NOTES FROM THE PRESIDENT

Arlington Central Library Closure in December

The George W. Hawkes Central Library will close to patrons on Tuesday, December 23, 2014. This is a key step in the transition to the new Central Library at a site across Center Street from its present location and scheduled to open in 2017.

During the time that the new library is being constructed, downtown library services will be offered at the temporary Central Express facility located at 200 North Cooper Street. This downtown Library will open on January 13, 2015 and will offer computer access, Wi-Fi, new and high demand materials for adults and children and holds pickup. Recently announced hours of service at the Central Express Library will be 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday and 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Friday and Saturday. Additional information can be found on the APL and the MOReLibrary web sites.

During the moving and re-shelving process the genealogy collection will not be available for research. Library staff plans call for the greater part of the Central Library genealogical research collection to be relocated to the Northeast Branch. The Arlington Director of Libraries, Cary Siegfried, has asked the Arlington Genealogical Society to play an active role during the transition. Several AGS members, familiar with the APL genealogy research collection, have formed a committee to assist, advise, and help the APL Staff regarding the temporary relocation of the Genealogy Research collection to Northeast Branch Library. The AGS Genealogy Resources Committee first met during early November to name a chair person and hold a brainstorming session. Current committee members are: Tom Cogdell, Mary Ann Conrad, Wally Goodman, Sylvia Hoad, Larry Howser, Laureen Jacobs and Pete Jacobs with Laureen Jacobs as the committee chair. The AGS Genealogy Resources Committee is adjunct to the AGS Purchasing Committee.

FUTURE AGS MEETINGS


Jan. 13, 2015: Richard Selcer on "The Panther Legend of Fort Worth."

We are sorry to report the death of Mrs. Graham's brother, who was laid to rest in West Fork Cemetery Monday evening,

June 3rd, at 3 o'clock. We have a tender feeling for all these loved ones who mourn over their dead.

Friday June 7, 1929 "Lige" Pressley Found Dead in Field, Victim of Apoplexy

"Lige" Pressley, 68, farmer, of rural route number six, fell dead while plowing in the field Tuesday a while before the noon hour.

Kenney Hudson, who was working in the same field with Mr. Pressley, found the body a short while after the tragedy and hurriedly summoned Dr. J. F. McKissick, Arlington physician, who arrived and pronounced him dead, the cause of which was apoplexy. Hudson had talked with Mr. Pressley only a very short while before his death, and had not noticed anything unusual, it is said, but after leaving him to take up his work again, soon noticed that no one was tending the plow of Pressley. Mr. Hudson investigated and found the body lying on the ground with life extinct, although at the time he did not know the exact condition of the stricken man.

Mr. Pressley had suffered for many years with a cancer on his face, and this, it was believed, might have been a contributing factor that brought on the stroke that resulted in his sudden death.

Funeral services were held Wednesday evening at three o'clock at the residence, Rev. S. M. Bennett, pastor of Arlington Presbyterian Church, officiating.
