I'm researching O'Neils and Dolans who lived in Troy. I've developed a lot of information but have not been able to determine the Irish county of origin. My gg grandparents were Michael and Sarah (nee Kelly) O'Neil. Michael was born in Ireland in 1834 and Sarah in 1840. They lived in Boston in 1859 when their son and my g grandfather Michael was born. They had more children in Boston up through 1867 when their son Thomas was born in Troy. Michael worked as a teamster in Troy and died there in 1887. He's buried in St. Peters. Sarah died in 1902 at 422 First Street. She is buried in St. Joseph's. I think that Michael had a slightly older brother named James who may have preceded him to Troy.

James died at 1459 Fifth Avenue in 1898 and is at St. Peter's. I believe that Michael and James' parents were James O'Neil and Johanna Flynn. Michael and Sarah's son Michael was a laundryman at 547 River.

He married Rebecca Dolan in the early 1880ies. Michael died in 1902 a few months before his mother did. He lived at 2608 Fifth Avenue and is buried at St. Joseph's. Rebecca lived until 1934. She was born in Ireland but came to Troy in the 1880ies. I believe she had a brother James who preceded her to Troy. Her parents were William Dolan and Ann Rutledge. Rebecca's son William married Margaret Wallingford in 1910.

He died at 33 in the flu epidemic in Troy in 1918. William and Margaret's children include my mother and my Uncle Bill who was mayor of Troy in the 1970ies.

I'm afraid I've searched naturalization records and some obituaries without luck so far on where the O'Neils and Dolans came from in Ireland. I'd be grateful for any ideas or suggestions. Thanks, David O'Brien

I'm researching O'Neils and Dolans who lived in Troy. I've developed a lot of information but have not been able to determine the Irish county of origin. My gg grandparents were Michael and Sarah (nee Kelly) O'Neil. Michael was born in Ireland in 1834 and Sarah in 1840. They lived in Boston in 1859 when their son and my g grandfather Michael was born. They had more children in Boston up through 1867 when their son Thomas was born in Troy. Michael worked as a teamster in Troy and died there in 1887. He's buried in St. Peters. Sarah died in 1902 at 422 First Street. She is buried in St. Joseph's. I think that Michael had a slightly older brother named James who may have preceded him to Troy.

James died at 1459 Fifth Avenue in 1898 and is at St. Peter's. I believe that Michael and James' parents were James O'Neil and Johanna Flynn. Michael and Sarah's son Michael was a laundryman at 547 River.

He married Rebecca Dolan in the early 1880ies. Michael died in 1902 a few months before his mother did. He lived at 2608 Fifth Avenue and is buried at St. Joseph's. Rebecca lived until 1934. She was born in Ireland but came to Troy in the 1880ies. I believe she had a brother James who preceded her to Troy. Her parents were William Dolan and Ann Rutledge. Rebecca's son William married Margaret Wallingford in 1910.

He died at 33 in the flu epidemic in Troy in 1918. William and Margaret's children include my mother and my Uncle Bill who was mayor of Troy in the 1970ies.

I'm afraid I've searched naturalization records and some obituaries without luck so far on where the O'Neils and Dolans came from in Ireland. I'd be grateful for any ideas or suggestions. On September 24, 2004, TIGS members were told about the new transcription project of death and marriage records on 74 pages contained in a folder that was part of the Burden Record collection. These records were cut out of Troy newspapers and cover the period March 1880 to April 1895. This project, unlike the Burden Payroll Records, which had to be done onsite at the Rensselaer County Historical Society, can be done at home on your computer.

To date fourteen volunteers, mostly from the Capital area, but others from Utah, Iowa, North Carolina and Massachusetts, have responded to the request for transcribers. A number of the pages of the death records have already been data entered and are awaiting proofreading. Marriage records, which are a much smaller part of the records on each page have been done for twenty-nine of the pages. The number of death records may around 5,000 and the marriage records will be around 1,000.

Excel spreadsheets are used to enter the data and according to the transcribers, they are very easy to use.

So, if there are others on the TIGS list who would like to work on this project, please write me off-list with your name and address.

I will then mail you hard copies of the pages and will email you instructions and the excel spreadsheet. Completed files are then emailed to me.

I also am a newcomer to the list. I'm grateful to the people who started it. My mom who is 87 was an O'Neil and grew up in Troy on 8th Street. I've done a fair amount of research on O'Neils in Troy. My "original O'Neils" were Michael (born in 1834) and Sarah nee Kelly (born in 1840). I think they emigrated from Ireland in the late 1850ies, lived in Boston for awhile, had children there (including Michael, my great grandfather and Peter who died on April 21, 1905 in Cohoes at age

43 and is buried in St. Joseph's), moved to Troy around 1866 and had more children there. Michael's father was James and his mother was Johanna Flynn. Michael died in 1887 and is buried in St. Peter's.

There is also a James O'Neil in the same lot. He is the only other person buried there. I don't know when he died. I have thought that this could be either Michael's father or an infant named after his grandfather. Recently, I learned that Michael probably had an older brother James who also lived in Troy. This James was born around 1833, was married to Margaret nee Cafrey, died in 1898 and is also buried in St. Peter's. His widow Margaret died in Troy in 1912. Because I knew that Michael's father's name was James, I developed a lot of information from the City Directory about James O'Neils in Troy and would be happy to share anything else of interest. Hello from Washington State,

I just became a member and I will be trying to fill in some blanks regarding my Irish roots. My GGgrandmother, Bridget Quinn, nee O'neill, b. ca. 1822 in Ireland, was married to an unknown Quin(n) and they had a

son, Peter, born on Feb 27, 1844 at the Nail Factory in Troy, NY. Peter was baptised on Mar. 1, 1844 by Father Havermann. I recieved this information from St. Peter's Church in Troy and though it was in Latin, I was able to be fairly certain that it was my GGgrandmother and GGuncle, Peter. The record also noted the sponsors as James O'Neal and a Maria (last name unreadable). The O'Neal would coincide with my GGgrandmother's maiden name, eventhough the spelling is off.

I am also looking for my GGgrandfather's family. His name was Francis Kane, b. ca. 1828 in Ireland, and at some point, Bridget's husband, unk. Quinn, probably died somewhere between living in Troy and NYC, where Francis married Bridget at Old St. Patrick's Cathedral, in NYC, on July 8, 1847. The marriage certificate that I've got shows the witnesses as Henry Kane and Ellen Wade, not further identified. I don't know if the Kane family was in Troy and that's how Bridget and Francis met or, if Bridget moved to NYC after her husband Quinn died and met Francis there. Those are some of the blanks I'd like to fill in.

Francis and Bridget had three children born in NYC. Michael, Mary and Edward born in 1848, 1850 and 1852, respectively.

Sometime between Edward's birth and my Ggrandfather Patrick's birth, in about 1859, they had moved to Kane County, Illinois. I'm presuming Patrick was born in Kane County, because he lists his birth location as Illinois on census records that I've found. The youngest child of Bridget and Francis was Elizabeth, born in about 1862 in Kaneville, Kane County, Illinois. Considering the gaps in the intervening years between the births of Edward and Patrick leads me to believe there were one or more children born, but who did not survive. Kane County records only go back to about 1877, so the local church records are about the only other source left to me there.

My GGuncle, Peter Quin(n) was listed in the 1860 census with the Kane family in Kaneville, Kane County. Subsequently, in October, 1861, he volunteered and was accepted into the 52nd Illinois Volunteer Infantry. Sometime in October of 1863, he was captured by Confederate forces and imprisoned at Andersonville Prison in Georgia, where he died from scurvey on November 8, 1864. His marker at the Andersonville National Cemetary is 10531.

With any luck, I will be traveling to Clinton, NY in the Spring and I'm planning a trip over to Troy for some on-site research and to attend one or more of the meetings.

Well there are my Troy connections and I am facsinated by the information that I've found so far. The history of the area and the hardships our immigrant ancestors endured is truly amazing. Finding this organization has been great. I've gotten a little more history of the area and I am looking forward to finding out more about the area's and my family's history. I have added several sites from the city and county to my favorites list and regularly check them for any updated information.

Thanks for reading and I hope that I can connect the dots eventually. If there is anything I can research here in Washington State for anyone, I'd be very happy to oblige.
