I just want to express my gratitude to one of our group, Kay Brearton, for her generosity in acting as my tour guide in Troy last week.

What fun it was!! We met in Troy early on Monday morning (after rush hour) to begin our adventure.

First, let me explain that I am not from the Troy area, so I did not grow up nor go to school here. Years ago, when I first decided to do genealogy research, I had to take out a map to see exactly where the city of Troy was located. I moved to Clifton Park a little over 4 years ago and, since then, have become familiar with the locations of the Troy Library, Rensselaer County Courthouse, St. Mary's Cemetery, and a few other places in downtown Troy, including the Irish Mist and Burke's Tavern, where several of our TIGS meetings have been held.

My great-grandparents, John J. Mangan and Johanna O'Brien, lived at 636, 648 and 650 River Street throughout their married lives. Those are easy addresses to find since they are right on a street that runs north and south along the Hudson River (648 is now a roofing company with a sign out front).

I never ventured into the myriad of streets east of River until about 2 weeks ago after a Friday afternoon research session at the Troy Library, when I impulsively set out to find 32 Hutton Street. I knew it was near St.

Peter's Church so, from Second St., I headed north on Fifth Avenue to St.

Peter's. But I couldn't turn right -- one way street!! So I turned left and wound up on River Street (whew!). At least I knew where I was. I tried to go around the block and up Hoosick Street, took a left onto another street (by now I was lost) and tried to come down to Hutton Street when I was at a dead-end. I could see St. Peter's Church Steeple and I could look down onto Hutton Street but couldn't get there. By this time (5 pm) there was lots of Friday afternoon traffic and then a snow squall arose suddenly and I decided to head home before I got myself into a deeper dilemma.

When Kay learned of my harrowing experience, she immediately suggested her taking me around the neighborhood of St. Peter's -- and it was my great good luck that Kay made that magnanimous offer.

When we met, I had a list of about 6 addresses to locate -- Kay didn't hesitate for one second. We went down one street and up another until I had been to each one. Some of the numbers were empty lots but houses still stood next to them so I had a good idea of what they looked like years ago. The one Hutton Street address was easiest to get to by parking on Fifth at the corner of Hutton and just walking a few feet east (MUCH easier than trying to drive to it). 32 is an empty lot but 30 is still there. Kay made it all so simple and easy, AND was able to give running commentary on the background of the various locations.

One address that I wanted to see was on Earl Street (formerly Green St.) Well, it is an ALLEY! I don't care what the street sign says -- Earl is NOT a street, it is an alley. I told Kay not to go down there, it was so narrow -- only room for one car. Too late! Kay hadn't even hesitated -- down the alley we went. I was horrified at the potholes but I guess Troy drivers are used to them. Two older gentlemen (city workers?) were near the end of the alley. They just stared wide-eyed as Kay smiled and waved as we passed by. I still don't think they believed their eyes!

It was a wonderful tour and great fun, as you can tell. We then went on to St. Peter's Cemetery but I will save the story of that adventure for another time.

And to think that some people say that doing geneology is so DULL!! They haven't met Kay yet!

My O'Brien side came from a place called 'Five Alley' just outside Nenagh, Tipp. In 1987 we went to Ireland with only this address and a list of family names. Our stay in Limerick payed off since our B and B host knew the area.

Because there were so many O'Briens there we went to the Heritage center in Nenagh. We did talk to a Pub owner in Five Alley and he did not know of our family (they emmigrated about 1866 to Troy and Cohoes, NY.) He did, however, know a Sullivan family-one member living just down the road from the Pub. Reading the Times Union in Albany on 4/15/2004 there is an article about a man who was doing yardwork in his backyard when his pick struck what he thought was a rock. Turned out to be the tombstone of Michael Lynch who died in Albany on 10/24/1841. Lynch came from County Cork and died at age 37. The concensus is that he was buried in St. Mary's Church cemetary that was near where it was found. St Marys was built by the local Irish community in 1797 at Lodge and Pine Streets and the cemetary was closed in 1873. Most bodies and stones were moved to a new location. Many stones were offered to people who wanted them when that "new" cemetary closed and they were building a High School on the land if there were no known relatives. Many ended up as paving stones in back yards. This stone was found facedown under 4" of dirt in 6 pieces in their orignal position as though it just tumbed down. The inscription says it was erected by his brothers. A city directory lists a mason named Michael Lynch at 16 Van Zandt St. in 1840 and then a widow named Lynch at that address in 1843.

The article goes on about the Irish population in Albany at the time, etc.

The man who found it plans to put the stone up by his back fence and says he is not moving Mr. Lynch too far.

The following information is a compilation of several messages I previously sent out on the holdings at the Troy Library and the Troy Court House which may be helpful to anyone researching relatives in Troy, NY.

A. The Troy Library Genealogy Room has three rolls of microfilm on Troy Deaths and Burials.

The three rolls of film in the library are:

1. Burial Records - March 1, 1833 - September 2, 1867 2. Burial Records - August 14, 1867 - June 27, 1882 3. Burial Records - June 8, 1882 - February 27, 1891.

If you are not in the Troy area and want to order the film on Troy Deaths and Burials from Salt Lake City, the numbers required for ordering are:

- 1. 1434103
- 2. 1434104
- 3. 1434105

The handwriting, for the most part, is beautiful to read but it may help to have some idea of what you are looking for. For example I was looking for my great grandmother Mary Carroll and her daughters Margaret and Catherine who were on Ida Street in the 1880 census and then disappear from all records.

The first record I found was "Wife of Mr. Carroll" on Ida Street who died on March 11, 1881 of smallpox. The next record I found was "Child of Mr. Carroll" who died in the Troy Hospital on March 15, 1881 of smallpox. Based on the age shown for the child, I knew it was Margaret. I am still searching for Catherine and assume she also died of smallpox. By the way, no one in my family ever knew of the existence of Margaret and Catherine and I only found out about them through the 1880 census records.

These Death and Burial records are an important reference for Troy researchers since many of the entries predate the 1880 law requiring the reporting of deaths.

Individuals who died outside of Troy are listed IF they were buried in Troy.

B. If you are researching relatives who died in Rensselaer County, the Surrogates Court in the Court House on Second Street near the Troy Library is a great source. They allow you to see the files in the basement on Rensselaer County Decedents. Records are either on 4×6 cards or in bound books as follows:

BOOKS:

1794-1873 One Book covers A to Z.

1874-1881 One Book covers A to Z.

1881-1916 One Book covers A to K - Other Book coves L to Z.

Records on cards and in books have a Volume and page reference which directs you to copies of legal documents in bound books on the shelves. Assistance is required if you want photocopies.

Wear old clothes when researching these bound books since the leather covers are in bad shape and you get covered with a red powder.

C. The genealogy room in the Troy Library has a 3×5 card file which at different times was compiled by library staff from the daily newspaper. Card shows date of event, date of newspaper, page number for referenced item and in some case the column number of the newspaper.

D. City Directories. There is an extensive collection of Troy city directories from the early 1800's and possibly earlier. I forgot what year they start.

Books are great for tracking down a family name. The earlier books do not list the wife's name but will show the names of widows. In later years the city directories start reporting the first name of the wife. Also, the early books will give an exact date of death. The newer books for the 1970's on stop reporting the date of death. The individual is just deleted from the book.

The Troy books include West Troy (now Watervliet) Lansingburg, Cohoes and Green Island. There are also some directories for the cities of Albany and Glens Falls in the library.

E. Newspapers - Old copies of the Troy newspapers are on microfilm and are located on the second floor of the library. These are great for the detailed information provided on the deceased and his family. When looking at the microfilm for an obit, remember to look for three separate items.

The formal obit which usually details occupation and work history, the small obit found on the bottom of the same paper and the write-up on the funeral which will be found in the paper published on the day of the funeral or a few days later. The small obit, which is no longer printed in today's papers, may list the names of grandchildren whereas the formal obit may just say 6 grandchildren. Some relatives are mentioned in one obit and not the other. The funeral notice, in addition to giving the name of the organist and soloist, names of songs, etc., will have the names of the pall bearers and sometimes give their relationship to the deceased.

F. Many other reference books and microfilm census records are available in the Genealogy Room at the library. If in Troy, spend some time at the library looking at the various sources. The new books they have on St.

Patrick's Church in Troy go up to the year 2000 and are a great resource.

Hope the above items are of help in searching for your Troy connections.

PREFACE

In 1786, the site of the city of Troy was the seat of five or more farms, crossed by roads intersecting a highway running north and south, near the river. At the time Albany, named a city in 1686, Poughkeepsie, founded in 1735, Lansingburgh, laid out in 1771, and Hudson, incorporated in 1785, were all comparatively populous places. When three years later the small body of settlers at Troy publicly advertised their confidence of its becoming "at no very distant period as famous for its trade and navigation as many of the first town," this boldly advanced expectation may have been regarded by the inhabitants of the older settlements on the Hudson as highly presumptuous and improbable of realization. However, in a short time creditable evidences of the enterprise and growth of the place began to be noted by observant travelers. One, seeing the advantageous situation of the village at the head of navigation, declared that it would not only be "a serious thorn in the side o!

f New City (Lansingburgh), but in the issue a fatal rival." Another, cognizant of the success attending the business ventures of its emulous merchants, remarked that those of Albany viewed "this growing prosperity of their neighbors with an evil eye," and considered it as "an encroachment upon their native rights." Another, discovering in 1807 the extensive trade which "Troy had opened with the new settlements to the northward, through the states of New York and Vermont, as far as Canada," observed that "in another twenty years it promises to rival the old established city of Albany."

These initial forecasts of the "ultimate ascendancy" of Troy became more significant as the village gradually expanded its area and enlarged its trade. The public spirit and local undertakings of its people began to be commended as exemplary and highly laudable. A distinguished metropolitan journalist, visiting the city in 1835, wrote: "Troy has been a pattern for all other places in respect to its industry and enterprise. Lansingburgh, four miles above, had attained almost to its present size when the first building was erected in Troy, and Albany, six miles below, had been in existence one hundred and eighty years. And yet Troy, far outstripping the former in a very short time, is now rapidly advancing on the latter." A popular English novelist, passing through Troy and Albany in 1837, and noting the difference in the growth of the two cities, could not forbear remarking the successful competition of the Trojans. "We have a singular proof, not only of the rapidity!

with which cities rise in America but also how superior energy will overcome every disadvantage. Little more than twenty years ago, Albany stood by itself a large and prosperous city without a rival, but its population was chiefly Dutch. The Yankees from

the Eastern States came down and settled at Troy, not five miles distant, in opposition to them. It would be supposed that Albany could have crushed this city in its birth, but it could not, and Troy is now a beautiful city, with * * * a population of 20,000 souls, and divides the commerce with Albany, from which most of the eastern trade has been ravished."

What, it here may be questioned, was a distinctive characteristic of the founders of Troy? The answer may be clothed in the pertinent words of the Hon. John Woodworth, who began residing in the village in 1791. "There was at that early day, and what distinguished Troy in all its progress, and was so conducive to its prosperity, a concert of action, a concentration of sentiment and united efforts on all questions relating to the interests of the village. To all these, political questions held a secondary place." This element of concord also manifested itself in the undertakings of their immediate successors. In 1835, a similar observation was made by another witness of the sprit of co-operation which quickened their efforts to increase the mercantile and manufacturing advantages of the city. "They know and feel their interests are identified with those of the city, and in whatever way the latter is benefited, they readily perceive their own general ad advantage. The!

fruits of this policy, and the entire unanimity with which they act in regard to all matters of profit and loss are at this time most evident in the flourishing condition of the town."

The later consequences of this notable emulousness of the people of Troy in making the place an important center of trade and commerce are discoverable not only in the wide fame now specializing the distribution of the productions of the manufactories of the city in all parts of the world, but also in the growing solicitude of the present inhabitants that a still greater renown may crown the industrial activity of its future people. Whatever incentives may induce them to further the interests of the city in the next hundred years, none will probably stimulate them more than the success which attended the vigorous enterprise and concerted action of their early predecessors. They, no doubt, will be honored for projecting and accomplishing improvements that will better their own condition, beautify the city, and enlarge its industries, making Troy the most populous, attractive, and important city on the Hudson.

I mentioned a few days ago that my brother-in-law, Joseph Galusky, died on Sunday. His obitituary notice mentioned that he worked at the Green Island, NY plant of Ford Motor Company for over 40 years and that he participated in the Normandy Invasion and the Battle of the Bulge during World War II. While it was not mentioned in the obituary, Joe was at the liberation of one of the concentration camps. These bare facts do not give a picture of the individual that Joe was and, while events are fresh in my mind, I wanted to outline some of my memories of Joe Galusky which impacted me and other members of my family.

As to the Ford Motor Company, Joe worked in the Radiator Division which was a muscle wrenching job. Many of his former co-workers are long gone but a number of them showed up at his wake on Wednesday evening. Many times Joe would stop at a roadside stand on the way home from Ford's and pick up some fresh corn and a home baked pie and stop at my mother's house on Burden Avenue. While there he would wash and scrub her floors. You never heard this from Joe but when visiting my mother she would mention that Joe Galusky stopped in and did the floors.

Joe's funeral was at St. Michael The Archangel Church on Thursday. Anyone familiar with the Troy area knows this is the new church which replaced the one on Stow Avenue which burned to the ground in the late 1970's or early 1980's. The old St. Michael's, which when it was built in 1872 was known as St. Michael's At The Ironworks since it was near the sprawling Burden Iron Company. This church was one of the most beautiful in Troy and anyone who was ever in the church has to remember the almost life size high relief Stations of The Cross which had figures that were three to four feet high. Although living in Clifton Park for the last 30 years, St. Michael's has a special place in my heart and I still consider it my home parish. My mother, Mary Elizabeth O'Connor McGrath (1901-1981) was the organist there for many, many years and nearly all my family members were baptized there, married there and buried from there. The various funeral notices and wedding stories that I ha!

ve collected on family members almost always mention my mother as the organist for the service. Part of the current baptismal font is made from the basin and cover from the original that was in the burned church. At the funeral Thursday, as I looked at the font, I thought of the family members baptized in that very same basin - my grandfather, William O'Connor in 1880, my mother in 1901, Joe Galusky in 1924 and myself in 1938. My mother always used to tell me I was the 2000th baby baptized in St. Michael's. However, in looking through the baptismal records years ago, I saw that I was the 3000th baby and not the 2000th. What's a thousand here or there!

The Galusky family lived at 731 Burden Avenue and my McGrath's lived at 739 Burden Avenue. So my sister Mary married the boy ALMOST next door. My mother, however, did marry the boy next door. The O'Connor family (my mother and her parents (William Arthur James Francis O'Connor - 1880-1941 and Mary Elizabeth Carroll O'Connor - 1874-1960 and siblings) lived at 739 Burden Avenue after moving from the extended O'Connor family house on Cross Street, which was attached to Dave's Grill where they lived with my great grandparents, Timothy Joseph O'Connor (1836-1912) and Catherine McCormick O'Connor (1850-1912). My father, James J. McGrath, Sr., his parents, Thomas Francis McGrath (1873-1949) and Nora Kennedy McGrath (1872-1955) and siblings moved next door at 741 Burden Avenue. So my mother and father grew up side by side, married and moved upstairs at 739 Burden Avenue and had their 10 children - I'm number 8 by the way. Both my parents spent their entire lives on Burden Aven!

ue. It's kind of ironic that the O'Connor's and McGrath's lived side by side in Troy since both families came from Tipperary where they lived about 20 miles apart. The O'Connor's were from Nenagh and the McGrath's were from Thurles.

Anyone who knew Joe knew his passion for garage sales. He loved to look for antiques and buy things that he thought someone else could use. According to him, whenever he gave you something, it cost only "a quarter". My sister Mary used to get upset with him bringing

"stuff" home so Joe would manage to sneak it into the basement before Mary could get a look at it. He was so proficient at finding the right things for people that my siblings and nieces and nephews would tell him they for looking for "such and such an item" and sure enough, Joe eventually would find it for them. And more than likely it was only a quarter! In visiting Joe and Mary I would always come home with one of his treasures that he found.

Growing up in South Troy, Joe was very familiar with the way things used to be. Streets and houses that were long gone after the Menands Bridge was built. He used to hunt and fish down the dike - which is what we called that wilderness area south of the Menands Bridge. He knew where there were old foundation ruins and could tell you who lived there many years ago and give you the location of old water wells. He would walk for miles along the banks of the Hudson River and at one time found some old cannon balls that surfaced when the river was dredged years ago. He always had something interesting to show you or tell you about. One item I remember was a photograph of Burden Iron workers with the steel vault made for the burial of President Grant. I recalled that he gave it to my cousin, John Clinton the undertaker in Troy, and Wednesday night at the wake I had John find the picture for me since Tom Carroll from the Hudson Mohawk Gateway Museum at the old Burden Iron of!

fice building in Troy was thrilled when I told him about the photo. He wanted a copy. Joe was also a meticulous and talented individual. He would cane chairs (a lost art) so they would look like new.

Joe also had a few stories that he would tell over and over. As a young kid he found a rare, according to him, nickel along the creek behind Marty Burke's South End Tavern. He accidentally spent the nickel for a ice cream cone and he would lament that the nickel today was worth a million dollars. I am not a coin collector so I can't judge the accuracy of his statement. The other story he would tell would always get me upset. Years ago he helped empty out a house in Troy where they took three truck loads of books to the dump. The house, had always been in the family of a civil war officer and when the unmarried daughter died the house was emptied. As a book lover, I would always get upset at this story. I keep thinking of the book treasures that were lost. I thought that was the place where Joe got his copy of the book Troy's 100 Years that he gave me, but he said no. The book was in his family ever since he was a child. Joe also talked about a collection of baseb!

all cards that belonged to his father. When he came home from World War II, the cards had disappeared from the garage where they were kept.

Before my wife Cathy and I went to Florida in January we visited Joe in the hospital. As usual, his comment was "why did you come all this way to see me, you got enough to do getting ready for Florida". Joe was like that. He would go out of his way to help others but he did not want anyone to go out of the way for him. The Thursday before his death I visited him in the hospital and my sister Mary asked him if he knew who I was. He looked at me and after a minute he said "Sir William" which is what he would call me at times.

I am glad that I had that final visit.
