Property Sold and Proceeds Distributed

The Warren Paint Co., by its attorneys, Cummings, McBride & Wolfe, has filed a petition in common pleas court against Hugh C. Smith, Ellen M. Smith, R. B. Moore, John Shellhorn and The Gem City Acetylene Generator Co., to marshal liens.

The petition says on Sept. 21, plaintiff recovered a judgment against Hugh C. and Ellen M. Smith for \$432.19 and for \$4.50 costs that they have no goods or lands subject to execution, but that Ellen M. Smith is seized of an equity in land in Jefferson township.

The petition says that R. B. Moore, John Shellhorn and the Gem City Acetylene Generator Co. claim to hold mortgages on the property by reason of which it is claimed the plaintiff is unable to effect a sale of the premises.
