As you all know, some of the Troy area TIGS members have been transcribing the Burden Iron Company payroll books. As we have to work with the Burden books on the premises of the Rensselaer County Historical Society, this has limited participation in this project to Troy area members. The TIGS transcribers has already finished Book 1 of the records which are now on line and can be searched by name from ANY location. Book 2 is currently being worked on and is now half finished.

One project that we are now ready to start, which can use transcribers outside the Troy area, covers another package of papers from the Burden Record collection. A folder of 73 sheets of paper with 74 pages of data (one page has data on the front and back) covers events (death notices/weddings,etc.) clipped from the Troy Newspaper. The records cover the period March 1890 through April 1895.

The great bulk of the records are Death Notices which is what we will handle first. There are a small number of wedding announcements and engagements which we will address later.

We may be talking about 8,000 death records on these pages which will be a fantastic resource for people searching for Troy ancestors. Also, if anyone has looked at the microfilm of the 1890 newspapers in the Troy Library, you are aware that the pages are dark and hard to read, and you need to read the entire newspaper because the little three and four line death notices can be anywhere on a page. This new TIGS project when done will be a great help to researchers since the records can be searched by name or date.

I now have photocopies of the first ten pages which can be farmed out to volunteers. Page 1, which consists of two 8  $1/2 \times 11$  sheets of paper has approximately 120 death records in four columns on it. A typical entry is shown below:

Notice To TIGS Members:

As you all know, some of the Troy area TIGS members have been transcribing the Burden Iron Company payroll books. As we have to work with the Burden books on the premises of the Rensselaer County Historical Society, this has limited participation in this project to Troy area members. The TIGS transcribers has already finished Book 1 of the records which are now on line and can be searched by name from ANY location. Book 2 is currently being worked on and is now half finished.

One project that we are now ready to start, which can use transcribers outside the Troy area, covers another package of papers from the Burden Record collection. A folder of 73 sheets of paper with 74 pages of data (one page has data on the front and back) covers events (death notices/weddings,etc.) clipped from the Troy Newspaper. The records cover the period March 1890 through April 1895.

The great bulk of the records are Death Notices which is what we will handle first. There are a small number of wedding announcements and engagements which we will address later.

We may be talking about 8,000 death records on these pages which will be a fantastic resource for people searching for Troy ancestors. Also, if anyone has looked at the microfilm of the 1890 newspapers in the Troy Library, you are aware that the pages are dark and hard to read, and you need to read the entire newspaper because the little three and four line death notices can be anywhere on a page. This new TIGS project when done will be a great help to researchers since the records can be searched by name or date.

I now have photocopies of the first ten pages which can be farmed out to volunteers. Page 1, which consists of two  $8\ 1/2\ x\ 11$  sheets of paper has approximately 120 death records in four columns on it. A typical entry is shown below:

Here are some ideas for your upcoming visit to Troy.

1. Call St. Joseph's Rectory (518 274-6720) and ask Bernadette to look up plot records for your family names and ask her if she could please send them to you. She can tell you the grave location (Section, Row,

etcl.) and identify who is buried in the plot and when. The date will be interment date and not the date of death.

- 2. There are no markers at St. Joseph's Cemetery showing Sections. Stop at garage at right side after entry gate and look for Jason. He can show you where to find the gravesite.
- 3. New York State required reporting of births, deaths, etc. starting around 1880. Compliance with the law was spotty in the early years. Prior to 1880 you have to fall back on the Church records.
- 4. Copies of birth and death records are now about \$22.00. If the event occurred in Troy, the certificates can be obtained from:

The handwriting, for the most part, is beautiful to read but it may help to have some idea of what you are looking for. For example I was looking for my great grandmother Mary

The first record I found was "Wife of Mr. Carroll" on Ida Street who died on March 11, 1881 of smallpox. The next record I found was "Child of Mr.

Carroll" who died in the Troy Hospital on March 15, 1881 of smallpox. Based on the age shown for the child, I knew it was Margaret. I am still searching for Catherine and assume she also died of smallpox. By the way, no one in my family ever knew of the existence of Margaret and Catherine and I only found out about them through the 1880 census records.

These Death and Burial records are an important reference for Troy researchers since many of the entries predate the 1880 law requiring the reporting of deaths.

The following newspaper obituary for Mary Ann (Hogan) Clancy (widow of William Clancy) is my link to Sheehan, Dwyer, Augustal, Cassidy.

May 19, 1941 - "....bearers, all relatives, were Richard Sheehan, James Dwyer, John Powers, Peter Masterson, George Augustal and Joseph Cassidy. Interment was in the family plot in St. Peters Cemetery..."

I believe Richard Sheehan siblings were Elizabeth, Harriet, William, John, Mary & Bertha. Parents might have been William & Maria. I'm still working on this lead but in 1880 at 13 Orr Street the "Sherman" family were listed but I believe it was actually the "Sheehan" family.

1910 listed a "James Dwyer" at 7 Orr Street. Anna & Thomas were listed in the 1910 census as living at 7 Orr Street. It would have been "Mary as HOH, Michael, her BIL, her children: James, Anna, John, Mary, Margaret, and Daniel.

It doesn't give any years or any other information, just their names.

The following tale illustrates the importance of looking at actual source documents.

In the recent posting I did on "One Block On Burden Avenue", I mentioned Homer Renaud (1903-1986) the husband of my Aunt Helen Gertrude O'Connor (1903-1991). Well one of my sisters (I have five) promptly told me I was wrong about his name. The correct name was "Omer" she informed me.

Like all of the people on genealogy lists I am a stickler for accuracy so I looked through my files and found the following:

- 1. Birth record in New York State archives for Homer/Omer only shows "Renaud male child born Cohoes, NY". No given name.
- 2. Wedding write-up in Troy Record on June 22, 1927 has headline "Miss O'Connor wed to Homer J. Renaud.
- 3. Death write-up in The Times Record on December 24, 1986 shows name as "Omer J. Renaud".
- 4. Troy City Directories switch back and forth between the names "Omer" and "Homer".
- 5. Parent's names in death-write up are shown as Edmund Renaud and Mary Lavigne.

I assumed the wedding write-up was the most accurate and used "Homer J. Renaud" as the correct name and where I had a news item showing "Omer" I added a footnote stating the correct name was 'Homer"

After reading a recent Evangelist Newspaper (official paper of the Albany Roman Catholic Diocese) article on the French Church, St. Joseph's in Cohoes, I called the church office and asked them to look in their baptismal records for the Renaud child to see if he was baptized there.

When the office called back with the information that the Renaud child was indeed baptized in St. Joseph's on December 2, 1903 which was the date of his birth. The rest of the information raised more questions.

First of all you were cautioned on the names since the people were French speaking, the name may be the French version of a more common English name and then the name was written in the book in Latin.

The name shown in the baptismal book was OMER ARTHUR RENAUD. Never heard of "Arthur" connected with Homer/Omer. By the way Helen's father, (and my grandfather) William O'Connor (1880-1941) was baptized "William Arthur" at St. Michael's in South Troy in 1880. Never heard of "Arthur" connected with his name either.


