CREDITOR.—LIQUIDATOR.—TRUSTEE.—This question, whether "trustees appointed under a liquidation are justified in giving to the debtor goods value £400 without the consent of the creditors," answers itself; for, of course, as stated, such an act could not be justified. If the quester will be good enough to state shortly what has happened it may be possible to see what is meant, as there are various ways in which a debtor may get back his estate—if he pays a composition, for instance; though it can certainly not be given him for nothing by the creditors' trustees.
H. & S.—GUARANTEE.—A guarantee which relates exclusively to goods sold does not require any stamp; but any other guarantee must bear a stampy agreement stamp, which may either be adhesive and affixed and cancelled by the person signing, or an impressed stamp. This latter may be upon the paper at the time of signing, or it can be impressed within fourteen days after its date. A mere offer to give a guarantee is not in itself sufficient, but the safest way is to have a plainly-worded guarantee, about which there can be no mistake.

SUBSCRIBER'S CLERK.—SICK GIRL.—WINDING UP.—This being an unregistered society it is not easy to say by what simple method it can be wound up, though this might be done through the aid of the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice. Doubtless the club has rules, and if the quester will send a copy the point shall be considered further. It may be as well to note that in all cases of questions upon such and similar societies it is quite impossible to give satisfactory answers without seeing the rules upon which they are founded and under which they are carried on and may be terminated.

G. B.—RAILWAY CARRIAGE.—CASK.—It is difficult to answer general questions otherwise than generally without going into details which would be too lengthy. If a railway company undertakes to carry goods and books them through, then they are liable for them until they arrive at their destination, although part of the way may be by canal or river, unless this liability is limited, as it may be, by the special conditions of their contract. Railways may limit their responsibility as to sea-risk by a public notice; but in other respects, if they book through, they can only control their liability by giving special notice, either upon the consignment note or the receipt. Each case must, therefore, depend to some extent upon its own merits, and a general statement may often prove misleading.
