I don't know about Ancestry, but I know the Family History Library in SLC has the same problem with extracted records from the microfilms. They triple check a name with three different people before putting it in their IGI. But, if there is a name they cannot make out, especially in the very old films of other countries, they skip it. There is nothing like scrolling thru a film yourself to find the folks you are looking for, because the spelling and/or writing of the name by the census taker could be quite creative. You are the one who has a vested interest in finding a certain name and your eyes will be sharper for variations. For clear images of the older censuses, I personally like genealogy.com, but I find more people when I scroll through myself. Unfortunately, this is a pain when researching in a city like Troy or Albany, but it was relatively easy when doing a small area like Rotterdam in Schenectady.

I have yet to find much out about the Careys in the family. In the 1880 census with my great-grandfather, Michael Shea, is listed Bridget Shea - mother and Bridget Shea - wife. When I obtained Michael Shea's death certificate it had Michael Shea - father born Ireland and Bridget Carey - mother born Ireland. I have yet to find any other information other then what I found from a cousin on The Island (NYC) who said his grandmother, my grandaunt Anna, went to Ireland with him to Waterville, County Kerry in 1978 and found a soliciter and priest who knew the family. I wrote to the parish priest in Waterville and never recieved a reply. I hope to relocate the address for that church and try again. I would suspect Bridget Carey, Michael's mother, and Bridget Dunn, Michael's wife, were both from County Kerry but I have no proof. Norwich, CT but he and Bridget gave 1861 as thier naturalization date on the census. Michael was discharged in 1863 after losing an eye during the siege of Port Hudson, Louisiana.

So unfortunately I only really have the name Bridget Carey as the mother of Michael Shea.

The June 1850 federal census in Troy, New York, lists Anthony and Bridget McDonald, ages 26, Sally McDonald, 50, and Catherine, age 2, all born in Ireland, and James 1/12, born in New York.. Listed in the same household were Anthony Maloy, 14, and Margaret Maloy, 17. I've looked high and low for ship records to no avail. Range of immigration years are 1848-50. It's possible Sally and baby Catherine could have come separately. I'm skeptical about a rumor saying a grandma stayed behind with a baby and when coming over, one or both of them drowned.

In about 1857, the McDonalds by then had three extra children and moved to Minnesota. I've worked off and on on this family for 30 years and haven't been able to find anything about their early years in Ireland.

Would you please check your records for this family? If your membership includes state census's, please check New York's State 1855 census records.

When I was small and lived in Oakland, California we had a large neighborhood of Irish around us and my mother who was going to school over in San Francisco after she finished high school had to go live with a lady know as "Mama June" who was her aunt. The unusual thing was that Mama June was a Fortune Teller and she didn't like the term. She was born in County Cork and her mother who was a seer had almost been put upon by the locals for making a false prediction, but most of the other times she was correct.

Well Mama June really had a reputation around town and a pretty good class of people who came to her home for readings and this is how she supported her self. She is noted for finding a murderer in 1949 and they called her the Irish Fortune teller which just sent her into titers. On some nights she had readings just to keep in shape. She use to put me on her knee and she had a very strange talking voice and a brogue so thick she needed an interpreter when she talked on the radio. But she talked to me one time and I went home that night and the next morning I got up and I made myself a piece of cinnamon toast and looked out the window and there was a large deer standing there as she said there would be. Then I went over and laid on the couch and we had a heater in the middle of the living room and that's when this little woman dressed like a peasant followed by a little man stepped out of the stove door that you opened up I guess for air to get inside. I can't remember what the woman told me, but it had something to do with it will be all right. Then she waved to me and stepped back inside the stove.

Later that morning when my parents got up, my mothers sister came by the house to tell her that "Mama June" had died during the night.

My Irish mother said that fortune tellers and seers were common in Ireland in those days. I know that not all of you are pure Irish but did you have a fortune teller or seer in your family? jd

Several years ago while researching my paternal grandparents - Mary and Patrick Gallagher - I checked St. Joseph's cemetery records. I learned that not only were my grandparents buried in the cemetery plot, but another couple also named Mary and Patrick Gallagher were buried in the plot. I obtained death certificates on the second couple and learned that they were brother and sister and the children of my grandfather's brother, Denis who had died in 1894 of a fractured skull from a fall down a pair of stairs at my grandparents' residence. I learned from her death certificate that Mary had died in 1904 as the result of injuries suffered in a house fire. I looked up the newspaper article

In today's Troy Record in the section called "Twentieth Centry Chronicle: This Day in 1904", the original newspaper article is published. She was 20 years old and it is believed that she may have been carrying an oil lamp that set her clothes on fire. The Fire Chief Patrick Byron stated that the sight which met his eyes when he entered the bedroom ws the most horrible he ever witnessed. Her brother was also in his 20's when he died a few years later apparently from natural causes.

I was quite surprised when I saw the article in today's issue of the paper.

In 1900 Troy NY was still an industrious town, plentiful with jobs. Many people from NYC and towns along the Hudson River went there to work. My own family are found in NYC, Brooklyn, plus the counties of Orange, Westchester, and Albany and Troy in Rensselaer Co in different census years depending where they went to find work. It makes for a lot of fun when we try to follow them around 100 or so years later :-)

With some great volunteers and three years of our lives, we transcribed the Troy NY 1880 federal census and then 2002 we started on the 1900 census. The transcribers have completed their work and I have gradually been able to get most of it on line, ward by ward. Today I started getting the 4th ward on line. It includes 4,587 individuals, 622 dwellings and 1,035 families. Transcribers to thank: Art Boyne, Bob mcConihe, Gwen Beiermeister, Pam Warren, Kay Brearton, Colleen Wheeler, Christine Dunham, Herb Phelps, Ron Mauer, Lynn Grice, Denise Jones, Kathy Janus, Eileen Guinee, Bob Yoder, Mary Nigro and Gary Craver.

Please remember when checking for your ancestor that you must keep an open mind when looking for your surname. For example, if you are looking for Casey or Carey, I suggest you check both names because with some handwriting they looked exactly alike. One of the enumerators of this ward had a hard time with spelling, not only last names, but first names and occupations. We transcribed it as he spelled it. Then if you add poor handwriting plus scribbling all over the surnames, there is a lot of room for mistakes. Again, I must say, use these on line indexes as a resource. If you think you found your ancestor, check the census itself. If you think your ancestor should be there and you don't find him/her in the indexes, again, check the census itself.

You can access the 4th ward at the URL below my name. At my homepage, at the top, under New York State click on Troy. On the Troy webpage you will find a link for the 4th ward. Tonight I got up four spreadsheets and hope to get them all uploaded between now and Monday.

I always thought the old school Catholic Irish were very religious, and that sounds like something the church would frown on, like the Masons. From the old stories I heard the parish priest was the Head Cat in Charge in town and what they said went, and were like a celebrity.

I get a kick hearing about the old school priests, far from being stereotypically gay and all the other terrible things you hear about now. My father told me stories about the priests at Catholic High. Father Mulqueen, smoking Italian cigars and beating the hell out of boys who got young girls "in trouble" as you used to say. Nuns cracking hands with pointers and open handing someone in the face for a cross look. I guess that's why my father would always make a point of it at my parent-teacher conferences to let the teacher know that beating me was most definitely an acceptable option for discipline.
