Bill, these are two great postings!

Troy "Burial" Records: I knew about these, and it always surprises me how few people have discovered them. As Lynn said, they are especially valuable for the years prior to the 1880s, when there were no official death certificates yet. These records fill in an AWFULLY lot of gaps! And you can often find other children of your ancestors that you never knew they had - children who died in infancy, for example - some of them from "teething"!

Court Records card file: I did NOT know about this, but this, too, is a great find, because it covers years that are more recent than the cut-off period for the state index and death certificates to be released into the public domain. Those stop in the early 1950s; these continue to the present day! Isn't that wonderful? The following periods:

part of 1946-1959 and all of 1960-1969 1970-1979 1980-1989 1990-1999 2000-Present

would give you information that you would NOT be able to get from the NY State Archives, the NY State Dept of Health or any other state source for another few years or decades. These card files would be a GREAT companion resource for those in the fortunate position of being able to visit the Rensselaer County Courthouse and the very-near-by Troy Public Library. Even if you are just starting out in genealogy, you could go to the Surrogate Court in the Courthouse, look up all your names in that card file and then walk a few paces to the Troy Public Library and search their newspaper microfilms for obituaries. Obituaries of the 20th century almost always have lists of relatives of some sort, and just THINK of what a GREAT START a "newbie" could make on the genie road in a SINGLE morning!

It depicts the turbulent, dramatic past of county Clare and its people against the national backdrop of cultural, socioeconomic, political and military upheaval on the eve of the birth of the Irish Republic.

Very much an island county, Clare has a distinct personality and has been synonymous with the 'strong man' or leader since the time of Brian Boru. The 1890-1918 watershed era raised no shortage of leaders in the

county: from Michael Cusack, father founder of the GAA to Willie Redmond and Colonel Martin Meaney of the Fighting 69th US regiment, from Bishop Fogarty, the ecclesiastical champion of the new republican movement, to Peadar Clancy and Eamon de Valera. Hi Pat:

Here is some of what I remember about the tour.

Terri Page was the tour conductor and she was excellent. Spent about two hours and fifteen minutes with us in the chapel and going around to some selected graves in the cemetery.

Prior to entering the chapel Terri gave us an overview of Troy's manufacturing history and how it relied on the river and the streams for power. Troy was one of the richest cities in the country. Of course our group with it's genealogy bent knew all the right answers as to the products made in Troy from bells, to stoves, to collars and cuffs, to horse shoes, etc.

As we entered the chapel, Terri put out the lights so we could experience the Tiffany windows with the sun streaming through. I have seen Tiffany windows before in St. Joseph's Church, the Troy Library, etc., but these were the most beautiful ones I have ever seen. Terri explained the various types of glass in the windows and the various techniques used to get special effects.

The hand carved wood ceilings and trim and pews were from oak and are the originals. The marble in various colors came from all over the world. A large block of onyx was purchased in London and that is what the various columns were cut from.

William S. Earl, married Hannah M. Gardner, the boss's daughter and with their collar and cuff's business became very wealthy. Gardner Earl, was their only child and apparently he was sickly from birth. On the grand tour of Europe he became interested in cremation and he had a document prepared requesting cremation when he died. His parents complied with his wishes when he died at about age 37 and he was cremated in Buffalo, NY.

Since Gardner was an only child, William and Hannah wanted to build a crematorium in his memory and money was no object. At some point Terri felt that the family was embarrassed at the cost of the chapel and all documents relating to its construction were destroyed. They are no original records left detailing costs, artists, etc. The stone work was done by Adam Ross Cut Stone which is still in business in Albany today. They have on loan from the Adam Ross firm a hand caved scale model of the chapel as it was originally built.

High on the front of the building is a large carved stone gargoyle which fell to the ground on its first two attempts at raising with ropes. The third attempt was successful and the gargoyle was affixed in place.

Apparently the two falls did not damage the stone carving.

After touring the chapel we drove to several locations in the cemetery. Saw one monument which was a colossal Celtic cross. Also the chapel of the Warren family which was one of the famous stove manufacturers in Troy.

About 80 family members are buried under the floor of the chapel. We had a wonderful view of Troy and the mountains in the distance from the escarpment where Terri gave us a history lesson on American Revolution and Civil War events as they played out in our panoramic view of the city and it's environs. Professional photographers have taken pictures of this view and a large display will be set on this prospect and it will identify the various buildings that can be seen.

The sad part of our tour was the fact that Oakwood Cemetery is so under funded. Major work is needed on the chapel to repair extensive water damage due to the failure of the roof is some parts.

This letter is from $\ensuremath{\mathsf{my}}$ research on the Ballykilcline people who went to Rutland:

"As one Roscommon immigrant wrote from Troy, NY: 'All Friends[,] arrived here in good health, after a long and dangerous voyage of 50 days. We had only two deaths on board. We came to the city of Troy, we then went to Barney Murphy's ... we all got employment ... let us know how ye all are, of if any of the money that was sent from all parts of this country, for relief for Ireland, has reached as far as you. Although the Atlantic rolls between us, it has not removed my affection from you ... Owen Tansey.'"

That is an excerpt from a letter that appeared in The Roscommon & Leitrim Gazette on July 17, 1847.

In this line it gives, last name, first name, age at time of declaration, where born, port of departure, date of entry, residing in, date of declaration.

All that was listed for 'where born' on this particular alien declaration was 'Ireland". Sorry this particular clerk did not ask for anything more specific. Some of the previous clerks did. Some of the succeeding forms, actually ask what county? This one falls in the cracks. If you read the webpage where this item was posted, you will find that I include all the info given on the declaration. The only way you can be certain that is is your ancestor is to check passenger lists. If he came by himself, then your only clue would be his age.

But, if he came with other members of the family, the list would confirm the declaration. Some, but very few, early passenger lists mention county and country.

Most of these spellings have been retained, but when it was quite evident that Mr. Thomas had struck the wrong key, the writer did not hesitate to make the necessary correction.

MacAlonan Mac Giolla Adhamhnáin (devotee of St. Adhamhnán, mod. Eunan). This was a famous Christian name in the diocese of Raphoe, taken from the saint so called. Found in counties Antrim and Derry.

The biggest religion, other than Catholic, in County Antrim is Presbyterian. Checking Mitchell's, A Guide to Irish Parish Registers, he give the following parish names for Kilraghts:

Church of Ireland: Kilraghts

Catholic: Ballymoney & Derrykeighan, records start 1853

Presbyterian: Kilraghts, two sets of records, 1st start 1836, 2nd start

1858

Checking the LDS catalog, I see they have the 1901 and 1911 census but no church records. They also have two books on the church history of the area, you might enjoy.

Checking Ryan's, Irish Church Records, both sets of Presbyterian records reside in the parish church so you could write the minister and ask for a lookup. If I were you, I would start here, it would only cost you a dollar stamp and a small donation to the church, much cheaper than hiring someone.

MacAlonan Mac Giolla Adhamhnáin (devotee of St. Adhamhnán, mod. Eunan). This was a famous Christian name in the diocese of Raphoe, taken from the saint so called. Found in counties Antrim and Derry.

The biggest religion, other than Catholic, in County Antrim is Presbyterian. Checking Mitchell's, A Guide to Irish Parish Registers, he give the following parish names for Kilraghts:
Church of Ireland: Kilraghts

Catholic: Ballymoney & Derrykeighan, records start 1853

Presbyterian: Kilraghts, two sets of records, 1st start 1836, 2nd start 1858

Checking the LDS catalog, I see they have the 1901 and 1911 census but no church records. They also have two books on the church history of the area, you might enjoy.

Checking Ryan's, Irish Church Records, both sets of Presbyterian records reside in the parish church so you could write the minister and ask for a lookup. If I were you, I would start here, it would only cost you a dollar stamp and a small donation to the church, much cheaper than hiring someone.

When I was in Ireland last month, I had some delicious Christmas Pudding at my friend Jane Lyon's home. She served it specially for me because I had said I had never had any. However, upon eating it, it reminded me of minced pie that my father always requested Thanksgiving and Christmas. Today, Jane posted her recipe on the Ireland-L mailing list and I know she won't mind me passing it on to our special group.

Once again, Pat- Thank you so much. Did the church census taken late 1700s have a specific name?

It looked like LDS had some interesting films but once again the dates are in question. Could you also check the variations: McAloney, McLonan, McLoney for any hits? Apparently McAlonan and McAloney were used interchangeably. If anyone has any ideas about that, I'd like to hear them. I can only guess that McAlonan was more Protestant sounding, and that he changed to fit his social surroundings. In 1830 in Jackson Washington County around mostly (protestant) Scots Irish farmers he is enumerated as John McAlonan, ten years later in Greenwich as McLoney, and then his son Robert as McLoney in 1850 in West Troy. In later census the father went back to McAlonan. I may have been "named" by a stone carver from Wm. H. young Monuments in Troy, as a head stone in Cambridge, NY in 1857 that they made was the first time we have found "my" spelling, for Roberts first wife's grave.

Does any one have any ideas about some "Mc" names that fluctuate between/ evolve from an "-an" or "-a" ending to an "-ey" ending (or vice versa), for example McCleary / McClera , McGillvary / McGilvra , and McAlona / McAloney ??? These are examples that were clearly the same men with last names that slightly varied in consecutive census in Washington County. I assume also it may be a result of heavy accent, phonetics, and maybe limited literacy. Any other interpretations?

I wonder if anyone on the Rensselaer County List or the Troy Irish Genealogy List remember Dave's Grill?

Dave's Grill was on 5 Cross Street just up from another well known Troy grill, The Snuggery Inn. Cross Street, for those not familiar with Troy streets, is the side street near Marty Burke's South End Tavern.

Owners were Dave Dufty, who was born in England and died in Providence, Rhode Island on April 6, 1961 and his sister-in-law, Mary C. O'Connor who died in Troy on October 12, 1963. Dave was married to Julia O'Connor. Mary and Julia were sisters to my grandfather William O'Connor and were my great aunts.

The grill, which was open for about twenty years, was attached to the side of the O'Connor family home. My great grandparents were Timothy O'Connor, born Nenagh, County Tipperary, Ireland, and his wife Catherine McCormick O'Connor born in Dunbin, County Louth, Ireland. They lived at Cross Street from the 1870's until their deaths in 1912 and 1923. My mother, Mary Elizabeth O'Connor McGrath, even lived at Cross Street with the extended O'Connor family for her first few years until her parents, William O'Connor and Mary Carroll O'Connor moved behind the Cross street house onto Burden Avenue. My mother spent the rest of her life at 739 Burden Avenue and when she married James McGrath the boy next door at 741 Burden Avenue, they lived all their married life on the second floor of 739 Burden Avenue.

Dave's Grill was a popular spot for families on a hot summer night. Cars would park all over the road in front of the grill and the wife and kids would sit in the car while the husband went into the grill to get drinks. He would come out of the grill carrying a beer tray of drinks and perhaps a small box (not bag) of the old time Blue Ribbon potato chips. Does anyone remember them? The parents would sit in the cars and enjoy their drinks while the kids would play games on the quiet back street. As kids ourselves we would join in and play hide and seek, etc. with the children. There would literally be dozens of cars parked there with everyone sitting in their cars enjoying the hot nights.

As children we would leave our house on Burden Avenue and walk through our back yard to go visit Mary O'Connor, who was my great aunt Mame, and her brother Charlie. If we wanted soda from the bar there was a small passageway with a telephone that led to the bar. You had to knock on the door with a coin and eventually a bar tender would come to the door and take your order. As kids we would sometimes bring a bucket to get beer for our McGrath grandparents who lived next door to us on Burden Avenue. My grandfather, Thomas McGrath and his wife Nora Kennedy McGrath, both from Thurles, Tipperary, Ireland would enjoy their beer with friends from Ireland, sing songs like the Maid of Sweet Carew and have a good cry in their beer.

I imagine it was a hard life in the O'Connor homestead. There was no hot water, no refrigerator only a ice box and there was no central heat. In the cold weather, Charlie would have a coal fire in the stove in the sitting room where Mame presided in her rocking chair alongside a large table which was under a large colored glass dome. As the night wore on Charlie would heat bricks on the stove which would then be carried up to warm the beds in the unheated upstairs rooms. If we got a little rambunctious, Mame would give us a warning that "Charles will give you the gate" so we then would guiet down.

The O'Connor home and Dave's Grill has been torn down for over forty years now but I still have a vivid impression of the buildings and the good times we had there growing up. One memento I still have from the building is a photograph of the Burden Water Wheel when it was a ruin and most likely being dismantled. I found this photo in the O'Connor home.

All of my O'Connor's as well as my McGrath's worked at the Burden Iron Company.

Rensselaer County Listers and Troy Irish Genealogy Listers may enjoy reading this rambling bit of family history.

I was searching The Troy Record newspaper microfilm at the Troy Library for the death notice on John Keating, a second cousin once removed, who died April 20, 1932. As usual, when reading the old papers I look for the sections named South End or other similar wordings to see if any family names may appear. The following article caught my attention.

THE TROY RECORD - Wednesday Evening April 20, 1932 page 22

SOUTH END.

Surprise Party

A surprise birthday party was tendered last evening in honor of Miss Agnes O'Connor at the home of her sister, Mrs. James McGrath, 739 Burden Avenue. The house was attractively decorated in pink and white and a large birthday cake formed a centerpiece. Dinner was served to fifty quests. Piano selections were played by Mrs. James McGrath and Joseph Clancy. Vocal numbers were sung by Miss Agnes O'Connor and Frank Murray. Entertainment was also provided by Mrs. P. J. Elligott and Bridie Keveney. Awards for games were presented by Macy Healy and Mr. Keveney. Miss O'Connor received a beautiful bouquet of pink carnations and other handsome gifts.

Note: The party was April 19, 1932 and it was Miss O'Connor's 20th birthday.

This party was long before I was born but I really enjoyed reading this family history story. Agnes O'Connor, "Miss O" as she was called by family members, died on October 2, 2002 at age 90. She was buried from Clinton's (Florence Clinton was one of her sisters) and as is the current practice today there was a large collection of photograph's displayed so I posted a copy of the above article with the pictures.

During the wake a woman came to pay her respects and told us her elderly mother said this was one wake she had to go to because our mother Mary O'Connor McGrath was a sister of Agnes and that her mother had lived with Mary and Jim McGrath for a while. Of course this was all new to us. After the woman left, my cousin John Clinton happened to read the birthday story on the bulletin board and he came over and said "you know that woman who just left was the daughter of Mrs. P. J. Elligott mentioned in the story." So off goes a letter to the daughter of Mrs. P. J. Elligott.

Dear Betty:

Enclosed are the following items which may be of interest to your mother:

- 1. Story on 20th birthday party for Agnes O'Connor which mentions your mother and your aunt.
- 2. Wedding write-up on my mother and father.
- 3. News story on the death of my mother's brother in 1918.

I would be interested in hearing your mother's reactions to these

stories especially what she remembers about the birthday party. Also did she know my mother before she was married? What time period did she live with my mother?

You can explain to your mother that I am the eight of Mame and Jim's children. I am also the second William as my mother's first child died seven days after birth. My

birth name was William O'Connor McGrath to distinguish me from the first William McGrath.

Hi Bill:

Sorry for the delay in answering your correspondence. I've been trying to gather information for you.

Sorry, Mom does not remember the birthday party. But she really enjoyed the articles as we all did.

My mom didn't know your mother before marriage. She came to this county when she was only fourteen. Mame took my mom in when her Aunt Kate (who was not very nice, really tough and mean) wouldn't let her go out. Your father Jimmy said "that's enough you're coming to live with us". He went over and got my mother's belongings and she lived with them she thinks for about a year or so. My Aunt Magie came from Ireland and she stayed with your mother also for about 2 months. Then her cousin found them an apartment on Federal street. They searched all over South Troy and there wasn't a space to be had. your mother used to tuck my mother into bed at night. She was so very good to her. I'm sure the Good Lord has her in the palm of his hand.

My mother had told me about your brother's death.

She told me a funny story about your grandfather, who lived next door at the time. He acquired a suckling pig and used to keep it in the cellar feeding it until Christmas when they had a great feast. No one was to know it was there.

My mom gets the years mixed up, it was so long ago. But the year of the party 1932, she took my older brother Joe, who was five at the time, to Ireland to see his grandparents. I never knew them.

Hope this has been of interest to you as it was to us. Thanks again. Happy Holidays. God Bless.

He signed Bond 9/01/1871 whereby he promised to pay Margaret Arts \$1200.00 with interest.

Margaret Arts then on 10/16/1871 for the amount of \$1.00 conveyed a certain lot in South Troy to my g-g-grandfather.

Are the dates you list the dates the Bond and Deed were signed by your gggfather and Margaret Arts, or the dates they were recorded in the Rensselaer County Clerk's Office?

By the way, the \$1.00 amount (and sometimes \$10.00) is a standard amount that is put on all deeds (except Executor's Deeds which do show the exact amount of the conveyance). Also, if you can see the deed stamps on the deed you can figure out the amount of the conveyance.

Then the same premises were conveyed from Charles M. Davis to my g-g-grandfather by Deed dated 8/25/1874.

When Margaret Arts conveyed this property to your gggfather on 10/16/1871 he became the fee owner of the property. It's difficult to understand how Charles Davis could convey the same property to your gggfather on 08/25/1874.

My reasoning tells me that the City of Troy both gave my ancestor the land for free and loaned him the money to build a house. And Charles Davis would have been the builder? Any assistance in this matter would be greatly appreciated.

Generally, a researcher will have some basis for assuming that his or her ancestors were Quakers. In an Irish context the evidence of a typical 'Quaker' surname is usually sufficient to give good grounds for such a conclusion. Of course, many surnames never became prominent enough to make them typically 'Quaker', but some names are very specifically and exclusively associated with the Quakers.

Particular family names can indicate the regional origins of some Quakers. Bewley, Goodbody, Perry, Pim, Robinson might be seen as names typical of Mountmellick and the midlands counties of Leinster. In Cork, Abell, Beale, Deaves, Harvey, Pike and Wright were common. Sparrow, Woodcock, Poole and Goff were to be found in Wexford. In Limerick were to be found Alexander, Bennis and Unthank. Typical Ulster families were Bell, Christy, Greer, Hobson, Hogg, Nicholson, Pearson and Richardson.

Among Irish Quaker dynasties with 'native' Irish names that should be mentioned are Carroll, Dowd, Doyle, MacQuillan, O'Brien and O'Callaghan. Other Quaker names deriving from Scotland, occur chiefly in Ulster. Some typical Ulster Quaker names might be Barclay, Bell, Christy, Greer and Douglas.

Once again we had a great conversation at the bar and then moved to the DR for eats.Frank Ryan shared some great old time pictures of the Troy PD from 1916, cops on motorcycles no less that far back, prominent in the picture was one of his Norton brother in laws. He had a wonderful kindergarten group picture, not sure of the year but probably 1920's and 4 or 5 1960's bowling league pictures from the old Elks in Troy as well as one of several patrons at the Elks bar.

There are simple instructions at the site for submission of a name, you are then given a PW and can enter and edit information. Great way to honor your heros.

Mentioned also was that the Troy Libary has available in the Troy Room the records of St. Patricks Church and St. Jean de Baptiste Church, these include baptismals and marriages. St. Patricks is right up to 2000. Catholic High has the yearbooks that have been mentioned on the list as well as some scrapbooks that were put together by students over the years. The NYS archives also has available on index cards WWI and Civil War records. You cannot touch them but they will show them to you, so this entails a visit to the archives

Not quite list material but interesting anyway is that we found that myself, Bill and Frank all lived in Germany at one point in our lives. Too bad we weren't looking for German Roots at that time, if we had them.

That's about it, we will meet next month at the Grove up across from HVCC.

If anyone present at the meeting has something to add please feel free.

It is with great pride and pleasure that I can report that the transcribers have completely transcribed the 1900 Troy NY census! This has only taken just a bit over a year. At times we had 40 people working on transcribing the census and by the time it ended we still had at least 10 people actively working. To date, the following wards on line: 6, 8, 9, 11 and 12. Today I am beginning to get the 1st and 2nd wards also on line and they will go up alphabetically as I get the time.

The 1st ward has 2,187 individuals, 275 dwelling and 520 families. The transcribers to thank are: Gwen Beiermeister, Pam Warren, Colleen Wheeler, Kay Brearton, Ron Mauer, Herb Phelps, Mary Nigro, Walt Warren, Art Boyne, Denise Jone, Gary Craver, Jerry Hurlbert, Lynn Grice and Bob McConihe.

The 2nd ward, much bigger than the 1st, has 4,730 individuals, 594 families and 948 families. The transcribers to thank are: Pam Warren, Ron Mauer, Bob McConihe, Jathy Janus, Jay Stevens, Herb Phelps, Kay Brearton, Collen Wheeler, Lynn Grice, Walter Warren, Gwen Beiermeister, Art Boyne, Eileen Guinee, Sandra Johnson, Christine Dunham, Bob Yoder.

The transcribers come from all over America and we also have one from England. They transcribe the pages, I proofread and then format and get on line. Both of these wards were extremely hard to transcribe for many

reasons: some pages in bad shape or had tape on them, enumerators had hard to read penmanship, enumerators could not spell last names, first name, countries of origin and/or occupations. Therefore, use the information as a resource and go to the original census (on film or at county office) to see for yourself how the last name was spelled. For example, Halligan was also spelled as Hallagan, sometimes in the same family group.

Tonight and tomorrow I will get most of the pages on line and I hope to complete this by tomorrow night, unless I am called for work. You can access the pages at the url under my name, under New York State, click on Troy. I am getting them on line at my site first and then will link them to the Rensselaer site at: http://www.rootsweb.com/~nyrenss2/At the Rensselaer County site, under Cities, click on Troy, and then on Censuses.
