





HON. JAMES MOORE

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The subject of this sketch is a native of Ireland, and was born in County Tyrone, February 17, 1842. He was scarcely six years of age when he came with his parents to America. They located in Harrison County. James received his education in the district schools and in Hopedale College. In 1862 he enlisted in Company C, 98th O, V. l., and served three years, chiefly in the army of the Cumberland, and then with Sherman in his famous march to the sea. Colonel Moore won promotion and was honorably discharged in Washington, D. C. Returning to Cadiz, he finished his education and taught school four years. Although an ardent Democrat, was in 1869 elected to the office of sheriff, serving with ability. He later became a Republican, began the study of law with Judge Pearce, and was admitted to the Bar in 1876. He has practiced in Cadiz ever since. His interest in public affairs has always been keen, and he has ever been among the first to advance every laudable enterprise. He has been four times mayor of the city, longer than any other who held the office, and during his terms the present waterworks were installed. As lawyer, friend, politician, soldier and public spirited citizen he has ever been extremely popular and of the highest standing in the community. Colonel Moore is a member of the G. A. R. and other orders.

The subject of this sketch is both an unique as well as popular personality of the city of Cadiz. He is the son of J. P. Lucas, and was born in Richmond, Va., in 1850. For a short time he conducted a colored school in Charles City County, Va., but began his career as a teacher in the colored school here in 1872, and has held the position ever since. By working nights and mornings he defrayed the expenses of his High School course, and graduated with honors in 1873. Not alone, however, as teacher, has Professor Lucas made his mark in the community. In the affairs of the town he has taken the keen interest of the honest citizen.
