1867 in the Blue Mountains and the Hawkesbury district:

1867 was an important time in the history of the Blue Mountains. This July marks 150 years since the opening of the railway between Penrith and Wentworth Falls. This historic event brought the community of the Blue Mountains together for it wasn't until the railways arrived that the community started to settle and develop.

In mid July 1867 the Blue Mountains railway line was handed over to the NSW government by its railway contractor William Watkins but not before much controversy over "colonial contracts", costings, a harrowing flood in the Nepean and a driver's death from a gunpowder explosion.

The Valley Heights Locomotive Heritage Depot Museum in partnership with the NSW Rail Museum will

run celebratory events from Friday July 21 to Sunday July 23, with the museum open throughout the weekend.

On Saturday July 22 steam train shuttle rides from Penrith to Springwood and return plus heritage electric 'Red Rattler' train rides from Penrith to Blacktown and return. This brings us to the next 150-year anniversary and that is the great flood that inundated the Hawkesbury area with a flow on effect to many other areas of New South Wales. In June 1867 disastrous floods overtook the low lying districts of Windsor, Richmond, Penrith, Maitland and elsewhere. The town of Windsor was almost totally submerged. Surprisingly the loss of life was minimal but the biggest tragedy was the drowning of the Eather family of two wives and ten children at Cornwallis. On 21st June 1867 the whole family, which consisted of two husbands, who were brothers, their wives and eleven children had climbed onto the roof of their house to escape the rising waters when the two men and one child, a boy, were swept away. By clinging to a tree these three managed to save themselves but unfortunately those left on the roof were eventually swept up by the rising waters and drowned.

Following this tragic the event a memorial sign was erected to this family at Cornwallis Road, off Greenway Crescent, Cornwallis, Windsor. **150 years on**, the Hawkesbury City Council commemorated this tragic event by hosting a dinner for the descendants of the Eather family and erecting a new memorial sign at Cornwallis Road, Windsor.

Another occurrence 150 years ago and with a connection to the Blue Mountains was the birth of our famous writer and bush poet, Henry Lawson on the 17th June 1867. While Henry was born at Grenfell NSW he lived for a time in Mt Victoria. In about 1880, his father, Niels Hertzberg (Peter) Larsen, won the contract to build Rylstone Railway Station so came to Mt Victoria as a builder in 1881. Henry followed to help him, aged 14. Peter built houses and the famous 'School in Montgomery St.' The headmaster and founder was Mr Reinitis, who taught many subjects (with staff) to local pupils & boarders, up to University entry level. Henry was also a pupil there.
