Unexpected Connection

I had always known that my WUTZKE family left Russia in 1900, settled in Neche, North Dakota and then came to Canada in 1905. They settled in the Bergheim District, which is located between Saskatoon and Aberdeen, Saskatchewan. My great grandfather Andrew Wutzke farmed in this area along with his uncle Andreas Wutzke, cousins and his sister and brother-in-law, Pauline and Martin Engwer.

In 2006 while researching church information from the Gretna Lutheran Church in Gretna, Manitoba I was provided with an interesting piece of information. That there was a Wilhelm Wutzke and Mathilda Harmel who had twins born Feb. 5, 1907. This same Mathilda Wutzke is listed as the godmother for Wilhelm Wutzke born 21 February, 1905 to Andrew Wutzke and Amelie Dreger. My great uncle and great grandparents respectively.

Who were Wilhelm Wutzke and Mathilda Harmel Wutzke? Some relation for sure. My mother had indicated that Andrew Wutzke would often visit with the Harmel family in Janzen, Saskatchewan. Must be some relationship I assumed. I was able to find that Andrew had a brother Wilhelm that I had not been able to find any information on, was this him?? I attempted to pursue this avenue by writing all of the Wutzke's listed in Manitoba with no luck.

While making a continued search for Andrew Wutzke and the passenger lists I came across an odd entry in the Odessa Digital Library. This was for a Wilhelm Watzka, with wife and children along with an Andreas. I thought I would look this one up. That was not the first time that another spelling has been listed for Wutzke. I have found it spelled as Wulzke, Wodzke, Wotzke, and Wudzke. So the spelling as Watzka came as no surprise.

Pursuing this avenue through the Library and Archives Canada I looked at the ship list for the SS Vancouver. There Andrew along with brother Wilhelm Watzka and sister Pauline Engwer are recorded as leaving Liverpool, England on 17 May 1900 and arriving Quebec 27 May 1900 on the SS Vancouver. I had finally found them.

This still did not get me any closer to finding Wilhelm and Mathilda Wutzke. Since 1995 I have been actively pursuing my genealogical history. While at times there seems to be more successes than failures, there comes a time when one needs to step back and let the ancestors direct the search. During a hectic period when I was involved in 3 household moves within a matter of months; I unexpectedly received an email in Oct 2008 that would change my research direction.

The email was from a lady who was helping a friend start her family tree. In essence it said that she has a family named Woodske who lived in Neche, North Dakota and are recorded in the 1910 census. She believed that the name in Russia may have been Wutzke. She found information on the death registration that indicated William was born May 18, 1877 and listed his father as Fred, that they had immigrated to North Dakota in 1900 and that Wilhelm/William had been married to Mathilda Harmal (Harmel) in 1896 in Russia. They had moved to Canal Flats, B.C. between 1912 and 1915. Did I think this could be part of my family?

Did I ever believe this was part of my family! The first clue for me was Neche, North Dakota, as that seems to have been the stopping off point of all my relatives and those that settled in the Bergheim District. Yes, we were related, no doubt in my mind. I had assumed this family had remained in Manitoba or North Dakota, never thinking to look westward. But then what would I have looked for, certainly not Woodske.

I have since had contact with Irene in Vernon who is the lady doing her Wutzke family tree. Yes we are related. Irene and my mother Violet Wutzke Maduke are 2nd cousins, while I am the 2nd cousin once removed. Irene sent me a picture of herself and my mother thought that she bore a strong resemblance to another second cousin who resides in the Saskatoon area, but is descended from Andreas Wutzke and Theophile Friedenberg.

Was I expecting that out of the blue family would find me. Not on your life. Am I excited, VERY!!! I can share my passion with a whole new audience, and learn more about another side of the family. I will have

SBSGS - Executive positions that need to be filled

The President shall:

- Be responsible for the direction and control of the business affairs of the SBSGS,
- Chair all Executive meetings, including preparing agendas and if possible, distributing to executive members in advance
- Chair all General meetings, including updating branch members on significant branch business i.e. seminar updates, fundraising events, Post-1906 census project, etc.
- Set up the overall agenda for each monthly meeting in consultation with the program cocoordinator,
- Attend SGS meetings or arrange for an alternate member of the executive to attend
- Along with the executive, prepare an upcoming yearly budget,
- Prepare documents and reports as necessary,
