The Infirmary institution was first organized in this county at a special meeting of the commissioners, in April, 1825. There have been five buildings erected, the one that preceded the present building burned down in 1903, and the building shown in the picture, was completed in 1905. It is modern in every detail, and cost approximately \$65,000. The Infirmary farm contains 400 acres. The present Infirmary directors are: N. E. Cleudennin, William Reynard, Wylie Jamison.




Superintendent and Matron of the Harrison County Infirmary
