In reply to your letter of April 24, 1925, in which you ask for the Confederate military record of Mr. H. H. Davis in the 49th Mississippi Infantry, I regret to inform you that there are no rolls on file in this Department of the 49th Regiment Mississippi Infantry, Confederate States Army, and no record of the service, capture or parole of a man named H. H. Davis as a member of that regiment has been found. Nor has that name been found on the rolls on file of any other organization from the State of Mississippi in the Confederate States Army.

However, it should be remembered that the collection of Confederate records in this Department is far from complete, and failure to find the record of any person thereon is by no means conclusive proof that such person did not serve during some period not covered by the records in the Department.

On account of the report on military record of H. H. Davis, received from Washington, D.C. stating that his name cannot be found on the records, in connection with any company or regiment designated by him, it becomes necessary that he submit further proof of service, in the form of affidavits of parties who personally know of the service rendered.


