

Leigh Johnson, Archivist
San Joaquin County Historical Society and Museum

Please join us for Leigh Johnsen's presentation on Thursday March 18th at 7:00 PM. Leigh is the new archivist for the Historical Society, coming from the Holt Atherton Special Collections Department of the University of the Pacific, where he worked as a project archivist arranging the papers of San Joaquin County historian Leslie Crow.

Leigh has published professionally in the Western Historical Quarterly, Church History, Spectrum Magazine, Documentary Editing, and Civil War History. He has also published in microform the Papers of Isaac Backus, 1690-1828, a documentary editing project focused on a noted New England religious dissenter often compared to Thomas Jefferson for his contribution to matters of church and state during the early days of the American Republic.



THE DEVIL IS IN THE DETAILS

Search results are only as good as the question you pose.

Use the plus (+) and minus (-) signs in front of words to force their inclusion and/or exclusion in searches. (NO space between the sign and the keyword). Example: +George -Washington

Use double quotation marks (" ") around phrases to ensure they are searched exactly as is, with the words side by side in the same order.

Example: "John Smith"

Type keywords and phrases in lower case to find both lower and upper case versions. Typing capital letters will usually return only an exact match. Example: president retrieves both president and President

Use the tilde sign before a word is helpful to find related words that are nearly the same meaning. Example: ~genealogy will return genealogy, geneology, genealogical, ancestry, or family tree Example: ~ancestry, will return ancestry, ancestor, ancestors, family tree, genealogy.

Use an asterisk as a wild card, which is helpful to find variations in spelling and word form.

Example: "John * Smith", will return people with the name of John Smith and John Smith with a middle name or middle initial followed by Smith.

Example: librar* returns library, libraries, librarian, etc.

Use a number range search to match a range of year Example: 1700...1750 returns results from 1700 through 1750

Boolean and Special Operators - Combining words with AND as well as OR, helps with refining searches. (Most search engines require that the operators be capitalized). NOT is also acceptable, but it is easier to use a minus sign.

In Boolean searches, always enclose OR statements in parentheses.

Example: Birth (announcement OR certificate)
Example: George AND Washington could return
George Burns and Grover Washington

THE GERALD D. KENNEDY REFERENCE LIBRARY AT THE SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The San Joaquin County Historical Society maintains an archival collection on behalf the County of San Joaquin. The collection includes historic records from the County and the Cities of Lodi and Stockton, as well as books, manuscripts, business and legal records, maps, photographs, and ephemera pertaining to the history of the County.

Genealogy

The collection includes directories that cover Stockton, Lodi, and other cities of the County during most of the twentieth century and much of the nineteenth. It also holds published and unpublished records of births, marriages, and deaths, as well as marriage certificates from 1874 to 1950. Of special interest are the library's Pioneer Family Register, which includes genealogical research submitted by descendents of longtime County residents, a collection of more formal genealogical resources compiled by individuals, and plat books that afford visual evidence of landholding from 1876 to 1919.


Among the records are warrants for land grants in the San Joaquin Delta; petitions, correspondence, election materials, and maps and drawings for the County's reclamation districts from 1860 to 1960; countywide plat books; and aerial photographs from 1937, 1940, 1957, 1963, 1983, and 1990.

Photographs

The library holds more than seven thousand photographic images—prints, slides, tintypes, and glass plate negatives—that cover a wide range of historical topics in San Joaquin County. Most of these images can be searched at the Museum with an electronic catalog.

Agricultural Equipment

Because of the Museum's strength in agricultural technology, the Reference Library possesses owner's manuals, catalogs, and related publications that deal with tractors and other agricultural equipment used in San Joaquin County farming from the 1880s to the 1970s.

MEET HENRY AND KATIE BRANDT

PHOTO BACKGROUND STORY

Ms. Shelley Cardiel from Kirkland, Washington purchased this photo in a second hand store and sent it to our research team, Charlie and Melinda Lambaren. Why? Written on the back of the photo is: MR. AND MRS. HENRY BRANDT, LODI, CALIFORNIA.

Ms. Cardiel suggested that perhaps the San Joaquin Genealogical Society could track down a living family member and give the photo to them. The research team handed the photo off to me . A quick search of some basic records – census, city directories and cemeteries and I found whom I believe to be Henry and Katie Brandt.

In the 1930 census, Henry (age 37), his wife Katie (age 37) and their two children Alice (age 14) and Harry (age 9) are living in Elkhorn Township on Alpine Road. Henry and Katie have been married for 20 years. All members of the family were born in South Dakota. The parents of both Henry and Katie were born in Russia. Henry owns the farm where they have a vineyard.

So in the 1920 census, I found the Brandt family right where they should be – in Lincoln Township, Hyde County, South Dakota. Henry (age 26), Katie (age 25), Alice (age 4 3/12) and Harry (age 3/12). There is a juicy clue here as well – living with the family is Henry Goehring (age 28) who is identified as Henry's brother-in-law. We now have a probable maiden name for Katie.

SJGS member Adine Gnekow was so very helpful and located where Henry and Katie are buried. Lodi Memorial Cemetery located at 5750 E. Pine St., Lodi . Henry Brandt buried Feb. 16, 1956 Katie Brandt buried August 10, 1951

I had to stop the research here due to other commitments. If there is anyone out there who knows of this family or **even better** who would like to take the project on – find a descendant to give the photo a home – please let me or any board member know and I will turn over the photo and all the research done up to this point.
