**WELCOME** to our November meeting which today is the Society's AGM.

**AGM:** All positions are available as always. Most of the current committee members have been long standing members of the Society so it is hoped this year some of our newer members will nominate to participate in the running of the Society. Our current President is standing again as are our current committee members with the exception that our Secretary will no longer be filling this position and neither will our current Vice President both these members wish to remain as committee members only. ### Snippets:

A recent review in the Sydney Morning Herald of a new book "Gypsies, Their Secret History" written by Mandy Sayer and reviewed by Christine Yeats caught my attention and I thought members might find this interesting:

**Australian Gypsies:** Gypsies originated from northern India migrating west toward Europe from around the 9<sup>th</sup> Century driven from their homeland by Islamic Invaders.

Gypsies reached Australia as early as 1788 when about 60 arrived with the convicts in 1788-1825 including James Squire, who arrived with the first fleet. He cultivated hops and founded Australia's first commercial brewery using hops in 1798. He also formed a deep friendship with Benelong whom he eventually buried on his property at Kissing Point on the bank of the Parramatta River. However the suggestion that he was a Gypsy is said to be debatable. Statistics show there are 12 million Romanies living in Europe, 2 million in the Americas and around 25,000 in Australia.

**Australia and the end of Napoleonic Wars:** With the end of the Napoleonic Wars Britain lost no time in casting off its army from 236,000 to 81,000 army and 147,000 to 23,000 navy. With no employment many of these men turned to crime with the hope of transportation to Australia. A study had shown that the life of a convict in Australia was better than that of a soldier. Many officers from the middle classes also came to Australia and it is from these that we drew our governors, explorers, surveyors, magistrates, doctors, police chiefs and prison commandants. These officers also left their mark on Australia by naming the new landscape after events and places in their war years. In all over 5,000 veteran of the war came to Australia either as free settlers or convicts. While much of the land in the Lake Bathurst area, 27kms south east of Goulburn was for the privileged, smaller blocks were made available to the north in Tarranville for veteran soldiers and becoming some of our first soldier settlements.
