

The State of New York County.

In this 1<sup>st</sup> day of November A.D. 1832 personally appeared in open Court of Common Pleas, now sitting at the and for the County of Ulster before Aaron Clark a resident of St. Albans Township a said County was recently over 60 years of age on the sixth day of May last was born in Southampton Hampshire County in the State of Massachusetts he is now recorded in his own bible which was set down by himself some time after he was married. who being first duly sworn in open Court doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Provision made by the act of Congress of June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832. —

That he entered the service in the latter part of December or early of the year 1777 in the Militia on a three months tour at Southampton Massachusetts under Capt. Joseph Clapp of East Hampton Col. Chapin Commandant of the Regt. assigned to Great Barrington from thence to Claverack Township in New York State near the Hudson River from thence to Albany where he lay with the Troops while the Regt. was marching when his tour was about half out (say in a month & a half) and when he went home the next summer or about the 11<sup>th</sup> July 1778 he went out again into the service to supply a call made to fill up the lines in the Continental Troops and went and joined the Officers of the Continental Line at Springfield in Massachusetts and place of Recruits & were selected by said Officers from thence to West Point. so as who recollect the names of the Officers appointed to West as down when we arrived at West Point we were placed under the command of different Officers when we arrived there we were under the command of Genl. English he thinks the Regt. was under the command of Col. Sprout went from West Point over to Fishkill thence on to Kings Ferry or Stony Point from thence to Haverstraw Bay from thence to Orange Town lay there when Major Andre was taken & executed thence on into the English Neighborhood from thence on to Clarks Town thence to Totowa (where he thinks) went back to Orange Town where he lay in this in a boat & the Indians never left

through the Stony point & up through the mountains on to West point a short time after he arrived at West point was ordered on a small expedition into 50 men and 25 boats which we took up off Oregon wheels 4 feet in diameter and lowered them up to Newburgh took the boats out on to Land (the oars of the boats were knapled) we then went back round the mountain to West point when he got back some arrangement had taken place with regard to what he belonged had broken up, he was in no fighting during the time he was in the service - was discharged on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of January 1781 Rec'd a full discharge signed by Major Maxwell which is lost or sold does not think he has seen it for 20 years but repeats it as follows "Aaron Stark I am now living from the Town of Southhampton has served his full term of engagement and is now permitted to return home.

Major Maxwell Major General  
has no documentary evidence nor does he know of any person now living at least in this section of the Country by whom he can establish his said services has been a resident of this state for twelve years past he has lived in New York Vermont & Massachusetts states since he was in the service - more or less  
He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any Agency in any State.
