Dear Brother, I recd your letter containing an affidavit  
of my services in the Revolutionary war and I herewith  
send you my proof of your services and I hope they may  
both prove satisfactory to the Secretary of War: I would  
be glad to hear whether there is any prospect of our  
getting any land for our services, you once wrote  
to me that Capt. Baldwin had got his & if you  
know of any way in which we can get ours, I wish  
you would write & let me know: for I am in  
want of it or a pension for my support

I continue to enjoy pretty good  
health, but almost blind, I can  
not see to read or write: my family  
are all well & my children very kind  
to me: you & my dear Brother have already  
lived to a great age & can not expect much  
longer life: I would be glad to see you, but  
can only hope to meet you in happiness hereafter  
accept my best wishes & prayers for you

The State of Ohio Licking County Sp.

On this 3<sup>d</sup> day of November 1832 personally appeared in open Court of Common Pleas now sitting within and for the County of Licking and State of Ohio Sarah Haskinson a Resident of Franklin Township in said Licking County will be eighty two years of age on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of December next (if he so long lives) was born on the 27<sup>th</sup> Dec<sup>r</sup> 1779 was born in Prince Georges County State of Maryland (his age is recorded in his father's bible now in the possession of his sister) who being first duly sworn in open Court doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Provision made by the Act of Congress of the 7<sup>th</sup> of June 1832 that he entered the service of the United States at Martinsburgh Virginia as a volunteer for six months under Captain John Baldwin about the last of August or first of Sept<sup>r</sup> 1777 - or 1778 is not positive as to the year, and marched to Pittsburg and joined the forces under Gen<sup>l</sup> Hand who was Commander of all the forces in Western Country we were then marched to Wheeling on the Ohio (then called Fort Henry) and remained there and at the Beach Bottom fort until some time in the spring when he was discharged having served out his full term (was in several battles) does not recollect whether his discharge was in writing or not if it was it has been long since lost or destroyed.

In the following fall in about the same time of the year he again volunteered for another six months tour at the same place under Henry Ambrose (Captain) ~~John~~ Lieutenant Henry Rowley - Col. John Morrow & Major George Scott were the officers who had the command of the Reg<sup>t</sup>. we then marched a Reg<sup>t</sup> of us out to the Mouth of Big Beaver Creek on the Ohio where we built Fort McIntosh - there we came under the command of Gen<sup>l</sup> McIntosh we then march about one hundred miles into the Indian Country and built Fort Laurence on the Tuscarawas River remained there some time when we went back to Fort McIntosh the Gen<sup>l</sup> there dismissed the Reg<sup>t</sup> to which he belonged and he returned with the Reg<sup>t</sup> home when he was finally discharged having been out in this Campaign about

four months - he did not again enter the service  
Deponent states that he has resided in this state (Ohio)  
since the year 1805 previous thereto he resided  
more or less in the States of Maryland Virginia  
and Pennsylvania - he states that he has  
no documentary evidence of his aforesaid  
services nor does he know of any person now  
living at least in this section of the Country  
by whom he can establish said services.

Except his Brother Bazil Hoskinson (now living in  
Erie Pennsylvania) who was out <sup>devised</sup> with <sup>him</sup> during the  
whole Term of six months under Capt. Baldwin  
He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever  
to a pension or annuity except the present  
and declares that his name is not on  
the Pension Roll of any Agency in any  
State

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Isaiah Hoskinson.

The data which follow were obtained from papers on file in the pension claim S.16157, based upon the military service of Isaiah Hoskinson in the Revolutionary War.

Isaiah Hoskinson was born December 27, 1749, in Prince George County, Maryland. The names of his parents are not shown.

Isaiah Hoskinson enlisted in August or September of the year 1777 or 1778, at Martinsburg, Virginia, and served as a private for six months in Captain John Baldwin's company, Colonel Pendleton's Virginia regiment. The following fall he enlisted and served four months in Captain Henry Ambrose's company, Colonel John Morrow's regiment, was in General McIntosh's Expedition to the "Indian Country," and assisted in building Forts McIntosh and Laurens.

This soldier was allowed pension on his application executed November 3, 1832, at which time he was a resident of Franklin Township, Licking County, Ohio.

On November 3, 1832, Isaiah Hoskinson stated he had resided in the State of Ohio since 1805 and prior thereto he had more or less resided in the States of Maryland, Virginia and Pennsylvania.

He gave the name of a brother, Basil Hoskinson, living in 1832 in Erie, Pennsylvania. No other family data shown.

In order to obtain date of last payment of pension, the name and address of person paid and possibly the exact date of death of Isaiah Hoskinson, you should write to the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, this city and cite the following:
