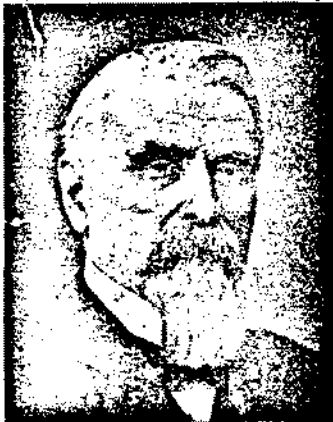


VIEWS IN THE CADIZ PUBLIC LIBRARY

The subject of this sketch is a native of the county, son of John Cunningham, and was born near Moorefield, March 1, 1837. He attended the district schools and afterward graduated from Franklin college in the class of 1857; studied law under John A. Binham and was admitted to the bar in 1859, and is therefore the oldest practicing member of the Harrison county bar. In 1861 he enlisted in Company B, 30th O. V. I., was chosen Captain and in 1862 was promoted to Major. Fought at Antietam, South Mountain, and his regiment led the famous charge at Vicksburg, during which one-third of the regiment fell. Failing health caused his retirement from the army. Returning to Cadiz, he began the practice of law and was elected county prosecutor in 1865, and to the legislature in 1871. Major Cun-

ningham was not only a busy lawyer, but soon became identified with financial and other interests in Cadiz. He became a director in the Harrison National Bank, and for 28 years was its president, resigning that position in January, 1909. In 1866, when the bank was robbed, Major Cunningham led the pursuing party, assisted in the capture of the robbers and the restoration of the \$250,000 stolen. In 1859 he married Miss Laura Phillips, and six children have been born to them. Mr. Cunningham was chairman of the commission having charge of the erection of the monuments to the Ohio soldiers who fell at Antietam. As one of the public spirited, influential men of Cadiz and Harrison County, Major Cunningham enjoys the distinction as soldier, lawyer, banker and successful man of affairs. Though trying to crown a youth of labor with an age of ease, he is still active in his profession and always in demand as counsellor and friend.

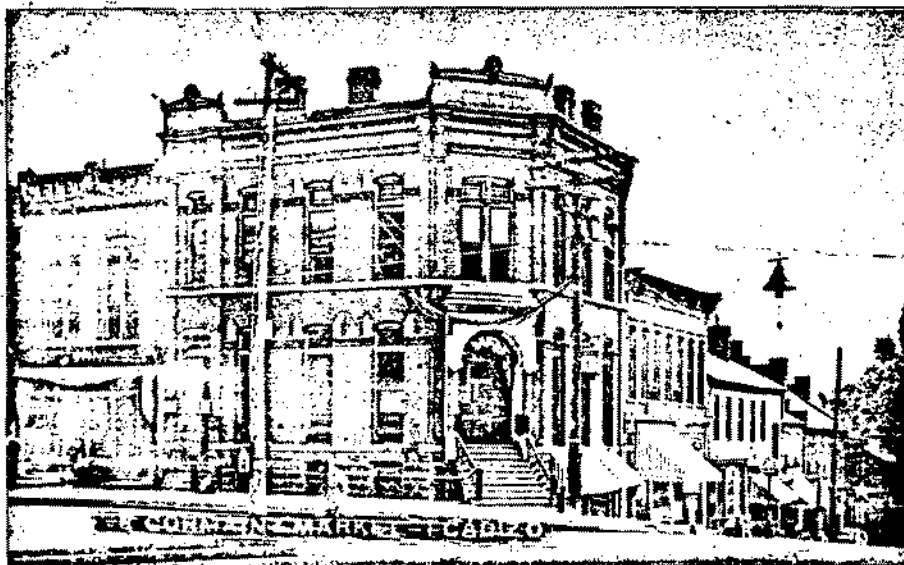
