Who Are We?

My name is Margaret Chapman. I have been a member of BMFHS since about 1999. I was born in Folkestone, Kent and in 1960, when I was 23, I came to Australia as a 'Ten Pound Pom' with my husband and son.

We landed in Melbourne and we were in Brooklyn Migrant Camp for a while before moving to Kirkstall in western Victoria for 5 years.

We then decided to travel and ended up in Tumbulgum, northern NSW, for 3 years. After that, we moved to Sydney in 1968 and then I moved to Faulconbridge in 1998.

In 1971, I began working for Coles as a comptometrist and by the time I left, I was in charge of warehouse accounts. I took an early retirement in 1993 when Coles decided to transfer their accounts department from NSW State Office to Melbourne.

I began my family research about 1985 when I saw an advertisement in the paper for classes on 'How to Start Your Family History'. It was run by Janet Reakes. She was a very enthusiastic teacher and never lost for words. My ancestral background is English and Welsh. Direct family surnames I am researching are: Parton, Mantle, Rowley, Stevens, Williams, Brown, Charles, Moors, Palmer, Davis, Howels, Osborne and Squibb.
