### **Genealogy and Our Medical History**

We have all been to visit the doctor for a complete physical, at some time or other. During the examination the doctor asks us specific questions about our family medical history. Some of the answers we readily know, others we don't know so well. Genealogy certainly plays a large part in filling in some of the answers to the questions we previously had no answers for.

During the past year I have come to learn that there is some answers that I can now provide to my doctor. Am I fortunate, I would say so! Initially I remember my Aunt **Joyce Maduke**, as a vibrant woman, who lived life to the fullest, even though she had diabetes. She had developed diabetes while a youngster and was dependant on injections of insulin. Her vibrant young life was cut short when she died during her mid 30's in 1960 from complications due to her diabetes. In short she had kidney failure and there were no kidney transplants at that time. My grandmother had always maintained this was something passed down from my grandfather's side of the family.

This was the only medical history that I had been able to share with my family doctor. As time progressed, my father's parents **Stanley Maduke** and **Martje Swaan** both developed adult onset diabetes. My grandfather became insulin dependant, while my grandmother could manage her diabetes with medication. Of course, both were on diabetic diets. Then my father **Jack Maduke**, developed adult onset diabetes that he manages with medication and diet. Next my father's sister **Gladys** developed adult onset diabetes and controlled this with medication. Last, my father's youngest sibling **Stanley** got adult onset diabetes too. Stanley managed to control his with diet and medication.

All went well except for about 3 years ago both Gladys and Stanley were no longer able to control their diabetes with medication. Both are now insulin dependant. End of the story, not quite! Events took a turn for the worse, when about 2 years ago Gladys had to have part of one leg amputated due to complications of diabetes. Stanley developed problems with his one foot, which is the result of diabetic complications.

This is a serious medical condition that appears to run in this family. Is this scary for me, yes. More importantly where does this come from. Grandmother thought her husbands side of the family. Not so, as I was about to discover through the magic of genealogy.

While researching my grandmother Martje Swaan and her mother's side of the family I came upon some revelations. Too bad my grandmother is no longer alive to share this with her, but have been able to do so with other relatives.

Hendrik Kuijper was born in 1846 in Schoorl, Noord Holland; son of Klaas Kuijper and Trijntje Van Lienen. Hendrik married Neeltje Broertjes who had been born in 1851 in Warmenhuizen; daughter of Pieter Broertjes and Neeltje Zwart. All very fascinating so far, but just names and dates. Hendrik Kuijper and Neeltje Broertjes daughter Jannetje (my great grandmother) was born on August 11, 1881.

Neeltje died in 1888 of Tuberculosis, which was suspected of resulting from diabetes. Jannetje's youngest sister Pietertje, died at age 16 from complications of diabetes. Jannetje's two aunts died from diabetes. One died at age 34 and the other died from complications of having her leg amputated. Knowing the identity of these two aunts was important. Both of these aunts were Neeltje's sisters.

In looking at my family tree, I can see that Diabetes did not come from the lineage of Klaas Kuijper and Trijntje Van Lienen, but rather from the lineage fo Pieter Broertjes and Neeltje Zwart. Three children of Pieter and Neeltje had died from complications of diabetes. As of this date, I am not sure of the source of the diabetes as coming through Pieter of Neeltje, but am confident that it has come down threw this side of the family.

Genealogy has paid off big time, in that it has helped me identify a potential disease that can affect my siblings, cousins, my children and myself. This has made me more aware of the other potentials that remain hidden within my genetic make up, that will only be found through genealogy. This is something that I would urge everyone to be interested in and to look at carefully. Genealogy is not just about names and dates, it's a bout the daily lives of our ancestors, how they lived and how they died.

### **Answers Lead to More Questions**

My great grandmother **Emilie Donat Drager** was born in 4 April 1866 in Goren Maly, Gostynin, Warszawa, Poland to Heinrich Donat and Karoline Kroening. Information that is easy to follow, one would think. Emilie died 9, September 1940 at home and is buried in Woodlawn Cemetary, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, next to her husband Adolf. An alternate spelling for Emilie's maiden name was Doughnut, provided by one of her son's who had no formal education.

I knew that Emilie's sister **Pauline Donat Schaler** had lived in the area of Neche, North Dakota. The same area in the United States that my great grandparents had initially settled, prior to their coming to the Bergheim District of Saskatoon. The Schaler's were family members that I had never met, but were always discussed and my grandmother would go to visit her sister Juliane (Julia) who had been raised by Pauline Donat Schaler.

After my grandmother's death and her possessions being dispersed, I acquired her baptismal certificate that documented her date of birth, place, parents and godparents. Her godfather is listed as being **Ferdinand Donat**. I could only speculate that he was a brother to Pauline and Emilie, but could not find out further information on him.

While pursing information on my mother's father's side of the family I stumbled across a web site that contained information about the Gottlieb Dreger family. It was while looking at the Canada Census of 1901 that I made an astonishing discovery. Listed with Gustav Dreger (as head) were Gottlieb and Julia Dreger (parents of Gustav), 2 of their children, and a **Rudolph Donit** age 6 and is a nephew of Gustav Dreger (1901 Census, Franklin Municipality., Provencher Co., MB, Dist. C2, p4). In order for Rudolph to be the nephew of Gustav, he would have to be the son of one of Gustav's sisters. Eliminating all the sisters whose spouses I knew left me with 2 possibilities, either Augusta, or Anna. But this remained a mystery. Any descendants of Gottlieb and Julia Dreger, were not aware of Rudolph Donit. Some information did arrive from a descendant of Gottlieb and Julia. Lorraine in Beausejour, Manitoba sent me some information she had received from another lady in Maple Creek who was doing Dreger research. That information listed Anna as being married to a Donit/Donart.

I asked numerous questions of relatives, none having heard of Rudolph. I decided to pursue the family of Julia Dreger Henschel, my grandmother's sister, who was raised in Neche, North Dakota by their aunt Pauline Donat Schaler. I received a large envelope in the mail from one of Julia's daughters, which contained a number of pictures, a lot of them originals from 1903 and up. What a treasure trove. Not only did Martha send me, a total stranger (albeit a relative) these pictures, but she identified everyone in the picture. There was two pictures that she had identified for me, one indicating 2 of my great aunts and **an Emma Hasse** wife of **Rudolph Donat**. The other picture was taken in 2004 and was all of Julia Henschels surviving children along with a Martha, daughter of Rudolph or Roy Donat.

I checked out the Manitoba Vital Stats website and found there were a number of Donats, who had married in Gretna, Manitoba. This was the location of the Lutheran Church that my ancestors had attended. No reason not to believe that these were related. I knew that the records for this church were kept in the Lutheran Church in Rosenfeld, Manitoba. This was information that I had read in one of the many issues of the Wandering Volhynians newsletter.

I had purchased all of the copies of the Wandering Volhynians from the Historical Society of Germans from Poland and Volhynia, located in Edmonton. I became a member of this group after finding a long lost relative. I wrote to the Lutheran Church in Rosenfeld and to date have not received a reply. I made numerous phone calls to this church without ever getting an answer. I emailed my mother's cousin in Emerson and asked him about these Donat names, none of which were familiar to him. Unbeknownst to me, he drove over to the Lutheran Church in Rosenfeld and made an attempt to find the information that I wanted. He informed me that he had no luck finding the names or the dates. Do not know why this occurred, as I am positive this information is there somewhere. I decided to break down and sent off to the Manitoba Vital Stats for marriage certificates of the following:

Hollinger, Jacob and Donat Carolina
Donat, Ferdinand and Whl Catharine
Stelzer, Frederick and Donat Catharina
Donart, Rudolph and Hasse, Emma
July 29, 1908
December 25, 1903
January 1, 1911
March 14, 1920

With this list of names, I thought I had more Donat's then I knew about. Little did I know. I waited patiently for these certificates to arrive, it took 7 long weeks. They arrived just before Christmas, and what a surprise they contained.

- 1. Carolina Donat was a widow in her 60's marrying Jacob Hollinger. Witnesses were Rudolph Schaler and Ferdinand Donat. Who was this woman??
- 2. Ferdinand Donat was listed as the son of Henrich Donat and Caroline Kroening marrying Catharine Uhl (not Whl). Witnesses were Jacob Kuhn and Adolf Drager (my great grandfather).
- 3. Catharina Donat marrying Frederich Stelzer was a widow and the parents were the same as for the Catharine Uhl who had married Ferdinand. The witnesses were Rudolph Schaler and Emil Meoz. I assume this is the same woman.
- 4. Rudolph Donart lists his parents as Anna Dreger and August Donart (deceased). He lists his place of residence as Walhalla, North Dakota. Emma Hasse lists her parents as Ferdinand Hasse and Julia Schmitke. (I also have Schmitke's in my family tree). Witnesses were Albert Steinke and Albert Hom(p)el. I assume that August Donart was the son of Heinrich Donat and Caroline Kroening.

I put this information on a couple of lists for Germans, and North Dakota. I received a number of replies. I did not receive any information about Rudolph Donart/Donit/Donat. I did find out that Carolina Donat was my great grandmother and that she was deceased in 1922. From the Pembina County, St. Joseph Township 9<sup>th</sup> June 1900 Census I found that:

Henry (Heinrich) Donat was the head of family, white male, age 60 born Dec 1839. Carolina – wife, age 57, born 1843, married for 40 years, had 14 births, 3 living children.

Ferdinand – son – born 1883, age 17

The family came to the United States in 1898, had applied for Naturalization, could read and write, but not speak English. They owned land, had a mortgage.

On the census I recognized the names of their neighbours, and looked at a map of Neche, North Dakota and area that lists the landowners in 1905. There is was all the time just down the road from Rudolph Schaler. Henry Doughnut my great great grandfather. I had seen that on a number of occasions, but it just never clicked. Why did my mother and her sisters not know that their great grandparents had immigrated? So many mysteries.

On the 1910 census it lists Kate Donnett as head of family on the same property. She is age 23. Son Henry is age 5 and daughter Margaret is age 2. Also listed is a servant John Ouhl age 16 (I assume this is her brother).

Both Heinrich and Ferdinand Donat need more exploration and that is what is progressing. I have sent for their death certificates from North Dakota. These can be ordered on line, as there is a website available.

I contacted Martha in North Dakota to ask about the pictures she had sent me, and to inquire of a phone number for the Martha Donat (daughter of Rudolph) in the picture. I received this information and phone Martha Donat/Donart in Benton Harbor, Michigan. We had a lovely chat about the relatives. She knows that she is related to the Dreger/Henschel clan. The only way that this can be is if Rudolph Donart/Donat is the grandson of Henry and Caroline Donat. I am going to send her information and she is going to go thru her father's papers. So many questions to ask and be answered, who raised Rudolph Donart/Donat, what happened to his parents and why do none of the relatives from the Dreger/Wutzke side know of this person when some of the relatives from the Drager/Donat side know of him.

This is a large ball of string and many ends to unwind. That is what genealogy is about, following the trail.
