Was Soloist at Great Special Concert in Switzerland

Son of Former Mansfield Man Is Playing in Germany

Francis Macmillen, the eminent American violinist, son of a former Mansfield man, was the soloist recently at one of the special concerts given at the famous Chateau de Trevano, at Lugano, Switzerland. Mr. Macmillen was heard in the Beethoven concerto and an a. and b. group composed of the Legende by Sinding and the Introduction and Ronda Capriccioso by Saint-Saens. So great was his success on this occasion that he was asked to play again on the following evening, a compliment seldom paid any artist.

The Orchestra du Chateau de Trevano, is composed of men selected from the principal orchestras of Switzerland and Italy, and are under the able conductorship of Monsieur Louis Lombard. It was a concertmeister with this orchestra that Cesar Thomson, the celebrated Belgium violinist, first gained recognition as an artist. This orchestra is maintained during the summer months by Monsieur Lombard, for the express purpose of dispensing symphonic music for the edification of his numerous guests.

The Chateau is situated in the valley near the Lake of Lugano, one of the most beautiful of the Italian Lakes and in the distance on all sides can be seen the snow capped peaks of the Alps. The Chateau is regarded as one of the most beautiful and pretentious castles in Europe. Mr. Macmillen began a series of four concerts in Berlin last night after which he will be heard
