## Red. Jan. 27

Pleasant day. Nevi Derrow, Joe Shively, Henry Stocle end I were out intending to ge some cornmeal. We got some corn in a crib bout it mile from here. Then we went into a bern to shill it. Thile there a patrol came around but they did not see us although they hunted around the barn. Hen they left we made tracks for comp with nearly 2 bushels of corn. Got in salady. Quite a number were arrestal. I was in the Tennoldee liver wishing. Thurs. Jan. 23

The buys went out to the mill and got our corn around. The 65th vet rans are going for Chastenoogs tomorrow corning.

We are to be transferred to the 125th. Fri. Jen. 29

Marm lay. Ofth started for Chattanooga. Our Squad and the 15th non-votorens were taken to headquarters but where they will be appigned. I do not kno. Jos. Shoals and I wore detailed to go with the 65th to Chattanooga to bring up our baggage. We drow rations and got started for Loudon about morning. Came about 15 ciles. Are camped 4 mile 3. Sweet later. The c are some beautiful springs here. I am very tired. The 15th Ohio, 42nd Ill. and 69 of the 3rd My. sre going from our Brigade now. Sat. Jan 30

Another hard days march. Came about 20 miles. camped at Riceville, a poor insignificant place. Some of us are quartered under the shed of a warehouse. It reduce a good part of the ... Passed through Athens 3 miles back.

A nice and flourishing town.

Sun. Jan. 31 Marchod 13 miles arrived at Cleveland about 4 P. . C-is quite a flourishing looking place. It is the junction of the Chattanooga and the Knoxville 3.T. B.R.R. Pho Robs

were here this norming. Priday the Rebs had a lence.

Mon. Pob. 1 Camped at Harrison. 12 miles from Chattanoogs. Marched 18 siles through country. Followed along a stream several miles. Had to cross it 25 to 30 times. Before day it rained; also part of the Porencon. Roads were quite slippy part of the way. Are camped in a cornfloid tonight. Tues. Tab. 2

Started from Harrisson at 7, arrived at Chattanooga a little bat re maon. (12 miles). The 64th started day before gesterday for home. David Dillon & Thomas Cornack were left because they had not served long enough. A Lieut. 42nd III. has command of those left. He gave me an order for 3 days ration. I will sleap in one of the Cr. S. tents. Tod. Pob. 5 Have a severe cold.

Got three lays rations this morning. Have been under the weather all day. John Theeky was in to see me this evening. The 15th Ohio start for home tomorrow. They are

quartered in the 64th old quarters.
