I know someone was looking for a Thomas Kerwick and the name sounded familiar. I recently found the following:

- 1. Thomas Kerewick(?) was a witness to the marriage of James Denny and Catherine Shinners on May 17, 1857 at St. Peter's Church 2. Thos Kirwick was baptismal sponsor for their first child Catherine on July 1, 1858 again at St. Peter's Church 3. Thomas Kirwick was a witness for John and Thomas Denny's naturalization petitions on February 18 1859. Since it appears that all three men went and were sworn in together, I would imagine that Thomas Kirwick's naturalization was the same day. (Naturalizations in Justice's Court; State of New York, Rensselaer County' City of Troy, Justices Court Naturalizations: Volume II (1858-1859) (Pages 291-580) Pgs. 537 and 538 (for the Denny names) 4. I was searching page by page of the US Census, 13th Ward City of Troy for other names and found Thomas Kerwick, 35 with Catherine, 34 and children Mary, John, Thomas, Kate and Winifred.
- 5. and then....I was researching other names on the LDS film "Deaths and Burials in the City of Troy(Mt. Ida) and found a Thomas Kernick(?) died on Vail Avenue 22 Aug 1881 born in Ireland, aged 55.

I don't know who was looking for this information. If you need copies of any of this information, I could mail it to you or bring it to the meeting next week.

Frank Hogan's sister Mary married Joseph Bernard Boland, my great grandfathers brother. Funny thing is that another brother Lawrence Boland also ran for mayor of Troy under the socialist labor party banner in about that same time frame. Lawrence, or "Comrade Boland" as he is listed in SLP records, was a political acquaintance of James Connolly when he lived in Troy, and was also nominated for Lt Governor of NY on the SLP ticket in 1896. That had to make for some interesting and lively Sunday dinner conversations between those two. I guess the Mayor Hogan connection (I was not sure before of the timeframe) also explains why I found in the basement of the county clerks office an early 1900's affidavit swearing in another brother, CP Boland, as a Rensselaer County deputy sheriff when he was a mason and builder by trade. Gotta love it. Then in 1912, 2 of the Boland brothers and their construction company were indicted for fraud and graft. They got out of it.

If you want to share any history/ stories about ex mayor Hogan I'd love to hear them. I have a bunch of interesting newspaper articles about the Boland brothers if you are related to them.

I am interested in the Troy politics and/or labor movements of that time. Can someone suggest a good non-fiction bibliography for that kind of local research? I already have "Worker City Company Town" which covers a few years earlier.

A Proclamation by the President of the United States of America

The story of the Irish in America is an important part of the history of our country. This month, we pay tribute to Americans of Irish descent who have shaped our Nation and influenced American life.

Long before the great wave of Irish immigration in the 1840s, people of Irish ancestry were defining and defending our Nation. Charles Thomson, an Irishman by birth, served as Secretary of the Continental Congress and helped design the Great Seal of the United States. Irish-born Commodore John Barry fought for our country's independence and later helped found the United States Navy.

Irish Americans have been leaders in our public life, and they have retained a proud reverence for their heritage. In June 1963, President John F. Kennedy spoke to the Parliament in Dublin and told the story of the Irish Brigade, a regiment that fought valiantly for the Union and suffered terrible losses during the Civil War. I came across a book entitled Irish America by Reginald Byron. It was published by Oxford University Press in 1999. I found it through Alibris. The book is a sociological study of the current attitudes of Irish Americans. It's based upon recent interviews with 500 Irish Americans from Albany. The interviews are interesting but the book's main appeal to me was its 80 page introduction with good references and a bibliography about the history of the Irish in Albany. It's one of the only such works that I know of. Byron describes Albany as the most Irish of all American cities. He says that Albany was unique in its willingness to accept Irish immigrants and had a reputation as such in Ireland during the famine. He attributes much of this reputation to Bishop and later Cardinal McCloskey's hard work, diplomacy and organizational ability while he led the diocese of Albany during the middle of the 19th century. Cardinal McCloskey established an unparalleled community of support for the Irish in the Albany diocese that included schools, hospitals, orphanages, and seminaries. The Irish that made their way to Boston, Montreal and Toronto often later left those cities to come to Albany. Cardinal McCloskey advertised Albany's benefits in Ireland during the Byron says that Cardinal McCloskey was much admired by the Protestant city fathers of Albany and asserts that there were never any "Irish need not apply" signs in Albany. I don't know how sound Byron's research and there are parts of the introduction that I wondered about but I still recommend it. Dr.

Rowley's Irish Aristocracy in Albany is regularly referred to. The Albany Institute of History and Art will mail you a copy of Dr. Rowley's work for 6 dollars.

Kirby Miller's Emigrants and Exiles is also excellent. Byron is at odds with Miller over the prevalence of the Irish language among immigrants.

My inference has been that these are the parents of my ggrandfather Whaling Master John KEENAN of Watervliet and I am confused because on the Captain's death certificate his father's name is James and his mother's name is Mary GILLEN. As you can see from the inscription he is buried next to the GILLEN burials:

If you don't live there, maybe a note to the caretaker to see if they have records?

Unfortunately for purposes of this situation, we live in suburban Chicago. The last time I was in the Watervliet area was in 1940 as a very young child. I got the information from the office of St. Mary's Cemetery, which also held the surviving information for Mt. Ida. I am looking at it, and it does not include HOAR. I also find that I contacted Robert Hudson of the Troy Dept. of Public Works, the unit of government that in 1999 had responsibility for the cemetery. As I remember, Mt. Ida on Pawling Ave. has been passed from hand to hand over the years and this department, which has public parks responsibility, was assigned to maintain it. Mr. Hudson sent me a copy of a few pages of Nathaniel Bartlett Sylvester, "History of Rensselaer County" published in 1880, which on page 45 includes the inscription for "Jane(sic) Keenan...with all the other information, except for a misspelling or two, the same as the citation from the record for Mt.

Ida. The Sylvester citation also does not include HOAR. So in looking at my files, I seem to have copies of at least some of the surviving cemetery records and municipal records. I find in one of the marginal notes I made at the time that the cemetery has been, for years, an "orphan cemetery,"

with no continuing dedicated interest to be found for it.

Please disregard my advice and I will just tell you what I have learned about Digital camera's. First and foremost is the salesman wants all the money you will be willing to spend on a camera. I spent almost a thousand dollars for a camera while my daughter got one at Wolf Camera for \$79.00.

The pictures we took were identical. Could have saved a lot if I had just listened.

Ok, let me get to the point. The point of your getting a digital camera is what.? If you can figure that out then you know what kind of camera you want. I would sit down and say this is how much I am willing to spend and then buy one of those consumer magazines on Digital Cameras. Then try to pick out the best camera for the money you wish to spend. Remember the field is changing all the time and in general its measured by the resolution it can produce on its computer chip. For example there is a truism about the higher the resolution the better pictures it will take. For example, the first cameras were 2mp then it went to 4mp and now we are 6mp and even 8mp. There is something to be aware of 4mp is about the break even point for making good 11x14 size photograhs. After that the resolutions starts to fall off. So 4mp is the value for your dollar mark. But if you want just to take a picture and spend money for a camera at 4mp or less a good 2mp would work just fine and save a few bucks in the process. So below 4mps, then you need to look for reputaion of the maker and the features. Below 4mp they take features off to save money. But the makers who really give you a good camera for your money still leave the features on. Specifically what you want is a camera with an Optical zoom and takes cheap memory.

Remember your going to take pictures and save them to a memory chip. I have a 1 gig compact flash menory card that I paid \$200 for. Now that chip is a hot \$49.95. Wow. I am still taking pictures and have not filled up the chip. But I did buy another card to put in the camera. The camera you buy may come with its own marginal chip, but that is another expense. Memory also comes in several different types and you will just have to figure out what is good for you. Get a salesman to demonstrate the difference in

memory chips. Then make sure you hear the prices. Last years camera is half what it was last year. For genealongical purposes your looking for some special capabilities such as being able to get close enough to take a picture of a page in a library, or to zoom in on something. Ok so here it is. My recommendations for that digital camera. Buy a 4mp or less, make sure it has optical zoom, get the memory system you can live with and make sure is has the features you would like, for example a close up mode, a flash control option and also make really good and sure that when you put the camera in your hands for the first time and take a snap that there is not a lag time between the time you squeeze the trigger and it sets off the lens a half hour later. Smirk at the salesmen when you put it through that test. Ok, go Nikon on the low end around \$200 for a 3mp, or take a good look at the Canon's. They have some 5mp that go for less than \$300 and take wonderful pictures and have a ton of options and whirly gigs. Then finally there is the Fugi's and they amaze me with what they can do for \$79. A real value are the 3.5mp Samsungs which will go head to head with cameras in its

same category. Kodak's god bless them are iffy. But if you want my opinion on what your going to buy just email me and I will give you my opinion. skinose2@hotmail.com. Over and out! Buy the way I use to own a camea store and have been a professional photograher.

Hi Kris:

As a professional photographer I would recommend that you buy a digital camera you can use in all situations, not just genealogy. The more you use one the more you will like it. There is not a digital camera that any of us can afford (except the new digital SLRs) that will do good copy stand work.

Even with a Macro (close-up) lens. So buying it for that is a waste of money.

There are a few very important things to look for. First, and most important is the lense. Do not buy a plastic lense, buy a camera that has a glass lense. Plastic is light, but it scratches and discolors easily.

Secondly get a metal body. These cameras are light and easy to drop, one crack in the body and its worthless. Thirdly get one that takes rechargable lithium batteries. You do not want to be buying or carrying around a pocketful of batteries. You want batteries that can be precharged and brought along as backup. Also be aware of storage capacity, the larger the storage media the better. Nothing worse that running out of memory halfway through a project of a trip. You want a zoom lense, a retractable one. Lastly, the more pixels the better!

I personally have a Sony Mavica, a Kodak and a new Nikon. The Sony is fabulous, best lense on the market, colors run a bit toward the red but that is easily corrected. But its expensive and a bit heavy. The newer Sonys are much lighter. The Kodak is lighter, takes a nice photo, but I'm not happy with the battery life or storage capacity. The Nikon 4300 is about half way between. Its lense is not as good as the Sony, but it is glass. Its light, compact and metal. It has interchangeable storage media (smartcards), doesn't take indoor shots as well as the Sony. My next digital camera will probably be another Sony. They are worth the extra money for the picture quality and battery life alone.

This is a good site for advice on buying a digital camera, I hope it helps. Jeanne

You guys want bang for the buck and plastic is good. Don't buy more lenses. Some camera's have a switch or setting that is intentionally used for close ups like copying pages in a library. They are on the Nikon's which I have three of. For you guys and I have done the same thing but a flash can be deadly overkill. Most people can just put your camera on auto and go.

Problem with that is your going to get the flash in every low light situation. Some cameras consider tv room viewing as a low light situation and will flash and of course your picture will be washed out up close in digital. If you can watch tv and read in a room well then evaluate and see if you want to flash. Most flashes were designed to cover the far wall. If that is what you want to do flash. If you want something closer evaluate or try it and see if you want to photo something closer. The great thing about digital is you can look and what you just took a picture of and keep it or redo it and start again. So if you don't want the whole room and something closer to you, you risk washing the picture out. Just cut the flash off, or do I like I do and just hold a tissue in front of the flash. Don't put your fingers on the flash or you will seriously burn yourself or start a forest fire somewhere. All the camera's will give you a reasonable up close small picture, but its when you start manipulating them that you will get what is know as abberations. Like the Sony's lean toward red, the Canons have a purple cast under some light situation, the Nikons are yellow and slow, yaddy yaddy so forth and so on.

So it all boils down to Optical zoom 3x or higher, plastic body, one switch control for flash and for closeups, 4mp or lower or higher if they will take your money and give you a higher mp for the money. One other thing to mention is if you do buy a Digital Camera you can send pix off and have them sort of processed on line. Or you can put them in your camera and run them through a Photo Manipulation program like Photoshop Elements 3. That's where I can manipulate all my px, even scanned in old family pix and put them all togather in a merge application and produce a picture that will bring tears to your eyes. But you can clean up faces, remove scratches and scars, improve colors or even use another color. So you bought a digital camera and now you know you have to buy memory and another Photo manipulation program. Hope this helps. Class dismissed. jd

Just getting to some e-mail and wanted to respond to this. Yes Mt Ida could be considered an orphan cemetary, but several years ago a group in Troy formed and call themselves the "Friends of Mt. Ida". They keep the cemetary up very well. Pawling Avenue is a main thoroughfare in Troy and the cemetary is right on it. I have not seen it overgrown in years, drive by everyday, it is very well kept. People use it for jogging, dog walking, etc. Used to have a beautiful black wrought iron fence that has been taken down, as it had gotten rough looking. Keep hoping it will go back up. Now this is Old Mt. Ida. Then Pawling Avenue branches off onto Pinewoods Avenue and that is where New Mt. Ida is located. New Mt. Ida is mowed but never looks as nice as Old Mt.

Ida. New is very crowded, stones right next to one another, old bushs grown up with no trimming, very difficult to do a good job with a lawn mower, etc.

Old has family plots with space between them. Many stones in both are broken and laying on the ground, that is where I am sure cost would come into play, having them repaired, but the stone is there and can be read.

Hi Bill McGrath, My name is Bruce M. Smith of Bayside, CA. I saw your periodic addition to a project of some kind with your addition of Troy History 100 years 1789-1889, and the list of Chief Engineers for the Troy Fire Dept.

The name I was researching that came up with your addition ...was "N.B. Starbuck", listed as a Chief engineer of Troy in 1846 & 1861, in your reference.

My interest lays in the 'tug boat' that was named after him. The morning of Wednesday, 13 March 1895, The Tugboat 'N. B. Starbuck ', Capt. Brandow, was operating ...with a Capt. and Crew of 5 men, on the East River, off of Pier #17.

While passing a line to the steamship "Seneca" of the Ward Line, a catastrophe occured that resulted in the sinking of the Tugboat N.B.Starbuck. The men had to swim for their lives. Capt Brandow was in such a serious condition that all efforts to resusatate him were futile. I believe that 'Capt Brandow' was Capt. William Brandow,b. 1837, living Brooklyn with wife and children. This man would be a relative of mine and I am interested in learning more about this accident and the Tug. Starbuck.

I have a number of Smith family who were chief engineers (marine) on the Hudson, Saint Lawrence, and down along the coast, ...from 1860's through the 1960's,
