented that from a lady named Tillie Henderson. There was my mother and I, and later on my brother was born, about 1936. Let's see, was he in the '36 Flood or wasn't he. Yeah, he was in the '36 Flood, that's right, because I remember my mother saying (that) when I was a baby I was chased out that Hotel up here, or that grocery store, by fire. In fact, that was the fire that more or less originated the Blawnox-Glenover Fire Department. They didn't have a fire department prior to that. So yeah, my brother, Joe, he was born, probably by 1935.

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Well, there were two old maids that lived in the house right across from where your grandparents {Joe and Ann Nowak} lived in my house {140 First Street}. They were a Mrs. Frasher and a Clara Salady. So, consequently, I was basically around women all the time.

And then my father's parents they lived, I don't know if you remember Diggitt, Diggitts and Greene's? They lived in; I think it was 132 Second Street, right beside us. Well, that was my father's parents. And, uh... now, my grandfather, John Sproul, he was an assistant superintendent up at the Workhouse. And they lived in Number 8 in the Workhouse Row. In fact, for a long time, that was known as the Sproul house. And, uh... but, my dad was never a guard at the Workhouse, but my uncle Clyde was.

My dad was in the Marines at one time, but later on he worked at the Blaw-Knox Company and then he started to get on construction, and was a constructional ironworker. He worked on the New Kensington bridge. I think New Kensington Bridge was about the last bridge he worked on in this area. And then he moved to Philadelphia because there was more construction type work. They'd be running back and forth from New York to Newark to Philadelphia. And, he worked on the Vanserro Bridge, or whatever it is called. I think that was the last bridge he worked on up in New York City.

But, like I said, I lived in Blawnox all my life with the exception I went to the Service. I graduated in June of 1943 from Aspinwall with George Dolhi and Marge Vogel, his wife. In fact, I was more or less instrumental in them meeting each other. We graduated in June of '43, and July 19th, I was in the Service. I ended up taking basic training down Miami Beach in July, August, September. I had prickly heat for 90 days.

From there I went to Gulfport, Mississippi. I went to air mechanics school. They were supposed to have an emergency shipment going overseas, and they sent us up to Scott Field. I think the only reason they sent us to Scott Field, they must have had about 80 inches of snow, or something. They had us up there for about a week shoveling snow. In fact, we had the snow so high that everywhere you walked; you thought you were walking down a corridor. That's how high we had the snow packed up.

And from there, I went over to England, and I was in England in February of '44. From there, I landed on the beach in D-10 (D-Day plus 10). And then I worked my way across the, well, we had the gasoline dump for the Battle of the Bulge there. If you ever seen that movie, where that tank was trying to get to that gasoline dump? Well, that was our dump.

I never had a furlough, so in 1945 I reenlisted so I could come home for Christmas. And, I got home for Christmas in '45, and then I went back overseas again, and I went up to Berlin. I was up in Berlin from about April 16 to probably about the middle of November of '48. While I was up there I had gotten married. I was also in the Berlin Airlift. In fact, I'm going to Berlin this coming May, for the 50th anniversary. The German government's inviting us all over at their expense. I was over there about 4 or 5 years ago. I belong to the Berlin Airlift Veterans Association. And, also another Berlin Airlift Association, which they had their big time last May and we're going to have our big together over there this May.

Q: Where did you live when you were 10 or 12 years old?

A: 136 Second Street.

Q: Where did you play as a child, say 10 or 12 years old?

A: Well, we swam mostly in the river. And, we played ball up there at the field, although it wasn't too good of a field at the time. And then right down where Royston's, the Royston plant originally was a burial vault company. They made these cement boxes which you put the casket into. And, that's what they made there. And there was like, an open field across from, do you remember the Disposal Plant down there? OK, right across from that we used to play a lot of ball down there. Well, then in the old days too we used to play a lot of Releev-io, and "Put your finger in the pie and run", and you go hide, more or less a game of release. Did you ever play Release? OK, well, we played release. That was the type of things that we played. And, like I said, I swam in the river constantly, every day. I was a pretty good swimmer at one time. I could swim back and forth across that river without even touching either side. In fact, one time, now this is beyond 10 years old, maybe 13 or 14 or something like that, about 10 of us started to swim from Blawnox and we swam up to the Hulton Bridge. Only about 4 of us made it, but we swam from Blawnox to the Hulton Bridge. And then, at that time there used to be steamboats going up the river. Well, as soon as we could hear that, that steam going pheew, pheew, we'd get in our boats and go out and catch the

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big waves off the paddle wheels. Or, sometimes we'd hook ourselves onto a barge. We'd hook our boat onto a barge and let him take us up to just before the Acmetonia dam and we'd release and then it would take us all day to drift down to Blawnox. Of course, we'd stop here and there. It was easy coming down because all you'd do was let the boat go. You could drift down.

Q: Were there any places on or near Blawnox that were **off-limits**?

A: You mean me as an individual? Well, over the Courts. Foreign people lived over there. So, basically, on this side of Center Avenue, we were more or less Anglo-Saxons and people of that type and everybody over in the Court was, well in fact, coming down Blaw Avenue, the houses aren't there anymore, but from the 6th Street gate down to the railroad tracks there was about, I'd say about 8 to 10 houses. We used to call that the Hunkie row, because all foreign people lived in there. See, all the Court houses was built by the Blaw-Knox Company. A lot of your houses up on Walnut Street, they was all built by the Blaw-Knox Company, too. But, on Walnut Street, those places was for more or less, let's say, the foremen's or more or less the bosses. And then, the row up there beyond the, do you know Petolski's. Remember Petolski's store? OK, it was right beyond Witas'. That red brick store. And, there's a row of about maybe 10 to 12 houses. Well, they was built by the Blawnox Company. In fact, most of the deeds in Blawnox read Hoboken Land Company. See, before it was known as Blawnox, it was Hoboken. And, then when the Blaw-Knox Company moved down here in the 20's, like '21 and '22, they started building all these houses. Well, you had two mills come down here, one from Reynoldsville, and what the heck was the other one? Anyhow, so the Blaw Company came down here and the Knox Company came down here. And then when they got down here, well then they combined and they called it the Blaw-Knox. But, it was B-L-A-W-K-N-O-X. Well, then when they named the town, they deleted the K and that's where we got the name of Blawnox. But, like I said, our parents, as a rule, didn't allow us to go over into the Courts because they were a more or less a ruffian type person over there. In fact, I'd say a few of them couldn't even speak English. See, in my day, I'd say it wasn't a lot, but there were kids that would go to school and when they went in the first grade, why they couldn't speak English. It was up to the first grade teacher to teach them English. In fact, I know when 2 or 3 of them, you know, by name, that they couldn't speak English 'til they got to school. So, consequently you had your foreign element was, you know, in the 20s was more popular and they more or less lived in groups. Well, like you have your Polish Hill and North Side is German and Squirrel Hill's Jewish, but at that time, it was more so that way. The different types of people, I mean, they lived in their own community, more or less.

Q: Was there anything about Blawnox, or that you could do in Blawnox that was **special, unusual or even unique** for its time?

A: Well, like I used to tell all the kids when in the store, I used to say, you kids have vacation every day of your life, in the summer vacation. I said, you do every day what the average kid in the city, or that, looks forward to (during) a 2 weeks vacation. I mean, we used to roam up over Powers Run. I don't know if you knew or not, but there used to be an airport up there, called Roger's Field. That's where the Fox Chapel (High) School, more or less, covers quite a bit of that area. But, there was an airport up there and we used to go up there like on Sundays and we'd watch them do sky divings and all kind of barnstorming at the time. Then, we used to go up to the Stone Quarry, because, the Workhouse farm was up there. Like a lot of times, after mass and that, we'd go up there on a Sunday, and we could stay up there all day because we'd go out there and pick potatoes and corn that we could eat up there. And, then we'd get a couple cigarettes and we'd go down to the, on top of Center Avenue there was the Workhouse barn. They had cows and chickens there. And we'd go down there with a couple cigarettes and we could get all the eggs we wanted. And, basically we could stay out there. And then, we'd roam out through what is now Oak Hill Manor. But, there was nothing there and we could loaf up around there quite a bit. In fact, they had what they called the Victory Gardens up there at the time of the Depression; the government would give you seeds. Well, at that time they weren't called Victory Gardens, they were called that during the War. But, prior to that they'd give you seeds and then lot of the people had homes, shacks more or less, up in the top of Oak Hill Manor. Let's see, Westfall lived up there, and the McKays lived up there. That's the McKay from Mon'rose Hill. George McKay, George McKay's brother's and his parents lived up there.

Q: This was before the Oak Hill Manor plan went in?

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A: Oh, yeah. Well, see the plan didn't go in there basically good 'til, probably after the War when they started the building. See, at one time down where Hobay Lumber Company is, that was a National, that was an amusement park down there. Now, I was a little bit too young to remember that, I mean, I do remember it. It was called the National Park. Do you remember the old skating rink down there? Where the Chinese restaurant is now? That was their dance pavilion. After the park more or less closed, it was the National Park skating rink. Now, I spent a lot of time down there roller skating, too. And, let's see, I moved in '52.

Q: Well, you were older than 10 or 12 at that time?

A: Oh, yeah.

Q: To go skating?

A: Yes. No, not necessarily.

Q: Were you going out to Roger's Field when you were 10 or 12?

A: Yeah, yeah.

Q: How did you get there?

A: Walk!

Q: Through the Workhouse?

A: Oh, we could walk through the Workhouse or go up Power's Run. Go up Power's Run Road and walk out there. I mean, it was nothing for us to walk that far on a Sunday, in fact, quite a few times, we would walk what we called the circle. The Sixteenth Street bridge was down Sharpsburg. It was called the Sixteenth Street Bridge. We would walk down to it. That was before they had the Highland Park Bridge in. We could walk down to the Sixteenth Street Bridge, cross there, come up on the other side and cross the Hulton Bridge. I think it was about, all together was about a 16 mile trip. But, we'd do that a lot of times on a Sunday. In fact, I remember one time Dale Roberts wanted to come with us (laughing). He insisted on coming with us. We ended up carrying him on our backs- horsy back ride, from about Hulton Bridge on down. He couldn't walk no more. I mean, he was younger than us, but he insisted on coming along. Now, this is with Andy Dolhi, George Dolhi, Jack Sharf, Johnny Bataglia, let's see, who else. I mean, George could probably verify all this for you, too. But, it was nothing for, I mean we'd do that maybe a couple times during the summer.

I remember, too, I think we was older than 12, but they used to have streetcar passes on Sundays. And, you paid a quarter for a pass and you could ride all day Sunday. And, so we'd go down Pittsburgh, and we'd get on a streetcar not knowing where the heck we were, we didn't care which streetcar it was. We'd get on a streetcar and maybe go out to Belleview or Kennywood. I mean, we didn't know where the heck we was going because the streetcar had to come back anyhow. See, and I remember the one time we went in the Grant Building, to go up to the KDKA studios. There wasn't too many radio stations at the time. And, we went in there, and the elevator operator, I don't know how many there was, probably about 8 or 10 of us, anyhow the elevator operator, he didn't want to take us up, and that, but we ended up getting on top of the Grant Building there, you know. But, that was the tallest building in Pittsburgh at our time. But that's where KDKA broadcast from. But, I remember we went down there. But, that was another thing we used to do on a Sunday, like I said, buy these passes and just get on a streetcar. Like I said, we didn't know where we was going because gonna come back, but we'd go someplace different.

Q: Did you go to **indoor theaters**? Where?

A: Well, there was a theater up in Blawnox. It was called the Maryland theater. You know where it was it?

OK. It was right up beside Pianos and Stuff. On this side. It was Mr. Merty's apartment. He bought the theater later on and made apartments out of it. But, it was called the Maryland Theater. And George Dominick and his sister, they worked there. Jimmy Ragerri worked there. He was an usher or something. George Dominick's sister was a ticket seller.

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Q: How young were you when you remember going there?

A: I guess, like I said, 12 and that.

Well, you see the first theater, basically, in Blawnox, was, the prison had one. And, my mother, and all the people of her age, on a Saturday, they could go, now this is when there was no theaters around, they were allowed to go into the prison. And, they was like up in the balcony. And the prisoners were down in the gallery part like, but that's how they got to see their first movies. Up at the prison, up here.

But, then, I delivered papers for Joe Sheridan. He had the paper franchise in Blawnox. In other words, we didn't have individual routes; Joe Sheridan had all the franchises. If you carried papers you carried them for Ray Sheridan and Joe Sheridan, the Sheidan family. And, they also had the book store. In fact, the last one they had was right on top of Blaw Avenue, that brick building right across at the red light there. Now, I worked for them and at that time their paper shop was up there where Arlotti's Cleaners is now. They was like old wooden buildings. They more or less remodeled them after I came out of the Service. They had that more or less remodeled. But, that was where the paper store was then. And, in fact, where the Sportsman's Club is, that was originally built by Jerry Ferone. And, it was Winchel's. Winchel Hardware Store is what it originally was. And then, right beside that was Bataglia's grocery store. And then my Uncle Ches, he was the Justice of the Peace in Blawnox for, well, he was more or less a cripple. And, he was Justice of the Peace in Blawnox for oh, I would say almost 20 years. And, he had his offices at different places. He had, where the Christian Alliance Church was, do you know where that's at? OK, well, years ago that was his JP office. And, he also had a pool hall in there. And then later on he moved up, just about where...

...over to the bus stop at Blaw Avenue. That brick building there. It's a barber shop now. But, then there was another building, it's torn down now, but it was probably about 2 or 3 lots over. It was more or less across the street from what was the A&P. You don't remember the A&P in Blawnox? Well, that was the big store right on the corner going down the Blaw Avenue there. That black brick building.

Q: On the west side?

A: Yeah. There's a Chinese restaurant in there now. Yeah, that was the A&P store. And then we had a P.H. Butler store across Blaw Avenue, up 1, 2, 3, probably about where Hugo's, do you know where Hugo's is in Blawnox? OK, it was about 4 or 5 doors up from the red light, but on this side, on the eastern side of Blaw Avenue. We had P.H. Butler, in town, and we had the A&P, in town. Well, of course all your small towns would, like for example, when I opened my store in 1952, there was nine **{grocery} stores in Blawnox** at the time. I was the ninth store. But, you had a Sure, and you had Witas, Jimmy Rigarri's, and right beside him was Bill Peteri. He had the little Clover Farm store there. In fact there was a Clover Farm store that was there for quite a while, that was Tanudi's Clover Farm store. And like I said, there was nine stores in town. Well, then they had Kapella's {Kopala} right beside me. You probably remember that? Then, up on Center Avenue there was a, where Thompson's park their truck now, there was a store there called Tony's. But, like I said there was nine stores in Blawnox at that time. But, when I was younger, I mean, your little corner store was the place of business. I mean, every small town had many stores.

Q: Did your family have a **vegetable garden**?

A: My family? We had a small one in our yard there on Second Street. It wasn't too much of one. But, we had some. See, right down at the end of the street, do you remember John Whiteman? OK, there was my place and then was Diggetts'. Right beyond that was, where Royston's is now, there was two brothers and a sister. Their name was Whiteman. Margaret Whiteman, John Whiteman and Bob Whiteman. And, John, every year had this real big garden. Do you remember a house being there on Second Street with a big yard? OK, well that was Whiteman's garden. {I remember his whole yard was garden.} That's right. And then he also had one across the street, between Skanderson's, which was the last house, and possibly Dick Sole's house. I'm trying to say names of people you could know. So he also had a big, big garden in there. So consequently we had a little garden, but almost anything we wanted as fresh, why see John, John sold that, his vegetables and that. Years ago. And then we used to have a huckster, that lived out in the stone quarry that he'd come down with a horse and buggy and he sold fresh fruits and vegetables.

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Q: Now, when you talk about the **stone quarry**, there were a couple of places that I heard referred to as the Stone Quarry when I was growing up (on Montrose Hill in the 1960s). Now, where were you talking about? Was it in the Workhouse property?

A: Yes. See, they quarried the stone for the Workhouse from this quarry.

Q: Now, where was it nearest to, Oakhill Manor, Blawnox or Montrose?

A: It would be if you go straight up Center Avenue. And, up beyond where the school was. Then you go out another almost length of Center Avenue beyond that, through Workhouse farm.

Q: And that would put you right about in the middle.

A: Yeah. But, in reality, I guess you're walking east because, you know where Crown Meadows is in Powers Run, don't you? Well, you know where the orchards were? Well, that's right, it was right near the orchards, right.

Q: Now, towards Montrose or the other way?

A: I think the orchards were more towards Mon'rose Hill. I'm trying to recall that. OK, so the stone quarry was more towards Mon'rose. But, like you said, towards the orchard.

Q: Where did your mother take you if you needed to see a **doctor**?

A: Well, there for a long time the doctors were from Aspinwall. Their names were Fosters. There were 2 or 3 of them.

Q: This was when you were a kid- 12 or 14 or so?

A: No, was younger than that, like maybe when I was (just) about born. The Fosters were the doctors that would come up here. And then there was a Dr. Donley.

See, I was a premature baby and, in fact, the Fosters had give me up for dead. They said, "Mrs. Sproul, you might as well forget about him. He's practically anemic and I think I only weighed about a pound and a half or something like that whenever I was born. And, so Dr. Donley was just a young doctor at the time. I think he was over St. Margaret's. Anyhow, he asked my mother if he could take the case. My mother said, why not. I mean, what can you lose?. So, they put me in an incubator, and give me blood transfusions off and on for I don't know how long. And, well, here I am (laughs)! In fact, when I came home from the Service, I got a job over at National Biscuit. And, so I had to take a physical and so the doctor said get on the scale. I think at that time I weighed about 143 pound. And, he said to me, "Well, you know, you've gained quite a few ponds since the first time I seen you". And here it was Dr. Donley (laughs). He was the company doctor.

Q: Who was your **dentist**?

A: Well, Blawnox had a dentist. Do you know where the Wine Cellar is? Well see, where the Wine Cellar now is, there used to be two **bowling alleys** down there. In fact, I was house man there when I was delivering papers. This was when I was in high school.

Q: Well, how big was it, how many lanes?

A: Two. Just two lanes. And, a guy named Adam, Adam, what (was) his last name? Jewish guy. Anyhow, he owned the building. He owned the lanes, and you had to go down stairs to them. (Do) you remember like, going down stairs to the Wine Cellar? OK, well, where the Wine Cellar was down stairs, there was 2 bowling lanes down there. And, in fact, when I was house man there, it was called St. Edward's Lyceum and we and different church leagues down there to bowl. We had some real good bowlers. We used to bowl just strictly duck pins. And, I bowled a 202. Well, what it was, it was 2 lines for a quarter. So the 3 low bowlers would pay for the 3 high bowlers. And, I paid because I had a 202 and I was the lowest of the 6 bowlers. I mean, we had some real good

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(bowlers). Trundy, do you know Trundy? Well, he lived in the back of... Rudy Malek and all... I mean, these guys could bowl! I mean, like I said, we was pretty good bowlers. I can't remember George and Andy (Dolhi) bowling too often. But, like I said, it was known as St. Edward's Lyceum. And then, I guess, when Shane bought the place, why he tore the alleys out. Anyhow, what made me get to there, in that building was a dentist. His name was Dentist Greene. I don't know what his first name was, but it was Greene. I think it was G-R-E-E-N-E. I'm not a hundred percent sure of that, but his name was Greene.

And then the first doctor we had like I can really remember, was Dr. Magee. Have you heard of Dr. Magee? OK, well, he had his office there on North Avenue. And then that house that set's right on the corner, of Freeport Road and was his house. That's where he lived. His son is a pretty big doctor out in Chicago now.

Anyhow, then later on, probably in about the early 50s, where the lot where the bank parking lot is, on the east side there was a house there and, oh jeez, I had that doctor's name on the tip of my tongue, Travis, Dr. Travis!

Q: And, this was at Center and Freeport on the hill side of it?

A: Uh, you had this old hotel, this Honeymoon Hotel and then, his house was the next one. In other words it would have been where you drive into the bank. Not on the Center Avenue side, on the eastern side of the bank. Where you enter the bank. Well, there was a house there. And that was Dr. Travis.

Q: What **chores** do you remember doing?

A: Me? I chopped wood, hopped freights, kicked off coal, picked the coal home, because all we had was a wood burner. We didn't have gas because we couldn't afford it. So, when I'd go swimming, why I'd bring in logs and let them dry out. After they dried out, why I'd take them up in the yard and chop them. And, well, Andy and George there, we'd hop freights, at that time your freight were slow, and if it was coal, why, we'd jump on it and kick coal off going up to Mon'rose. Well, our brothers and mothers and relatives would come along and they'd pick up the coal in sacks and that's how we kept the house warm.

Q: Did you receive an **allowance**?

A: (Laughs.) Nothing from nothing leaves nothing (laughs). No.

Q: Did you do anything in Blawnox to **earn extra money**?

A: Well, like I said, I ran a paper route. In fact Joe Sheridan, after school I'd pick papers and I'd take them along Walnut Street and, I'd meet him where the Bi-Lo Station is now. But there was nothing there, I mean, at that time. At the bottom of Mon'rose Hill. And then he'd pick me up and we'd go up to Power's Run, clear out to, well, past where the airport was then. I don't know what the heck... Federkeil's, do you by chance to know Federkeil's, out there? OK, well, it was out there. It's out there, the street that goes to the Fox Chapel School. It was out maybe, another mile beyond that. And, at that time, who owned the store up on that Power's Run? Up on Power's Run there. I know his name well enough. I can't come up with it right off the bat. We had a kid there, he would get papers from us and he'd take them out through Crown Meadows. Well then Joe and I, we'd peel off and go down River Road and get all the apartments and all that along there. Then later on, I was their bad debt collector. In other words, if you owed papers for more than 2 weeks, it was up to me to go out and collect it. So, as I was collecting paper, I was going to tell you this about the theater, in my papers I would take out these Maryland Theater flyers, you know, coming attractions and that, and for that, I got a free ticket. Which was worth a dime. So, that's how at least I got to the show at least once a week because I got my free ticket.

Q: Did you have an **after school or Summer job**?

A: When I was in high school I was taking care of the bowling. Now, Andy and George and his gang all caddied at the Field Club. I'll tell you, I never caddied at the Field Club but I knew more about the Field Club, I mean, they'd sit and that's all I'd hear every night. I knew everybody that golfed at the Field Club. What it was, see, we had a shack. Now, this was like in ninth grade and in there. We built a shack in, you know where George Dolhi lived, along the railroad track on Fourth Street? OK, exactly across the tracks there, we had dug a hole, I'd say, probably about 8 foot deep, probably about 8 by 8 by 8 by 8. And, then we covered it, with weeds and all that and then with,

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first we put metal over it and then we put dirt over it. And then we had like a big iron thing that we used to use as a cover to keep the kids out. But that was our shack. And, we loafed up there real good. Every night. And, all these other guys were caddying, but Donald Shawfield, who lived right across the street from me, him and I would huckster. We had a guy and we'd go up to New Kensington and Creighton and all that area and we would huckster. We got paid so much. Like, if we sold a bushel of peaches we'd get paid so much and then Donald and I used to go over to the islands and there used to be elderberries over there. I mean, knee deep, I mean, berries by the billions. And we'd go over there, oh, maybe about 5 in the morning and we'd take orders (laughs). And we'd hulk these elderberries and sell them for a nickel a quart. I mean, not just the elderberries in the bush. In other words all you got was the elderberry. And then we'd sell them for a nickel a quart. That's how we made some living there. And then, Donald and I, we was in like, picking scrap iron and that. Quite a bit. We'd go down to Roys(ton) where they made these vaults. And we'd get some, because they had some iron railings and that where they'd encase these vaults. And we'd clean them up. So, we did a lot of junkin', too. Then, after that, like I say, I had this paper route and then I was house man in the bowling alley. I took care of the paper store at nights, too.

Now, in my senior year in high school, now this could be done at that time, I got off at one o'clock and I worked at the Blaw from 3 'til 11. George and I and quite a few of our gang, Andy, George and all of them. Now in my summer vacation between my junior and senior year, we worked up the Blaw-Know Company for that 3 months. At that time, during the War, I mean, they wasn't worrying too much about age. So, we worked our summer vacation. I would say that would be the '41 to '42 vacation, because, then as a senior in '43, got off at one o'clock and I worked from 3 'til 11, when I was a senior in high school. And then from there, why, I went to the Service and I did all kind of work there.

Q: Where did you go to **elementary school**?

A: I started up in Blawnox, at that time. Let's see, who was the first grade teacher at the time? Miss Wards, yeah, was the first grade teacher. And then, when I went into second grade, why, my mother pulled me out and sent me down to St. Scolastica. So, I went down there and finished 8 grades down there. And then from there I went up to Blawnox and, they only had 9 and 10 up there, and then I had to go back to Aspinwall, high school and finished eleventh and twelfth down there. So, then I graduated in 1943.

Q: What do you most remember about **Blawnox School**?

A: Blawnox School? Oh, that we had to climb, they tried to force us to go up and down them steps. I forget how many steps there were, something like 88 or 108 steps, but all us kids on Center Avenue, we'd go straight up Center Avenue, you know. And, every once in a while, why, some eager beaver teacher would decide to write us up for it. Coming down the steps was no problem because we used to jump three or four at a time, but going up, that was a long trudge. But, like I said, we were supposed to go up the steps and then you see, we came home for dinner and had to go back, you know. You'd come home about eleven-thirty or quarter to twelve and then you was going back, trudging up there about twelve-thirty or quarter to one. And then you come back down again at 4 o'clock. You got your exercise just going to school and back. Oh, yeah (laughs).

Q: Do you remember any of your **teachers, principals** (at Blawnox)?

A: I remember Mr. Barnhart, he was my home room teacher, and he was my Algebra teacher. And, later on he became principal after a while. Mr. McCord was the principal when I went to school there. And then, I had Mr. Terley for Biology.

(Pause- brief interruption)

OK, then I had Miss Patterson, she was my English teacher. Let's see, Sharpnak, he was my Mechanical Drawing and Wood Shop teacher. He was a little flaky. He used to wear a hair net in his hair and that kind of stuff! But, I got in a big fight up there. We was in what was Mechanical Drawing, yeah, we had Mechanical Drawing at first, first so many weeks and then the next three weeks you had shop. Three weeks Mechanical Drawing and three weeks shop. Well, anyhow, I was a native of Blawnox, but we had some guys up here thought they was real tough. Anyhow this Trendy and Steve Utis were going around the shop wanting a nickel for protection. So, we had like, two students at a desk. Marion Young, now that's a boy, he was my desk buddy there. So, he says, "You better have a nickel". I says, for what? He says, "Trundy and them will want a nickel for protection". I said, well, I'm not going to give them a nickel for two reasons, item number one, I don't have one, item number 2, no body pulls that

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kind of stuff on me. He says, "Boy, you better settle down". I said, hey, I was born and raised in this town, I know my way around. So, just about that time old Steve Utis come up and he was just about to put the shellac brush in my face. No, Trindy was, Trindy was about to put the shellac brush in my face, if I didn't give him a nickel. And, so I looked over my shoulder and Steve Utis is behind me and I hauled off and kicked like a mule and got him in the knee cap and I went and brushed Trindy all over the shop. So, this old Sharpnak guy, he was as flaky as a snow flake in a wind storm. But, anyhow he's yelling, "Get him, get him, get him (in a high pitched voice)", (laughs), so, George Dolhi and Bob Whartonby and all them, they all grabbed me and he said, "Take him up to the office, take him up to the office (in a high pitched voice, laughing). So, they took me up to the office and like I said, McCord was the principal at the time, see. So, they left me in the office and he wanted to know what had happened. Well, old Sharpnak started to tell him, "He started a fight (in a high pitched voice)". So he says, "Well, you stay here", and he says, "we'll, deal with you". So, later on he asks me what was the deal in the fight, you know, and I told him that they had a nickel protection gig going on there and I said I didn't, for 2 reasons, I didn't have a nickel and second of all, I wouldn't have given him a nickel if I did have one. So, he asked me who it was. I told him it was Steve Utis and Trindy. And he says, "You took on Steve Utis and Trindy?" I says, yeah, no problem. I says, "I'll tell you what", he says, "you're supposed to get 10 swats, so when you get down to the room, you pretend you're crying and you got your 10 swats". He says, "But, I want to shake your hand", he says, "I've been waiting for someone to take one of them on anyhow". So, I got out of that pretty good.

But, let's see I'm trying to think of some of the other teacher's names. I know Turley, I had for Biology. And, well, I got in trouble with him right away, too (laughs). What it was, we had home work, you know. And he was asking us, each student, what our answer was to such and such a thing. So, anyhow, he asked me what mine was and I told him, and he said, "Louder". So, I repeated it louder. He says, "Louder". So, I screamed it out, I really hollered it out, and he come down, he says, "You're a wise young man, aren't you (craggy voice)?" So, he starts telling me about how he, we had two pretty big football players came from Blawnox, Ernie Banelli, he played for Pitt, and Joe Shadonik, he played for, well, I think Ernie Banelli he went to the Rose Bowl when Pitt did and Joe Shadonik went to, I think it was the Sugar Bowl for Duquesne. But, anyhow, he says, "I took care of Ronnie Banelli and I took care of Joe Shadonik and", he says, "I don't think I'll have any problems with you". Well, in the meantime, oh, I had to stay in after class, that's what it was. So, he's giving me all these here things what he did to these guys and that, and I said to him, Mr. Turley, I said, one more step and I'll bend this Geography book right over your head. And, he backed off and we became real good friends. In fact, I made solid "A"s in Biology from there on in (laughing). I mean, I did a lot of work in it, but we got along pretty good after that. And, like I said, I was up there for 2 years, and then we went to Aspinwall.

Q: What do you most remember about **St. Scolastica's**?

A: Saint Sco's. Well, let's see.

Anytime you talk about a Catholic school, you think of punishment, man! I mean (laughing), they talk about cruelty. I'll tell you what, if them nuns had pulled today what they pulled in school years ago, they'd have them all in court (laughing). Well, what it was, they were trying to make an altar boy out of me, and my mother, I mean, she was pro-Catholic, I mean, and I wasn't about to go to Aspinwall to get up early to go to Mass and all this and that, plus I didn't feel like being an altar boy. And, so it ended up I was a choir boy (laughing), they made me a choir boy. I don't know whether I could sing or not but, they made me a choir boy anyhow.

Q: How did you **get to your elementary school**?

A: Well, at that time the train, it cost, I think it was ten cents on a train. I lived on Second Street at that time, right across from where your grandpap and grandmother lived {140 First Street}.

Q: Well, did the **train stop in Blawnox**?

A: Yes, oh, yeah. Well, at that time it was a local, I mean they stopped at Blawnox and Aspinwall.

Q: Where exactly did they stop to pick you up?

A: Oh, there was a **station** there **in Blawnox**!

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Q: Near Center Avenue?

A: Oh, yes. OK, coming down Center Avenue, you hang a left. And, that's all railroad property there. And, do you know where Verolli's is now? OK, well it's a repair shop. But, all that property there was a station. In fact, in the book, did you get to see the book on the 50 years of Blawnox? OK, there's a picture of the train station in there. And the station master was Mr. Schrum. But, they used to stop, drop of the mail, like if I would come in on the 4:30 train, I mean, they had them big carts, you know, those big heavy steel wheels on, and they sort of had a wooden platform where they could push it over across the tracks to get the mail. In fact, that's how Sasnowski's, see they were the ones that picked up the mail and took it up to the Post Office. See, Blawnox had a **Post Office** many, many years ago. In fact the post Office was where they have a bunch of antique shops in there. It's right beside Isabella's. It still says "US Post Office" on it. That was the only post office around here, more or less. And, see, well, prior to that, that used to be a **playground**. That sat way down in there. When they built the Post Office there they more or less built it up a little bit, but that originally was a playground. Blaw-Knox Company had a playground in there. And then at Christmas time they had this big telegraph pole in the middle of the playground there and they would stick **Christmas trees** in there and they had a huge, it was as tall as a telegraph pole. And, they had Santa Claus there and they'd give you a quarter pound box of candy. I mean, it was good candy at that time. But, you could go to see Santa Claus there and they had this big, huge Christmas tree that the Blaw-Knox Company would more or less, you know, they would back up the festivities there.

Q: Well, let's go back to this train. You got on the train...

A: In Blawnox.

Q: And you got off... where was the **station in Aspinwall**?

A: It's still there. At Brilliant Avenue. I mean, the train, basically would go up and after it deposited the passengers in Aspinwall, then it would go across the railroad bridge into E's' liberty. Can you visualize the railroad bridge in Aspinwall? It's still there. It's not been used, I don't think, but the bridge itself is still there. And then the station was like between the upper story and the bottom part of the, you know.

Q: Oh, so they left you off up top like?

A: Yes, uh-huh.

Q: And you had to come down the stairs?

A: Yeah, come down the steps, yeah.

Q: The station must have been under the trestle.

A: Yeah it was under the (trestle), right. Do you remember where the, like on Brilliant Avenue where people used to wait for the bus? Can you visualize that?

Q: There was a streetcar island there, wasn't there?

A: Well, that's in the Loop. Like, one street behind there. That was called the Loop, where the Loop Lounge is.

In other words, you crossed the street, and you waited for the bus there, and then the Loop was created by, your Pittsburgh Railway would come in from Sharpsburg. The 94 was called Sharpsburg. I don't think they used the word Aspinwall. Anyhow, that would come in and go around that loop, and then coming through Blawnox from New Kensington and that was the West Penn. The West Penn line came through Blawnox and down the old road and it would come in and it would make a loop. And that's where you would exchange your transfer. Uh, there wasn't a transfer, it was two different companies back then. But, in other words, if you was going to Pittsburgh say from Cheswick or Springdale, you'd take the West Penn into Aspinwall there at the Loop. And then you would get the 94 Sharpsburg and then you'd go into Pittsburgh from there. And, in fact there was a Loop Restaurant and you had the Loop Lounge there, but that's where the streetcars would loop around. In other words, like the Pittsburgh

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street car would turn in Brilliant Avenue and make that quick left into the Loop and then the West Penn would come up and make their turn into Brilliant Avenue and when it came out the next street, where the bowling alleys were, remember the bowling alleys there? OK, where the bowling alleys were. Then the West Penn would hang a left and come up towards Blawnox and the 94, the Pittsburgh Railways, would make a right and go into Sharpsburg and so on, into Pittsburgh.

Q: So, you'd get off the train there and then you'd have to walk four blocks or to St. Scolastica's?

A: Right. And then see, if I bought the round trip ticket or something, invariably, if I were standing there and waiting for the train to come, and a slow freight would come, I'd hop the slow freight and come into Blawnox. I mean at that time, the freights never did go that fast and I knew how to jump. All of the kids from Blawnox knew how. All of us kids knew how to jump off a train. You jump off a train, you don't jump off straight, you jump off in a running fashion. But, sometimes if it was real nice weather, I'd walk home, you know, and stop off at Ross Crik down there and play around down there or something like that or see who was fishing and I'd walk home a lot of times. Anything to save a nickel.

Q: Do you remember your **teachers at St. Scolastica's**?

A: At St. Sco's? Well, let's see. I had Sister Agneta in the eighth grade. She was the principal. She used to pounce on me like I was her pet stomping bird. And I had Sister Claire, I think she might have been my second or third grade nun. And, I had Sister Lucille, I think she might have been the sixth or seventh grade teacher. She was pretty tough. That's about all I can remember right off hand.

Q: Were they **good teachers**?

A: Oh, yeah. Oh, yeah. You learned in the Catholic school. That's one thing. I don't care what they say, the reason you learned better in the Catholic school was these nuns don't have nothing else to do at night but prepare lessons. Whereas these public school teachers, they can go out carousing around, bar hopping and everything else and come the next morning they're no more prepared that what the students are. But, the nuns, boy. I mean, invariably they would check your test, I mean, very seldom did you ever pass out papers in a Catholic School to check. Those nuns would take them papers over to the Convent that night. You got your paper back and one thing I like about the Catholic school, too, more than the public school was, you got a number. In other words, you didn't get "A", "B", "C", or "D", you got like a, let's say a 100 to 90, and then from 89 to 80 was say, a "B" or something like that. I mean, you could take all your grades and add them up and average them out and, I mean, on the report card would have the number and you could come out with the number. And, it wasn't where some people get a strong "A" and other people get a weak "A", but in the meantime, they got an "A", you know. It had a wide range, where as in the Catholic school you got an actual number. If you had a test of, let's say, 50 questions, each one was worth 2, I mean somebody had 6 wrong did better than somebody that had 8 wrong. So, I mean, although its close, it's still a different percent. And, I always liked that better than the regular "A", "B", "C" and "A+", "A-", "B+", "B-", you know, all that kind of stuff. I mean, you could actually figure out your own grade. You see, now like, for example in Catholic school, they didn't teach fractions. You worked with decimals.

Q: I want you to imagine yourself in your house, at 10 years. It is a warm **Summer afternoon**. There is a nice breeze blowing. Were you on Second Street then?

A: Yes.

Q: What are you doing?

A: Well, see, we were pretty poor. So, consequently, I could be chopping wood. Or going along the tracks picking up some coal because, see we cooked with coal and wood all year round, we didn't have no gas. At that time, my mother couldn't afford gas.

Q: So, you probably wouldn't be in the house in the summer?

A: No, the chances are, when I was about 10? I possibly was doing a lot of swimming, too. Because, I swam a lot.

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Q: If I were to ask you to **walk out of your house**, which door would you be most likely to use?

A: Well, it all depends on what I was going to do. If I was going to go over to Donald Shawfield's, I have to go out the front way. Or, Updegraf's, which lived right across the street from me. And then, you see my grandmother on my father's side, lived right next door to us. That was the house, do you remember Diggitts'? And Greene's? OK, that was my grandmother's house. Well, then, my uncle Herb... then there was Gert Sproul and Bibby Greene. Well then, Gert married Glen Diggitts and Bibby married Ken Greene. They both lived in that house for many, many years. And, finally, Greene's bought a house up on the end of Sixth Street. Then they moved out and Diggitts more or less had the whole house to himself.

So, if I went out the back, invariably I was going down to the river. I mean, that was the only place to go to. Now like in the evenings, like where your grandparents was {140 First Street}, Roaches lived in there.

(end of tape side).

Joe Harris, he lived in the house that I bought {140 First Street}. Then you had Ralphy Peterson lived down the end of the street {First}. We would invariably play softball out on First Street there.

Then, did you know that Blawnox was one of the first and probably the only small towns that had their own filtration system? For waste? OK, so anyhow And I'll tell you what buddy, when the weather was heavy, phew!!! So was your breathing (laughs). 'Specially in the heavy rain or something like that. I mean, that odor would hang down there, I mean, it would gag a maggot.

But, I mean, in general it was real good down there. I mean, The Bottoms was always nice. I mean, you had the people up Top would say, "Oh, the Bottoms, you live down the Bottoms", like we were a bunch of slums or something like that. But, you know what I always tell them? Without a Bottom you can't have a Top.

Q: Was the **neighborhood noisy**? What **kind of sounds** do you hear?

A: Was it noisy? No. I'd say no.

You'd hear a train going through. Train whistles. Well, at that time it was the steam engine. And then, like I said, and then the steam boats. I mean, we could hear their whistles and that when they was coming up, oh let's say, maybe as far down as Ross Crik. And that's where we'd run down and get our boats and go out and catch the waves off the paddle wheel. And then invariably like if they was going up river we'd catch that, we'd hook onto a barge, maybe go up to Hulton Bridge, or something like that, just before the dam. Then we'd unhook and then we'd just, more or less would drift down the river for something to do for the rest of the day. Stop off at the island and swim. We had a swing rope over there, you know, Tarzan rope where you'd swing out and fly in the river and then we just, like I says, you could just drift down the river. We'd do that and we'd always chase the, the LaBelle was the one that had the best wave. It invariably had what they called a white cap. That's a wave, probably about 2 or 3 waves behind the paddle wheel where your back waves and your new waves come together a create like a big, big wave. Like it always created a white cap, that's why we called it a white cap. And that was the wave you always wanted to catch, the white cap.

And, we did have a guy from Blawnox that got to close to the paddle wheel and the paddle wheel smacked him and he was not a complete cripple but he walked with a stiff leg and that. I can't think of his family name. We called him 'pinsky', but I can't think of his family name at the time but, he got hurt from being hit by the paddle, he got the boat too close to the paddle wheel, the paddle wheel just hit the boat and threw it in the air and that.

But you see, Blawnox down here, at the end of Center Avenue, we had what they called **Popeye Beach**. And hey, on a Sunday you'd have anywhere from fifty to a hundred people down there. Swimming. And, then over in Sandy Crik, do you know where Sandy Crik is? OK, Sandy Crik, I'd say on a Sunday, you'd have as many as 500 people swimming there. But, it lost its popularity because, see they had dredged that side. So, you could be walking out and next thing you know, you had about a 30 foot drop there. So, consequently, a couple of people would drowned every year. And they was always what we called "hillbillies". People come down from the hills, like Penn Hills and these various other places. Kids didn't respect the river, they probably thought that was in some swimming pool and drowned, you know. And, over the element of time, it lost its popularity. But, it was never what we called a "river rat", any of us that lived along the river (that) would ever drown. It was always these here people that, you know, came down from the hills or didn't live along the river, or something like that. A couple times they had about 3 or 4 drownings over there in one year, in one summer, like. Well, after that it lost its popularity. In fact, there was a place over there called The Anchorage. Did you ever hear of The Anchorage? OK, it was more or less a night club. It was over there, but later on it more or less lost out, too, I think. At one time, I mean, that was a very, very popular place. Like, what people talk now, "Ah, I wouldn't swim in that river. It's

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filthy, and that", I'll tell you what, you can ask George {Dolhi}, every one of us could swim breast stroke. You know why? Because, that's how you cleaned the turds and everything in front of you to swim (laughs). You swam breast stroke. In other words, the breast stroke, more or less, you was sweeping you way, a path through it, you know. Then you had your mines up there that (released) a lot of acid. It wasn't unusual, once or twice a summer, why, you go down the river and you see hundreds and hundreds and hundreds and of dead fish. Maybe from the acid from the Harmarville mine. Which you don't have anything like that now. And like the people, "Oh, the river's filthy". Now, I'll tell you one thing. It is filthy to a certain extent. Now, if you go swimming, you end up with a grease job on you from all the, you know, the gas residue on top of the water and the oil residue from the motor boats and that.

Was you ever down along the Wall? Below the Workhouse Pumping Station, there? At the sewer? Well, I'll tell you what, when the Workhouse used to dump and you should see what used to come out of there. I mean, you could always catch carp there. Because there was always, like, corn, everything else. I mean, this was when all your industry was dumping into the river. So, consequently they really had a lot of filth in the river. And, you don't have as much filth now, but, like I said, you will come out greasy. From all the residue from the motor boats and all that.

Yeah, we spent a lot of time swimming.

Q: If you were to get thirsty, what would you **most likely drink**?

A: H₂O, (laughs).

See, over here right beside where I'm at, do you remember **Sophie's store**? The one that was right on the railroad track, like? OK, well every once in a while you might run over there and get a bottle of pop. Now, I remember, my mother and my brother and I, we would make Hires root beer. That was the big thing for us. Hires root beer. If we was going to have any pop, but like I said, if you got thirsty, it was run in the house and get a glass of water. That's it.

Q: Do you remember any special activities in Blawnox on the **Fourth of July**?

A: The 4th of July? Well, I mean, we all shot our own fireworks.

Yeah, I do remember one real big one. All these Fourth of July fireworks that I've seen, and I've never seen anything to compare, uh, what's that across the river there? Oh, that golf course up over the hill? Longvue. Longvue. This was in the Roosevelt era. They put out fireworks that had the face of Roosevelt. They put another one out that maybe (was) the United States flag. And, I've never seen anything to compare with that. I mean, I just never seen anything to compare with it. And, that's where we used to see our fireworks. We'd sit down all go down along the river, because Longvue would set off their fireworks. Blawnox itself, we didn't have no fireworks. But, like I said, all the kids at that time, we used to make carbide cannons. You know what a carbide cannon is? It was shaped like a cannon, it was usually made out of steel. Well, what it was, you had coal miners in Blawnox and they used carbide to put in their helmets, that was their light at that time. In the mines. Do you ever remember seeing their hats that had that thing? They would put carbide in there. And then, you more or less wet a little bit, and light it. That would create a flame. So, what we would do is make these carbide cannons, and you would put this carbide down in the, jam it down in the cannon, like with a rod and set it off. Of course, the more you made, the bigger the boom (laughs).

See, at that time, maybe about 2 or 3 hundred feet down from Center Avenue, the railroad had a supply cabin there, like. They would keep some of their supplies in there. Well, they would put in there signal caps. See, a lot of times, what it was, like an engineer, if he wanted the next engine there to slow down, he'd put a certain type carbide cap, strap it to the railroad. Well, when the train would run over it, it would explode. Well, then that other engineer, he knew what signal that was, whether he was to speed up or slow down or even stop. In fact, your light across here at Center Avenue, if the light were straight up and down, that means you could pour through. If your three lights going across, that meant that you had to practically come to a stop. And then if your light was on a diagonal, on a right hand diagonal, that meant that something, and on the left hand diagonal, that meant something. It was set up on a three light system. Like I said, if your top light, your center light and your bottom light were all straight that means he could pour through. There was nothing in his way. But if the lights were across, that meant that he had to slow down or even stop. I mean, we didn't know the signals exactly, but we knew what it was about to do.

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Anyhow, we would raid their sheds and get these dynamite caps was what we called them, and then we'd take a sledge hammer and see who could hit it and not have their hand recoil, you know, see who could resist it the most. Ah, it was fun. But, if you do it now they would put you in jail. Yeah, it's a wonder you didn't blow your hand off. Well, we had big sledge hammer, I mean, nobody ever got hurt from it. The same with firecrackers. I mean, I can't remember anybody down here ever being hurt with firecrackers. And then you had your M-80s and that and all your different, well skyrockets were always seemed to be, I liked them the best. The skyrockets were, they're like the bottle rockets now, except they (were like) Roman Candles, more or less. They was fun, too. We'd set a lot of them off in the back of the yard where your grandparents (lived) {140 First Street}.

That was a pretty popular place. In fact, see when I lived on Second Street there, everybody on the other side of Second Street, if they was going down to the river, they came through our yard, to go to the river. I mean, I think our yard was used as much as Center Avenue as a short cut to go down to the river. In fact, one time they had a jail break. The prisoner was being picked up in a motor boat. And they came through the yards and next thing you know, the guards and their hounds, they came through the yard. Like I said, it was a regular alley way. More people, I think, went through there than the two street ends.

Q: What is the first scene that pops into your head when I ask you about your **high school**?

A:but when I went to Aspinwall, well Teabough, he was principal down there and as a Senior you needed 16 credits to pass. So the senior (year), I had 14 and a half credits. Fourteen and three-quarters credits or something like that. So, I signed up for English and Gym (laughingly). I needed my other quarter credit in Gym and I needed one more credit, so I signed up for English and Gym. So that lasted about, maybe about two weeks or something (laughing). Teabough sees me one day and he says, "You're Sproul, aren't you?". I says, yeah. He says, "You know, you didn't fill out your schedule." Oh, yeah, I filled it out. He said, "No, you didn't." He hauls me in to the office. He say's, "You signed up for English and Gym". I said, I know. All I need a credit and a quarter. Well, he took that like a, he jumped on me (laughs). So, in the meantime he makes me take Algebra, Algebra II, and another course in History and Geography and some kind of science. And then I needed an elective. So, he says, "How about typing?" So, I go down typing class. Well, this was during war time. And teachers are starting to get a little scarce at the time. So, they had this one old teacher. She was OLD. We called her foggy Boyd because she wore, at that time to wear colored glasses, you know, was an oddity. And she had her leg all wrapped up. We used to say she was running at Santa Anita (laughs). But, invariably, like when you changed classes why, everyone that was downstairs had the next class upstairs and vice versa. And she'd be changing classes, she'd get caught in one of them stair wells like, you know (laughs). She looked like a revolving door. People pushing her around and everything. She had a cane and everything, too. So, I come walking in and she says, "What do you want, young man?" I says, well, I'm supposed to see if there's any opening in typing. Ah, she grabs me on the shoulder. She says, "You're a mighty strong young man", she said, "now, what you'll do, you'll escort me up and down the stairs between classes". And I thought- Oh, Yeah! I never was a Boy Scout and I'm not going to try to start being one now (laughs). So, I went back up to the office, at that time Teabough wasn't there, his secretary, Miss Shoop, was there. And I says, typing's filled up. I said, they don't have no room. So, that ended my typing career (laughs).

I remember one time, there was George, Bob Leya and I, see all the kids from Blawnox, we carried our lunch. And, uh, so we're in the hall and we're throwing an orange back and forth. It's one of them deals, every time you threw the orange back and forth, well, you more or less stepped back a step, you know. Next thing we're at the whole length of, did you ever go to Aspinwall? OK, so we're in the main hall there and, so the next thing you know we're practically at the whole length of the hall. So, to get it down there you had to really whale that orange, so what happened, I think it was George, he threw that stupid orange and it went through a window, down towards the tennis courts, on that end. There was tennis courts on the, when you went into the school on the left hand side of the school there was tennis courts. Anyhow, the orange goes through the window. So, we're going to be heroes. So, we go in there and we tell Mr. Teabough about that we broke the window and this and that. So, he's praising us for being honest and all this and that and honesty and all that. In the meantime, he says, I think we were just about ready to leave and he says, "Well, what went through the window?" And we nonchalantly says, an orange. Holy Man! We stood there for 15 minutes listening to The Starving People in China and the rest of the world (laughs). We're throwing oranges back and forth (laughs). We didn't have to pay for the window, but I'll tell you what- that ear beating! About these poor people in the world starving and we're throwing food around to play with (laughs).

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Q: Well, how did you **get to school in high school**, was it the same as grade school?

A: Same way. Well, the trains were not running quite as full schedule at the time and I'd take the bus in or bring the bus back.

Q: Whose bus line was that?

A: **Harmony Short Line**. Yeah, Harmony Short Line. But, you had to walk up the hill. Up the top of Center Avenue and catch this. It was a Harmony Short Line bus. They had blue busses. In fact, you know John Cicola? Well, his dad was a Harmony Short Line bus driver. And, I think he retired from there. But, well, when Port Authority took over it, they took in all these smaller bus lines, Yeah, he was a Harmony Short Line bus driver. I think it more or less worked out of New Kensington, which would be Westmoreland County.

Q: Do you remember any **school activities**?

A: Well, **football**. Now football, you see the year we graduated, we were unbeaten.

Q: What year did you graduate?

A: Forty-three.

But, the year after that when Ribby, did you ever hear of Ribby Malek? Ribby Malek and, I forget who, anyhow, they went unbeaten and unscored upon. Which, I think, is the only time it ever happened in the WPIAL... in that section, in fact, in almost any section. Art McCones was the coach. And, then later on he, let's see, is it Clarion? Or is it Grove City? Anyhow, I think it's Clarion. It was one of the schools, one of the colleges, it might not even be them. But, anyhow, their field is called McCone Field. It was named after him.

Aspinwall, when I went to school was the powerhouse of the Valley. Well, what McCone would do, he'd want to know who was going out for football. Now, I never went out for any of these because I was always working. I ran a newspaper route like I was telling you and I had to more or less work so consequently I didn't do any school activities. I might have went to a couple of football games. I never went to a dance. And I still don't dance. I used to roller skate a lot, but never dance. But, he found out who's going to play football and then he'd find out how many kids were from Blawnox and, see at that time kids from Harmarville and even as far up as Cheswick and that, the better students went to Aspinwall. Instead of going to Springdale. In fact, Aspinwall's English was so good that if you went to college, you didn't have to take an English exam, or something like that, because they figured your senior English was equivalent to a first year of college English anyhow. But, I never had that problem because I never went to college; I went right to the Army. But Aspinwall was a very high graded school when we went. But, McCone would, did you ever hear of Sonny Jukopik? Well, he was police chief Harmarville. Well, he played football for Aspinwall. The majority of the team was made up from Blawnox, Harmarville and your coal mining section. There was some kids on it from Aspinwall, but very seldom was there anybody on it from Fox Chapel or O'Hara, or something like that. It was made up of the mill-hunky towns. And, they had good football teams. They never did real good in basketball, but they sure was known for football. Like I said, if you ever could look up their record, they sure was a powerhouse.

Q: Where did you **hang out, outside of school**, when you were in high school?

A: Across from George Dolhi's house, across the railroad tracks, we had an old shack. We called it **The Shack**. We dug a big hole, it was probably about, maybe 10 by 10. And then we covered it with boards and big metal things and then put dirt over it. We called it The Shack. That's where we spent all our time, mostly. Well, that was more or less our headquarters. Our gang consist of probably about, let's see, Jack Sharf, Jack Bataglia and then quite a few of the kids from the Bottom. But, remember me telling you before about the Courts being more or less of all Polish extract and that? Well, they weren't allowed in the shack. You had to live on this side of Center Avenue to be in the shack. You couldn't be from the Courts (laughs). Well, we had Bob Whartonby and...

And then, at that time, two Clawson's, now that was where the Vinegar, you probably remember it as the Vinegar Works? OK, at that time that was a gas station. And that's where your school busses ran from. And, it was called **Clawson's** garage. Well, they had more or less a soda fountain set up out in the front. It had a juke box in it

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and all that kind of stuff. That's where, in the evenings a lot of time we'd hang out up in there. It was your, you know, your typical drugstore scene, but it wasn't a drugstore. I mean, they sold like hamburgers and all that kind of stuff and they had booths and a juke box and that kind of stuff and that was the, more or less, the live spot of the town.

And then, **Dinty Moore's Bar-B-Que**, it was big. You remember Dinty Moore's down there? OK, well that was big place. I mean, if you was going out a more high class (laughs). That's where you more or less went.

Q: What was that place like, I mean, what did it look like?

A: Well, it had like juke boxes in, and they served sodas but their specialty was bar-b-ques which they cooked outside on the spit. I mean, you could see the bar-b-ques, the meat being bar-b-que'd. And then they would bring it in and would chip it, I mean it really had a bar-b-que flavor to it. In other words, more comparable to your Arby's. Something like your Arby's would be now.

Q: Was it set up with like tables and booths?

A: Oh, yeah. Booths, yeah. Booths and then you had like your soda fountain where, you know, you sat individually. Like some of these dinners, you know. Something comparable to one of them.

See, then there was another bar-b-que right below that, down about where Pep's is now. They tore it down. But, there was another bar-b-que down there, but it never did go over too big. Dinty Moore's was the, then they had a miniature golf course out there, too. It came in more or less started wide and then it, where the old road comes up into Freeport Road, well, that was more or less a point. And that was your front nine and then from that point on was your back nine. But, it was a miniature golf course and that's when miniature golf courses were fairly popular. That was the closest one around. I mean, it was always well crowded.

Q: Did you do things such as shopping or just **hanging around in Aspinwall**?

A: No, not me. Because, like I said, I was either delivering papers or I was watching the paper store at night. Do you remember Sheridans? Well, see they had the paper franchise in Blawnox. Well, they had their store a couple different places. It was right up by where Arlotti's Cleaners is now. Then, later on, it was over right on the top of Blaw Avenue, that brick building right across Freeport Road at Blaw Avenue?

Anyhow, they sold comic books and all kind of stuff, plus they booked numbers. So, I would book the numbers for them and just more or less watch the store. Like I said, selling comic books and well, the same setup as with your drugstores or magazine shops have now. And then, later on, when St. Edward's took over the bowling alleys down the cellar of Adam's building and they had two alleys down there, well then I was house man down there. So, consequently, as a rule, I was always doing some kind of work so I really never went to Aspinwall in the evening. This I can say. I never went there. In fact, most of our gang, I don't think, did. We more or less stayed in town.

Q: Did you do things up the river in **Harmar, Cheswick, Springdale, Oakmont or New Kensington**?

A: No, no, no, no, no.

Q: On **Montrose Hill**?

A: Ah, we'd go up there maybe to visit some of our friends or something like that. I think we basically was up on Powers Run more that we was up Mon'rose Hill, because we could walk up Center Avenue and cross over and come out about where Crown Meadows was and then, well, this was when I was a lot younger, there was an airport out there. Called Roger's Field. And we used to go up there and on Sundays and that. You'd have your skywalkers, I mean wing walkers and that kind of stuff there. You know, airplanes at that time was a new thing and it was really something different.

Q: When you were growing up in Blawnox, where was your favorite place to **shop for clothes**?

A: It was Rubin's Department Store. Right on the corner of Blaw Avenue and Freeport Road. You see, where the Chinese restaurant is now, that was the A&P. And right across the street was Rubin's Department Store. They sold

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clothes in there. They had the 2 sides of it, there was 2 doors you could go in. Well, the one side more or less had shoes and the other side had dresses and things like that. But, that was the, mostly where, if you were buying clothes in Blawnox, that's where you would buy it.

Q: Where did you go to get a **haircut**?

A: Pete Panza's. Pete Panza, his shop was in that, what I was describing as our bookstore. But, prior to that, he had his barber shop in there. And then, later on Flannagan's opened. There was Joe and John Flannagan. Then you always had Angelo. Basically, we had 3 barbers in town for many, many years. You had Angelo Rigerri. You remember Angelo? Well, you know he passed away a couple years ago? Not too long, maybe about 2 years ago. Anyhow, then Flannagans was right over (this)side. Do you remember a drugstore being there, Mosca's drugstore? Beside the Memorial? Well, then Flannagan's shop was right beside that, in fact, they had that as a beauty salon, also. That was John Flannagan and later on, Joe Flannagan, he opened up his own shop across the street over just about where the pizza shop is right now. I was going to say Tony Destein's place, but I know you don't know that. You know where that pizza shop is right across from, let's say, the Monument?

Q: Right about where North Avenue comes down?

A: Yeah, just about. Not quite that far up. Almost beside Arlotti's. Well see, you had a restaurant in there and then you had Joe Flannagan's Barbershop. Basically, at one time, we had 4 barbers in town.

Q: Where did you go to **get an ice cream sundae**/float/banana split?

A: Well, like I said, to Clawson's. Up there where the vinegar works was. And, or down to Dinty Moores.

Q: Did you **go to Pittsburgh** often?

A: No, the only time we ever went downtown is, you could buy a Sunday pass and we'd go down on the streetcar and we'd ride all over Pittsburgh.

Q: How about **East Liberty**, did you go there much?

A: No, hardly not at all. Not that I know of.

Then we probably always went down at **Pittsburgh** at this time of the year because all your stores at that time had big Christmas displays. You had Frank & Cedars and Kaufmann's and Joseph Horne's and, let's see, there's Frank & Cedars, Kaufmann's, Joseph Hornes, seemed like there's, Gimbel's. Gimbel's, that's it, there you go. Their whole windows were displayed and they had... it was quite a thing to go down and see.

Q: Now you remember **the flood**, don't you?

A: Do I remember the flood, hell yes, I remember the flood, I was in it! (laughs).

Q: Your house was under water, right? Where did your family go?

A: Well, a lot of the people went up to the churches. The Methodist Church, all your churches. The Presbyterian Church and that up there, and up the Fire Hall It wasn't a Boro building at the time. I don't think they had the Boro building Let's see, '36 Flood, I don't think the new Boro Building was built at the time. But, and different clubs and that, like, you know. But, it was mostly the churches. The Methodist Church, the Presbyterian Church and they more or less bedded the people down in there. And then a lot of people, you know, they had relatives that lived, let's say, up over the hill side, you know. At that time, most of your small town was integrated, it was intermarried, more or less, you know. If you talked about somebody, and here you found out it was their aunt or uncle or something like that, so. See, I lived in Farrine's house. And, the water ended up, the water line in our house was 3 inches from the ceiling.

Q: On the first floor?

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A: On the first floor, yeah. In fact, that night, for something to do I was looking over my stamp collection at the time with a candle and I guess by the time we decided to take off. Anyhow, I must have slammed the thing down, the stamp album, and here, it must have caught on some wax, and we come in and our big, round table, it was lying on the side but the stamp album was still stuck to it. In other words, I didn't lose any stamps (laughs). And then, the water was across the road. In fact, I have some flood mud right now. When I was remodeling the house over there on First Street, we was cutting out a door way and I got a piece of mud, it looks like a small brick, but it's actually mud from the flood that, you know, had settled down in there. And then Second Street was the last street down to get flooded. You see, the water came up from the swamp, up along the railroad track and then it came down along the railroad track. So, basically, Fourth Street was flooded before Third Street and Third Street was (flooded) and then the river, water coming up the other way, so actually Second Street, momentarily, let's say for half an hour, was an island. It was the last street to be flooded. The water was across the railroad tracks.

Q: Did you walk out or did you have to be boated out?

A: Well, see at that time, let's see, I was what, eleven, eleven or twelve years old. And, all us kids were the ones with boats. So, we were helping people to get out. Well, when I got out, it was up over my waist, I know that. But, like Donald Shawfield, they had a couple boats. Irelands had a couple boats. With the firemen and all that, we were more or less helping people get out of the houses and that.

Now, down the end of the street we had a bootlegger. Named Jimmy Cole. The firemen's insisted he was going to get out and he sat on top of the roof With his shotgun, and wasn't about to get out. He says, "I get out here, all you thieves will steal my booze" (laughs). He stayed up there and they had to take over his meals to him (laughs).

And then, another funny thing I remember about the flood, there was an old barn house coming down, right by the train station, at the time, where the train station was. This barns going down and there's an old cow sitting on top of it going mooooo! (Laughs). He had enough brains not to get off that thing, but he sure was making enough noise about his boat ride. He didn't like that.

Q: As a kid were you impacted by **the Depression**, or did you think everybody is in this?

A: No, I'd say, my individual family, like I said, we didn't have no gas. What it was, my dad left, and so my mother took in worshipping and ironing. She did worshipping and ironing for the woman that ran Dinty Moores. Her name was Olga Furher. So, every time she'd bring the worsh up, I mean that was just one of the person's that she did worshipping and ironing for, but every time that she'd bring the clothes up, she'd bring bar-b-ques. That was like on a Tuesday. Then she picked them up on a Saturday, she'd bring bar-b-ques. To this day I don't like bar-b-ques. I got feed-up, sick of them. I'll tell you what, I guess they was good when you was hungry, but...

Q: Did you worry about **Hitler in the late 30s**?

A: Well, at that time you didn't have the news coverage that you do now and it was basically radio and you might have been aware of it a little bit, but nothing to any big thing.

Q: You didn't actually feel like it was going to affect you?

A: Right. Right. And then, when you're a young kid, that kind of stuff doesn't impress you too much anyhow.

Q: Do you remember you or the community doing things to **aid the war effort**?

A: Well, they had these War Bond drives, you know, and at that time you could, like the schools and that, you could take 10 cents and get a 10 cent stamp. And you filled up, like a Green Stamp book. And then when you got eighteen-seventy-five in it, well, you turned it in at the Post Office and you got a bond. It was called a War Bond at the time.

Then, the Blaw-Knox Company, they got a couple "E" flags. That was, I don't know whether it stood for. Anyhow, I know they did a lot of Navy work. Making king posts and that for the Navy, I know that. I worked up there twice. Three months both times, so. And, I was never in the union. So, I never got in a union (laughs).

Q: Do you remember any **kids from Blawnox serving in the war**?

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A: Oh, yeah, yeah.

Q: Did you know anyone that was **killed in the war**?

A: Yeah, let's see, Johnny Zabeck, was killed. I'm positive of that one. There might have been one or two other ones, but Johnny Zabeck I know, because he lived over in the Courts and I knew him. He was probably about a year or two older than me, probably about 2 years older. Because he got in, I think he was killed in North Africa.

Now, Lee Simmons had his legs pretty well shot up in North Africa. It seems to me there was a couple other people, but I don't know them by name.

Q: Did you worry about **winning the war**?

A: No. No, basically it was just a big experience, you know. I mean, you didn't know what the heck was going on half the time, but it never, now like I was in the Battle of the Bulge and even then it was just a momentary scare, But I don't think we, I mean, I myself, and even all the guys I was in (with), nobody had the feeling that we was going to lose the war.

Q: When you lived in Blawnox in the 1950's did you **worry about the atomic bomb**? Did your family have a fallout shelter?

A: No, not exactly. I mean, when everybody was doing these air raid shelters and these bomb shelters, my attitude was- hey, if that thing's gonna drop, a second rate piece of celery isn't going to help. And a couple times I more or less, it run through my mind that, like in my cellar way here, that I might put something in but, then again I said, if that thing is as powerful as it's supposed to be, I mean, your more or less just wasting your time. And, if you do save yourself, you're coming out into a, what do they check you for, radiation. So, you're going to come out, everybody else is going to be dead... and you're going to be suffering from radiation anyhow. I mean, you seen what happened in Japan. So I figured a lot of it was being overdone.

Q: Did you worry about **Communists**?

A: No, no. I was up in the Airlift and I was right in Berlin. I mean, I dealt with Russians head on. In fact, my wife was from the Russian Zone in Berlin and I would go over there. I had a Four Power pass and I'd go over there just as easy as if I'd go down the street. No qualms about it. Now, I was an odd individual, I mean, a lot of guys, I guess, were a little 'fraid, but me as an individual, I wasn't.

Q: Did you think that the kids in Blawnox were significantly involved with **drugs, alcohol or smoking in the 1930s**?

A: Well, like I said, almost my whole gang smoked- Andy and George, they all seemed to smoke. But me being a stubborn individualist, I didn't smoke. Due to the fact that the more they insisted that I was going to smoke, the more I insisted that I wasn't (laughs). Plus, I couldn't afford them anyhow. And, I figured, if I was going to make a dime or 15 cents, I wasn't going to waste it on a pack of cigarettes. So, to me this is the angle that they should use on stopping people from smoking. I mean, I go through this in the store constantly. Like, I had this woman today, just for example, and I mouthed off to her about it. Now, this woman works at a cleaners. And, she's making ends meet, her and her son and that. But, in the meantime, she put something like twelve dollars' worth of cigarettes on the counter. And her food come to about eight dollars. And, I said to her, I mean, you can't even afford this! Actually, the people should tell me to mind my own business, but that would be the worst thing to do because then I would mouth off. But, I think this is the angle that they should use. I used to tell kids here in the store, why did you start smoking? Do you want to look popular or be somebody great? I said, you want to be known as somebody different? Every day, go up to the bus stop, at five o'clock, and you stand up there on Center Avenue, and you burn a dollar bill. I said, I'll tell you what. Within a week or two, you're going to be the most famous person because everyone is going to say, from New Kensington to Pittsburgh, "Did you see that nut down there in Blawnox burning a dollar bill?", and, I said, that's only half a pack of cigarettes. You know. And I said, you wouldn't even be bothering your health. And, to me I think they should come in on a money angle. How much waste cigarettes are. I mean, a waste of money. I mean invariable people will want a carton of cigarettes. Then they buy milk, jumbo,

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bread. The milk, jumbo and bread come to twelve dollars and the cigarettes come to twenty dollars. They just {say}, "Isn't milk and bread expensive, reh, reh...", but they don't say a damned word about cigarettes. I mean, that just aggravates me.

Q: Are you glad that your parents chose **Blawnox to raise their family**?

Yeah, I'd say so. To me Blawnox is close enough to Pittsburgh that you could go in anytime you wanted to. And, we was far out enough that the, you didn't have the city problems, the city congestion.

In fact, I used to tell the kids here in the store that all summer long you kids get to do what kids in the city wait to go to camp for two weeks to do. Or to go on vacation for two weeks. Ride your bike, go swimming, play ball, go on a hike, picnic. I mean, you can do all that here in Blawnox, as far as I'm concerned. And, the people, as a rule, are people that help each other out. I'll tell you what; it's not as good now as it used to be. But, like, the gang I have in the store now, well I don't even have a gang. When I first opened the store, I used to have as many as 18 kids loaf over here. We used to play ping-pong down the cellar, we used to weight lift, and I had a card out there. If they wanted a bag of potato chips they would mark it up by their name. Or anything you wanted to do, they'd help you. Now, these kids, they're useless. I mean, as far as I'm concerned, I wouldn't trust half of them.

But, the kids in the 50s and the 60s, like Freddy and Tom's age, and Dick Roach and Chuckie Roach, and all them kids, I had no qualms against them being out in the store by themselves. In fact, if I was in here eating and there was just somebody to get a pack of cigarettes, or candy or something, "I got them, Bill, I got them", and they'd wait on them, and I had not no fears that they were scraping me one way or another and, like I said, they had their card there, and if they'd get a bag of potato chips or an ice cream cone, they'd mark it up beside their name. But, the kids now, now, no, they're selfish.

Q: Would you or are you **raising your family in Blawnox**?

A: Yeah, they were all raised in Blawnox. My family all live within, Nancy lives the farthest and she lives in Hampton. And Tom lives up Mon'rose Hill. And Freddy lives in Cheswick. And, Norman lives right next door to me. And Peggy lives over in the old house {140 First Street}.

And we all get together several times a (year), in fact Christmas Eve will be a big night, we'll have about 35 or 40 of us, all together. That's our big night when we open up our presents and that.

Miscellaneous

Bill: Do you remember when Sharf and them had the **Sweet Breeze**? The orchestra Sweet Breeze?

Dan: No, no.

Bill: Well, they became, you know, popular in the Pittsburgh area. Anyhow, they revived themselves again and they had a gig down the Yacht Club here, probably about, well it was in the summer. Maybe Memorial Day or something like that. And, they had a real big turnout. So, then they just had another gig down Montemuro's, and it looked like, actually what it looked like a Mon'rose Hill reunion. I went down to it, I mean (laughing), the Dolhi's were there, you name it. I mean it looked like a Mon'rose Hill reunion. And now they got a gig New Year's night down the Fox Chapel Yacht Club again. They play, you know, the music of the 50s and the 60s or something like that. Probably the 60s or 70s. You know, your type of music. But, all the guys, its Greg Scharf, do you remember Greg Scharf? OK, well, they went to school with my son, Tom. And Tom was born in '52. Because they went to school with my Tom and Emil Heintzinger. So let's see who else, what the heck was that one, Whale. They called him Whale, what's his brother's name? He lived up on the far end of Walnut Street. Geez, I know their name as well as I know mine. I can't remember. Probably about 10 seconds or so from now I'll remember it out of a clear blue sky. I can't think of it right now. But, there was Heintzinger and Donny Domitio, do you remember him. Well, that's who my son's Tom group was. Lombardis. I think Joey Lombardi.

A Glimpse at Life in Blawnox in the 1930s and 1940s An Interview with George Dolhi

This is an edited transcription of an interview with George Dolhi conducted in October and November of 1998. George was born in Indianola, Pennsylvania, about 6 miles outside of Blawnox and his family moved to Blawnox when he was 3 months old.

The interview was conducted over the phone by Dan Nowak with George at his residence on Montrose Hill. The editing is an attempt to make it more readable. Editor's notes are shown in {brackets}, probable missing words, due to difficulties hearing the tape recording, are in (parenthesis).

Ten years old: 1935

Q: Did you live in the same **house in Blawnox** the whole time?

A: Uh, no. When we, could I start back in Indianola a little bit?

OK. See, when my dad, he worked in the coal mines when he came from overseas. And Republic Steel owned the coal mines up in Indianola. In fact, there's a street up there still called Republic Avenue. And all those houses up in Indianola were owned by the coal mine. Well, he got a job in a coal mine up there.

When he first arrived in this country he went to Wimber PA, that's a little town outside of Johnstown, was a coal mine. And, the coal ran out there. And he heard that there were jobs here in Indianola, Republic. He came here and got a job in the coal mine up there. Uh, in 1925, right before I was born, I guess, he was living in a company house, renting a company house in Indianola and, the first strike in a coal mine, under John L. Lewis, was called. And he went out on strike, my dad, the way I understand it. With all the other coal miners. And, well the Republic Steel at that time couldn't (laughing) stomach a strike. They hadn't heard of such a thing, coal miners going out on strike, so they brought in what they called a bunch of goons. They were people that they hired as policemen, come in with clubs and everything. They threw us right out of our house! We were in a company house. They said, "You go on strike you no longer work for the company, you're out". And they threw all our furniture out of the house and right there that day, you were out of the house. He had nowhere to go. He had a family. I was only (laughs) 3 months old. I was the youngest of five. So, he had enough of the coal mines by then. So, he heard that there was a company in Blawnox, a steel mill, at that time it was called Hoboken, the town, hiring. So he trotted down to Blawnox somehow, I don't know how he got down there from up in Indianola, and, yes, they hired him, but as a part time worker.

So, I guess with that job under his belt, he got us moved to a company house down in the Riverside Courts in Blawnox. Again, it was a company house owned by the Blaw-Knox steel mill. They were row houses as you probably remember them. They're still there, the Courts. And, we lived in the Courts for less than a year, because he only worked part time. He was not a full time employee and there was a full time employee that wanted a house. And there was none available, so we had to get out of our house because my dad was only part time. And this full time employee moved in. So again we were out without a home. And there was what they called an old shanty. It was on Second Street, I don't know if you know where Wartonbys lived? It was right across from Wartonbys there. And, it was just an old garage. Two room thing. It had no running water. No electricity. No gas. We moved into there. Imagine seven people, five kids and two adults moved into a two room place! With no utilities at all. So, that's how we came to Blawnox.

But, I could just go a little further; we only stayed in there possibly a year, because the winters were too bad there without any heat or anything. Just had an old coal stove. So, anyhow, I was probably a year or two old when we moved out of that old shanty after living in a company house in the Courts for less than a year and then in that old shanty for a year. I guess I was 2 years old when my dad saw a house on Fourth street, it was for sale, down the Bottom, in Blawnox. 124 Fourth Street, I remember.

I'm trying to, yeah, at that time Blawnox was called Hoboken. In 1925 Blawnox changed, the Blaw-Knox Company officials asked the people of Blawnox to change the town's name to after the steel mill, to Blawnox. Before that it was called Hoboken. So, when we moved into that house at 124 Fourth, which my dad bought, it was already called Blawnox.

And it was nice. Boy, it was luxury compared to what we had, you know, was two rooms down stairs. We couldn't believe it. And it had a bathroom, and it had three bedrooms upstairs and a cellar. Small 25 foot lot. Big barn in back. (Laughs). And I guess it was just pure luxury and he paid 25 hundred dollars, 2 thousand- five

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hundred for a house back then! What the down payment was or whatever, I don't know, because he had nothing, no money at all. So, evidently, there must not have been a down payment. They just, every payday, they put aside a little bit for the mortgage. And he bought that house and that's where I lived until I was 18 when I went in the Service. So, that gives you a little background.

Q: Who were the **people that you most remember** when you started to play outside?

A: Well, I was probably very young at that time and we had neighbors. It was all sort of an ethnic background there. Croatian, and Italian and Polish people were all... I remember the Panzas and we were friends ever since we were very young. Jim and Joe was about the age of me and my brother Andy and we got to be very good friends. They were an Italian family. And then, right down a couple doors away from us, there was a lady called Mrs. Fortuna. She was a Polish lady and I know her name was changed. But she elected to call herself Fortuna, her last name. And, she was a very, oh man, outstanding lady. Everybody that knew her would remember. We'll go into that a little bit more.

And then right next door there was a lady, I remember, she was called Mrs. Grech. And all I remember about them is that they moved to Minnesota when I was very young.

And on the other side, believe it or not, there was a speakeasy. Maybe you've heard of it. Jimmy Cole...C-O-L-E, ran the speakeasy. And he had a wife called Nellie. They had no kids. And Nellie was so cross-eyed. She'd be talking to you and she'd be looking down the street and you'd wonder if she was talking to you or not (laughs). But, we could get in to that later, that was our television, watching the people going in and out of that speakeasy in later years.

Q: Did you have any **relatives in Blawnox** then?

A: No. None what so ever. Unt-uh. My dad just needed a job bad and he just went down into town and, I guess, they were hiring at that time.

Our relatives were working with my dad up in the coal mines in Indianola. And they also ran into the same fate that we did. They got kicked out of their house during the strike and they went to Russelton and Superior, where other coal mines were, and Harmarville. There was a coal mine in Harmarville. And, in fact, my sister, married one of our neighbors (that) moved to Harmarville and her last name now is Lestelika. And then we had a Boris family that was our first cousins. Now, they all scattered up through Russelton and Superior, which is about 10 or 11 miles away, to the other coal mine areas. So, we knew nobody in Blawnox.

Q: Where did you **play as a child**, say 10 or 12 years old?

A: Yeah, there were great play areas. We had a great play area. The river. The sidings on the railroad tracks, down about a half a mile from our house. We lived right across the street from the railroad track. (It) was full of box cars and, oh, we just had the greatest time down those box cars.

There was a Workhouse. Was the Allegheny County jail at that time. And there was a workhouse and we used to play up on their fields and get chase off by the guards and so forth (laughs).

We had lots of expansive places to play.

Q: Were there any places on or near Blawnox that were **off-limits**?

A: Yeah, we weren't allowed to go over the wall at the Workhouse. There was a low wall that separated, it's still there in fact, it separates Blawnox from O'Hara Township. The Workhouse was in O'Hara, actually. But, the wall was the Blawnox limits and we weren't allowed to go over there because there was a lot of trustees and prisoners running around and we were told to stay out of there. Little did we heed that warning, we were always over there. (Laughs.)

Q: Who were your **playmates**?

A: You mean some of the names of the people? Well, Jim and Joe Panza, like I said. Bob Wartonby. Bill Sproul. He's still living down there; he has a store down in there. Down the Bottom, right now. Oh, the Roberts brothers. There was Dale Roberts and his older brother, and, let me see, there was quite a few people. There were people called Eli Spanovich, I remember. And, the Irelands. They lived right down against the river. Oh, we had a gang of

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people. There was Jack Sharf. But, he lived up on the hill and he elected to loaf with us down the Bottom and that was sort of a separation, the railroad tracks. The Top kids loafed up above there and the Bottom ones loafed together down there. But, some of them crossed the line and come down and were very welcome (laughs).

Q: What did **you play**?

A: There was no TV, as you know, at that time, or anything like that and we had a lot of outside games. Cops and Robbers and things like that. Among the box cars, up and down the box cars. We roller skated a lot. Because there was only one paved section. The Allegheny County Warehouse was down there and they paved the road. We called it Parkview Road. And everyone in town came down there to roller skate and so forth. But, there were other games. We used to play relevel-i-o. Skinny 8 and 2 is ten. Bucket-Buck, how many fingers are up (laughs). And things like that I remember.

Q: Were there any **bullies** in the neighborhood?

A: Yes. There was one family. And they were called Privich. Believe it or not, that was their name. Privich, I think, V-I-C-H. And the whole family was that way. And the older brother, George, same name as me by gosh, he ended up in prison. And the younger brother, Denny, I remember, he bullied everybody. And, oh, I got beat up by him a couple times, not beat up, just smacked a couple times. We were scared to death of them. They were really mean. Mean family. He siced the dog on me I remember one day and he bit me, punctured my leg all up. And, I wouldn't go to the doctor, (laughs). Good thing nothing happened.

Q: Was there anything about Blawnox, or that you could do in Blawnox that was **special, unusual or even unique** for its time?

A: Well, when I was that age? We're talking about 10 or 11 or 12?

Well, let's go into like, our school. We walked to school. Up and down, the hill. It was torn down here years ago. The school, together with the Blaw-Knox Company, like on Christmas, they sponsored a, all the classes of the school would sing under a huge Christmas tree. The Christmas tree was up there where the Post Office used to be in Blawnox, now it's an antique store. And there was nothing but an empty lot there. And right in the middle of that was a, we called it the playground; they had a wading pool and a couple sliding boards. Right in the middle of it was a tall, at that time I thought it was the tallest telephone pole I ever saw. And they had drilled holes in this telephone pole while it was laying down and they picked it up buried it in the ground and it stood up quite high. Christmas, they would get a whole trailer truck load of Christmas trees, Blaw-Knox Company. And they would stick these little Christmas trees all up through this pole and (it was) the biggest Christmas tree in the valley when they were done and it was all electrified with bulbs. You could see it from across the river and everywhere.

And, everyone in town, well, I wouldn't say everyone, the children, I guess, in the school, would get a half a pound of chocolate candy if they sang under the tree with their classroom. Boy, I think everyone sang there. That was one thing. It was very nice, community spirit like that. The Blaw-Knox sponsored.

And again, they sponsored a ball team. I was too young to be on it then, but the older guys had a ball team. They played Aspinwall, and Sharpsburg, and O'Hara, and the surrounding... Indiana, Cheswick, the surrounding teams would come in. And, we thought that, oh man, we thought that we couldn't wait till the ball game, be up at the field. They provided the field, and it's still there, right now it's a playground. Right off of Center Avenue. Right behind the high rise for the older people.

And, well, we used to take turns, us younger kids, to be water boys. And we'd carry buckets of water with a dipper in it. Run down our house and get a bucket of water, cross the railroad tracks, sloshing, so the players could have a drink. And at the end of the game, they'd throw us a nickel for that. I remember we thought that was great!

But, the games were really good, and getting back to **Mrs. Fortuna**, remember I mentioned her? There was, I remember, a screen backstop that the people built. And she would stand in one spot. Nobody dared take her spot. And she would just yell at the top of her lungs, cheering our team on. And, it was something to behold (laughs).

Q: Do you remember any **ice cream or "sweet treats" vendors**?

A: No. No, I don't. Just the stores.

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Q: But, nothing like going around in the trucks?

A: No, but I remember **hucksters** selling food and groceries and so forth and produce. But, not ice cream, no.

Q: Did you have a **curfew**?

A: You know, I seem to think we had it when we were older, when we were like teenagers. But, when we were younger there was no curfew, because the parents were the curfew. Boy, they'd yank you as soon as it got dark and you got yanked into the house.

Q: Did you go to **indoor theaters**?

A: Yeah, there was one. The building's still there. It's an apartment house up on Freeport Road and it was run by David and Myra Boyd. I guess they were part of the, somehow they were part of the Heinz family. And, they were a little more well-to-do than most of us in Blawnox, and they were from up here on Montrose Hill, in fact. And, she ran the theater and it cost 11 cents to get in. And, I remember going to the theater, it was indoor theater, yeah.

Q: Now, how young were you when you remember that theater? Do you have any idea when she put that in?

A: Yeah, I must have been before the flood and the flood was in '36. I was eleven at the time of the flood. So, it must have been before that in '35, '34?

Q: But it wasn't there any earlier than that, though?

A: It might have been by somebody else, but we were too young to go.

Q: So, you only remember it from about the time of 1935 or so?

A: Yes. Yeah

Q: How did you get there?

A: Walked.

Q: Do you remember any specific movies or attractions?

A: Yeah, there were a lot of serials, what we called them. You would go and they would give you about 15 minutes of an ongoing production, like "Flash Gordon". He was on all the time, you know. And it was just like a TV series, like, you know. And you would see the "Flash Gordon", and it would be continued the next time you would go to the movies. It was just a draw, to draw the kids to go again, you know. And when you'd go again it would repeat half of what you saw the last time so you only really saw 5 minutes of the new stuff (laughs). But there were things like that. And, I'm trying to remember a couple of the movies. (Pause.)

Yeah, "The Three Musketeers". I remember them. A lot of Shirley Temple movies. When she was that young. She was the same age as I am, I think. And, we liked her. She was a very good actress. Shirley Temple.

Q: They didn't have **drive-in theaters** at that time did they?

A: I don't think so. No, I don't remember a drive-in. No. Nobody had a car. There was almost no automobiles. Very few.

Q: You mentioned something the other day about the interaction between the kids in Blawnox and **the inmates and guards at the Workhouse**; can you expand on that a little?

A: Sure. When I moved into the house on 124 Fourth Street, I was only about two years old. I grew up there until I was 18 when I went into the Service and all that time, the Workhouse was there. It was only a block away and we used to go down there. There was a wall separating Blawnox and the Workhouse and that was also the

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dividing line between Blawnox and O'Hara, Township. The Workhouse was in O'Hara Township. We'd always walk down there and there was this huge coal pile right down, oh, about a half a block away from our house. Railroad cars would come in and the prisoners, by hand, would unload these cars and build this gigantic coal pile there. They'd do that all summer and in the winter time trucks would come down from the Workhouse and the prisoners again would be down there loading these trucks to take it up, they had their own boiler, that gave them the heat and the steam to run all their laundries and everything. And, I believe they even generated their own electricity. And, we used to go down there and a lot of the prisoners were trustees. They were the ones that weren't in for longer than maybe 30 days. I don't remember what the length of time they were (in). But, they were allowed to be on their own. They were never allowed outside the wall, but we were allowed inside. There was a road that went right through, it's still down there. Parkview Road we called it. And, we used to play down there, you know, ride the scooters and skate and everything. We'd always be down there and we'd see the prisoners and they'd yell at us, "Hey, kids", and they'd even know us by name. They'd say, "We need some cigarettes, you wanna go down the store?", and we'd say, they won't sell us any, unless you give me a note. And I remember that. And they'd write a note saying it was for the, you know, a prisoner and they'd give us the money and it would cost, I remember, 15 cents for a pack of Lucky Strikes. Or Paul Malls. And, we'd scoot down the store. Sophie Kapolo owned the store down there, at that time. And run back and give them the cigarettes. We'd talk with them. They were nice people. And they never bothered us except for that.

And also, right against the river was a water pumping station for the Workhouse. It actually pumped and purified the water. They were self-contained. That was one heck of a facility. Bet the county would like to have it now. If it wasn't, you know, that old. But, the prisoners, trustees, would be down there in that pumping station. And, we'd go down there, also, and fish. For catfish. Never caught much (laughs). And, right off the wall down there by the pumping station. The prisoners would watch us, and they'd be fishing there, too. And again, they would ask us for tomatoes if we had any. They loved tomatoes, you know, when we had the gardens, and I remember we used to take them down there. And, they had their own gardens, we could never figure out. Maybe they weren't allowed to take them, or something, out of their garden.

But, we'd get them cigarettes and things like that.

Q: These were the trustees, right? There were **prisoners kept inside the jail**, weren't there?

A: Oh, yeah. But, those prisoners also were all on work details. I don't think there were any that were, well there might have been some in solitary. But, every one of them worked and that's how the prison was self-sufficient. And they would come down to this coal pile, I remember, and they had ball and chains, you know what they are? OK, they had about a 5 foot length of chain chained to their ankle, a lot of them. Now, those were the prisoners that tried to escape, or were trouble makers. And on the end of the chain they had probably, it looked like a cannon ball. It probably weighed 25, 30, 40, I don't know how many pounds a cannon ball weighs, and it was welded to the chain. And when they were shoveling the coal, they'd lay this ball down and do their work. But, when they had to walk or move, they threw it over their shoulder and they carried that big heavy thing on their shoulder. But all the parties that came down, the work parties, they were all inmates up there. But, they were not trustees, you know. We weren't allowed near them.

Q: Did they ever escape or was there any fear in the town that one would escape?

A: No. A whistle would blow once in a while when they had a prisoner escape, but nobody worried about it. Not at all.

Q: Nobody paid attention?

A: No, they caught them all the time. They didn't get very far, I guess, if they escaped.

Q: Well, I guess they never really came into the town, they probably ran in the other direction.

A: Could be, and I don't think they were the violent prisoners, you know, murderers or anything like that. I don't know how long they were in for.

Q: Now, that woman {Margaret Kincaid, daughter of the Superintendent} that lived there and wrote the book on the Workhouse, it seemed from her writings that most of them were in for drunkenness.

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A: She lived up at the farms, Kinkaid. I went to school with Jean Kinkaid, she lived up there. That was the daughter. And the older daughter wrote the book. It wasn't Jean. But, oh yeah we was always up the farms too, up there. They had cows and bulls and horses and man! Where the RIDC is now, that was 700 acres of farmland. Beautiful. They grew everything.

Right across Freeport Road from the high wall, the guards had houses and they lived there. In those houses. They're all gone now.

But, I remember, see the prisoners used to play ball down behind the wall. We weren't allowed down in there. And once in a while, they'd hit a ball up on the main highway, there was always a trustee sitting in a rocking chair across the road and he'd run out and grab the ball and throw it back to them (laughs). And, the trustees also used to go up to the Post Office in Blawnox and get all the mail for the Workhouse.

Q: You mentioned **hucksters** coming around. What were they selling?

A: Produce mostly. There was a family called Bataglia that owned a store, up on the Freeport Road. And it was this little, very little grocery store and he had a '28 Ford truck. And it was open in the back. And it would make a racket. No muffler, no nothing and I remember and, you'd know when he was coming around. He'd stop and he would try to sell you the groceries. Not groceries so much as produce. He'd go down to the Strip District. The Strip District was there even back then and he would buy all, you know, a truck load, and then he'd come up and sell it to the people that couldn't get to the stores.

And also, at the same time there was somebody from Sharpsburg, I remember, used to come up and do the same thing.

And then there was a lady that had a bakery up in Blawnox. And, she was a Jewish lady, I remember. And, she made bread. And I don't know if it was her daughters or what, they would carry it! They had no trucks or anything. And well, you know, I guess they just walked from door to door and try to sell a loaf of bread to you. I remember that.

Q: Where do you remember your family **shopping for food**?

A: Mostly to the A&P in Blawnox. There was an A&P. Right now it's a Chinese restaurant on the corner of Blaw Avenue and Freeport Road. There was an A&P there.

Q: Where did they go to "**just pick up some milk and bread**"?

A: Down, there was a store; in fact there was two stores down the Bottom, a block away! And, one store was run by a lady called Sophie. Sophie Kupala. And, she was a Polish lady. And her and her husband ran the store. And then right across the street there was another little store, and it was run by Ferraros. And, uh, they just had canned goods.

But Sophie had a little bit of everything. And we would deal there, I remember. Charge it on the book. And, everybody did at that time. From payday to payday. And when we'd go to pay off our, you know, our one week, I guess my Dad got paid by the week or something, then he'd go pay off the bill. I remember she'd give us a, well, they're packaged like these breakfast sweet rolls, you know. And we'd thought that was great. (Laughs.)

Q: Did your family have a **vegetable garden**?

A: Oh, yeah. Almost everybody did. There was no lawns back then. I think Wartonbys were about the only ones that had a lawn. We used to go over and play football on his property (laughing).

Q: Did things grow well?

A: Yes. Yes, they grew. Those people knew how to grow a garden back then, they grew everything.

I still have a garden. I guess it was a throwback from that.

We grew tomatoes and onions and even corn, and cabbage, and green peppers and most everything. We only had a 25 foot lot with a big garage behind us, and a house in the front, so you image the garden wasn't very big, but it was all garden. There was nothing else but garden. Everyone had a fence. And, along the fences the ladies would plant flowers. Dahlias and Cannas and things like that. But the center, boy, it was all vegetables and nothing else.

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Q: Did you help with the garden?

A: Oh, yeah. Oh, yeah. I had to dig the darned thing up. Me and my brother, every year we had to dig it up and we had to pull the weeds.

And then, later on there were Thrift Gardens. That was during the Depression. You're talking about the Depression years. It was tough. See, I was born in '25. The Depression hit in '29, I was 4 years old. And then, from then on 'til they got, oh, probably in, the Depression didn't end almost until World War II started. So, in the thirties, when I went to school, it was tough. And, they had Thrift Gardens for the people. The county parceled off a big, flat area, and it was between Aspinwall and Blawnox. And, everybody got, like, a 50 by 50 foot lot. (Anyone) that wanted to put a big garden on it. And the only restriction was that, you know, that you took care of it and planted it and they would give you the seeds and everything and, boy, I remember doing that. That was a big job. And, we all put up our vegetables and had them all winter long (laughs).

Q: Where did your parents take you if you needed to see a **doctor**?

A: There was one doctor in town. His name was Dr. Magee. J. P. Magee. And, we went to him.

Q: What and where was the **closest hospital**? Do you recall?

A: No, I don't. I don't even think at that time I knew there was such a thing as a hospital (laughs).

Q: Did you have a **dentist**?

A: No.

Q: Did you or your family **swim**? Where?

A: Oh, yeah. Yeah. The older people didn't. My mother and dad, no, they didn't. But, the whole family did-down the river.

At the bottom of Center Avenue, the older people, they were much older than I was. The teenagers at that time. I was only 10 or 12, or younger, I guess. The older ones made a beach down there. And, again, they went to the Blaw-Knox Company and the Blaw-Knox Company, boy, they were very community minded. They sent down a couple truckloads of sand. Poured sand all over the gravel. The beach right now, along the river was all gravel. And they poured sand down there. We had a beautiful beach and they called it Popeye Beach. Where it got its name, I don't know, but I suspect there was one fellow that was sort of did a lot of this planning and taking care of the beach, and everyone always said he looked like Popeye (laughs). So, (we) swam down there all the time. They built a dock and, oh, it was wonderful.

Q: Did you or your family **hunt or fish**?

A: No, no, we had no money for anything like that.

Q: Did you or your family **travel in the car for recreation**?

A: No, we did not. We never had a car. Our family never had a car. After I was married, I got a car. When I was 22. That was my first car. We never had a car when we were younger. Almost no one did down there. Where I lived.

Q: You didn't need it?

A: No, everything was in walking distance. We lived probably 2, 3 blocks from the Blaw-Knox Company where my dad worked and a block from the stores, or 2,3. We'd be up on the hill, up on Center Avenue and Freeport Road. We'd sled ride down the hills a lot there. No, everything was in walking distance. I remember the guy next door had a Model T Ford. He used to be out there cranking it all the time. And he took us for a ride in it a couple times. I remember that.

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Q: What **chores** do you remember doing?

Well, me and Andy, we were the only two boys in the family. We had three sisters and two boys. And, our job was to see that there was enough fire wood and coal to last us through the winter. Because there was no such thing as gas furnace back then. And, if you did, you were one of the elite (laughs). Everyone had coal burning stoves and even furnaces.

And, what we did, my dad made an old wheel barrow, I remember. And we'd haul that thing about a mile down the railroad tracks to all these box cars that were parked down there, you know, on the sidings. And, as you looked in all the cars there was a lot of old oak wood that they used to shore up whatever they shipped in these cars with. And then they'd leave the wood in there, all splintered and everything. And, we'd make trip after trip down there and got that wood and we'd bring it home, just pile it up in the back yard. And that was our Saturday chores. And then, after school when we come home, it was too late to go looking for wood, so we would saw it, saw it all up. There was saw horses in the back and we had piles of wood. And then we had an old barn like looking garage in the back that had a loft in it, actually, upstairs. We had that whole thing filled with wood. Every winter, it was our job to make sure that was full of wood.

Now, also, we got coal. We used to buy coal. But, a lot of it, we went along the railroad tracks, and again, we picked it off. And again, that was the Depression years and people kind of took care of each other then. I'm trying to think of the guy's, oh, Don Shawfield, he lived right down by us and his dad was an engineer on the railroad. It went right past our house and right through town. And, he brought these coal trains through. And he'd slowed it down through town, and the engineers and brakemen on the train would get on top of these coal cars, and they'd kick these big lumps of coal off the cars as they were rumbling through town. And then when the train left, everybody just scattered along the tracks picking it up and taking it home and nobody fought about it or anything. It was all nice and peaceful and we got a lot of coal that way.

Q: Did you receive an **allowance**?

A: No. Money was an absolute thing of, I didn't know what it was (laughingly).

Q: Did you do anything in Blawnox to **earn extra money**?

A: Oh, yeah, when I was a teenager, yeah, when I was in school. When I was 15, well, OK, let's say this way, 14, everybody in town, just about, the boys, went out and caddied. Out either the Field Club or Fox Chapel. And you had to have a doctor's certificate to work at that time. We called it a worker's certificate, because you were too young, you know. And, you had to get a little physical and old Dr. Magee, he just signed it, he didn't even look at you. He said, "Yeah, you're alright". He signed it (Laughs). We took it out to the caddy master and then he hired us and, yes, we worked, got a dollar and a quarter. Well, first it was a dollar for 18 holes and took us three hours to go around the golf course. And, you only got out to do that once or twice a week. So actually, you only got two dollars a week. But, you had to spend almost every day out there waiting to be called, for a caddy. And then the caddies went on strike, I remember, and they wanted a dollar and a quarter. Well, they gave it to them, but after that there were no tips. {Laughter} Yeah, the members quit tipping. Because, they had to pay that quarter in the extra fee for the caddy (laughs).

Then after that, when I was 15, I got a job (with) Prince Distributing Company, used to be a beer distributor. Up in Blawnox. And, I stopped in one day and I told him that (I'd) sure like to have a job, and he said, "Well, yeah. We need people to help on our truck. We can't pay you much, you know. And I said, oh, anything. So, I got a job there and just delivering the cases and so forth and that's where I learned how to drive. On the beer truck. He had regular drivers there, you know, and I went to help him and they let me drive and at 16, I got my driver's license. And I was driving his beer truck all over East Liberty and all the home deliveries through Fox Chapel and everything, delivering beer. And, you were not allowed to do that. You weren't allowed to drive a beer truck until you were 21. And, he told me, I remember, he said, "You look", he was a Jewish fellow, his name was Benjamin Kaufmann, and he said, "Hey, you look like part of my family" (laughs). He says, "If anyone asks you, tell them that you're working for nothing. If you ever get stopped, you're not getting paid and you're part of the family". That way, he wouldn't get in trouble for letting me drive when I was 16 (laughs). But, I got a big raise. Instead of 2 dollars working, I worked the Saturday, all day. Eight, sometime ten hours, and I got 2 dollars. And then when I started to drive the truck, I got two-fifty. All day (laughs). So, that's about it.

When I was 11 years old, I forgot, I helped a fellow, he was a stamp collector. In his house. He used to sell stamps and so forth. And my sister, Margaret, used to do house work for him. And he asked if she knew

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anybody who would like to come up for a couple of hours a day and just pull all these stamps out of all these albums he bought and separate them. So, I went up there and she told (him), yeah, she had a brother. So, I went up there and I used to work. That was when I was 11 now. From nine in the morning, just on Saturdays, just Saturday mornings, that was all, one day a week. Nine in the morning 'till 12 noon, I would work there. And at the end of the day, he'd give me 50 pennies. Fifty cents (laughs).

So, that was my working years. You know, when I was a teenager and younger.

Q: Did you say you caddied at both Fox Chapel and the Field Club?

A: No, just Field Club. But, a lot of the kids caddied at Fox Chapel, also. I went Field Club. I don't know why, why the choice them, I don't know.

Q: Do you remember who the caddy master was?

A: Yes. His name was Kelly. Now, that was his last name, I don't know his first name. Very strict, very thin guy with glasses. Yeah, I remember him. He was very strict, he didn't take nothing from all the caddies, you know.

Q: How did you get out there?

A: Walked.

Q: From Blawnox?

A: Yeah. We walked down the railroad tracks. Down to Fox Chapel Road. Right down to where the crossroads are right now. And then we'd thumb. And then if we were lucky enough, one of the members would be going out here, had a car and would stop and pick us up, they knew they were all caddies thumbing there. And, if we were running a little late and nobody was picking us up, then we'd walk. We'd walk all the way out to the Field Club and after we'd get out, 3 hours around the course carrying the bag, for a dollar, we'd walk home.

Q: Did you enjoy caddying?

A: Yeah, I did. I say it hesitatingly because it took away all your childhood then. You know, you're 14 and you're used to just doing nothing playing and working hard, like I said, gathering all that wood and everything, but we had a lot of time, we had gangs of guys playing ball and everything. But, once you started to caddy, that was all gone. Because, boy, all your time was devoted to that. If we had some time off it was unusual. You know, you had to go out and if you got skipped, if you were late, they put you on a list and you had to watch your name as it rose to the top of the list as they were calling caddies out. And, you knew when to go home and when not to, without getting out. Because you still had to go and check that list. And that took almost all the childhood away at that time.

Q: Where did you go to elementary school?

Blawnox. Blawnox school. They had a school up on top of the hill. The water tank's still there, but now there's all apartments there. Blawnox Public School.

Q: What is the first scene that pops into your head when I ask you about your grade school?

A: How far it was from our house (laughs). I could see it right from our front porch. We'd look up there and I'd say, oh, golly, I got to walk up there again? We walked in the mornings, rain, shine, winter, summer. We'd have to walk home for lunch. Had a half hour for lunch. We had to walk back up there. Three or four o'clock, I forgot when we got out, we had to walk home. So, that's one, two, three, four times a day we walked up that thing. It was well over a mile away. Probably like more than a mile and a half.

Q: Do you remember any of your teachers, principals?

A: Oh, yeah. First year, a lady taught me in first grade was Mrs. Swartz. Then there was, Mrs. Latice, was our History teacher. Not in first grade, in later years. There was a Mr. Lang, and I even think he had a sister that taught.

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And, Barnhardt. He later became principal, I think. He was a teacher. Highman, he was our shop teacher. I could probably think of more, but right now (laughs), that was about it.

Q: Were they **good teachers**?

A: Yes. They had a lot, you know, when I look back they had all these uneducated people. Very poor, from Blawnox. It wasn't a very rich town, believe me, and they had a lot to contend with and what they had to work with, us bunch of ruffians. They did a heck of a job, I think.

Q: Are there any **special friends** that you still think about or even see?

A: Friends? Yes, definitely.

Once a month, right now, we still go out to lunch. There started out to be about 16 or 18 of us, and we're down to seven. They either died off, or they quit, or they got too old or too sickly. But, right now, there's still me and my brother, Andy, go out every month. Every second Wednesday. We call it the Second Wednesday Men's Lunch Club. And we go out to eat in a different restaurant every Wednesday. There's me, my brother Andy, Jim Panza, from, I mentioned before. Joe used to come out, but any more, he got a little diabetes sickness and he decided he wasn't going to go anymore. Big Jim Mashella, he's still around Blawnox. But, he quit because his legs got too bad. He couldn't walk around too much. Bill Sproul still goes, even if he has two canes. He still runs a store down the bottom, and he still goes. Bill Roberts still goes. Tippy McMunn still goes. And, of all things, there's a guy that used to live up here on Montrose Hill, Jim Murdock. He never loafed with us. But, he always wanted to come to this Men's Club. We said, sure, come on! He was our age so he still comes. There are seven of us now that still.

And Jack Bataglia, remember I told you his dad used to huckster? Well, he went up until about two months ago. He died just two months ago. Jack Sharf, from Blawnox. He was one of our crew. He just died about a year ago. So, we're losing them. We're all in the seventies, between 70 and 75.

Q: I want you to imagine yourself in your house, at **10 years old or 5 years** after you moved in. It is a warm Summer afternoon. There is a nice breeze blowing. **What are you doing?**

A: In the house? On a nice, warm summer day, in my house?

Q: Or, would you be in there at all?

A: Well, probably not (laughs). At 10 or 12, I'd either be in school, if not in school I'd be down the river on a nice warm summer day. We lived in that river when it was warm. Swimming and just walking the shores and things like that. And, we took an awful lot of walks. At 10 or 12, I'm not sure whether we were permitted to go out in the woods, but (when we were) an older we did. Went down, it was called Ross Crik. It's in the Fox Chapel area now. But, it was all wooded then, no homes.

Q: If I were to ask you to walk out of your house, **which door** would you be most likely to use?

A: The front door, going out on to Fourth Street.

Q: If I ask you to walk over to your front door and step out, **what do you see?**

A: First of all, the railroad tracks were directly across the road. There's the main line of Pennsy, the Pennsylvania Rail Road. And across the rail road tracks was a ball field.

Q: Are there any **kids around?** If so, who in particular do you see?

A: Oh, yeah, at our young age we always had a gang of kids. There was a lot of kids in the neighborhood.

Q: Is the neighborhood **noisy?** What kind of sounds do you hear?

A: Well, only with the trains.

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I'll tell you what, at that time there was a County maintenance building two doors down and they had these big Mac trucks with chain drives and rattled all over the place and they actually had steam rollers. The big rollers that rolled the roads flat and so forth ran by steam and when they fired them up in the morning, it was noisy.

Q: Do you recall any particular **smells** such as flowers, smoke, fumes, cooking?

A: Well, yeah, the trains always roared down through on the rail road tracks and that sulfur smell stayed with you for a while. And the Workhouse always was next door. It was about a block away from where we lived. The Allegheny County Jail at that time, we called it the Workhouse. And they were always delivering coal and taking it away. The coal smell, sulfur, seems to stick in my mind.

Q: Is there much **traffic**?

A: Almost none. Except for the trains. No cars to speak of.

Q: If you now get an urge to **take a walk**, which direction will you head?

A: Well, if I wanted to go meet my friends, I would go to the right. Because, that was where the town was. To the left was the Workhouse. But, we usually ended up down on their property and down in the rail road yards where they parked box cars and we played down there or down the river. We were on the edge of town and so I would have to turn right (laughs). To meet my friends.

Q: Living on the bottom, did you **hang around much on the top of Blawnox**?

A: No, not at that age. We stayed pretty well down.

But, the big flood was in 1936. And I was, I guess, 10 or 11 years old then, I was born in '25, so I was 11, wasn't I, at the flood? But, after the flood we more or less started loafing around up top and we got a lot more friends up there and all met at the ball field or other places. But, before that, we stayed down there.

Q: If you were to get thirsty, what would you **most likely drink**?

A: Water, we had no money to buy anything down the store and once in a while, my parents made homemade root beer. And, oh boy, we really liked that, but it wasn't free for our taking. I remember we had to go and ask for it and they kept saying, "No! It's not done yet, wait a while" (laughs). We'd always want it before it was ready to drink, I guess. But, I remember the root beer and probably just plain water.

Q: Do you remember any special activities in Blawnox on **July Fourth**?

A: On the Fourth? You know, no I don't. I don't think they had fireworks then, nor did they have any parades of any kind. No, I don't.

Q: Do you remember any special activities in Blawnox on **Memorial Day** or Labor Day?

A: Yeah, Memorial Day. They had a parade and they always, right in the ball field across from where I lived, across the rail road tracks, they brought down a big cannon, I don't know who brought it down, the Army Reserve or something at that time, I have no idea. But, it was there! When they'd fire it, man, the whole town would rattle. They fired blanks, I remember that.

Q: But, you said they did have a parade up on Freeport?

A: I think so. Yeah, always on Memorial Day, yeah.

Q: Where did you go to **high school**?

A: Uh, well two years at Blawnox. See, Blawnox School was from grade 1 through 10.

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Q: Oh, it was?

A: Yeah. And then we had to go two years down Aspinwall. So, I finished up at Aspinwall High.

Q: What is the first scene that pops into your head when I ask you about your high school?

A: Well, the school, going down there to school. Because before that, gee, it was like a foreign country (laughs). We just couldn't get there, you know. But, when we started to go to high school, we found out there was life outside of Blawnox (laughs).

Q: How did you get there?

A: A bus. The Harmony Short Line had a bus, when I was 16. And that's when I started to go down there, 16, and 17 and 18, when I went down there. And we took a bus. And, I remember it was a nickel to go down. Right now I think it's a dollar and a quarter (laughs).

Q: Do you remember any of your **teachers, principals**?

A: Yeah. Kebah. I forgot his first name. Kebah was our principal. And everyone liked him. He was a good old guy. And, some of the teachers, yeah, we had Mrs. Lincolnfelter, (laughs) and she was the Art teacher. And Miss Reed was the English teacher and Mr. Trout, he just died here recently, he was my Mechanical Drawing teacher. That was some of them.

Q: Were they **good teachers**?

A: Yes, I thought they were very good, yeah. We got along all together (laughs).

Q: Are there any **special friends** that you still think about or even see (other than the group from grade school)?

A: From Aspinwall, only my wife, I married her (laughs). I met her in high school.

Q: So, you still see her from time to time?

A: Yeah, right (laughs). Yeah, we met in high school, but then we didn't go steady or anything in high school. And then after the Service, we started to date and finally got married.

Q: Do you remember any **school activities**? Dances, football games, basketball games, etc.?

A: Oh, football games. I liked them. We went to most of them and I remember Jim Patterson, he's living in a home now, Presbyterian home in Oakmont, he's in very bad shape. But, anyhow, he was a year ahead of us, and he had a car. About the only one around that had a car. And, he used to take us to most of the football games. And at that time we had the best football (team) in our class. I don't know if it was Class A or double-A or whatever, how they rated them, but they were all heavy. And we won. We went to all the football games. And, he rode us around to the games, I remember.

Q: What year did you graduate?

A: Forty-three. Nineteen-forty-three.

'41 was Pearl Harbor. And, all the guys, it seemed, couldn't wait 'til we graduated so we could join up.

Q: Where did you **hang out**, outside of school, when you were in high school?

A: Oh, well, we usually came right home, but on certain, a lot of occasions, when we had a quarter or so, in our pockets, to spend, we went down Bard's. It was an ice cream place, and it was on Brilliant Avenue, right where the 5 and 10 is now. There's a variety store down there, 5&10. And it was Bard's ice cream and all the high school kids hung out went down there, had a soda and so forth.

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Q: You said you got your **first car** after you got out of high school?

A: No, I didn't get a car until I was married. I was married before I got my first car. I was 22 (laughs).

Q: What was your first car? How much did it cost? Who did you buy it from?

A" Nineteen thirty-six Dodge sedan. And the back seat wasn't bolted down. When I took anyone for a ride in the back seat and I put on the brakes they ended up against the front seat, just slid forward (laughs). They all banged their knees (laughs). I remember that (laughs). I think it was about \$180. Something like that.

It was a used car lot, and I think I had to go way over South Hills. You know these people that are developing down there at Pittsburgh now, Buncher? He started out as a car dealer. Boy, now he's a multimillionaire, he's developing all the land around Pittsburgh and buying up all the buildings. That's who I bought it from. Years and years ago.

Q: If you were to picture yourself **back in your senior year of high school**, at 8 o'clock on a Friday or Saturday night in the early Fall, where would you be?

A: In high school? In Blawnox, there was a place called Clawson's. And we all hung out up there. It was up on the main road. Right now, there's a building up there, used to be the old vinegar factory, and then they tore that down and they built these apartments, and so forth, and it was a store, little variety store, and in the back room it had a juke box, about 4 or 5 booths, and we used to go up there and buy a bottle of pop and a bag of potato chips (laughs). Spend the whole evening up there, the girls and boys. It was just a hang out.

Q: When you were growing up in Blawnox, did you do things in **Aspinwall**?

A: No, not at that time. We went school there and that was it. And we, like I say, we went to Bard's once in a while for ice cream soda or a sundae or something, but back home we came, as soon as we can.

Q: Did you do things in **Sharpsburg or Etna**?

A: No. That was foreign country (laughs).

Q: Up the river in **Harmar, Cheswick, Springdale, Oakmont or New Kensington**?

A: We were sort of confined, without transportation and so forth.

Q: On **Montrose Hill**?

A: Yeah, yes, walking. And, at that time, I was interested in hunting a little bit, during my high school days, because my brother-in-law, he was a great hunter and he kind of introduced me to it and I used to go up on the Workhouse property and hunt pheasants and rabbits and I ended up a lot around Montrose Hill.

Q: When you were growing up in Blawnox, where was your favorite place to **shop for clothes**?

A: Ruben's. Corner of Blaw Avenue and Freeport Road, you know, the main road going through. It was called Ruben's Department Store. And they had shoes and clothes and everything there and that's where we shopped. Almost everyone in Blawnox shopped there.

Q: Where did you get a **haircut**?

A: Either Angelo Ragerri's Barber Shop or across the street, Flanagan's. We would see who was cheaper (laughs). That's was we'd go.

Q: Where did you to get an **ice cream** sundae/float/banana split?

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A: Well, that was again, that Clawson's, I was telling you. Where we hung out. It was like an ice cream store and variety store and so forth. And then there was also Eck's. E-C-K. They had a little store, restaurant. And we used to go in there and get some ice cream once in a while. When we had the money (laughs).

Q: When you were growing up in Blawnox, did you go to town **Pittsburgh** often?

A: Very seldom. Once in a while we'd go there. I remember my sister taking us down there. Once in a while, just to look around at Christmas and so forth.

Q: What is **your profession**?

A: Before I retired, you mean?

Q: Yes.

A: I was a Mechanical Draftsman for US Steel. And, we designed mechanical steel mill, heavy steel mill equipment. Like continuous casters and so forth, for the mills.

Q: Was your vocational selection **influenced by anyone in Blawnox** or any of your teachers?

A: Yes, by Mr. Trout. When I went to high school I took Mechanical Drawing, one year down there, and then I was going to take shop, you know, you had your choice or you could go a half year of each when you were in high school, take shop, wood working and so forth and he said, "With your ability to do this type work", he said, "why don't you just forgo the shop, and so forth, and stay steady with this", and he said, "I can almost guarantee you'll get a job". So, I did. I took Solid Mechanical Drawing and then after the, when I got out of the Service, I wanted to go to Pitt to become a Mechanical Engineer, and I didn't have the, all the Math or the academic subjects in high school. So, I was gonna go part time. I started, I took Trig and so forth, Trigonometry and it at night school and then I gave it up and went one year to Conley Trade School to learn Mechanical Drafting and immediately, after one year, I got a job. So, I just stayed in it.

Q: When you lived in Blawnox in the 1930's. you were very much aware of the **Depression**, from what you told me?

A: Oh, yeah.

b. Did you worry about Hitler in the late 30s?

You know, not in the least. No, he came to power in about the... '39, I think, well, no... actually, that's when he bombed Poland, I guess. It was probably before then... no, we never heard a thing about him.

Q: Do you remember doing things to aid the **war effort** when you lived in Blawnox in the 1940's ?

A: Well, like I say, Pearl Harbor was in '41, and I graduated high school in '43, and there used to be bond drives, for people to buy bonds. And, we didn't take part in that, but in school, we were told to bring our extra dimes and so forth, and you bought stamps. And after you bought so many of these stamps, you could buy them for a dime, I think a dime and a quarter and so forth, dollar stamps, they gave you a book. And, when you filled the book up, you got a 25 dollar War Bond. We used to do that, just 'cause all us guys (laughs) we didn't have much money. So, that's the only thing I remember, is buying those stamps.

Q: Do you remember any kids from Blawnox **servicing in the war**?

A: Oh, sure. Yeah, lot's and lots of them. A few of them didn't come back.

Well, they used to have an Honor Board down, you know where the Monument is in Blawnox now. They used to have everybody's name that served And then it got too much, 'cause there's too many wars and they couldn't keep up with (laughs) all of the people that were on there from World War One and, you know, World War

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Two and then Korea and Viet Nam and everything, so they just put a new memorial down there that recognizes everybody. But, before that it had everybody that lost their lives and everybody that served.

Q: Did you know anyone that was **killed in the war**?

A: Yeah, one guy, Ed Saybeck, I remember, in Blawnox. He never came back, he got killed. We used to loaf with (him). Well, there was a few more, but I just can't recall right now.

Q: Did you worry about **winning the war**?

A: Winning? No! You know, it never entered our minds. And boy, we were gung ho! We were gonna go over there and wipe the Japs and Hitler off the face of the map and that was it (laughs)! We were only 18 then (laughing). Nothing bothered us.

Q: Well, you **served in the Armed Forces**?

A: Yes.

Q: When was that? Was that right after school?

A: Yeah, when I was still in high school, I went down, in 1943, and I tried to volunteer for the Navy. At that time I wanted to be, go into the Navy. At that time, they weren't taking anyone that had glasses. My eyes aren't that bad, but I am nearsighted and I have glasses, and at that time- no way! Now, they'll take anybody, you know, they don't care about glasses. But, at that time, they didn't allow you so, they said, no, you can't volunteer for the Navy. So, I waited 'til I graduated, and immediately after graduation, I got a job in the Blaw-Knox Company and I only worked there a few months. I graduated, like, the end of May, and the end of July I got my notice, my draft notice, that I was drafted, you know.

And, funny little antidote there, (laughs), Danny. After I was drafted, I went down, I passed my tests with flying colors, you know, glasses or no glasses. The Army was taking everyone with glasses. The Navy wasn't. So, when I passed the tests, you go through all this rig-a-moroll, at the end of the line, there was an officer sitting there and he said, "OK, you passed. You're going in the Service", he says, "What do you want to be in, the Army or the Navy?". I almost dropped off the chair! I said, I just tried to volunteer and they wouldn't take me. Certainly, I want to be in the Navy. Got this big stamp. Boom!, he stamped my papers, he says, "Son, you're in the Navy". And, I looked at the paper and it said, "United States Seabees ". And, I said, what are they (laughs)? I never heard of them. And, he said, "It's a branch of the Navy. You're in the Navy, goodbye". Well, I found out! The only thing about the Navy, we wore the Navy uniform. We were trained by Marines, and we were a construction outfit. And, we built airports and airport runways and cleared minefield and built barracks. And we were just a construction outfit (laughs). We were the workers of the Navy. And, anything they wanted done, you know, building, well, then they called us.

Q: When were you inducted?

A: In July of '43. As soon I graduated.

And, I got out in about 30 months later in, oh let me see, my birthday's in February, and I remember I was up in Sampson, New York, up around where you are (laughs). I got discharged from Sampson, New York. That was through the Navy. In '46. February of '46.

Q: Where all did you serve?

A: The Pacific. We took our training down there in Gulfport, Mississippi, and we were shipped out to Wyanimi, California. From there, we went down to San Diego and were shipped to Hawaii for 7 months. I didn't want to leave there (laughs). And then from Hawaii, we followed the recapture of the islands, we followed the invasion forces. And, unloaded ships and, you know, and just straightened out airfields and stuff. And, unloaded supplies mostly. For the invading forces.

We went to the Marshall Islands and Inowitah, Quadjelian, Bikini, where the A-bomb was exploded later on. Then, we went out on the invasion of Guam, three days after the invasion we were there unloading stuff right on

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the shore. It took 21 days to secure the islands, the Mariana Islands, Guam especially, was a big island. And, we were on a ship, unloading all these supplies on the shore, at night when we couldn't see anymore, you know, the ship would go way out in the ocean again. They were afraid of Kamikaze attacks in the harbor, and stuff. So, we went way out and, in the morning at dawn, we were right back, the ship pulled back in. We started to unload it. And then we went to another ship (laughs). That's what we were doing there. For 21 days, until the island was secure, we weren't allowed to the island. We were just on the ship unloading while all the poor Marines, and Army people were up there, fighting.

Q: Well, when I was a kid, and my grandparents lived in Blawnox, and my uncle was just 7 years older than me, there was a whole bunch of his friends that went to the Armed Service. And, they all went into the Navy. It seemed like that it was the thing. Now, was that true during the War? Was Blawnox, were the kids in Blawnox all eager for **the Navy**?

A: I don't think so. Like, my brother Andy's two years older, he went to the Air Corps. Bill Sproul went to the Air Corps. Olsen, he became a pilot, he was in the Air Corps. I'd say mostly the Air Corps. Kenny Bowser, who I went to school with, man!, he flew P-38s, he was in the Air Corps. I would say the Air Corps, and the Army, mostly. Bob Leya was in the Army. (A friend of mine.) No, I wouldn't say the Navy, hunt-uh.

Q: Did you think that the kids in Blawnox were significantly involved with **smoking in the 1930s**?

A: Oh, yeah, definitely. Yeah, I started to smoke when I was 14. I got a job out at the Field Club, caddying. And you had to get a doctor's permit to caddy. And we got one and we went out to caddy, and that's where I was introduced to smoking. All the older guys smoked and, boy!, that was the thing to do. And there was no thought of even that it was going to make you sick or give you cancer or anything back them. Boy, that was the thing to do (laughs).

Q: What about **alcohol**?

A: No. I don't remember anybody being involved with that. We just couldn't afford it! Maybe the older guys were, but not until after the Service, you know. That's where you got introduced to everything. When I went in... to the Service, the Armed Forces.

Q: What about **drugs**?

A: No, it was unheard of. Nobody even knew what marijuana was or anything like that, nothing. Cocaine, nothing like that.

Q: Are you glad that you ended up **growing up in Blawnox**?

A: Yeah. Yeah, when I look back, sure. I still have a lot of friends that I, like today, we just got done having our luncheon. There were 7 of us and talked about old times (laughs), and so forth. Your name was brought up because you wanted to talk to some of these older people. We're all in between, I would say, 70 and 75, you know, right now. I think Andy, my brother's 76 right now. Jim Panza's 75. Jim Murdock's a year older than me, he's 75. We're all about 75 (laughs).

Q: Did you ever consider **raising your family in Blawnox**?

A: No, I wanted better. See, we grew up poor and that's what I associate Blawnox with. At that time, (we) had nothing down there, you know. I had a lot of friends and I grew up, I guess, without getting into any big trouble but, no I wanted better for my family. I wanted out.

Q: Miscellaneous.

A: If you wanted more, I got a lot of other stories, Danny about the, we lived right next door to a speakeasy. That alone is one session. My gosh, you can't believe the fights I saw!

A Glimpse at Life in Blawnox in the 1930s and 1940s

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...now there was a **big flood** when I was eleven years old, you know, the 36. Nineteen-thirty-six, and it came up to within 6 inches of our second floor. I'm I still being recorded? OK, I want to give you one little antidote.

In the flood we had a cat and that was the only casualty of the flood. The prisoners again, from the Workhouse, volunteered to row across the railroad tracks, which was all flooded with water, to get clothes and stuff out of the houses that they could for us and when they landed on our porch, rowboat, they rode right onto the porch roof. That's how high the water was. When they went in the window the cat was upstairs and it jumped down into the water and it drowned. That was the only casualty of the flood.

You know what the name of that cat was? Nookie! Could you believe that? And, I did not know, I was eleven years old, what that even meant, and my sister used to tell us every night- you go out and call the cat. We used to call the cat. She said, "I'm not going out and call that cat". We used to go out, me and my brother, would go out on the porch, we'd go "Here Nookie, Nookie" (laughs). And we didn't know what it meant (laughs). Oh, boy!

I tell her about that and she just smiles!

A Glimpse at Life in Blawnox in the 1950s An Interview with William J. “Bones” Nowak

This is an edited transcription of an interview with William J. Nowak conducted in June of 2004. Bill, as he was known to his family, was born in the coal mining town of Logans Ferry near New Kensington, Pennsylvania in 1941. Just before the start of the Second World War, his family moved into the Shadyside section of Pittsburgh and his father, Joseph, went to work at the Union Switch and Signal plant in Swissvale making parts for aircraft. The family moved to Blawnox right after the war, probably in 1946.

When Bill entered his teen years he put on height quicker than weight and was six foot – three inches tall while weighing less than 140 pounds. One day when he was leaving the house with some of his friends his father nonchalantly asked him, “Where are you off to, Bones?” The nickname stuck.

The interview was conducted over the phone by Dan Nowak (his nephew) with Bill at his residence in Florida. The editing is an attempt to make it more readable. Editor’s notes and alterations of personal references are shown in {brackets}, probable missing words, due to difficulties hearing the tape recording, are in (parenthesis).

{First moved to Blawnox: 1946
Ten years old: 1951 }

Q: Do you remember what the address was of the house where you lived when you **first moved to Blawnox**?

A: I think it was 138 First Street. The house right beside the one we {later} rented off of Bill Sproul.

Q: Did your parents **own or rent**?

A: No, they owned that house, they bought that house.

Q: Who were the **first people that you encountered** when you first moved out into the neighborhood?

A: I think the first real friend that I had in that town was Jimmy Farine that lived almost directly across from 140, where we rented. And I started to get to know Richard Huminsky, that lives down at the Courts down there, and another kid by the name of Frank Burke. And, Richard Clarrie, Ronnie Wiepo, who lived about half way up the hill there; Chuckie Roach, who lived in the Courts there, and Lee Smith, who also lived in the Courts; and Eugene Hughes, he lived about, almost catty-corner to where we moved in there. He used to live in the second row of houses, you know, on Second Street. He lived in about the second or third house over. And, those were usually the playmates that I had, that grew up there altogether, you know. Those were the bunch of guys that I hung out with.

Mainly what we did was, if it was during the school year, we would all go to school Monday through Friday, way up on top of the hill, which was; Center Avenue, if you went way up the top there used to be a school up there. It was the **Blawnox School**. And, we used to go all the way up the top of that hill, and it was OK in the summertime but in the wintertime it was kind of rough. I would say it was a good quarter of a mile or more, a third of a mile from our house. But, coming down from school it was kind of easy because it was all downhill, and we were pretty good joggers and we used to run all the way down to the bottom for lunch, and then we’d go back to school.

And, most of the time **after school we played** the normal games; leap frog, basketball, mushball up in the field. You know, half way up the hill, on the left-hand side up on Center Avenue, there’s that ball field up there, we used to play in that ball field. And, if we got real interested we would go down into the swampland which was behind the old Workhouse, down there, and we would go fishing down behind the Wall, and half the time we’d give comic books to the prisoners and the prisoners would give us comic books back. We’d trade with the prisoners (laughing), right there in the field. And, when they would go in a lot of time we used to go down there and we used to get tomatoes and have tomato battles and a couple of times we got chased out of there by the guards up there but they could never catch us, they weren’t as fast as we were. And, a lot of times we’d go down there and we’d get corn and everything and take it down to old Popeye at the end of Center Avenue and have corn roasts.

Q: That {**Popeye**} was the beach there?

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A: Yeah, that little beach right at the end of Center Avenue there. We used to spend (time) down there. Mr. Farine had a boat and I used to hang out a lot with Jimmy and we'd go water-skiing as we started to grow up a little bit and we'd got boating and spend a lot of time over on **Nine Mile Island**. We'd go over there after we'd ski all day and then we'd sleep in one of Jimmy Farine's, his brothers all bought a boat and we'd take that, and we'd all chip in for gas, jeeze, that was when gas was 18 or 19 cents a gallon. And, we'd get a dollar, gee, you could get five gallon of gas. That would last us all day, you know, for what it cost us. And, we'd go over there and we'd spend most of the time on the island and we'd take hot dogs and hamburgers and everything and we'd spend the whole night there on the island, come back in the morning. We'd be swimming half the night and everything. We would walk down along the beach down behind the Blaw-Knox mill and we would swim from the shore on the Blawnox side to what they called Bird Island. And then from Bird Island we'd swim over to Nine Mile Island where all the sand and the beach was. On Bird Island it wasn't very good because it was filled with mosquitoes and stuff like that, you know. It wasn't as cleared out, I guess, as the Nine Mile Island. And then if we got real brave, we'd swim over to behind Nine Mile Island to the other side of the river which is a place they called The Rocks. We'd go over there and they had these big, high boulders that hung out over the water. Well, we'd climb out on these boulders and do swan dives and flips off of these boulders into that water and then when we got all tired out we'd come home.

Most of the time, we hung out at **Sproul's store** right there on the corner. On one side of his store he had a big slab. It was like a porch but he had no roof on it or anything at this time. And, that was like the meeting place. If you wanted to find somebody, you know, after dinner or Saturday when you got up, if you were hanging out and you didn't find anybody, you went over there to Sproul's. If it was on a Saturday they were all inside and we were sitting on an old coke machine and we'd sit there and wait until somebody came or else we'd sit outside if it was nice and wasn't raining, on the slab and sure enough, somebody else would come along, and then, somebody else would come along and we'd play cards there, penny ante, and we'd sit there and drink our old Pepsis and that. And then, when we got enough of us, we'd figure out what we were going to do. We'd either go up and play basketball or go fishing or go swimming or go down and have a beach party or something like that. And, as we got older we did change a little bit and we got into that beer drinking stuff (laughs). Well, that's the place we'd go. We'd all go down there on the beach and we'd sit around. A lot of times, we built an old shack down there and, just to keep us out of the rain, and we'd sit down there and play cards and fish half the time. And that, basically, was most of the stuff that we did when we were growing up. We had a good, care-free life and there was a bunch of (us) that all hung out and they were all what they called the "Bottom Boys". We were on the downhill from Route 28, which was the main street in Blawnox; most of the guys which we hung out with were from the Bottom. And, every once in a while, you know, we'd cross over and go up and hang out with those guys up there and do the same old thing, you know, play basketball and have parties and stuff like that, but growing up in Blawnox was what I would call one of the best times of my life. You know, {my parents} were not very strict on me and I wish they were as I was growing up because I sort of grew up wild, doing anything that I wanted to do, smoking, drinking, you know, those kind of things. And, I wish my dad would have taken a switch and popped me on the butt when I decided to quit school and everything, but it's just one of those things, (they were) kind of easy. But other than doing what I did, if I could go back, say 45, well almost 50 years to those days when we were young kids and doing what we did, some of the best time that we've had in life growing up. I mean, you always had something to do down there even though, you know, you didn't have any organized places to go, where kids would go to like a gym or you didn't have any of these places to go to where you play basketball inside, or anything like that. So, basically growing up was what we made for ourselves. There was always something to do, always somewhere to go. The only time that used to get, how can I say it? When we were in school, Sunday evening would seem like it would close in on us and everybody would drift off because they had homework to do. And me, I didn't really (laughs), I wasn't much for homework so usually I stayed out with Jimmy and Richard Huminsky and we just hung out until it got around eleven, eleven-thirty, at night and then we would all go home and then we would go to school the next day. Well, going to school was, I don't know, I really didn't like school; I really hated school pretty much. I more or less wanted to be out on my own and I wanted to do something while I was young. I didn't know what I wanted to do. One time I ran away and I thought I was miles and miles away. I was going to be either on a ship or something, or be a sailor or something, or sail the seven seas, I didn't know. But I wanted to do something on the ocean. And, lo and behold, as I was walking the railroad tracks going up through this town, and across the railroad tracks, there come your dad, he (laughs), he says, "You little shit, you. Where in the hell do you think (you're going)?" I says, "I don't know. I'm just out on my own; I'm going to make it on my own." So, he took me home and that was that. But I remember that when your dad came, and I thought, oh well, there goes my plans for being a sailor on the seven seas.

Q: How old were you then?

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A: I don't know, I was probably about 13 or something like that. I can't really remember the age I was, probably around 13 or 14. But, I really didn't like school; I hated school with a passion. And, I didn't like doing homework. But, as we grew up and we transferred down to, Blawnox only went up to 10th grade up there. We went down (to Aspinwall), and when everybody left 10th grade up there it just seemed like that was the end of everything. Because, everybody was going places, they were splitting up, and there wasn't much companionship as close as it was. And when I was going to school down in Aspinwall we had to either take a bus or hitch a ride or that and I didn't really like that idea. And Richard had quit school, and one day I was standing in the office and I looked out the window, and I saw Jimmy, my best buddy, he was walking out and I says, "Where's Jimmy going?" And, they says, "Well, he just quit school." And, that was like the beginning of everything, you know. But, the younger years were the best years, because, as soon as you got up somebody was always yelling outside your door, you know, "Hey, Bill. Hey, Bill." Or, I could walk across the street to Jimmy's house and him and I used to hang pretty tight. And we'd always do something, you know. So, growing up in Blawnox, I would say those were the best years of my life because, like I said, once everybody started going places, you know, one of the guys met a girlfriend, I can't remember her name, it was Chuckie, and then John met a girl and they got married and everybody was like drifting apart and splitting up. And, the old gang wasn't there anymore. And once the old gang wasn't there anymore it seemed like being a kid was no more, you know. You wish that (it) would have went on forever. But, most of the time we really had a good time growing up. There was always something to do. Like I said, even though there were no special places to go, no gyms or anything like that, no recreation halls or anything, we always found something to do. Ride bikes, we'd get old bikes and fix them up and ride them around. Couple of times we got an old wash machine motor, which was gas, and we turned it into a go-cart and we had one of the little kids ride around in it, because it was too big for us, but we made it run. We were always doing something. Most of the time, though, growing up, in the younger years, we were always on that river. I mean, we were on that river from morning until night. We'd be waterskiing, or (I'd be) fishing with {my brother} Joe. Joe used to come down with {his wife} Charlotte, and we'd go down the river and we'd fish, and those were some of the precious moments that I really had with my brother. I really enjoyed that town, but just recently when I went to Joe's, my brother's funeral, up there in Pittsburgh. I took some time, it was a couple days after the funeral that I was going to stay the whole week up there and do some visiting, and I went back to the home town. And, I went in and I talked to Bill Sproul and we were reminiscing about old times and old things and I tried to locate a few of my old friends but everything seemed different. I looked across the street where Carol Provich used to live and I walked the streets and went up and down and, where {my parents} used to live. The houses, the fronts of the houses, changed. But, I did notice one thing. As I looked into the yard at 140 First Street, in the driveway there, that's where Bill Sproul's daughter lived, there's a big tree in the middle of the yard. And my Mom, she planted that from a little wee thing in the ground. And, I looked down the driveway and, boy, that tree is just as big and as, oh, it's beautiful. And, I thought, gee, that's the tree that Mum planted. Then I went down on the beach and I walked on the beach and we used to take a stone and put it in our hand and use it like a hammer and we would smack the wall and try to make our initials in there, like beat the stone so that we could have the initials. And, I looked and looked on these walls and tried to find my initials and they're just gone (laughs). And then I walked the beach along there a little bit and I remembered that some of the rocks there that have been there for ages and ages, that (were) part of the wall (that) fell down and they had rebuilt the wall. And, I sat on that rock where I used to sit and fish and it just seemed like it was so small compared to when I was a kid. And I walked further on down to where the, we used to call it Popeye, at the end of Center Avenue there, and there's docks down there and everything and it was so changed that all I could look for was just memories. And, I walked up and down the streets of Blawnox, and there was people that lived there that I didn't know anymore. I mean, it was 50 some years, you know, 50 some years that I had seen these people. And, of course some of them were living there, but they were people that I didn't associate with. They still live there, but I never knew them, you know. And to tell you the truth, if right now I went back to that home town of Blawnox, there's probably, one, two, three, maybe four people in there that I could locate and talk to and one of them was Bill Sproul. The other one was Richard Cleary, he still lives down there. Richard Huminsky still lives down there but he's kind of in bad shape with his heart and everything. And the other one was Chuckie Greene, which, I didn't associate too much with Chuckie, but I knew him, you know, as he was growing up. But, as far as anyone else in that town, me going back to that town and living, I would have to say, in this point of my life, no, that was not my home town anymore. It's just gone. It's faded into the ages along with all the people that I knew. And, the only thing I have left is memories. So, growing up, like I say, was really a place to be, there was always something to do, always somebody to play with, always somebody to get in contact with. And, the summers seemed like they were just so great, because, you know, it was like an endless summer. You had everything to do. You always had a million and one things to do. But, when we got into those 17 and 18 years, it just seemed that was the time when

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everybody was splitting up. You turned your back and somebody else was moving to Maryland, they were married. Someone was moving to Erie. Someone was doing this, you know, and it dwindled down and dwindled down. There was nobody left (sighs). It just faded into history, Dan, is what it did. Like I said, the only thing that’s probably really there, from the yesteryears, is Bill Sproul’s store on the corner. I stopped in and I saw him and he’s getting up into age and we, like I said, tried to go through some of the memories and the things and the stupid stuff that we did. But, everybody’s gone. That’s the way of life, you know.

Q: That’s what fifty years will do.

A: (Laughs.) Fifty years will change everything in a person’s life and you just have to either accept it because when I go back there, and like I said, when I look around, there’s nothing there that I can actually put my hands on, you know. The school is gone, the house where we lived was changed, people that lived there, I didn’t know anymore. The Wilhoits were gone, you know, everybody was gone, the Senecals were gone, the Farines were gone, the Hughes were gone, you know, everybody just disappeared. Growing up, like I say, those were the years that you just have memories of them but, you know, it’s going to pass. And, fifty years, well, it’s gone.

Q: Did you go to **indoor theaters** when you were growing up?

A: Yes, once in a while.

Q: Was there any in Blawnox when you were growing up or had that theater closed?

A: Oh, no, that theater in Blawnox used to be up on the main street. And, I remember being about 10 or 11 or something like that and we used to go up to that theater up there. And in school they used to give you a card with your name on it and you presented it (and) you got to see the movie and you got a free box of candy, at the movie. Which, you know, it was a real small box, but it was something. It was pretty neat.

Q: That was the one that was on Freeport Road right about where Witas Market was?

A: Yeah, then Witas moved out of there, too. I think it used to be, right now there’s a music store beside it, or something. Because, I passed there one day and I says, Geez, I said, there used to (be the theater), now I think that place is an apartment or something.

Q: Did you have a **curfew**?

A: Normally, when we were kids, there used to be a, Mike Biolotti was the chief of police in that town. And, Mike was usually on the upper half. We never saw Mike up on the upper half because he patrolled up there and was up by the station. But, we had two policemen that used to be down there. And, one of them was Lee Smith. And, he was a real nice guy. And, we had Buddy Wysocky, he was real nice, too. And, they would just come around and they would say, “Hey, can’t you guys keep it down to a small riot?”, or, “Move to the next corner”, you know, “you’re waking people up.” They never really chased us off the streets, you know. We could be sitting there and he’d come by at eleven-thirty at night, twelve or one and we’d be sitting there playing cards, penny ante, and smoking cigarettes. He wouldn’t say too much, just you know, “Hey, keep it quiet. Don’t cause anyone to wake up or anything like that.”

Q: Did your family have a **vegetable garden**?

A: {My mother} had some vegetables and she had flowers back in the yard. Vegetables, I don’t think too much. But, she did have some vegetables in the back yard. Tomatoes and stuff like that. She had a big square chunk right in the center of the yard, boy (laughs). She would grow flowers all along, when we lived at 140, as you came down the back steps, she grew flowers all the way from the garbage cans (which) were at the bottom of the steps on the right all the way to the steps where you go down to the beach. And then in the middle of the yard she grew flowers, too. And, we had a cherry tree in that yard, which gave out the best dang whole cherries in the world. Well, we used to climb up in there and just sit there and pick them and get 60, 70, 80 of them. They had seeds, you know, the big seeds in them. And, when they got ripe, oh boy! They were black cherries, they were the best! But, we used to climb up in that tree.

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Oh, and one time, in the winter time, OK?, and the flood waters are coming down and it's about five feet from the top of the wall. Ice and everything. Muddy brown water coming down. We climbed up, put our bathing suits on (laughing), it was a warm day. And, we **climbed up in the cherry tree and we're diving out** of the cherry tree and the current was taking us down. And, we'd have to swim like hell to get to the next pair of steps or else we were gone down the river. (Laughs.) Well, I remember Mum coming down there, Mum and everybody else, boy, they tarred us, yelled at us and, boy, they slapped us on the heads and everything else and said, “You guys are crazy, jumping in that water like that.”, you know. It was icy water, but we were just kids, you know. We were just kids and we didn't know the dangers of it all, but that's, I can't remember how old we were, probably about, oh, I don't know, about 12, 13 or 14, somewhere in that age. But, that's one of the things that we did, down there.

Q: Where did your parents take you if you needed to see a **doctor**?

A: Most of the time, Dan, I grew up without a doctor, or without having a family doctor. I never had one. Oh, wait a minute. If I got a slash or a cut or something that needed stitches, come to think of it, yeah. There was an old doctor, right at the top of the hill. If you went up Center Avenue, there's a car dealership on the right as you're going to the top of the hill. I can't think of the name of it. But, right across the street from him was Dr. Travis. And, he was an old doctor and he'd stitch your head up. Which he did, he stitched my head up. He stitched my lip up, too. What happened was, I was a kid, and we were jumping on these, where Royston's was, down the end, they didn't have any fences around there or anything and we got on the inside (and) we were jumping on these barrels, from barrel to barrel, playing catchers. And, as I jumped from one barrel to another, my foot slipped off the edge and I came down and I hit a barrel. And, the edge of the barrel smashed a hole in my head. I guess it was about an inch and a half, right above my left eye. I went up there and I had to get stitches put into that. That's where I went, up to Doc Travis, right up the top of the hill. That was the doctor.

Q: Besides high school, did you go **into Aspinwall much**? Did you do much in Aspinwall?

A: When I was a teen-ager, the only thing we used to do was go down to the Aspinwall football games. That was the only thing that I had to do with Aspinwall. I went to school down there for a little while, then I quit, but other than that, the only thing we went down (there for) was to go down and watch the football game down in Aspinwall.

Q: Did you ever go to **Pittsburgh**?

A: Uh, Pittsburgh...

Q: I'm talking when you were a kid, teen-ager, early teens.

A: I think a couple times we went down there to Pittsburgh just to drive around to see what it was like at night. But, did we ever go to a ball game, or anything like that, no. I went to a football game one time in Pittsburgh once when O. J. Simpson was playing Pittsburgh. And, he was playing for Buffalo and he outran the Steelers so bad that I just sat in the chair and fell asleep. I said, I ain't watching the rest of this game (laughing). But, that was way back. I remember him, I'm looking at him watching O.J. come running down the field and everybody was standing there with their hands on their hips, and he just, right into the end zone. You know, I says, I ain't watching this game anymore.

Q: When you were growing up in Blawnox, where was your favorite place to **shop for clothes**?

A: I think, {Dad and Mum} used to take me up to, on the main road up there, you know where the Blaw-Knox Division mill is? What's that road that comes up from there to the hill, the main office?

Q: Blaw Avenue.

A: Is that Blaw Avenue? Well, right at the top of the hill, there was a red light there. And, right on the right hand side there was a store. Now that I think about it, now that you brought it up, it was the old-time store where they had the blue jeans laying on the tables in front of you and the shirts laying on the tables and the jackets.

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Q: This was on the right hand side as you were going up the hill?

A: Yeah, I think they called it Fineman’s. And, that was where Mum used to take me for my school shirts and that. And, my blue jeans, we always wore blue jeans. And, Fineman’s had a store, clothing and shoe store. And, that’s where I used to get my shoes. Right there, in Fineman’s. Most of the time we would wear, back in those days they had what they called the blue suede shoes. They were leather with some kind of a felty stuff all over them and everybody had to have a pair. They were either laced up or else they had these snaps on them, like, it looked like a tongue. You lifted it down and it opened the shoe and then you pulled it back up. It slid on these metal tracks, like. Everybody had to have a pair of them and I had my first pair. My mom thought they were the weird shoe (laughs). I liked them because everybody had a pair, you know, because, I guess, those were the Elvis days and everything and he was singing that song, “Blue Suede Shoes”, so everybody started wearing them.

Q: Where did you go to get a **haircut**?

A: There was two barber shops in that town at the time I was a kid. And, I think one of them is still there today. If you went up Blaw Avenue and you turned right on Route 28 there, you know, main street, and you went down a little bit, there used to be a barber shop there. I used to go in there, and I think it was, geez, I can’t remember, either a buck, or buck and a half, I can’t remember. It was pretty cheap to get a haircut there. And then, if you went further on down, like towards the Oakmont Bridge, there was a barber shop there. It’s still in business today because I did see it as I was back home a couple months ago, right there. Either one of those two places. And then, a lot of times, {my brother} Joe, since he worked in the funeral home, he would give me a haircut. And, a lot of the times, we wore our hair real long as we grew up and were teenagers. We wore that big pompadour in the front, you know. You pushed that wave and it hung way out over your forehead. You combed your hair way back on the sides into a ducktail, you know. That’s something that’s gone. I don’t see any of that around anywhere today. But, we combed our hair like that. And, basically, when you went to the barbershop, all he did was trim around a little bit, you know, get it off your neck and everything.

Q: If you wanted to go get yourself an **ice cream sundae** as a kid, where would you go?

A: Well, I think I only did it maybe once or twice, do you know where the memorial is, where the Hoboken Church is in Blawnox?

Q: Yes.

A: OK, well, if you’re coming down Route 28 and you come to that road where the Hoboken Church used to be, you keep going straight and there’s a memorial there on the left, I think. Well, right in that area there there used to be a soda shop where you could go in and they had those old green fountains where the mixers were and everything. And, every once in a while, when we were out roaming around, you know, going here or going there, we’d stop in there and we’d get a cherry phosphate or one of those ice cream things, a sundae or banana split or something like that. They were, like, 45 cents or something like that and with three scoops of ice cream. They were pretty good. But, that’s where we went. But, I very seldom went up there, because most of the time we were on foot and you had to walk all the way up. But, that’s where you got it.

Memories of Blawnox in the 1950s and 1960s

Daniel C. Nowak, Jr.

These are additional recollections by me, Dan Nowak, the interviewer, transcriber and editor of the previous interviews. I was born in 1948. My paternal grandparents, Ann and Joe Nowak, lived on First Street from just after the Second World War until her death in 1979, most of the time at 140 First Street, where they rented from Bill Sproul. My parents and I lived with them at 138 First Street (a house that they owned for a while) for a year or so after my birth and then in an apartment that was on Center Avenue at the railroad tracks owned by the Sasnowski family. My immediate family moved from Blawnox about 1954. We moved to Montrose Hill in September of 1957.

{First moved to Blawnox: 1949

My first memories of Blawnox were right around 1950 and included the big snow of that time. When we lived with my grandparents at the house that they owned at 138 First Street, I was too young to wander much and my world was that house and the yard. My strongest memories of that time are of standing at the end of the yard looking at the river. There was constant activity in the form of people walking along the river, pleasure boats and tugs pushing barges. When we moved to the apartment by the railroad tracks, I was still not old enough to wander very far on my own. It was only later after we moved out of Blawnox and came back to visit my grandparents that I really got to know the town and its people.

There are a couple of things that I do remember from our time in the apartment that I want to discuss.

The first was the railroad tracks (and there were two at that time). A story was told to me by my mother. First of all, you have to be aware that in the early 1950s rail freight dominated and there was probably 20 to 50 times the train traffic as there is today. The Brilliant Cutoff rail bridge at Aspinwall handled hundreds of trains a day at its peak. Trains were coming through Blawnox at regular intervals and you had a better than even chance of being caught at the gate by one every time you tried to go from the Bottoms to the upper part of Blawnox. Sometimes, while waiting for the northbound to pass, a southbound would start by. Personally, I loved it as a kid. But getting back to my mother's story, she told us that the first night that they stayed in the apartment, a train came through at night and, as required, blew its whistle, sending my Dad into the air and onto the floor. She said that all she could do was sit there and laugh at him on the floor in a sitting position with a look of total bewilderment on his face. With time, she told us, they got used to the trains and stopped noticing them at all, at least enough to sleep through the whistles. I think that this was the case with everyone in the town. The trains were ever present, but after a while no one paid attention to them.

The second memory that I have of that time was the grocery store right across Center Avenue from the apartment. It was known a "Sophie's" and was run by Sophie Kapala. {See the 1940 Census record for Enumeration District 2-34, sheet 12A, lines 31-34.} Mostly, I remember the penny candy. We frequented Sophie's because my grandparents shopped there at the time. He shopped there because Sophie was Polish as he was and at first felt more comfortable with her and could speak Polish with her. Later, however, they had a falling out over his tab and he switch to Bill Sproul's store at the other end of the block, where he stayed for the rest of his time in Blawnox. I should mention that it was common for all of the small grocers to maintain a tab for their regular customers and they would pay off the tab on pay day. This made it easier for parents to send one of their kids to the store to pick up something as they did not have to worry about the kid losing the money.

Most of my memories of Blawnox in the post-World War II era came from the period of roughly 1957 through 1970 when my immediate family was living on Montrose Hill and my grandparents were living first at 140 First Street and later at 118 First Street. Since my grandparents lived on First Street, these memories are mostly centered on the area between the ball field and the river.

In general, there was a different feel to the Bottoms then than there is now. When I walked along First and Second Street a few years ago, I noticed a couple of things that were different. First, there was the lack of children and the noises associated with children. If it were 1958 there would have been children of all ages all along both streets, either on the sidewalks or in the yards. There also always seemed to be a few of the neighbors holding a

conversation across a fence. My grandmother had a knack for learning languages and I remember walking around with her and having her speak to the various neighbors in two or three different languages (Polish, Slovak, Croatian or Italian) as we made our way through the neighborhood.

Another thing that sticks out as different now from 1957 is the lack of flowers. I recall that in the 1950s and 1960s everyone had a garden in their yard and sometimes covering the whole yard. It seems that while they all grew some vegetables in the center or back of these gardens that the borders were all flowers. As you walked down the street you could see flowers in every yard and along every walkway. I always felt that these people, having gone through the hard times of the Great Depression and the Second World War, still had the habit and personal duty of having at least something of a vegetable garden, but that once times improved in the post war period, they wanted the color and beauty of the more frivolous flowers as if to thumb their noses at the hard times that they finally had overcome.

Speaking of the Second World War, I remember on several occasions during the 1950s hearing Blawnox residents tell stories of how their sons were in the Service and while serving in the Pacific, saw a radar tower with the nameplate proclaiming that it was made by Blaw-Knox company in Blawnox, Pennsylvania and proudly telling their buddies that Blawnox was their hometown, and that probably their father or uncle worked on that tower.

Getting back to gardens, I remember seeing the Whiteman garden when I was very young, at least younger than 7 years old. It was at the west end of Second Street between First and Second. It seems to me that it covered the entire area that is now taken up by the Royston parking lot and adjoining building. I remember the old frame house right on Second Street and the rest of the yard, which appeared two or three times the size of the other lots along the street, entirely filled with vegetables. The entire yard was garden. There was no grass and no flowers. My grandmother referred to it as Johnny Whiteman's place, so I assume that he was the only one of the family left at that time. The garden was very healthy and the soil was black. Mr. Whiteman was in the garden and stopped to talk with my grandmother for a while. He looked to be ancient to me as a young boy. He gave my grandmother a couple of tomatoes. {The 1940 Census shows John E. Whiteman as 67 years old, which would have made him about 82 years old when I was 7 years old. In 1940 he was living with his older sister, Margaret, and younger brother, Robert. The Whiteman family first appears in the then village of Hoboken in the 1880 Census. There were seven children in the family at that time.}

I also always remember a lot of bird song when I visited my grandparent's house in the summer. My grandmother enjoyed the bird song as they had lived in the city for five years before moving to Blawnox. She had an ear for the birdsong and could identify specific individuals. If a particular bird song was missing for a while, it caught her attention and she surmised that the cat probably got it.

There were several other reasons to be in Blawnox when I was a kid. One was attending Mass and CCD at St. Edward's. After church I would often walk down to First Street and spend Sunday with my grandparents. I was the oldest of nine children, so that day relaxing by the river was true R&R for me. I would often run to Sproul's store on Center Avenue for my grandmother. It was always a center of activity with older kids sitting on the concrete slab at the side of his building and younger kids playing on the sidewalk in front. There always seemed to be one or two people already in the store waiting to be served when I walk through the door.

Another activity that took me into Blawnox at that time was the Little League baseball, run by the BCA (Blawnox Community Association). Montrose Hill was (and still is) in O'Hara Township. While there was a league that played on Powers Run, it was much easier for the kids from the Hill to walk down to Blawnox then to Powers Run. Participation in that league would have required that an automobile be available, which was not always the case. At the time that I participated, there were probably only 8 to 12 kids from the Hill in the age group that would be playing on the Little League level, so they were assigned to different teams. (Later, the Hill contingent grew to where they were able to field their own team. My brother Ken coached them at that time.)

Getting back to the BCA league of the 1958 through 1960 era, I recall that it was four teams. They were sponsored by the Athletic Club, Sportsman's Club and the two Blaw-Knox unions. Therefore the names were: the Sportsmen (wearing red trim), the Athletics (wearing black trim), 1243 and 2826. The two numbered teams wore blue and green, but I cannot remember which was which at this time. There was a fifth team called the Merchants that would only be activated when there were enough kids. They wore purple with the name of a different Blawnox

merchant on the back of the uniform. No one wanted to be assigned to that team. They just did not look cool. I played for the Sportsmen and really liked the red. Emil Heintzinger was our coach. The Allegheny County Workhouse was still in existence at this time and I recall one or two of the guards that used to throw down a quarter or half dollar every time that someone hit a home run. That was big money at the time.

Another memory that I have that I associate with those times and baseball was the enthusiasm that everyone had for the Pittsburgh Pirates in the years around their 1960 World Championship year. I recall walking home from a Little League game and hearing the Pirate game on the radio. It seemed as if you could walk through the entire town and from porch to porch and through the open windows we would not miss any of the game until we left Blawnox and started up through the woods to Montrose Hill.

Another reason to venture into Blawnox at that time was to get a haircut. I recall going to Joe Flanagan's for a while because he was least expensive and also Angelo's. Angelo's was the best if you wanted to pick up all of the latest local gossip. He kept track of everyone's comings and goings from his position at the center of town. They shops were both on Freeport Road.

We also came into Blawnox for the Fourth of July fireworks and fair at the ball field. I seem to recall the fair as starting later, maybe into the mid-1970s, but I am not certain.

The local post office at that time was also located in Blawnox. If you needed stamps or to conduct other post office business at that time and you lived either in Blawnox or eastern O'Hara Township, the Blawnox Post Office was where you would go to.

We often walked into Blawnox to the two closest grocery stores, Sullivan's and Witas Market. Both were on Freeport Road. Sullivan's was closest to the east end of town, in the 500 block, and Witas Market was a block further to the west. Both were on the south (river) side of the street. Witas Market was bigger and had a better selection. They also had good meats. They were more like a small supermarket. Sullivan's was definitely the "Mom and Pop" type of small grocery store, possibly the smallest in town. (I recall it as Felix's Market when we first moved to the Hill.) For us kids, it was easier to just pop into Sullivan's quickly and grab our Pepsi and bag of chips (always Wise), all for a quarter.

Of course, there were always the bars. My Dad used to stop at Skalski's frequently. We would pick him up at work at the Field Club and he would have to stop in for one beer while we sat in the car and waited. I also remember Emma's on Blaw Avenue at the corner with Pine. The door was on Pine. I recall going somewhere with my Grandfather and my Grandmother warning him not to stop at Emma's on the way back because she did not want her grandchildren exposed to the bar scene. I have a good recollection of what the inside looked like at that time so I guess he didn't pay much attention to her "request". Besides Skalski's and Emma's, the only bars that I remember were the two clubs, the Sportsman's Club and the Athletic Club, both on Freeport near the fire station and the Starlight Lounge, also on the same side of Freeport near Skalski's and the clubs. I am not into alcoholic beverages so I tend not to notice bars. There may have been more but I do not recall them. The same goes for beer distributors. I know there were a couple of them, but I could not say where they were.

I do remember Mosca's Drug Store by the Memorial at North and Freeport but do not recall ever going in there to the soda fountain.

I also remember a 5 & 10 just about across from the drug store. I loved to go there around Christmas time to buy inexpensive items for gifts. They would put an advertisement in the Pittsburgh Press that would make it look as if all of these trinkets were much larger than they were and a really great buy. They were not. Maybe that is why the store did not last.

Arlotti's Cleaners was another reasons to come into Blawnox, although our family seldom had a need for a dry cleaner.

There was also a separate Arlotti's shoe shop that I recall using once or twice. In those days men would buy leather shoes that could be re-soled several times. A good pair of shoes could be made to last a dozen years.

There always seemed to be an abundance of churches in the town. My family was Catholic so we attended St. Edward's on Cable at Walnut. It was a relatively new parish and church when we moved to Montrose Hill in 1957 and was growing fast. The other large church that I recall was the Hoboken Presbyterian Church on North just up from Freeport Road. Additionally, there always seemed to be two or three smaller churches along Center Avenue between Freeport Road and the train tracks. I recall one being the Christian and Missionary Alliance and another may have been a Methodist church.

I should mention that St. Edward's also had an elementary school in those days. They started with one or two grades and added a grade each year until they had a full eight grades. I never went there as I was too old. My brother Ken, who was born in early 1952, was in the first or second class to go through. So, my guess is that it started in about 1959.

Overbeck's Nursery has been there as long as I can remember.

Tower Auto was a Gulf gasoline and service station originally. My grandfather worked for Gulf Oil at their regional sales office in the Shadyside section of Pittsburgh as a janitor. In the 1950s when they were starting to push their credit cards, he was offered one by Gulf. He told his boss that he could not make use of one because there was no Gulf station in Blawnox. His boss was surprised that there was a town in western Pennsylvania without a Gulf station (Gulf being headquartered on Grant Street in Pittsburgh) said something like, "Well, we will have to look into that situation. Within six months there was a Gulf service station at the corner of Center and Freeport.

Also, speaking of gas stations, there was another gas station across Center Avenue that, I think, was an Atlantic, but I'm not certain.

I recall shopping in Fineman's on the south eastern corner of Blaw and Freeport (262 Freeport). This was a typical old time small town clothing and shoe store. As my uncle (Bill Nowak) mentioned, one half was shoes and the other half was clothing. Everything was out on tables so it was easy to browse. I seem to recall the husband covering the shoes and the wife the clothing half. They were almost what you would call stereotypical Jewish merchants. She was short and wore her glasses on a chain. He was thin and I seem to recall him in a brown suit with a vest. I recall my grandparents buying clothing from them. I do not think that my grandparents were much for bargaining, so they probably just left the store if the price was too high. I do recall, however, going to Fineman's with my dad to buy shoes. He would pick out the cheapest pair. Mr. Fineman would then tell him that he didn't want those and that he should buy the more expensive shoes for his kids because they would last longer and in the long run it was a better value. Dad would counter that the kid would outgrow them so quickly that it wasn't worth the extra price, and anyway, he just did not have that kind of money, and would you be willing to come down a bit? Mr. Fineman would lean back and move his arms from the crossed position to where the left hand was across his chin and ponder his position. He would then offer a price between the cheap shoes and his better shoe. They would go back and forth a couple of times until the price was just a bit more than Dad's original selection and they would strike a bargain.

That is about all that I can remember of Blawnox in the 1950s and 1960s.

Census records are subject to interpretation due to the fact that human error can be introduced at several points in the process. They include:

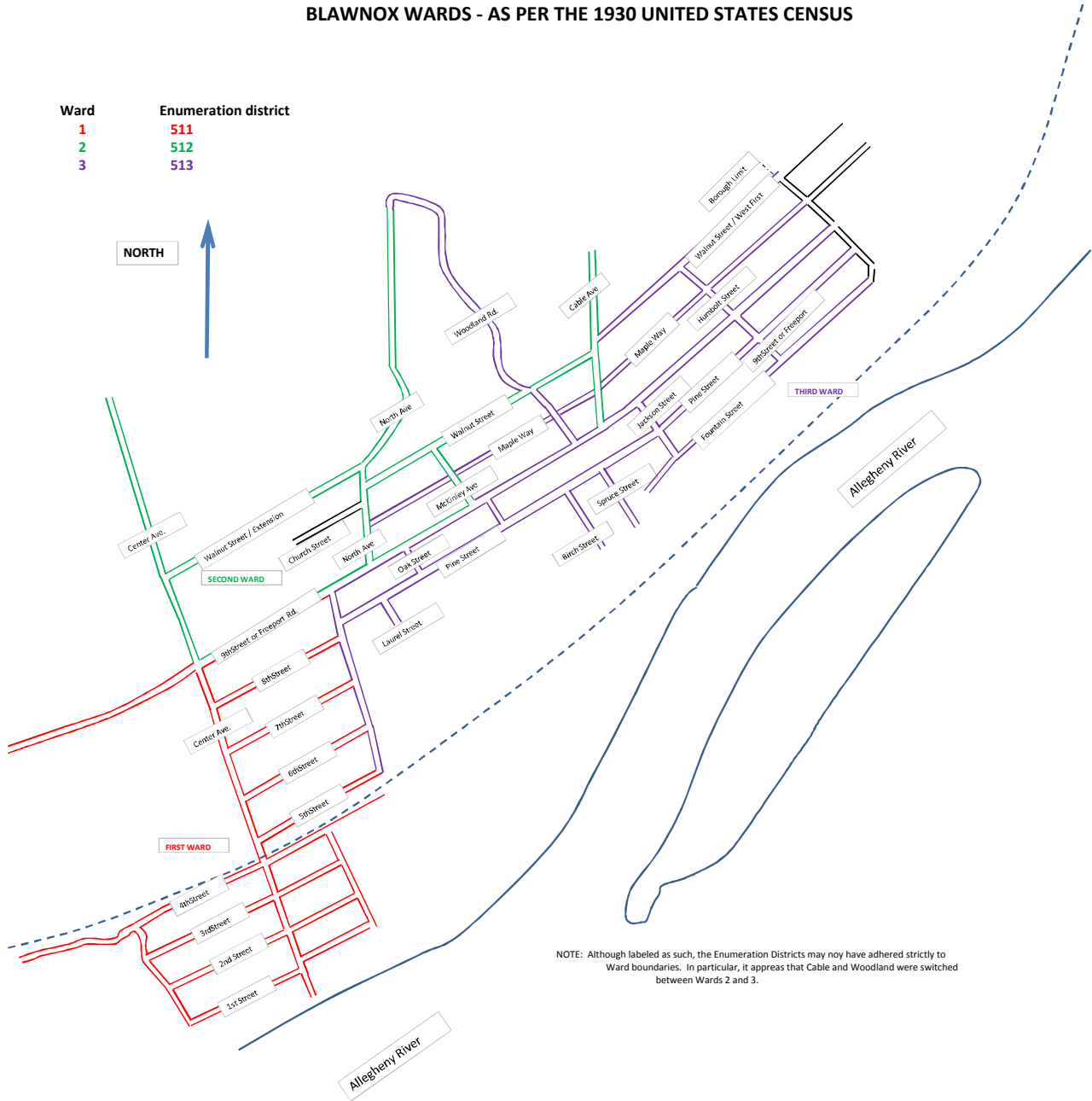
1. Ignorance on the part of the Informant. (Some being illiterate.)
2. Mis-hearing by the Enumerator.
3. Poor handwriting by the Enumerator

Because of the above, different transcribers could interpret the handwritten record differently.

The sources used included hard copies of the US Census records taken from reels available at the Carnegie Library in Oakland section of Pittsburgh PA. Supplementary Internet sources were used to fill in any gaps and recheck damaged sections. While an attempt was made to reduce the typing required by downloading specific families from the Internet site FamilySearch (<https://familysearch.org>), this turned out to be of minimal value due to the number of errors and poor tracking of page and line numbers. The entire record was rechecked and redone from the original population schedules. While transcribers at these sites had access to better copies of the original schedules (and for the most part did a fine job of interpretation), often my familiarity with these families from working with various census records of the O'Hara east area, and the fact that I knew many of these names from my childhood, allowed me to correct some mis-interpretations. Also, those transcriptions limited the field of information from what I required, such as street names and occupations.

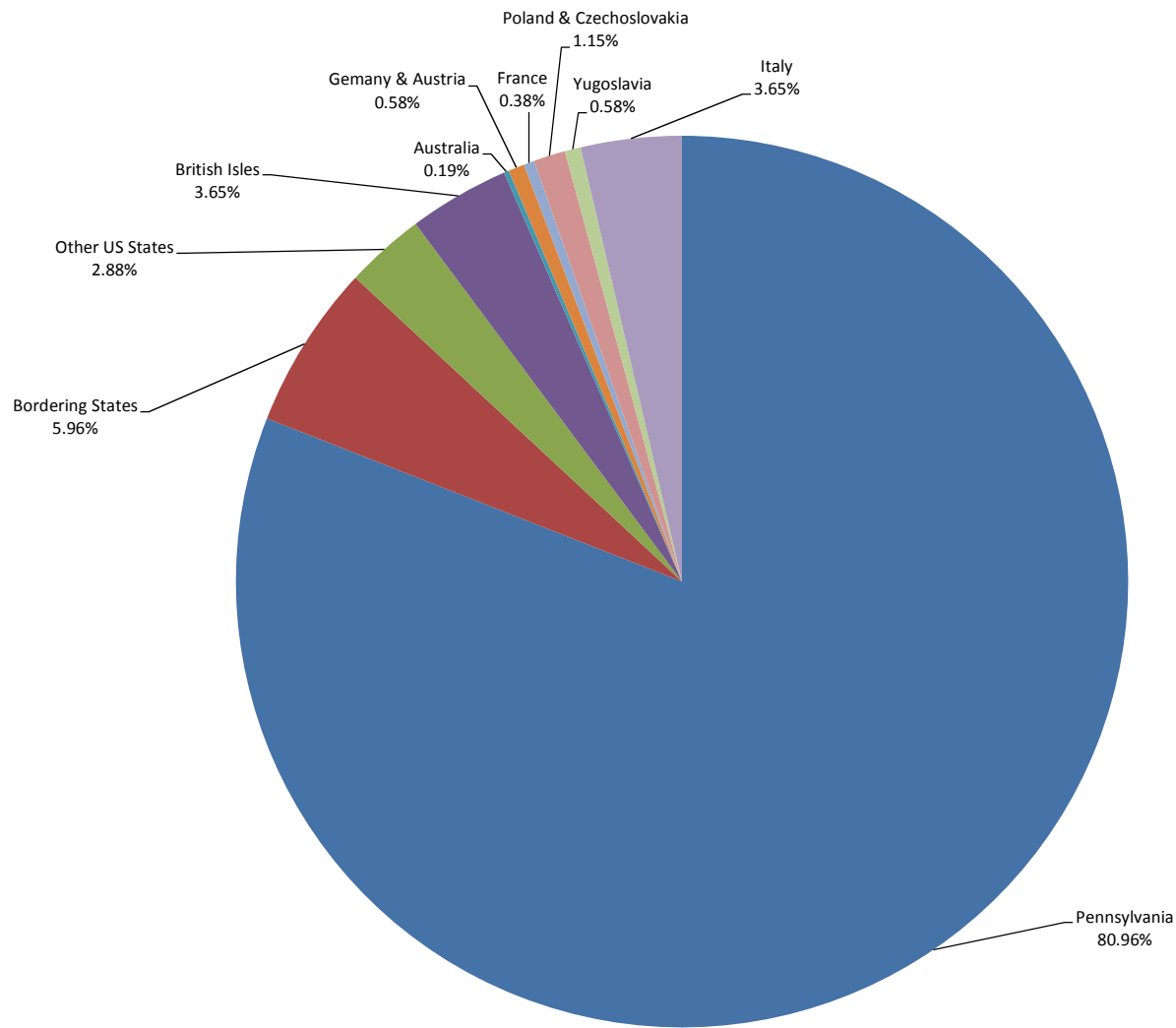


Place of Birth, Blawnox Ward 2 - 1930



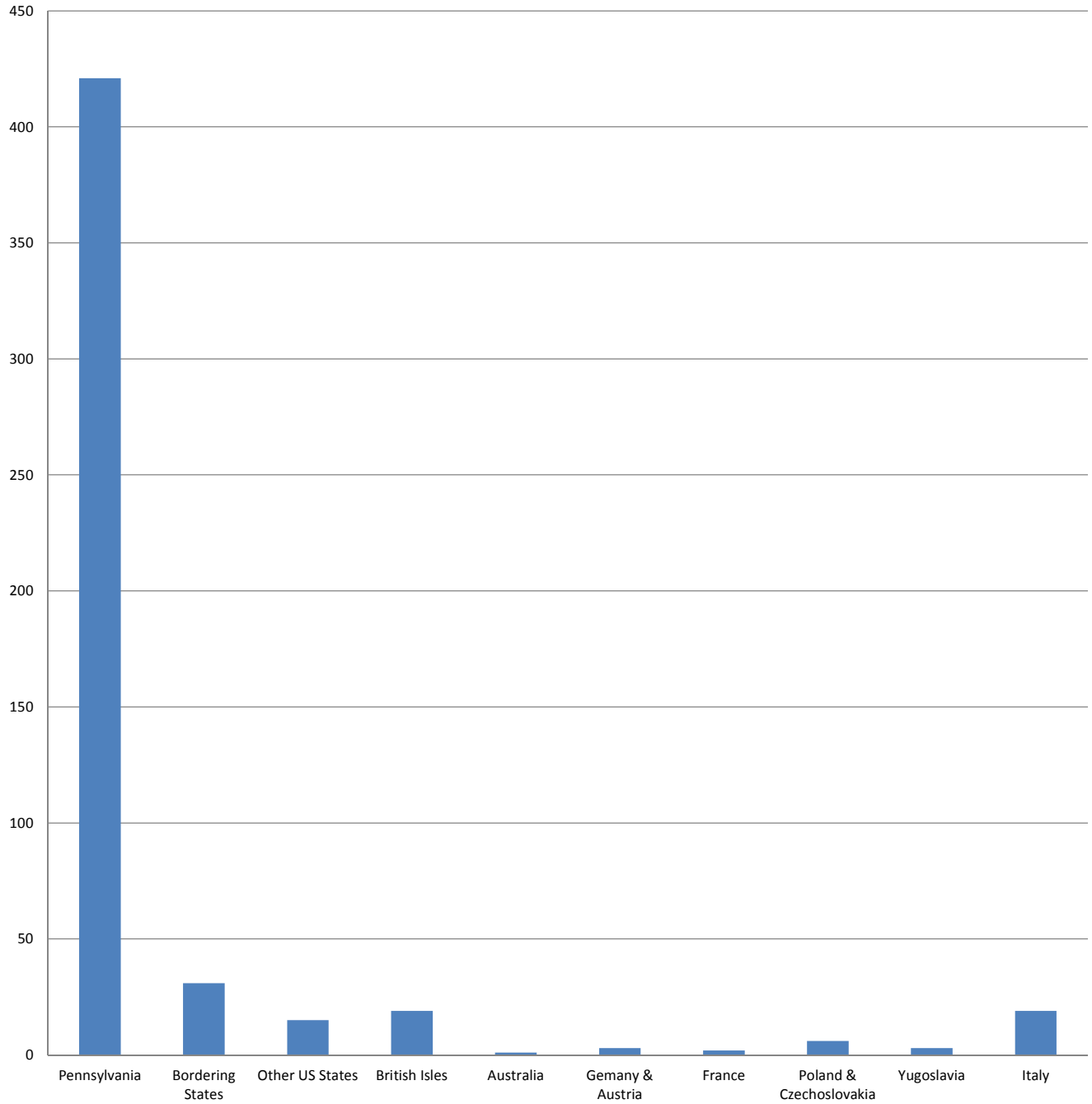

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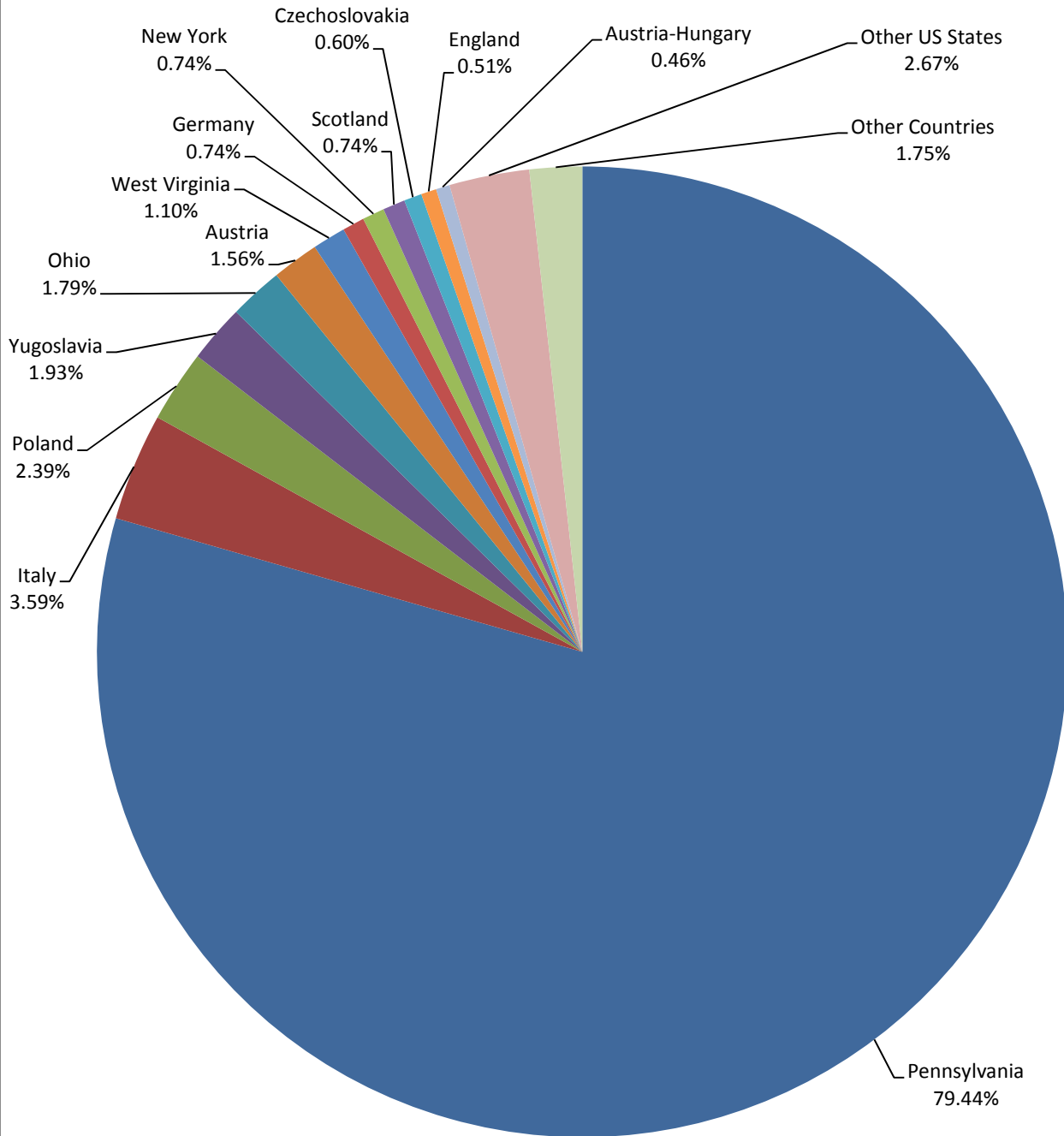

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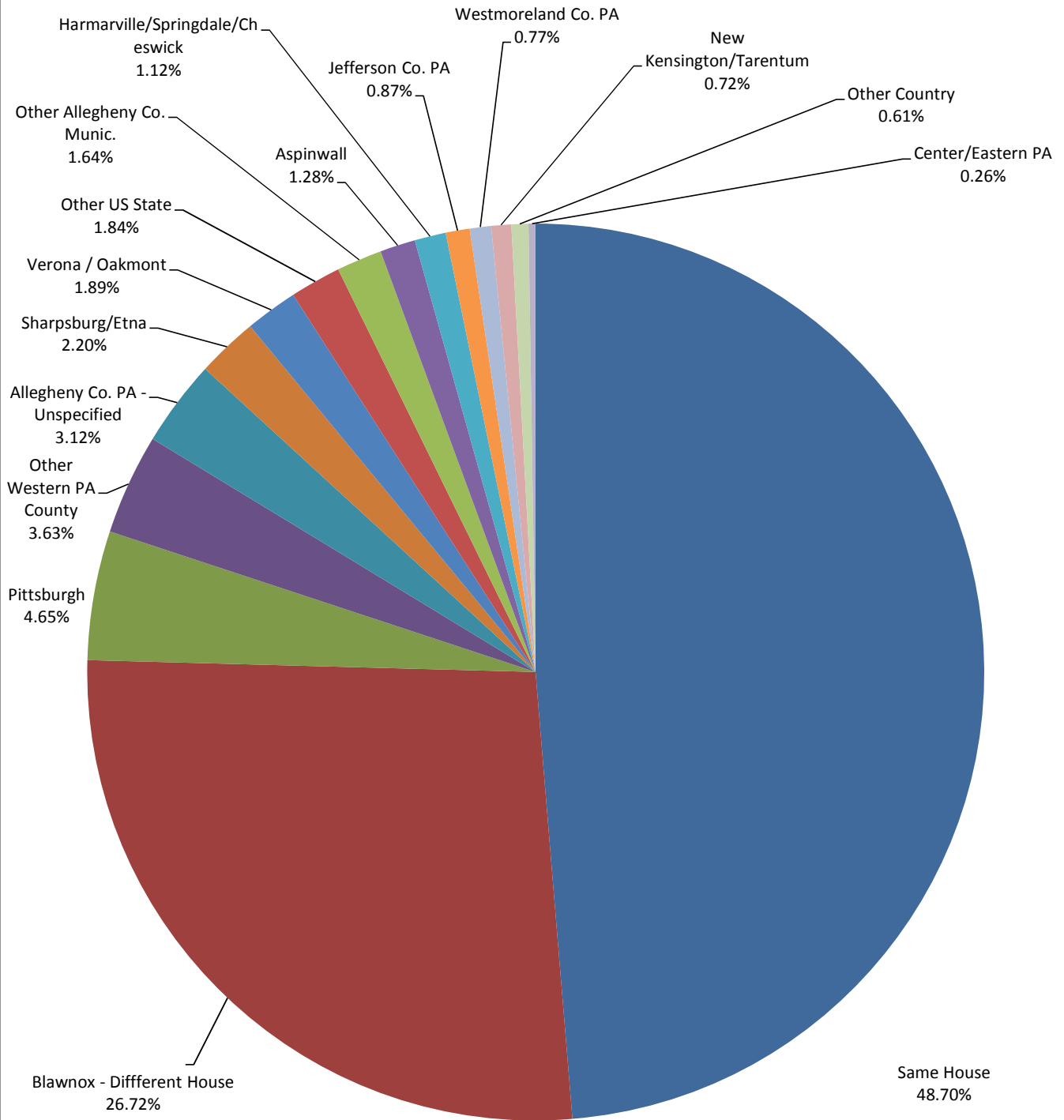
1940 United States Census of Blawnox, PA Occupations
