 according to Law - on his oath says that he enlisted in  
 Captain Vane's troop of Light Dragoons in the month of  
 April 1783 - in the town of Reading in the State of Pennsylvania  
 to serve during the War - that he served six years in the said  
 Company - for fifteen months - when he was duly and honor-  
 ably discharged, or furloughed - The said Company was at-  
 tached to Genl. Washington's life guard - Dependent upon the  
 day that he is now in very reduced circumstances and  
 stands in the greatest need of the aid of his country for support  
 that he is infirm lame and old - Dependent upon a cer-  
 tificate or discharge, signed by Genl. George Washington's order

Mefflin County & On the 22<sup>d</sup> day of August 1820 personally appear  
 ed, in open Court it being a Court of Record held in Lewis town, in and  
 for the County of Mefflin Jacob Barlett of the township of Mayno, in  
 the aforesaid County and State of Pennsylvania, who being first duly  
 sworn according to law, doth on his oath declare, that he served in  
 the Revolutionary war as follows viz. that he enlisted in Captain Van  
 Hens troop of Light Dragoons, in the month of April 1782, in the town  
 of Reading & State of Pennsylvania and served in the said Corps for  
 fourteen months at which time he was honorably discharged. That the  
 Company of Capt. Van Hens was attached to Genl Washingtons life  
 guard. Deponent is now 56 years of age and never has received any  
 pension from Government. He is his application for a pension dated  
 9<sup>th</sup> May 1820 was returned with this endorsement "Service Admitted"  
 But that "The schedule of property must be exhibited agreeably to act  
 15<sup>th</sup> May 1820"

And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United  
 States on the 15<sup>th</sup> March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift  
 sale or in any manner, but by the disposition of Providence, disposed  
 of my property or any part thereof with the intent thereby to diminish  
 it as to bring myself within the provisions of the act of Congress enti-  
 tled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and  
 Naval services of the United States in the Revolutionary war" passed on  
 the 15<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person for  
 me in trust any property, or security, contracts or debts due to me; nor  
 have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto  
 annexed, and by me subscribed viz

The State of Ohio Licking county

On this 7<sup>th</sup> Seventh day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and Forty three personally appeared before the Judges of the court of common pleas in & for said county of Licking, Christena Barlet a resident of Eden Township in the county of Licking aforesaid aged seventy eight years, who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup> 1838. Entitled "An act Granting half pay and pensions to certain widows" That she is the widow of Jacob Barlet who was a private in the army of the Revolution - and one of Genl. Washington's Life Guard - & that he was a pensioner of the United States - placed on the Pennsylvania Roll of Pensioners and in the Spring of the year 1833 she as the widow of said Jacob Barlet - drew seventeen dollars - being arrears of Pension due to her said husband at the time of his death - by Joseph S Lake Esq of Woster Ohio - where she then resides - & who informed her that the pension certificate of the said Jacob Barlet was left at the War Department - by said J S Lake -

She further declares that she was married to the said Jacob Barlet in the month of September in the year seventeen hundred & Eighty five and that her husband the aforesaid Jacob Barlet died on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of April (1828) Eighteen hundred and Twenty eight: That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place <sup>previous</sup> to the first of January seventeen hundred and ninety four. viz: at the time above specified - and is still unmarried and the widow of Jacob Barlet -
