I knew someone on list would have the answer and be forthcoming with it!! Thank you all for your information and suggestions. I can now try to contact ST. Mary's Hospital . We did get our Mary's date of death from Vital Statistics in Albany, then went to the library and searched for obits which told us she had died at Troy Hospital. There was no address listed in any of the obits.

We don't get to Albany to research very often and always go with a well organized list, births/deaths/etc., which my sister and I divvy up. Guess we just neglected to order Mary's death certificate due to more immediate interests being attended to at the time. Thanks for the reminder!

As for the directory search, I was only able to find Mary listed twice: 1) at Leonard Hospital in Lansingburg, and 2) at the Phoenix Hotel. She boarded at each of those places. (She was the cook, and not the other Mary Geoghegan, sister of Patrick, who worked in a collar shop.) And we believe we have her as a maid for a private family who lived at the Watervliet Arsenal, in 1900.

Family thinks she worked and/or lived at Vanderheyden Hall, but I'm kind of stumped about how to get that info, not being familiar with the area and it's institutions. That's really all we know about her, outside of the fact that she was godmother to one of my great uncles (according to parish records in Ireland).

Thank you again, Kevin, Jim and Lu. I appreciate your help and reminders.

A Brief History of West Hall

West Hall was the home of our department prior to our move into the Jonsson-Rowland Science Center and the Materials Research Center in 1998.

While we are happy to now be located near the center of campus, we remember fondly those days on the western edge of RPI. Certainly to many of our alumni, West Hall remains the home of the department in memory. Below is a brief history of the building.

Rensselaer and West Hall have a love-hate relationship. Yes, West Hall is old and a bit decrepit. And students decry its distance from "the rest of campus." But there's no denying that West Hall has a charisma and a charm that outshines its imperfections of age and upkeepin short, it has a history.

West Hall was the home to the Department of Earth and Environmental Sciences, nee Geology, for the over 40 years. Yet the history of this 100-plus year-old building extends far beyond our occupancy, specifically to June 28, 1868, when the cornerstone for a new hospital building was laid by the Right Reverend J.J. Conroy, Bishop of Albany.

"West Hall" was the next step in the evolution of St. Mary's Hospital, at that time known as the Troy Hospital. The Hospital movement in Troy began in 1845, when the epidemics of 1844 and '45 compelled city authorities to erect temporary buildings and use space in the Sisters of Charity orphanage in South Troy to care for the sick. In 1848, construction began on the first "permanent" Troy hospital, on the southwest corner of Washington and Fifth Streets. Upon its completion two years later, the hospital's direction was placed under the Sisters of Charity where it has since remained.

The Troy Hospital, which became the first full service hospital in New York State outside of the New York City area, remained in this building until 1914. About this time, however, owing to rapid growth of the city and of the construction of the Union Railroad within a few feet of the building, the location was deemed unsuitable and so the site upon which West Hall now sits was purchased.

However, it seems that West Hall was destined to accommodate the cultivation of the mind rather than the healing of the body. In 1922 it was purchased by the Diocese of Albany and served as Troy's Catholic Central High School for the next 30 years.

Though its name has changed, its tradition as a place of education remained when West Hall was purchased by Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Our own history here began after the Fuel Resources Department became the Geology Department and West Hall became its headquarters.

The geology department truly embraced West Hall as home, yet the building retained its character and evidence of its history. The office and museum were located in the old operating theater turned gymnasium, labs and classrooms in the old hospital rooms, rock storage in the front stairwells, and the sedimentology lab adjacent to the boiler-room in the sub-basement.

Because of its history as a hospital and morgue, its dramatic victorian architecture, and its age, West Hall always invoked an image akin to the haunted house of classic horror films. Emanating noises from the steam pipes and critters in the walls aided that image. Stormy nights certainly had the ability to make the building's scientists a little uneasy, creating an atmosphere where one would expect encounters with the supernatural.

In 1998, the institute moved the Earth and Environmental Science department to the Science Center, moving in alongside the department of Physics,
Applied Physics and Astronomy, and the department of Biology. West Hall is
now home to the purchasing department, as well as a substantial portion of the Integrated Electronic Arts department.

Looking at the database, I find three Margaret Connors', two listed in 1886 and the other 1887. These were from the directory and no other info was given. If you note, you will see none were listed in the NYS Vital Records. This was a time when the state had ordered civil registration of births and deaths but it took time for the counties to fully comply with the law, so looks like they either didn't die in Troy or their deaths were not registered. While births and deaths were ordered to be registered in 1880, it took till 1890 to get 90% compliance from the whole state as a group. If I were you, I would try the city of Troy and see if they have your Margaret's death. Also, maybe someone in the area can search the obituaries for you.

Then, we started the New Era of "Confidentiality", that sometimes makes it difficult to get any records. I have never had a problem with my own records from hospital or otherwise. But, today they would probably expect a letter, signed with Social Security Number, Date of Birth and maybe notarized.

It could be a dead end, or even a waste of time. But, sometimes it's good to know. Thinking about it now, from a medical professional point of view, it seems that the Confidentiality Issue may block the information from being given out, freely.

Funeral services for Dr. John Sibbald, 96, of Lansingburgh, who died Sunday at Stony Point Farm in Benson, VT after a brief illness, were held Wednesday. A mass of Christian burial was offered at St. Augustine's Church here with burial in St. Agnes Cemetery in Menands.

Dr. Sibbald had served as head pediatrician at St. Mary's Hospital in Troy. He retired from active practice July 1, 1975, in his 90th year and was one of the oldest alumnus of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. He was an active supporter of many charities as a physician and citizen.

For the past two years, he had been residing in Benson with a grand-niece, Priscilla A. Caney.

Born in Cohoes, he was the son of Charles J. and Lucy (O'Brien) Sibbald. Dr. Sibbald was a graduate of Troy Academy, RPI, where he received a degree in civil engineering and later graduated from Columbia University, where he received his medical degree. He also attended McGill University in Canada.

Between his graduation from RPI and attending Columbia, Dr. Sibbald worked for the Fonda-Johnstown and Gloversville Railroad and was the youngest master mechanic in the country on the railroad at that time.

He was a past president of Rensselaer County Medical Society and St. Mary's Hospital Medical Society. He began his medical career as a general practitioner and later went into pediatrics. Dr. Sibbald for many years was physician for the summer Troy Fresh Air Home in Grafton and active as a physician in clinics for children at the Health Center in Troy. He maintained private practice on Fifth Avenue and later in the Ilium Building on Fulton Street.

Other survivors include a nephew, two nieces, grand-nieces and grand-nephews.

Yes, that is what I have on the 1880 census in Troy. John and Matilda were born in
Pittsburgh 1878 and 1879 so they moved to NY just after Matilda was born (btw, Matilda
married Henry CONROY about 1899) Dennis Connors and Margaret Herron were Nora's parents and
may have stayed in England. Thanks for looking for them.
I don't have Nora's birth record, just her death certificate issued in
1917 that records her birth and the names of her parents.
The 1900 census for Troy says Samuel emigrated in 1867 and Nora in 1869 so I am assuming they
were not married in 1870 and may not have even
known each other then.
                          I cannot find any ships passenger lists online

Best way to get vital records is to start with the indexes in the NYS Archives reading room. You must have the state's number to get quick service.

I use the drop box in the archives reading room. Orders in the box go into a special fast service pile.

Without the state number, orders go into a pile to be looked up when the staff gets time to do that lookup.

Sure, drive the order form to the DOH bldg if you want to, but you'll do best if you're sure you have the state number on the form. They don't offer public access to the index fiches, which must be read in person in one of four locations. I use the one in the NYS Archives reading room in Albany.

As to why no record is found locally, perhaps it's because the first, original copy of a vital record is sent to the state. Then if there is a local loss of records, a record will be in the state files.
